#### Get Your Lesson In Safe Driving From Wrecking Yards—Greer

AUSTIN. — One way to assure a safer holiday motor trip, says State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer, is to drive by any garage or wrecking yard to view the remains of the latest automobile brought in from a highway collision.

The stark mental picture of its unfortunate occupants as it crashed headlong into an approaching truck; the horror of those few seconds while the ill fated vehicle bounced end over end and down the embankment; these and similar impressions can serve to emphasize the importance of careful driving.

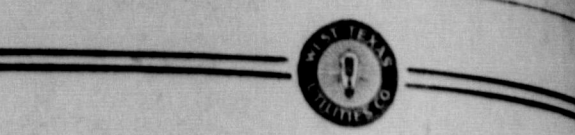
"As seasonal traffic volume spurts upward, it is more important than ever that the highway signs be carefully observed," Greer emphasizes.

"This applies especially to the 'No Passing Zones' which are plainly marked by a double stripe laid down on the pavement," he adds.

The no-passing zones were marked after engineers figured out with slide rules and instruments exactly where they should begin and end. They allow a bare minimum of time to get over the hill or around the curve before an approaching car can make yours another basis for an insurance claim.

"Besides being dangerous," Greer points out, "it's now against the law to attempt passing another vehicle where the double traffic stripe means 'Don't try to pass him here.'"

**Collector Clarifies  
Question of Who Is To  
File Early Tax Returns**

"Great confusion as to who is required to file a return by January 15, 1948, exists in the minds of

many taxpayers," declared Frank Schofield, acting collector of internal revenue for the Southern District of Texas, in a release this week. This confusion is evidenced by the flood of questions received daily.

"For the information of the pub-

lic, we would like to set forth two simple rules governing those who must file returns by January 15, 1948. All taxpayers not covered by these rules who file on a calendar year basis must file by March 15, 1948. No returns may be filed until after January 1, but the earlier they are filed after that date, the sooner those entitled to refunds will receive them."

The following types of taxpayers must file returns by January 15, 1948:

Farmers — Persons who derive at least two-thirds of their income from farming, ranching or similar agricultural occupations, must file either an estimated income tax return on Form 1040-ES for 1947 or their final individual income tax return on Form 1040 before January 15, 1948. If the final return is filed, it will not be necessary to file an estimate.

Persons Who Have Had Material Changes in Income or Exemptions — Taxpayers who filed es-

timated tax returns and who now find that their estimates must be substantially increased or decreased as a result of change in income or exemptions must file an amended tax return on Form 1040-ES before January 15, 1948. If they so elect, they may file their final income tax return on Form 1040 before January 15 in lieu of the amended estimate.

It is emphasized that the second type of taxpayer listed above has the right to file either an amended estimated or a final return. If the final return is filed by January 15, it will serve both as the return and as an amended estimate. If an amended estimate is filed by January 15, the taxpayer then has until March 15, 1948 to file the final income tax.

Any taxpayers who are in doubt as to whether they are required to file return should contact a deputy collector of internal revenue.

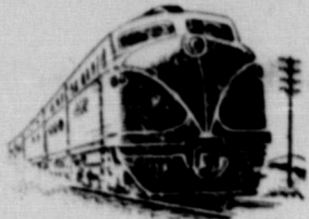

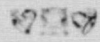

**WEEKLY SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS**

(USDA) — Livestock continued to advance but most other farm products brought steady to slightly lower prices in seasonably dull Christmas week trade, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration.

Stronger to higher cattle trends prevailed except for some reaction at San Antonio after the previous week's prices attained new peaks for the year to date. Low canner cows lost 25 to 50 cents while common and medium slaughter calves and common stocker calves declined 50 cents to \$1, but other grades and classes held steady. Gains at other markets ranged from 25 cents to \$1 and affected practically all kinds of cattle. Best cows reached a new high of \$20 per hundred pounds at Fort Worth.

Most sheep and lambs brought steady to strong prices. Occasional gains included a 50-cent rise on lambs at Wichita and a 25 to 50 cent advance at Denver, where good and choice ewes reached the highest price since June at \$9.75 to \$10.25 and choice lambs topped at \$25.15. Most ewes sold around \$8.50 to \$9 or \$9.50 at other southwest markets while best lambs returned \$22 to \$22.50 at Texas markets, around \$23 at Oklahoma City and \$23.25 to \$23.75 at Wichita.

Barley held firm but most other grains lost ground. Corn dropped about 10 cents while wheat and oats went down a nickel and sorghums seven cents. On Friday, No. 1 hard ordinary wheat sold at \$3.07 1/2 per bushel, bulk, in carlots, delivered at Texas common points, where yellow milo brought \$4.08 to \$4.13 per hundred pounds. Rice, peanuts, hay, feed and wool markets were seasonally slow during the past week.

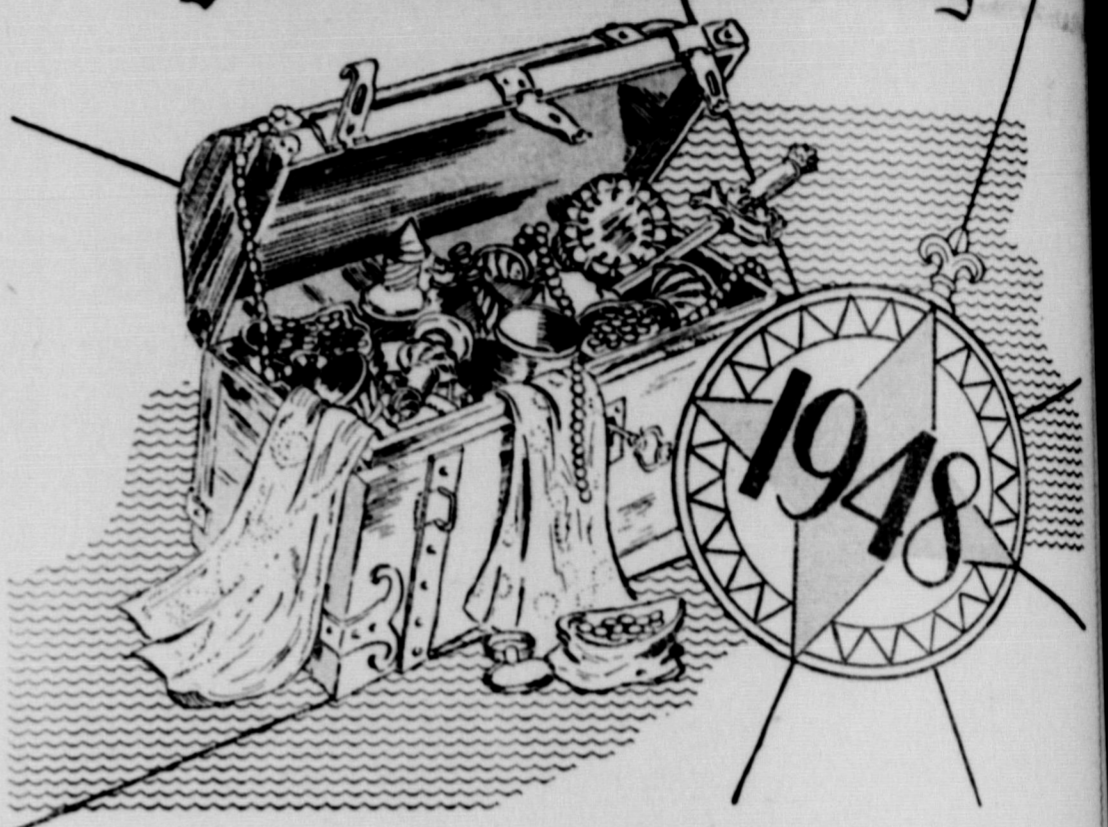

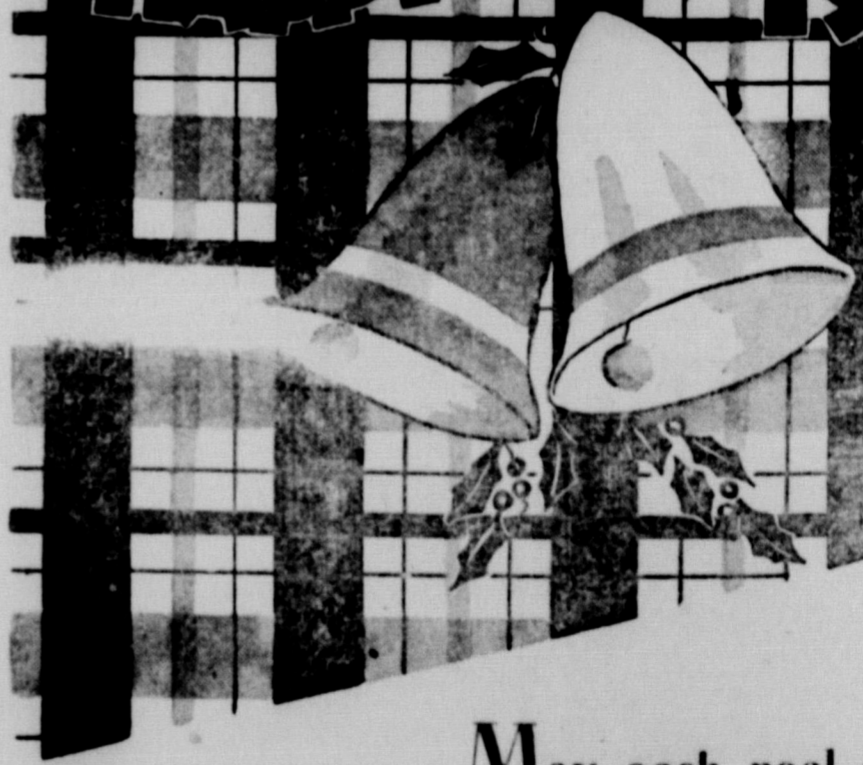

**Huge Oil Spending  
In 1948 To Assure  
Texas Prosperity**

DALLAS — Texas petroleum industry expenditures next year of more than \$1,500,000,000 (billions) — which include more than \$500,000,000 in wages, \$400,000,000 for land owners and \$130,000,000 in state taxes — formed the basis for a 1948 Texas prosperity forecast Saturday by R. E. Anderson, president of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Anderson, manager of the W. T. Waggoner Estate, Vernon, and deputy chairman of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, cited an Association study which showed that approximately one-fourth of Texas income is from petroleum or petroleum products.

"Since Texas provides nearly 50 per cent of the nation's petroleum requirements — which are now at an all-time high — Texas has every prospect for continued high incomes in 1948," Anderson said.

Anderson cited major classification of industry expenditures which will put dollars in the average Texan's pocket during 1948:

Payrolls alone will account for more than \$500,000,000, Anderson said. The effect of this will be widespread since one out of every eight Texans depends directly on petroleum industry employment for a living. Anderson also pointed out that during 1947 petroleum refining wages had risen more than 10 per cent.

More than \$400,000,000 will go to Texas landholders, large and small, for lease rentals, bonuses and royalty payments since there is some oil and gas activity in nearly every county in the state, Anderson stated.

Anderson forecast petroleum industry payments approximately \$130,000,000 into state and local government treasuries through various taxes on different phases of the oil and gas business.


