Phenothiazine Stands Up

by Dr. I. B. Boughton Texas Substation No. 14, Sonora, Texas

Ample proof that sheep roundworms can be controlled in West Texas by

free-choice feeding of phenothiazine-salt mixture, with no danger of poisoning. is revealed in a 4-year test at this station.

The test was made to find the answers to two specific questions: 1) Whether phenothiazine-salt mixture, fed to sheep free choice, would control stomach and other roundworm infections. 2) Whether long time use of such a mixture would be poisonous

Answering both questions, it was effective and it

Sheep used in the test were fairly beavily infested at the start, showing an average of 1180 worm eggs per gram of manure in ewes and an average of 1700 in lambs. The count decreased steadily to 60 for ewes and 30 for lambs by the fourth year. The worm eggs in the manure did not hatch, an important point since the failure to hatch shows that the infestation of the range was being reduced.

But don't throw away the drench gun. In 8 Minnesota flocks, where sheep were given a pheno-thiazine drench and had free access to phenothiazinesalt mixture, the lambs weighed 93 to 104 pounds. They dressed out 47.4 to 48.9%; and over 90% of the carcasses graded AA.

On the other hand, in flocks where the sheep were given the phenothiazine-salt mixture but were not drenched, the lambs weighed 87-99 pounds; they dressed out 46.6 to 47.4%; and 11% to 40% graded AA.



AUSTIN. - It is a tragedy that Texas parents continue to allow their babies to suffer and die from that painful and killing disease diphtheria. This is the opinion of Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, who says "It is up to the parents. If they protect their children with immunization, they need not have diphtheria."

Dr. Cox said that it is amazing that this disease should be allowed to take its toll of young lives when it can be entirely stamped out by proper immunization. Yet in the past week, 33 cases were re-

'Babies should be immunized by age of eight or nine months." Cox advised. Authorities on nine months, and sometimes as early as six months. A second dose

To maintain complete immunity Dr. Cox said that a reinforcing immunized certainly should e protected without any further delay, the State Health Officer declared, and added that it is the responsibility of the parents to save the lives of their children.



The Federal tax rate on local telephone service is 15%. The tax rate on long distance service, where the charge is 25c or over, is 25%. Other forms of telephone service are subject to Federal taxes at rates ranging from 8% to 25%. This tax is imposed by the U. S. Government directly on

the user of the telephone. The telephone company, at its own expense, serves as a collector. Long distance calls and certain other services, being taxed at 25%, are taxed higher than the 20% rate for

Juxuries such as furs, jewelry, and perfumes. This form of tax, that is an excise tax on telephone service, has traditionally been resorted to only in national emergencies. Your telephone company believes this form of tax should not be a part of the peace time tax structure. Representatives of the telephone industry have urged and will continue to urge before the proper Congressional committees that these excise taxes now be eliminated; and many users and representatives of users of telephone service are likewise urging that they be repealed by the
