In Prize Awaits 4-H Show Winners

Prizes, 42 Sheep Exhibited Here Today

Calves and 42 sheep exhibited Saturday, Jan. 10, at the Ozona 4-H Club boys' Annual Livestock Show. A total of \$157.50 in prizes will be awarded to the exhibitors for the best animals.

Steer Superintendent J. Kincaid, Jr. The calves judged in two groups; the calves weighing 1000 pounds and the junior calves under 1000 pounds. Prizes for the senior and junior will be \$15.00 for first place, \$10.00 for second place, \$5.00 for third and \$2.50 for fourth. The Grand Champion Steer will be selected from the two top animals in the senior and junior class and will receive \$10.00 and \$5.00 respectively.

Robison is to be sheep superintendent and the sheep will be judged in two classes; fat fine sand fat mutton type. Prizes for these two classes will be \$10.00 for first place, \$5.00 for second place and \$2.50 for third place. Champion Steer and Champion Lamb will be awarded \$10.00 and \$5.00 respectively. There is also a class set up for fat pen of three lambs, wool or mutton type, owned by the boy and winner receives \$10.00 and \$5.00.

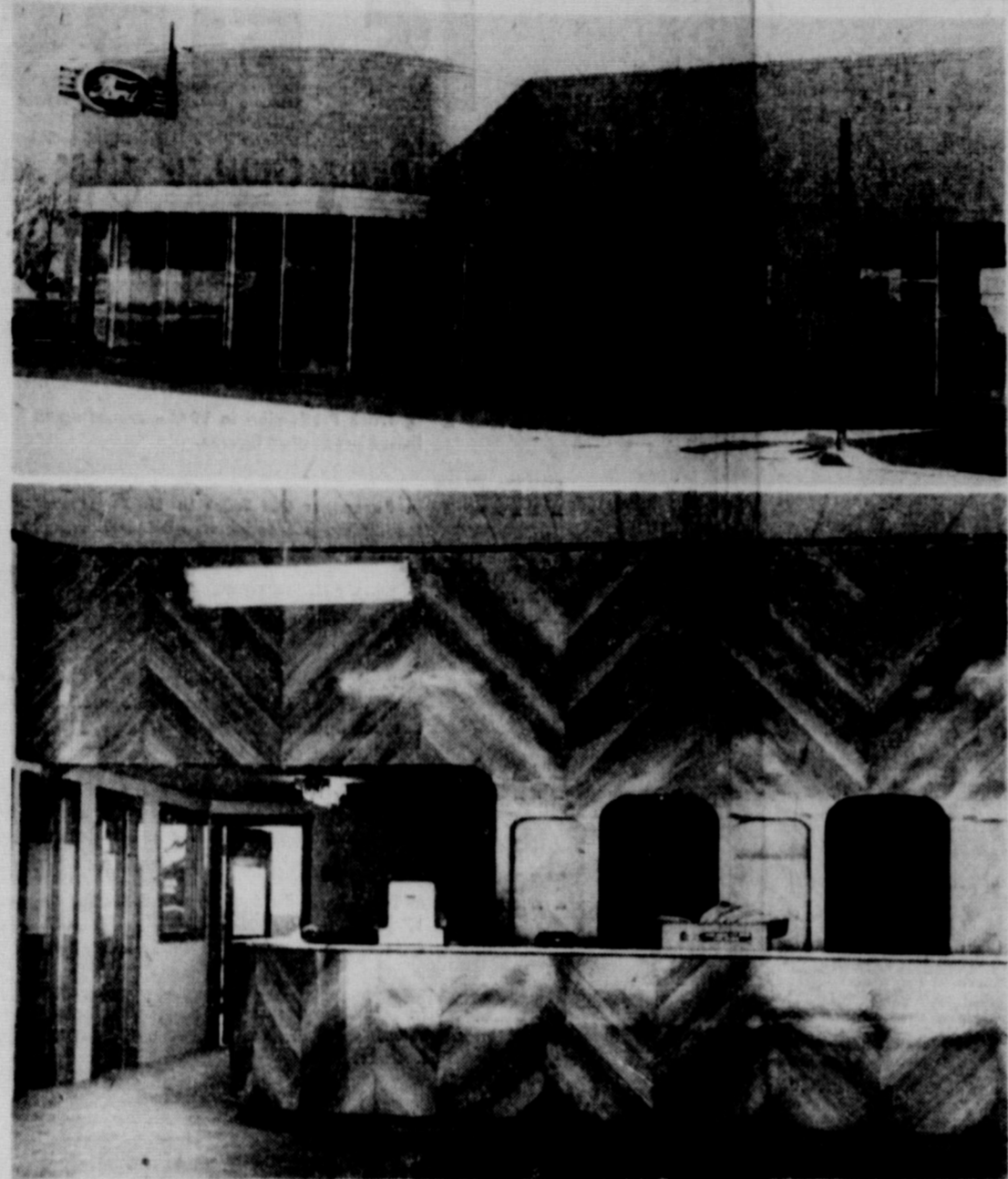

School Board To Meet Architects On Building Plan

Special Session January 21 To Hear Estimates, Plan

A special meeting of the school board has been called for next Wednesday afternoon, January 21, starting at 2 p.m., for the purpose of conferring with various architects relative to the proposed school building expansion program, it was announced yesterday by Max Schneemann, board president.

The meeting was set following a discussion at the regular meeting of the board Tuesday night. Letters are being prepared this week notifying interested architects of the meeting date and representatives of these firms are expected to be here to confer with the board.

The board hopes to select an architect to plan the building program and to prepare information and cost data so that the matter may be presented to the people in concrete form. As soon as such information is assembled the matter will be placed before the people for a vote on the question of issuing the necessary bonds to carry out the building plan, the board president said.

Ozona Cagers Shade Sonora In District Opener

Locals Take Both B And A Games by Close Margin

Coach D. A. Parker's basketball squads, both the first and second string crews, had to turn on full steam on the local court Tuesday evening to turn back determined Sonora squads by close margins to win the opening game of the District 22B basketball slate. Ozona volleyball girls dropped the decision to the Sonora girls to open the evening's play.

The first game, between the B squads, was an extra period affair, the locals racking up the tying tally in the dying seconds of the regular fourth period and the slam-bang extra period affair wound up with the local small fry leading by the slim margin of one point, 24 to 23. The regular period had ended in a 21-21 tie. The Colts were two points in the lead by virtue of sinking a couple of free throws. J. G. Hufstetter won a free toss and sank the throw to put the locals within a point of another tie. In the waning seconds W. C. Burns shot a field goal to put his team out in front by the single point and the game ended seconds later.

The A team game, the district counting encounter, was also a photo finish affair, with the locals emerging with a 2-point lead, 39 to 37. Red Harrison, who turned up with 22 points in a tournament game in Eldorado last week, came through with a total of 17 points to head the evening's scoring. The Lions go to Eldorado Friday night of this week for their second district encounter with the Eldorado Eagles. There will be a volleyball game and first and second string basketball games during the evening.

"We will leave the schools with sincere best wishes for their continued progress and expansion. All of our efforts will be devoted to the welfare of the school program in general and to the welfare of the pupils specifically during our remaining months in the system."

Fire Is Kindled Under '48 County Political Pot

V. O. Earnest, Homer Good Enter Race for Sheriff's Post

Crockett county's 1948 political pot came to a quick boil here this week with simultaneous announcements from two candidates for the office of sheriff, assessor and collector of taxes. The county's first two candidates to announce are V. O. Earnest and Homer Good.

V. O. Earnest, incumbent, serving in the office under appointment of the Commissioners Court to serve out the unexpired term of Bruce Harp, resigned, announced himself a candidate for his first elective term in the office. Mr. Earnest was appointed by the court in the fall to serve the unexpired term of Mr. Harp after the latter had resigned the position to go into private business.

In announcing his candidacy for a first elective term, Mr. Earnest said that he felt that he had learned enough about the duties of the office through his service in the position to date to qualify him for better service to the people. Another year in office, he said, will add further to that knowledge and experience to warrant his asking a full term in the office.

"I feel that my experience to date and the further experience I will have this year will qualify me for efficient service in the future," Mr. Earnest said in making his announcement. "I am doing my best now and will continue to do so until the end of my term of service, whether it be at the end of the present appointive term or in the future, I like the work and will do my best at performing the duties of the office. I will appreciate the support of all my friends."

Homer Good, employed at Baker's Food Store the past two years, pitched his hat into the ring as a candidate for the sheriff's post. Mr. Good came to Ozona from Coke county where he had resided most of his life. He has been employed at Baker's store since coming to Ozona.

"Because I feel that I am qualified to discharge the duties of the office and because I have been solicited by a number of my friends to offer myself as a candidate, I have decided to make the race. I shall make every effort to see as many of the voters in the county as possible between now and the election but I would like to make this as a personal solicitation for your support. I will be grateful for every vote I receive and if elected I pledge myself to do my dead level best to perform the duties of the office to the satisfaction of all."

Mr. Good is married and has three children, a boy, Muggins, 6, attending kindergarten, and two daughters, Maudie Jo, 4, and Vicki Wayne, 18 months.

Denham Resigns After 20 Years In Schools Here

Veteran Administrator To Continue in Educational Work

Claude S. Denham, who is serving his 20th year with the Ozona school system, Tuesday night tendered his resignation as superintendent at a meeting of the board of trustees.

Announcement of the resignation of Mr. Denham was made by the board president, Max Schneemann. The board accepted Mr. Denham's resignation "with regrets" and received the retiring administrator's pledge to the board "that every possible effort will be made to uphold the same high standards for the schools that we have striven to uphold in the past." Mr. Denham will retire after the work of the present school session is completed in the Spring.

The retiring school head did not make definite announcement of his plans other than that he and Mrs. Denham would move to Lubbock in June where he will look after property interests and "will continue in the field of public education in the Lubbock area." He will retain property holdings here and has made tentative plans for a small housing project in Ozona, construction work on which may be begun in the Spring.

Mr. Denham came to Ozona from Lubbock in August of 1928 to accept a position as high school principal. He served six years in this position before being elevated to the position of superintendent in 1934.

Under Mr. Denham's fourteen years of competent leadership, the local school system has made many advances to raise it to a place of leadership among small schools in the state, consistently retaining membership in the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges by meeting stringent rules of standards of excellence.

The schools have grown from a 19-teacher system to the present 30 teachers with the pupil membership growing from 434 to the present more than 500 enrollment. The Latin-American school which grew to its present new building erected in 1937, has been expanded under his leadership from a three-teacher school to the present staff of 11 teachers.

Adopting each advancement in educational methods and standards, the local school system has undergone many changes for the better under Mr. Denham's leadership.

Sheriff Earnest To Launch Safe Driving Campaign in Ozona

Sheriff V. O. Earnest this week announced plans for a "safe and sane driving" campaign in Ozona — with traffic laws and justice court as implements for bringing about an improvement in driving habits of motorists in the town.

New school zone signs are being erected this week in the area of the school and for the protection of children the slow speed requirements of school areas will be enforced, the sheriff said. The streets will be patrolled and traffic regulations enforced.

"Ozona people are asked by the law enforcement officers to observe the usual traffic rules such as turning only at intersections, parking on the right side of the street, keeping within the speed laws and driving carefully and sanely at all times.

"I believe that most of the traffic violations in Ozona are the result of thoughtlessness," Mr. Earnest said. "I believe that if those who are guilty of thoughtless, careless driving are reminded of the dangers to themselves and others that they will cooperate with us in correcting the local situation. I hope that it will not be necessary for us to cause anyone trouble, but for the safety of all there must be an improvement in the driving habits of some here."

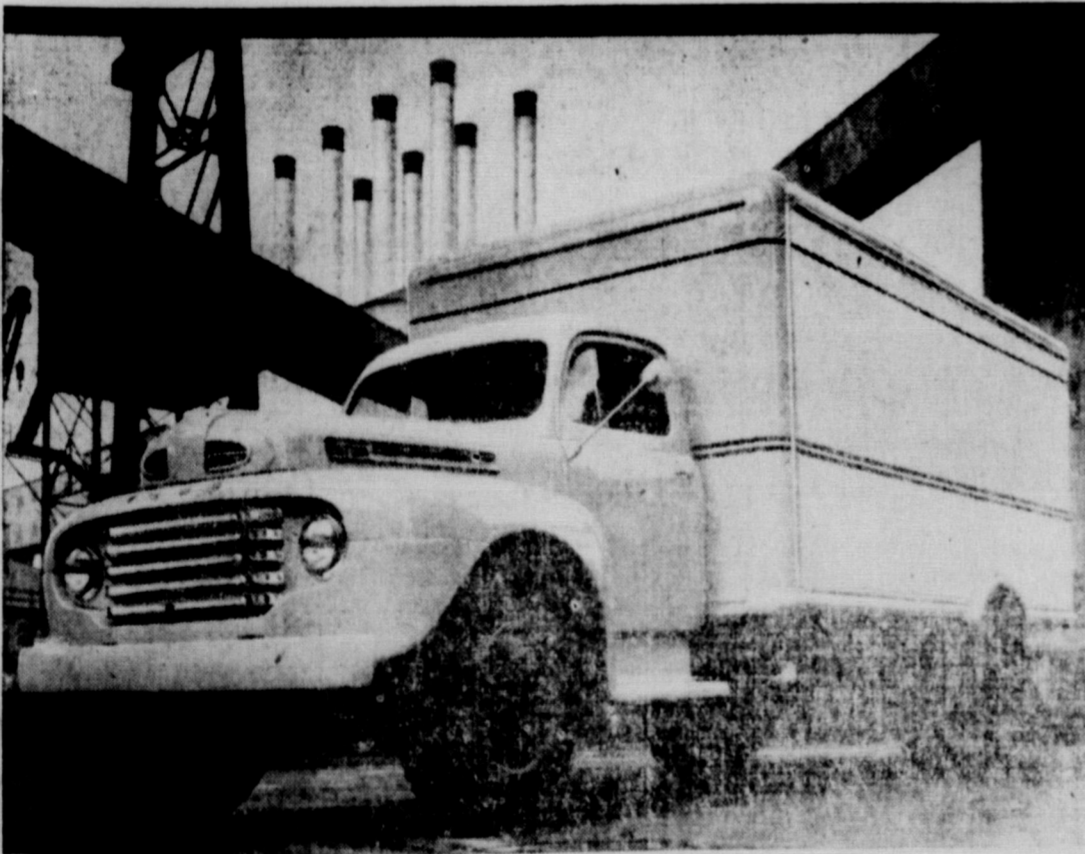

leadership. The system has changed from a 45 minutes to one hour periods of class study and employs only degree teachers. Follow-up reports on its graduates indicate the high standard of work accomplished by students of the school.

A first class library has been built up with almost a full time librarian in charge. Band was added to the school curriculum in 1934 when the present band hall was constructed. An expanded athletic program which has provided physical education and added interest in school work is another advancement made by the schools. That the emphasis on the athletic program has paid off is attested by the fact that members of high school football teams have had the satisfaction of winning district championships four different years, in 1941, 1942, 1944 and 1946. Excellent basketball teams have also been turned out in high school, the school administration sponsoring the 17th annual invitational tournament the last of this month. Baseball was introduced into the school program in 1947 and the girls will come in for physical education direction as seen as a qualified director of such activity can be secured. All playgrounds and the football field have been sodded and tennis courts constructed to further broaden play activities of the stu-

dents. High teacher standards has been a feature of the local school system under the present administration, the local schools being among the first in the state to adopt the \$2,400 minimum salary standard. The local school also pioneered in teacher housing, having provided modern teacherage facilities with a total of 22 bedrooms available to the teaching staff, all with kitchen accommodations available and at low rental rates.

Three school-buses now operate in the county, one taking 14 pupils from this county to Iraan schools, another taking 20 pupils to the Big Lake schools and one operating from oil field settlements into Ozona bringing 17 pupils to the local schools.

These and many other advancements in excellence of the local school program have come during Mr. Denham's tenure as head administrator of the system.

"Naturally I am proud of the progress the school system has made during the time I have been connected with it," Mr. Denham said, "but credit for such progress must be given to the progressive peoples of a progressive community. I have always enjoyed excellent cooperation from the school boards and from the people in any undertaking for the betterment of their schools and I believe the local system is a credit to their good judgment."

Mrs. Denham, who has taught 18 years in the same room in the

grade school building, came to Ozona in September of 1930 after their marriage in Dallas in June of that year. Mrs. Denham will always be remembered with love by the several hundred pupils who have passed through her grade, the fourth until the 12-year system was adopted, when her assignment became the fifth grade.

One of the most recent tributes paid to Mrs. Denham was by the Senior boys of the 1947 Lions football team who dedicated their final game against Sonora here on November 8 in her honor. She was their first "football coach" in the grades.

New Line of Ford Trucks To Be Shown To Public Friday

A new line of Ford trucks is being shown to the public for the first time Friday by Ford Motor Company dealers throughout the nation. The streamlined 1948 models, completely new from the wheels up, represent the first post-war product of Ford. The new Ford truck is being shown Friday and Saturday by the Melton Motor Co., local Ford dealers, in the company's new building, formally opened this week.

The new trucks are notable for an unprecedented range of models and capacities as well as many engineering changes.

Two new series—F-7 and F-8—are the largest ever manufactured by Ford. They have maximum gross vehicle weights of 19,000 and 21,500 pounds, respectively. Another new series is the six-cylinder cab-over-engine model.

Three new power plants are available for the new trucks—a 95-horsepower six-cylinder engine, a 100-horsepower V-8, and a 145-horsepower V-8.

The new trucks are attractively styled without losing ruggedness necessary for good performance and long life. Radiator grille and headlights are recessed in a functional pattern in the modern front end which contributes to massive appearance and gives added protection.

Greater front strength has been achieved through improved sheet-metal suspension and heavier construction. Fenders are heavier, wider and of a new design which provides greater tire clearance. Another design advancement is a heavy channel-steel bumper attached directly to extended frame side rails. The bumper is, in effect, an extra cross member providing greater rigidity and impact strength.

Driver comfort is one of the first considerations in the new trucks. Advanced cab design provides living room comfort with more space and better ventilation.

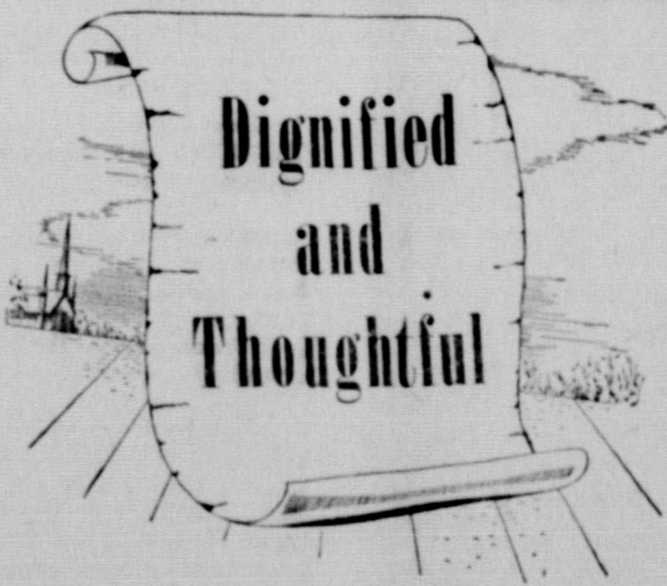

**Weather Man Explains
Use of Station
in Rotary Talk**

Ed McEwen, representing Weather Bureau Regional Office at Fort Worth, here installed weather observation station at Bawcom home, spoke at Rotary Club Tuesday on the use of weather reporting and forecasting.

McEwen told of the various instruments being in use at the station here and of the uses of the observations, which here will make reports every three hours during the hour period, calling such reports to the first order station Angelo. Simultaneous reports gathered from all points in the country and these reports are transformed into weather forecasts from which forecasts are made for different parts of the country.

height and movement of clouds and other weather factors will be observed and reported from the local station, he said.

George Gershwin

When George Gershwin was twelve, his parents bought a piano; but the idea was for his brother, Ira, to take piano lessons. However, it didn't take long for the family to discover that it was George, not Ira, who had a soul for music. Although George was never too interested in mathematics, history, and English, he did enjoy his job as pianist and accompanist for the school choral club. He felt a need for more time to devote to music, however, and left high school before finishing. Remick's Publishing House in New York hired George as a song plugger and sent him to Atlantic City to play their publications in a small music store. Between working hours, George began experimenting with his own melodies, dreaming of the day when he might have them published.

Gershwin's first real hit was "You Just You," which Vivienne Seagle sang on a Saturday concert radio program. From this song, the door was opened to him by the

more influential people in the music world. Then came the hit, "Sewanee," written for Al Jolson in his stage show, "Sinbad."

Brother Ira has a natural gift for lyrics as George had for melodies; and soon this combination was able to pull songs right out of the air.

The famous stage producer, George White, soon found that the Gershwin style of music was a "must" for his series of "Scandals." It was during this period of years that George and Ira wrote such unforgettable tunes as "Somebody Loves Me." From "Show Girl," produced by Florenz Ziegfeld, and starring Al Jolson's former wife, probably "Liza" is the best-remembered tune to-day.

When George and Ira went to Hollywood, their fame for show tunes became even more widespread. Through the movies their unforgettable songs reached every corner of the continent — songs such as "They Can't Take That Away From Me," "I Won't Dance," "Top Hat," "White Tie and Tails," introduced by Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers. It was during the time the Gershwin brothers were working on music for the "Goldwyn Follies" that George became aware of his illness — a brain tumor which soon caused his death in 1937. "Love Walked In" was a featured number from this picture.

The more familiar of these show tunes will be sung on the Gershwin program Feb. 5 by a chorus composed of members of the Music Club and community, and will be under the direction of Mr. G. A. Rhoads.

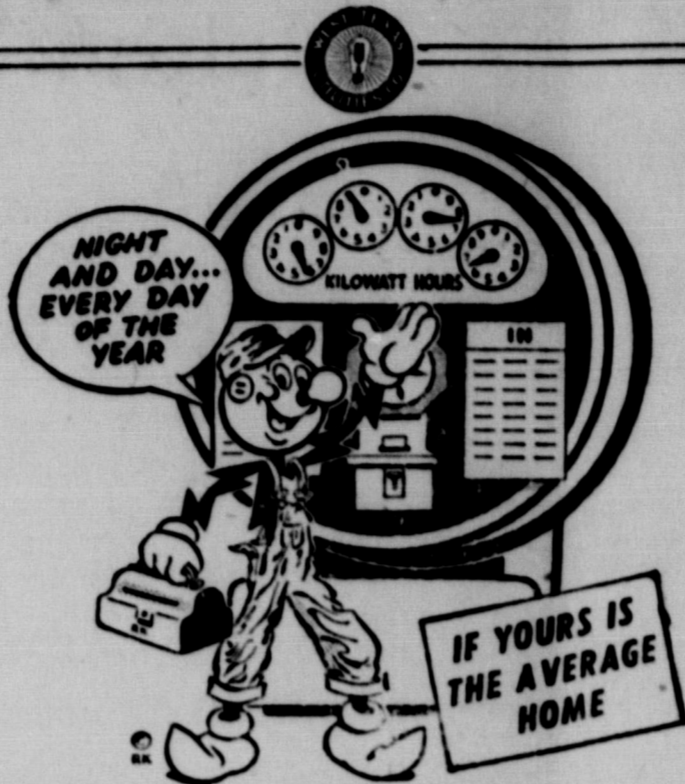

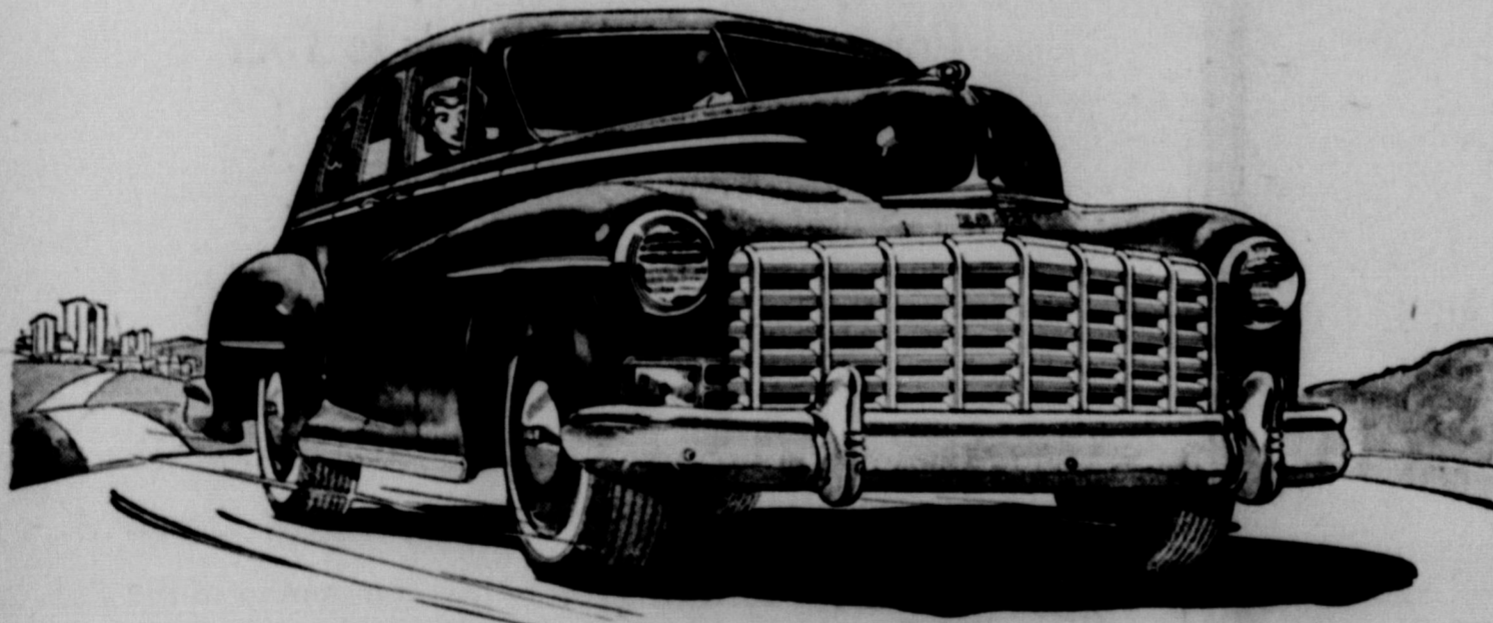
