## Moisture Deficiency Delays Crop Planting

### Four Inches Needed Over General Area

According to Spencer Tanksley, Bailey County Extension Agent, approximately two to four inches of rain will be necessary within the next twenty days to enable area farmers to plant their customary June cotton. Tanksley said, "At least two inches of moisture is needed for farmers to get in and get their land ready to plant." The preparation necessary to planting would probably do away with that two inches if we get it, he said.

Generally, it is about 12 inches from ground level to underground moisture. Since approximately one inch of rain (a good soaking one) will wet the soil about three to four inches, depending on soil types, at least three to four inches of rain will be necessary to meet the underground moisture.

"We can hope that with the breaking loose of these good rains, our dry spell is over," said the agent. Our county wheat will be helped some, in that the moisture might help to add some weight. It will not, however, boost any yields for us," the county agent said. There

have been a few greenbugs reported in county wheat, but most producers have been able to get by without spraying.

In talking of the some 25,000 acres of corn planted in the county, Tanksley said that the corn was not doing very well due to the cloudy, cool weather. The vigorous, early growth that is characteristic of corn has not happened this year and the corn is slow in germinating. "Our corn crop is not hurt, really, at this time, but it is just not growing," added Tanksley.

The agent stated that the potatoes in the county were up and looked good. Cont. on Page 6, Col. 1

### Grain Payments Due Farmers Soon

Grain sorghum deficiency payments in the amounts of \$.27 per bushel have been authorized by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on eligible 1981 planted grain sorghum, according to Rusty Williamson, Bailey County ASCS director. A 99 percent allocation factor will be applied if 1981 planted acres exceeded a producer's 1980 planted acres. Williamson said that it will be approximately three weeks before checks will begin being mailed out of the county office, "so don't call us, we'll call you."

A reminder is issued to producers that all eligible cover crops planted on set aside acres after January 29, 1982 cannot be grazed May 1, 1982 through October 31, 1982.

Producers should remember that if it is too

dry to plant in their farming area, they need to contact the county ASCS office to file a prevented planting claim on such acres. The claim will be used for history only and no payments will be made on this type acreage.

Wheat certification must be made and all wheat account for by May 15, 1982, regardless of its intended use. If a producer is planning to use wheat (grazed or clipped) for their cotton or grain set-asides, then it should be certified by May 15. The cotton or grain will not need to be certified until August 1, however. Producers should take care to see that these requirements are met in order to ensure program compliance.

Area farmers should be receiving in the near future, a letter regarding "Approved Cover or Practice for Conservation Use Acreage Program 1982." This letter will have instructions regarding practices that are eligible for set aside acreages. Almost all of the cotton deficiency payments should be out of the county office and to the producer. ### Kindergarten-First Grade Spring Round Up May 7

Harold N. Horne announces that Friday, May 7, 1982 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. is Spring Round Up at Neal B. Dillman Elementary for kindergarten and first grade children for the 1982-83 school year.

Children who will be six years old on or before September 1, 1982, are eligible to register for first grade. Parents should bring the child's birth certificate and record of the child's immunizations (shots) if available.

Immunizations required by the new federal and state guidelines for students five years of age or older enrolled in elementary or secondary schools include (1) Polio - at least three doses of oral polio

vaccine are required, provided at least one dose has been received on or after the fourth birthday (2) DPT - at least three doses, provided at least one dose has been received on or after the fourth birthday. Booster doses of DT vaccine are required every ten years. (3) Measles - all students in this group must have received measles vaccine on or after the first birthday, or during the calendar month of the first birthday and since January 1, 1968. (4) Rubella - one dose of rubella vaccine (German measles) is required (5) Mumps - beginning September 1, 1981, all children or students nine years of age or less on September 1, 1981, will be required

to have received mumps vaccine.

by the time this is read, said Williamson. However if an individual has not received his payment, he should contact the ASCS office between 8 a.m. and noon on either Thursday or Friday, May 6 and 7.

The final date of June 1, 1982 has been set aside for entering 1981 crops of corn, cotton and grain sorghum into the government loan.

Producers who desire measurement service need to come by the county office and sign up for the service. Prompt attention to this matter will insure service, otherwise, producers might come up short on this, said Williamson.

with good healthy plants. Onions and other vegetables are in the process of being planted.

A few hundred acres of sunflowers have also been planted.

While the calendar may indicate that spring planting time is here, the soil temperature may not agree.

To get your crops off to a good start, it's best to base spring planting on soil temperature readings rather than on the calendar date, emphasizes Spencer Tanksley.

So get a soil thermometer. It's inexpensive and easy to use and can be bought at most farm supply stores. It's a good investment and can help you get your 1982 crops off to a good start, says Tanksley.

Take soil temperature readings for several days at the same time of day -- the early morning is usually best for more reliable readings.

The National Weather Service also monitors soil temperature readings over the state and reports these as a part of their daily radio agricultural advisories. However, these are regional readings and may differ from readings at specific locations, so keeping track of soil temperatures on your farm is still a good idea, says Tanksley.

He offers these guidelines regarding soil temperatures and spring planting:

1. Make sure soil temperatures at the 4-inch depth are above 60 degrees F. for about a week before planting. It's best to wait until the 65-degree mark for cotton and for about 70 degrees for peanuts and soybeans.

2. Check the three- to five-day weather forecast and don't plant if cold weather is on the way.

3. Plant on a firm, settled seedbed. A raised bed warms up faster than flat ground and offers better drainage from excess moisture.

4. Plant only deep enough to get to moisture and avoid disturbing the seedbed any more than necessary.

5. Plant high quality seed with a germination of 85 percent or higher.

Don't exceed normal seeding rates by more than about 15 percent since too many plants can delay crop maturity.

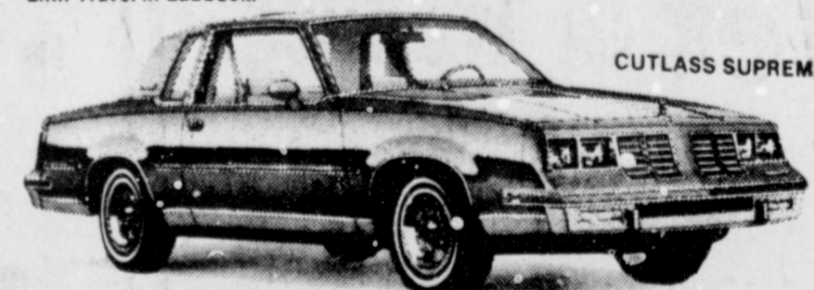

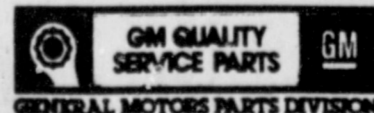

## UPSCALE LIVING

As wine becomes more and more the accepted American drink--before, during and after dinner--so grows the number of people with questions about wine. What wine is best to buy? What kind to serve with what dish? What is the right temperature? And on and on.

Many of the country's seasoned wine connoisseurs--or oenophiles, as they're known--agree on one point. You are the ultimate connoisseur. The final expert. If you like a wine, drink it. It is good wine.

The same advice can be applied about serving "what with what?" If you have a preferred vintage, there's no reason why you can't enjoy it with any sort of meal. Purists do advise that full-bodied, red wines are the perfect companion for red meats and cheeses. Dry whites, they say, should be

consumed with poultry, fish or as an ideal aperitif.

Two new wines on the American market fit those categories. They're from the renowned Italian wine house of Martini and Rossi. The company has been producing wines in Italy for 200 years.

The new wines are both vintage-dated dry wines made from limited production areas in Italy's north-eastern wine regions.

One, Sangiovese di Romagna, is a dry, full-bodied vintage with a flowery bouquet and deep red color. The white wine is called Bianco di Custoza and its opulent bouquet is complemented by a clean taste.

Another bit of advice from the oenophiles--almost every bottle of wine will improve with a little breathing time. This applies especially with the young reds and even whites. In

other words, remove the cork and allow the wine to air before pouring. This will soften and mature the flavor. Dry white wines can air 15 to 30 minutes, young reds about one hour.

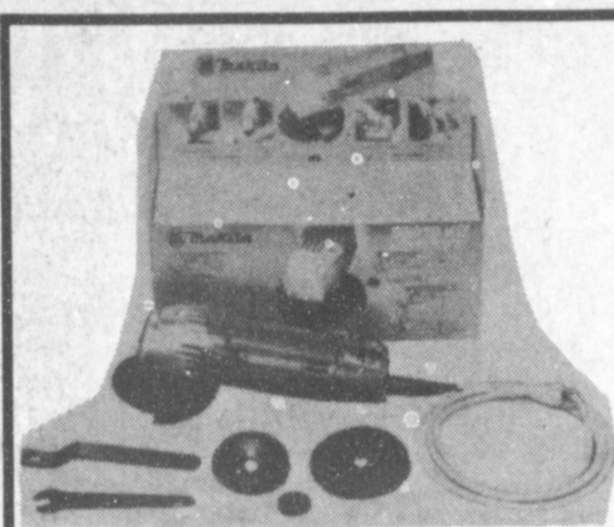

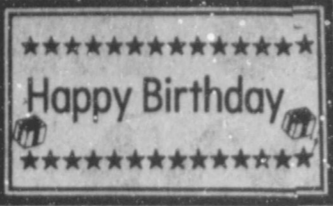

**Slaughter numbers increase 18 percent**

AUSTIN--Texas beef producers sent 16,600 calves to slaughter last month, an 18 percent increase from the number slaughtered during February 1981, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown reports.

"High interest rates make it economically unfeasible for producers to make a profit by placing the calves in feedlots. Feedlot placements in February dropped 23 percent from the previous month," Brown said. "The nation's economic outlook just isn't improving fast enough to expect any drastic change in this situation."

The number of calves slaughtered during January and February was up nine percent from a year ago with 35,600 head. During the same period 890,600 head of cattle were slaughtered representing a seven percent decrease from the previous year.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reports that overall red meat production in commercial slaughtering plants during February totaled 295 million pounds. This is eight percent below the total red meat production of a year ago as well as that of last month. Red meat production during the January-February period of this year totaled 616 million

## Mock Trial Team Attends State

Members of the Muleshoe High School mock trial team, along with their sponsors, returned from the statewide competition April 24. This team had earlier won the right to compete on the state level by beating Lubbock Monterey at regional competition. Members of the team were Sandra Graves and Kevin Robinson, prosecuting attorneys; Stacey Barnhill and George Vela, defense attorneys; Jamey Chancey and Jimmy Green, witnesses for both the prosecution and the defense. Sponsors were Mr. Wayland Ethridge, Principal of Muleshoe High School, Mrs. Jean Allison, teacher, and her husband, Harold Allison.

The state competition was held in the Dallas County courthouse beginning Friday, April 23, at 2:00 p.m. The Muleshoe team drew Bay City for their first opponent and drew defense which meant that Stacey Barnhill and George Vela were the attorneys and Jamey Chancey and Jimmy Green the witnesses for the defense. All of the team members were pleased about this, as the prosecution had been the team which won against Lubbock Monterey during regional competition; and the defense team was now ready to prove its readiness. They performed admirably and were excited when the announcement was made that the Muleshoe team would advance to quarter-finals.

In the next round, which was held nearly immediately after the first, Muleshoe was paired with Amarillo and drew prosecution. Again the Muleshoe team presented its case with confidence even through several unexpected things occurred during the trial. Even though the Amarillo team was chosen to continue, the Muleshoe team members were complimented on their ability to think on their feet. Prosecution attorneys, Kevin Robinson and Sandra Graves, as well as prosecution witnesses, Jamey Chancey and Jimmy Green, were all highly complimented during the judges' critique as having outstanding ability, and team members were consoled that the decision in favor of Amarillo had not been unanimous.

Team members and the sponsors felt the Muleshoe mock trial team accomplished a great deal advancing to the quarter-finals at State in the first year to be entered in this competition. Team members all stated that the entire experience was very beneficial and they learned a tremendous amount in a short time. The team

members are already coaching and giving their teacher, Mrs. Allison, a number of suggestions about how to win State next year.

The idea behind mobile/manufactured housing is not new. According to the Manufactured Housing Institute, a two-story prefabricated, paneled frame dwelling was shipped in 1694 from London to Cape Ann, Massachusetts, where it stood for over 50 years. And moviegoers will recall that Captain Rafer Hoxworth brought a manufactured house from New England for his beloved Jerusha Hale in "Hawaii."

The post-World War II nationwide housing shortage gave the mobile/manufactured housing industry its first big boost. By 1955 mobile/manufactured homes were being produced in twelve-foot-wide models designed to be either stationary or mobile. At the same time the Federal Housing Administration began financing mobile/manufactured home construction to help meet the housing needs of returning veterans and, within a decade, the shift in emphasis was complete. Mobile/manufactured homes meant stability and year-round livability — not mobility. As a result, mobile/manufactured housing now accounts for 30 percent of all new single family homes sold at any price, and over 90 percent of \$30,000! Mobile/manufactured hous-

ing is an increasingly attractive alternative that is making important inroads into the American housing market — spurred, not only by the rapidly growing demand for housing, but also by the need of most middle income Americans for decent shelter they can afford as well as be proud.

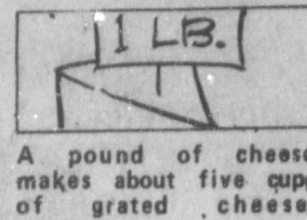
### Aggies are better student loan risk

**COLLEGE STATION** — The default rate among Texas A&M University students on national Direct Student Loans is among the lowest in the nation, U.S. Department of Education records show.

As of June 1981 only 2.36 percent of the loans granted at Texas A&M were in default compared to 1980 figures of 16 percent nationally and 21.3 percent in Texas, university officials said. The percentage of Texas A&M students in default dropped from 4.7 percent last year.

Only 129 student loans for a total of \$73,000 were in default by Texas A&M students.

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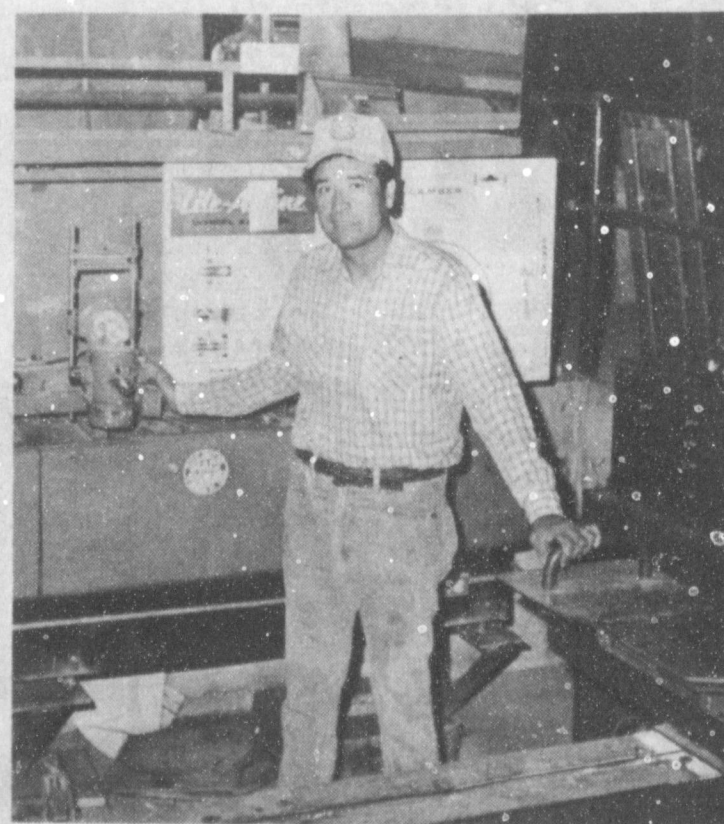


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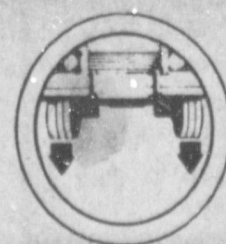
