Major Sorrels Back In U. S. after Three Years in Hawaii

WHEELER AIR FORCE BASE, T. H. — Major Elmer H. Sorrels has returned to the mainland from Hawaii where he has been stationed since his arrival in November 1945. The majors' new assignment will be with the 455th Air Base Unit, 14th Air Force, at Orlando, Florida.

Major Sorrels is the son of Mrs. Mabel Wakefield of Ozona. He graduated from Ozona High School with the class of '26 and attended Draughtons Business College at San Antonio, Texas, where he majored in bookkeeping and accounting. Before entering the service in 1929, Major Sorrels was bookkeeper and cashier for the West Texas Utilities Company in Ozona.

Mrs. Sorrels is the former J. Glynn Blair, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Blair of San Angelo, Texas. The Sorrels have two sons, Jackie O., 15, and Donald E., 13.

Major Sorrels has come all the way up from the ranks since he first enlisted at Fort Sam Houston, 1 October, 1929. In recognition of his signal services, he received a direct commission in May, 1942, as 2nd Lieutenant. Ordered overseas in September, 1945, Ma-

Major Sorrels came to Wheeler November 23. During his service here he was the last commanding officer of Mokeleia Air Field and closed that field. His last assignment was squadron commander and group executive for Headquarters and Base Services Squadron, 556th Air Service Group at Wheeler.

'Make Safety No. 1 Crop' Is Slogan of 4-H Clubs For 1948

"Make Safety Our No. 1 Crop." That's the 1948 slogan of 4-H boys and girls throughout the nation to help reduce the annual toll of 18,000 deaths and 1 1/2 million injured on farms, due to accidents.

Many members are taking active part in the National 4-H Farm Safety awards program, which is being continued in Texas under the direction of the Extension Service for the sixth consecutive year.

Among the members' activities to safeguard their families against accidents are moving or correcting hazards on their farmsteads. Their safety measures include nailing down loose boards in homes and barns; covering open wells and water tanks; properly storing tools; exercising care in operating machinery on farms and automobiles on highways, to mention only a few.

As incentives for superior records in farm safety work, awards are again offered this year by General Motors. They comprise sterling silver medals to five winners in each county, and a merit plaque to the state championship county. Each state's champion will receive a trip to the Chicago 4-H Club Congress next November. Eight state winners selected to receive national honors will each receive a \$200.00 college scholarship.

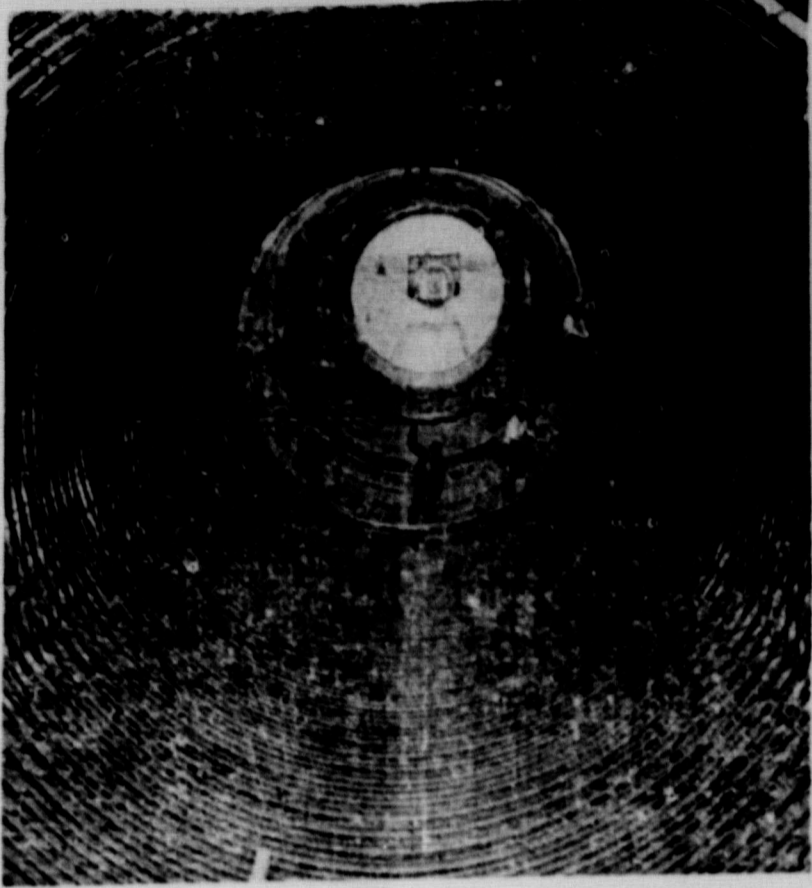
Last year's state winner in Texas was John Luther Byars, Lakeview.

GIRL SCOUT NEWS

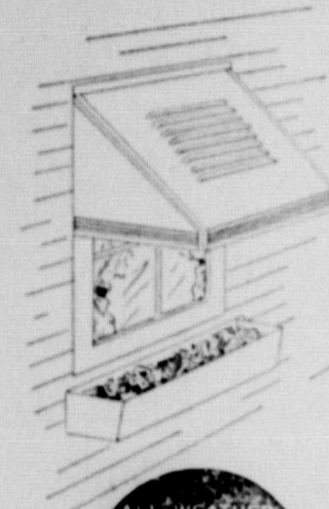

We miss LaJean Ward who moved to Colorado City, who has gone to San Angelo, Ellen Jayne, who went home to spend the summer relatives.

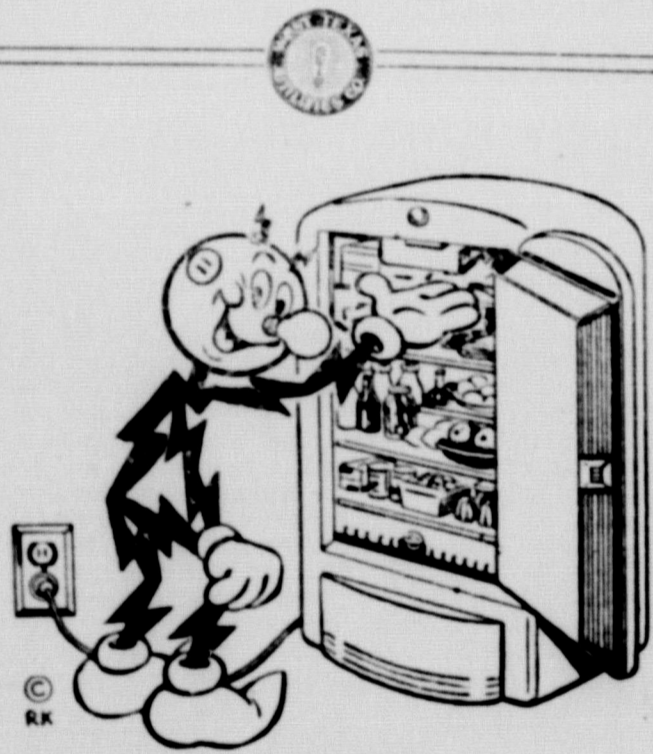

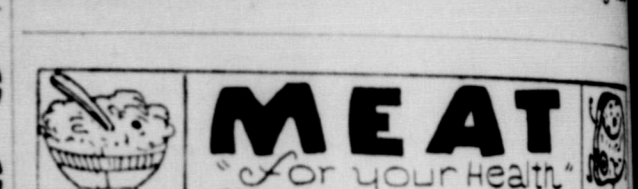

WEEKLY SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

(USDA) — Prices at southwest markets followed very uneven trends during the past week, the Dallas area office of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Cotton prices fell at the first of the week but gained later on to just about reach the level of a week ago. Grains dropped early but climbed back to mostly higher levels than last Friday. Wheat netted three cents loss, however, and barley eight cents.

Sheep and lamb prices drifted generally 50 cents to \$2 lower this week, though shorn lambs at Kansas City and all lambs at San Antonio held about steady. Goats sold steady to slightly easier. Medium and good shorn lambs brought \$19 to \$23 at San Antonio, \$19 to \$24.50 at Fort Worth, and \$21.50 to \$24 at Kansas City. Wool sold higher at 75 to 80 cents a pound for best grease wools

in Texas. Mixed strength and weakness visited southwest cattle markets this week, with prices varying by class and grade from around a dollar higher to a dollar lower at the different terminals. Common and medium slaughter steers and yearlings brought \$21 to \$25 at Houston, and medium and good grades drew \$25 to \$31 at Fort Worth. San Antonio moved medium steers at \$28.50. Kansas City turned high-good and choice steers at \$33 to \$34, and Denver took medium to choice at \$27.25 to \$33.

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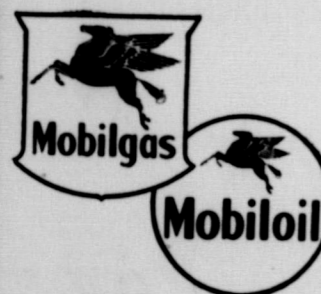

awaiting service, extension of sewer mains and service lines to all parts of the city, additional storage capacity on the hill to insure against shortage and for further fire protection for the city, improvements to the hill property, including the swimming pool, and other extensions and improvements are contemplated in the program now under study and soon to be presented to the people of the district for their final determination.

Having had a taste of an asset enjoyed by most towns but denied for so many years to Ozonans there are hundreds of youngsters and many oldsters who are hopeful that rebuilding of the swimming pool atop water works hill may be included in the contemplated improvement program of the water district, making use of the abandoned original city water storage tank of approximately a half million gallon capacity.

The pool set on a natural rock bottom, developed leaks last year which caused slight pollution of supply wells and directors were compelled to order its abandonment this year. A bath house, diving platform and spring boards have been provided and the pool was a source of pleasure to many. Whether or not a plan to convert the pool on the present site to a modern rectangular design, with filter and chlorinating system, and more moderate gallonage capacity can be undertaken under the contemplated improvement program must be determined on the basis of the engineering estimates, a spokesman for the board said. As an alternative, renovation of the present pool, with a new leak-proof bottom may be considered.
