## Beeman Child Loses Finger in Lawn Mower Accident

Allen Beeman, 18-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. G. K. Beeman of Ozona, suffered the loss of the middle finger on his right hand between the first and second joints and possible loss of a portion of the ring finger on the same hand as a result of a lawn mower accident here Monday morning.

The middle finger was completely severed when the child stuck his hand in the mower while the blade was spinning. The ring finger was almost severed but surgeons attempted to save it and have hopes of success of the operation. The child was taken to a San Angelo hospital after receiving first aid treatment and surgeons attempted to sew the finger in place. The parents were told it would be ten days or two weeks before success or failure of the attempt could be determined.

Mrs. Beeman was mowing the lawn and the child was playing nearby. She stopped the mower and took a step away and during the instant following, while the blades were still spinning, the child stuck his fingers in the mower blades.

## Conoco 1-A-U In Block 47 Pool Marked a Failure

The second attempt to develop Silurian and Ellenburger production in the Block 47 (Grayburg) pool in northeastern Crockett County has failed.

Continental No. 1-A-12 University Monday prepared to plug and abandon. It has recovered 460 feet of drilling mud and 3,069 feet of salt water, with no shows of oil gas, on a 2 1/2-hour drillstem test from 9,715-70 feet. The Silurian also was barren.

The duster is in the C SE NE 12-47-U, one mile west and quarter mile north of Continental No. 1-A-13 University, the Block 47 Silurian discovery.

## Midway Lane Is Extended S'East By Shell Wells

Two Producers Finalized for 1,478 and 1,715 Barrels Daily

The Midway Lane (Ellenburger) field in northeastern Crockett county has been extended south-east by the completion of two producers by Shell Oil Co., Inc.

No. 4 Chambers, 660' from the north, 2,484 feet from the east line of the northwest quarter of league 4, Chambers county school land survey, registered a natural daily flowing potential of 1,458.28 barrels of 44 gravity, pipeline oil. The rating was based on a flow of 364.32 barrels in six hours through a one-inch choke on 1 3/8-inch tubing set 7,596 feet from pay topped at 7,527 feet, with total depth 7,598. Five and one-half inch casing was cemented at 7,527 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,790-1. Flowing pressures were 550 pounds on the casing and 275 pounds on the tubing. The well is an east offset to Shell No. 2 Chambers and a diagonal southeast offset to Sinclair Prairie and Atlantic No. 3-67 University.

Shell No. 5 Chambers flowed 428.9 barrels of 45.2 gravity, pipe line oil in six hours to rate 1,715.5 barrels daily. The gauge was through a one-half inch choke on 2 3/8-inch tubing set at 7,598 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,590-1. Flowing pressures were 800 pounds on the casing, 1,100 pounds on the tubing.

The well topped the pay at 7,531 feet and drilled to 7,602 ft. 1,980 from the north, 3,171 feet from the west line of league 4, a Chambers county school land survey, a diagonal southwest offset to No. 4 Chambers and a south offset to No. 2 Chambers.

Shell No. 1 Ada Kincaid heirs, wildcat C NW SE 6-MN-GC&SF, 2 1/2 miles south of Ozona, was drilling at 8,240 feet in shale. ## Powell Field Bus To Bring Children To Schools Here

The Powell Field school bus, which has been operating for several years to transport children from the Powell field community in this county to schools in Big Lake under the financial arrangement agreed upon between the two counties, hereafter will bring the children to Ozona schools instead of to Big Lake.

Decision to combine the Powell field and Todd field school buses to one route from the field into Ozona was reached at a recent meeting of the school board. A potential 30 children are in the Powell field area and the local schools have compensated the Big Lake schools by turning the state per capita for these children, besides the expense of owning the bus and its operation and employment of a driver at \$125 per month on a 12-month basis.

It is anticipated that the two buses now operating from Powell and Todd fields will be sold and a new 48-passenger bus purchased to make the daily route from Powell field through Todd field and into Ozona, and back each afternoon, the new arrangement resulting in a considerable saving to the district.

## \$150,000 Water And Sewer Bond Issue Proposed

Election Aug. 14 to Determine Fate of Expansion Plan

Qualified electors who own taxable property within the district and who render such property for taxation will be called upon to decide on August 14 the question of issuance of a total of \$150,000 in tax and revenue bonds, of the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 for the purpose of providing necessary extensions and improvements to the Ozona water works and distribution system and its sanitary sewer system.

An order calling the election for Saturday August 14, was approved in the form of a resolution passed by the district board of directors in a recent meeting following report of the engineer's survey of the needed expansion program and the estimate of costs. Legal publication of the complete resolution and the propositions to be submitted to the voters will be found on another page in this issue of the Stockman.

Need for extension of sewer service to sections of the city not now served, and for extension of larger mains and installation of fire hydrants to bring fire protection to all parts of the growing city, together with adequate water storage to take care of emergency breakdowns in pumping equipment and to provide recommended storage as fire protection prompted directors to take the initial steps to secure the engineering survey and to submit the entire expansion program proposal to the voters of the district.

The proposed \$150,000 issue will be the same form of tax and revenue bonds as heretofore issued by the district, net revenues of the district water and sewer system operations being pledged to payment of the principal and interest on the 30-year serial issue, which will bear interest at a rate not to exceed 3 1/2 per cent.

The proposal calls for sewer extensions and improvements totaling \$29,000, which will provide 5,500 feet of 6 inch, 4,800 feet of 8 inch and the necessary wyes, manholes, ditching, etc to the present sewer system, most of the extensions being in the Latin-American section of the city.

For the water works system, the plan calls for installation of a 500,000 gallon steel reservoir on water works hill, 350 feet of 12 inch cast iron main from this tank to connect up with the distribution system, and extensions of mains by 3,750 feet of 8 inch, and 16,650 feet of six inch cast iron mains. Twenty-two additional fire hydrants are also proposed for installation with the new mains in sections not now provided with adequate fire protection. Various gate valves, valve boxes, ditching, fittings, paving patch, etc. will run the total proposed water extensions cost to \$121,850, or a total cost of \$150,850.

The matter will be presented to the voters in two separate proposals, one dealing with the proposed sewer extensions and the second with the water system improvements and extensions. Each must be voted upon separately by the electors, the sewer expansion proposal calling for \$29,000 in tax and revenue bonds and the water proposal for \$121,850. If both issues pass, it is the intention of the directors to issue combined Waterworks and Sewer System bonds in the maximum amount of \$150,000, all of which may not be sold at once but as needed to carry on the expansion program.

A detailed map showing the location of all proposed new water and sewer extensions is on display in the water works office and citizens are invited to inspect this map for a better understanding of the extent of proposed improvements.

On this the 14th day of July, 1948, the Board of Directors of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 convened in special session, at the regular meeting place in said District, with the following members of the Board present to wit:

WHEREAS, Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 has been heretofore legally organized under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, said District has heretofore duly and legally issued its Revenue Bonds, payable from the net revenues of the District's Waterworks System, for the purpose of purchasing and constructing a complete waterworks system, plant and improvements within and for said District; and

WHEREAS, said District has heretofore duly and legally issued its tax and revenue bonds, payable from a tax upon all the taxable property in said District, the payment of said bonds being additionally secured by a first pledge of the net revenues of the District's sanitary sewer system, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expense; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of said District has determined the necessity of constructing extensions and improvements to the Waterworks System and the

Sewer System of said District; and WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of said District has determined the necessity of issuing additional revenue and tax bonds of said District for the purpose of constructing extensions and improvements to the waterworks system and the sanitary sewer system of said District; and

WHEREAS, there has been filed in the office of the District a report of the District's Engineer covering the improvements, together with maps, plats, profiles and data fully showing and explaining same, and which report contains a detailed estimate of the cost of such improvements, all of which plans and estimate have been and are now on file and open to public inspection in the office of the District; and

WHEREAS, the said Engineer's estimate of the cost of the improvements is as follows:

1. That an election be held in said Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, on the 14th day of August, 1948, between the hours of 8 o'clock A. M., and 7 o'clock P. M., at the Crockett County Courthouse, in said District, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District, who own taxable property therein and have

duly rendered same for taxation, the following propositions:

**PROPOSITION NO. 1**

Shall the Board of Directors of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 be authorized to issue bonds of said District in the maximum amount of \$121,000.00, to mature serially over a period of not more than thirty (30) years from their date and to bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and three-fourths (3 3/4%) per cent per annum, as may be provided by the Board of Directors of said District, for the purpose of constructing extensions and improvements to the Waterworks System of said District, and if there shall be annually levied and collected on all the taxable property in said District for any current year and annually thereafter while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding and unpaid, a tax sufficient to pay

**Ken Regan Knows Problems of Area He Seeks to Represent**

PECOS, TEX. — Rep. Ken Regan, who is a candidate for re-election to his post in Congress, knows at first hand the problems of those whom he represents in the 16th district, friends here pointed out today.

Basic resources of the people residing in the vast district are principally farming, ranching, oil and, of course, general business.

Mr. Regan has had a turn at all of them.

The Congressman came to West Texas about 1920, after service as a Captain in the Air Corps of World War I. He settled at Pecos and was active in the land development of that time along the Pecos Valley.

Later he was engaged in the automobile business in Pecos, and also was a partner in other enterprises. Since conditions were far from booming in those days, Mr. Regan had, at first hand, his share of the headaches of the small business man.

During the mid-thirties, Mr. Regan was active with his partner, Earl Bell, in developing the famous Pecos cantaloupes, and of establishing a marketing association for them.

Mr. Regan has always owned several sections of ranching land in Reeves county, and while he has never been classified as a large rancher or stockman, he has

had sufficient experience in the raising and marketing of cattle to give him a personal insight into the problems of the stockraiser.

Even before the days of commercial oil production in West Texas, Mr. Regan was interested in the oil possibilities of the region. He plunged into many a dry hole, before any well with which he was associated ever struck the pay. He did own large tracts in Loving county, when the Wheat pool there was developed in 1930 and 1931, and has since been associated with several successful oil developments.

He served four years as state senator, and on several occasions was acting governor of Texas, in his role as president pro tem of the senate.

Mr. Regan volunteered for service in World War II, served in the air corps, and left the army in 1944. He then set about rebuilding his business, and was more or less drafted to make the congressional race last summer. Now, back in the harness of public service, he has shown tremendous energy and ability in representing the varied interests of the 16th district.
