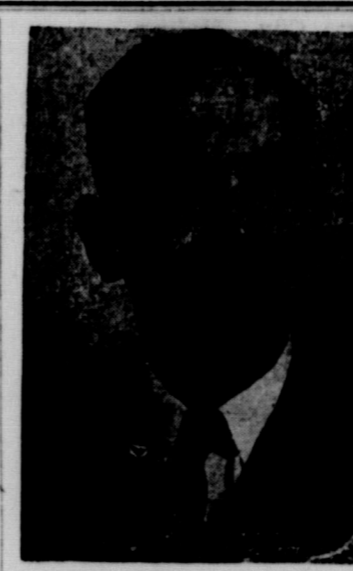

Paul Gibbs Last Minute Candidate For Justice Peace

World War II Dis- abled Veteran Seeks Precinct 1 Post

A last-minute candidate for the office of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Crockett county, was the only ripple in an otherwise calm passing of the deadline for official filing of candidates for county and precinct offices with the county Democratic chairman last Saturday.

Paul Gibbs, disabled World War II veteran, a former paint contractor and paint store operator, and a resident of Ozona 15 years, filed with County Chairman A. O. Fields Saturday afternoon as a candidate for the office of justice of the peace here at the solicitation of a number of friends and this week authorized the Stockman to announce his candidacy.

Mr. Gibbs' candidacy raises to two the number of contests for office in this county. Although he has made no public announcement and bid for support from the voters, the incumbent justice of the peace, W. M. Johnigan, has filed for a place on the ballot, the county chairman reports. The only other contest in the county is that for the office of sheriff, assessor and collector of taxes. The incumbent, V. O. Earnest, serving under appointment of the Commissioners Court following the resignation of Bruce Harp, and a candidate for his first elective term, is opposed by Homer Good for the office.

Paul Gibbs enlisted in the United States Navy at the outbreak of war and served two years aboard the cruiser, USS Savannah, as a petty officer. His ship participated in the bombardment of the African coast during the American invasion of that continent as a preliminary to snuffing out the Hitler fire in Europe. The Savannah was among war ships guarding the first convoy of troop ships to Africa and protected the landing. The ship saw service in Atlantic and Mediterranean waters.

Gibbs received his honorable discharge from the Navy with total disability rating. Because he can no longer do manual labor, he has retired from his trade.

"If the people see fit to elect me to this office, I will do my best to perform the duty in a satisfactory manner," Mr. Gibbs said. "I feel that I can meet all requirements of the office and will undertake to administer justice in a fair and impartial manner at all times. Although it will be impossible for me to see all voters between now and election day, I hope that all will consider this a personal solicitation of your vote and support in the coming election."

Crockett Agent to Take Range Management Training Course

Bill Bergfeld, Crockett county agent, left yesterday for the Ranch Experiment Station near Sonora where he will participate in a range management course, sponsored by the A & M College, which will begin at the Station today and continue in field trips to ranches in this southwest area through July 10.

Mr. Bergfeld is one of the 26 West Texas agents invited to participate in the training course. The agents will assemble at the experiment Station today and will remain there through July 3 for specialized instruction and study. Starting July 4 and continuing through July 10, the agents will be conducted on a field trip, traveling in the Pecos county 4H Club bus, to ranches in Pecos, Brewster and Presidio counties for observation and study of range management methods.

Instructors will be Dr. Vernon A. Young, head of the Range and Forestry Division, Dr. O. E. Sperry of the same department, and A. H. Walker, range management specialist of the College. The group will carry their bedrolls and mess kits and eat from a chuck wagon.

WEEKLY SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

(USDA) — Mixed strength and weakness appeared at southwest farm markets during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Slaughter steers and stocker and feeder cattle held their own fairly well for the week, but killing cows and calves sold \$1 to \$2 lower at most southwest markets. Common and medium cows sold generally from \$17 to \$21.50,

though San Antonio paid from \$15 to \$17.50. Common and medium calves ranged from \$16 to \$25 at Texas markets. Wichita paid \$28 for top vealers and calves. Good and choice vealers brought mainly \$27 to \$31.50 at Denver and \$25 to \$29 at Kansas City.

Slaughter lambs netted generally lower prices at southwest markets after early-week gains and later losses. Other sheep classes showed little or no change. Spring lambs sold at \$28.50 down at Oklahoma City. Medium and good

grades brought \$20 to \$24 at Fort Worth, and \$28 to \$29 at Denver and Kansas City.

Plumbing Contract On New Elementary Building Awarded

Bollinger Plumbing & Heating Co. of San Angelo was awarded the plumbing and heating contract on the new elementary school building, construction of which has already begun, at a special meeting of the school board yesterday. The award was made on an amended bid made by the San Angelo firm. The original four bids received by the board were consid-

ered too high and award of contract was withheld pending receipt of new bids or amended bids from bidding firms.

Bollinger Plumbing and Heating Co. was awarded the contract on its bids of \$26,615. The lowest bid received in the original letting was \$26,980 submitted by the Levy Plumbing & Heating Co. of Dallas.

The general construction contract was awarded last week to the G & E Construction Co., on its bid of \$118,800. The Embry Electric Co. of San Angelo was given the electrical contract on a bid of

\$3,692. The total cost of building as contracted is \$149,107. Completion is within 200 calendar days, beginning to be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the next year, January 1.

Cattle Sales Put April Farm Income To New High Level

AUSTIN.—April farm cash income, totaling \$103,492,000, more than doubled the March level, The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

For the greatest source of income, cattle sales totaled \$49,319,000 in April. Fresh vegetables brought \$16,125,000, and milk products, \$10,389,000. All types of farm products except rice, exceeded

ed income levels of the preceding month.

South Texas Plains reported the highest farm cash income in April—\$19,310,000. Northern High Plains was second with \$11,375,000; Edwards plateau, third, with \$10,809,000. All districts turned in gains over March farm income.

Compared to April 1947, farm cash income gained 226 per cent, as all districts except the Lower Rio Grande Valley turned in increases from 6 per cent in Southern High Plains to 90 per cent in South Texas Plains.

Farm income from January through April 1948 reached \$290,715,000, or 1 per cent above a like period in 1947. During this period income varied from a 55-per-cent rise in Southern High Plains to a 33-per-cent decline in Northern High Plains.
