Grid Field House To Be Complete By September 1

Bleachers May Be Up By First Game, Lights By August 15

A step-up in schedules may result in a completed football stadium, including bleacher seats, lights and field house in time for the season's first game.

Contract was let recently for the new field house, costing approximately \$19,000 to the G & E Construction Co. and the contractor has promised completion of this building by September 1. The structure is to be 26 by 70 feet, with dressing rooms for home and visiting teams, showers, rest rooms, office space, equipment space, hot and cold water with butane gas heat. It is to be constructed of hollow tile with stucco or bondex finish.

Supt. Jack McIntosh, in Waco last week, talked with officials of the company furnishing the bleachers for the local stadium and was told that shipment of the bleachers is to be made August 24 and possibly earlier. Foundation for the bleachers has already been completed ready for installation as soon as they arrive.

The West Texas Utilities Co. which has the contract for installing the lights for the football field has promised completion of the work of setting up the lighting system by the middle of the month.

TB X-Ray Survey For Ozona To Be Asked By Rotary

Steps to Secure Free Service Outlined by Mrs. Louis Gayer

At the invitation of the Ozona Rotary Club, Mrs. Louis Gayer of San Angelo, secretary of the Tom Green County Tuberculosis Association, told the club Tuesday of the determined fight to control tuberculosis by the Texas Tuberculosis Association and the various health agencies in Texas, and outlined the plan for mass X-Ray examinations now being made in different communities in the state by mobile X-Ray units.

Mrs. Gayer was asked by the club to communicate with the State Health Department and the TB association with a view to securing a date for one of the mobile units to make an X-Ray survey in Ozona sometime in the near future.

Miniature X-Ray films are made and these are blown up for examination, and any chest abnormalities are called to the attention of the patient and through a follow-up program, those persons found suffering from incipient or active tuberculosis are urged to undergo further examinations and treatments.

No charge is made for these X-Ray surveys, Mrs. Gayer said, it being the responsibility of the sponsoring organization to distribute appointment cards and to assist in publicizing the plan so that as many persons as possible may be examined while the unit is in town. Approximately 20 persons every 15-minute period may be given chest X-Rays by these units, she said. One of the units is dated for a survey in Sonora and Eldorado and it was thought possible that Ozona could be included in the same itinerary.

In a recent survey made in Tom Green county, 8,000 examinations were made and out of that number 290 chest abnormalities were discovered, 187 of them with a definite tuberculosis lesions, Mrs. Gayer said. Every person 15 years old and older will be examined free of charge by these units.

Mrs. Gayer called tuberculosis an "unnecessary" disease, pointing out that it can be cured if discovered in its early stages. If examination shows presence of the germ in dangerous numbers, treatment and care can prevent an active outbreak, she said, and it is an advantage to know of such condition early so that proper care can be exercised.

\$102.40 Average Paid For Rambouillet Rams At San Angelo Sale

SAN ANGELO—Sheepmen from West Texas and Eastern New Mexico paid an average of \$102.40 for 432 Rambouillet rams at the Twelfth Annual San Angelo Sheep Show and Sale here. Twenty seven of these, chosen as stud rams, sold at an average of \$249.

Stadler & Frerich of Brackettville were top buyers of the day, paying \$3,147 for 21 head, mostly stud rams. Charles Canon of San Angelo paid \$3,055 for 16 rams to be second high.

Biggest price for a single ram was \$560, paid for the reserve champion, consigned by John Williams of Eldorado. Buyers were L. P. Hodges of Sterling City and J. H. Sims of San Angelo. During the 1947 sale a Texas record was set when Miles Pierce of Ozona paid \$1,190 for a yearling consigned by Dempster Jones of Ozona. However the overall sale average was only \$5.61 more than in the 1947 sale.

The champion ram, consigned by A. B. (Lon) Culberson of Brownwood, sold to James and Gerald Porter of Barnhart for \$290.

Other high prices included a stud ram consigned by L. L. Richardson of Iran which went to Jack Canning of Eden for \$410. George Skeete and D. L. Frasure, of Water Valley and Mereta, respectively, paid \$260 for a John Williams ram. Two Leo Richardson rams from Iran sold for \$300. One went to A. C. Hinde of Barnhart, the other to Lucy Hinds, also of Barnhart.

The champion pen of five registered rams, consigned by Wynn S. Hansen of Collinston, Utah, went to Henry Neal of Rankin at \$180 per head. Champion pen of 10 sold at Peterson Ranch Co., of Brackettville for \$140 per head. The rams were consigned by Claude Owens of Fort Stockton.

5-County Board To Administer New Draft Law

Ozonan, Nominated Without Consent, Re- fuses to Serve

Governor Beauford H. Jester last week announced that he recommended for appointment by the president a total of 526 members of 136 local draft boards to administer the new peacetime Selective Service law in the state of Texas.

Board No. 110, serving Sutton, Kimble, Schleicher, Crockett and Edwards counties, was listed with nominees selected by the governor from Sonora, Eldorado, Junction, Rocksprings and Ozona to compose the board.

Listed by the governor as recommended for appointment from Crockett county was Oscar Kost, Ozona boot and saddlery owner. Mr. Kost immediately announced that he could not serve on the board and so notified the governor by letter. He was not consulted by the person who submitted his name for recommendation and knew nothing of the nomination until the list was published in daily papers, he said, and asked in a letter to Governor Jester that his name be withdrawn from the list submitted to the president for appointment.

Other members of the board which is to serve Crockett and the other four counties, with headquarters in Sonora, include Joe F. Logan of Sonora, J. L. Coleman of Junction, J. F. Oglesby of Eldorado and J. L. Balentine of Rocksprings.

Schools To Open Here September 7 Faculty Complete

Opening exercises will be held Tuesday morning in the high school auditorium after which students will go to their respective rooms to receive books and assignments, with regular classroom work beginning Wednesday morning.

WHEREAS, Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 has been heretofore legally organized under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, said District has heretofore duly and legally issued its Revenue Bonds, payable from the net revenues of the District's Waterworks System, for the purpose of purchasing and constructing a complete waterworks system, plant and improvements within and for said District; and

WHEREAS, said District has heretofore duly and legally issued its tax and revenue bonds, payable from a tax upon all the taxable property in said District, the payment of said bonds being additionally secured by a first pledge of the net revenues of the District's sanitary sewer system, after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expense; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of said District has determined the necessity of constructing extensions and improvements to the Waterworks System and the Sewer System of said District; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of said District has determined the necessity of issuing additional revenue and tax bonds of said District for the purpose of constructing extensions and improvements to the waterworks system and the sanitary sewer system of said District; and

WHEREAS, there has been filed in the office of the District a report of the District's Engineer covering the improvements, together with maps, plans, profiles and data fully showing and explaining same, and which report contains a detailed estimate of the cost of such improvements, all of which plans and estimate have been to public inspection in the office of the District; and

WHEREAS, the said Engineer's estimate of the cost of the improvements is as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 2
Shall the Board of Directors of Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 be authorized to issue bonds of said District in the maximum amount of \$29,000.00, to mature serially over a period of not more than thirty (30) years from their date and to bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and three-fourths (3 3/4%) per cent per annum, as may be provided by the Board of Directors of said District, for the purpose of constructing extensions and improvements to the Sanitary Sewer System of said District, and if there shall be annually levied and collected on all the taxable property in said District for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds, or any of them, are outstanding and unpaid, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to pay the principal as the same becomes due, the payment of said bonds to be additionally secured by a first pledge of the net revenues of the District's Sanitary Sewer System, after making provision for the annual principal and interest requirements on Crockett Coun-

ty Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 Waterworks Revenue Bonds, dated March 1, 1941, and Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 Waterworks and Sewer System Tax and Revenue Bonds, Series of 1946, dated May 1, 1946; provided, that in the event the Board of Directors be authorized to issue the Waterworks System Bonds as submitted in Proposition No. 1, it is the intention of the Board of Directors to issue combined Waterworks and Sewer System Bonds in the maximum amount of \$150,000.00.

2. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the words:
"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LEVY OF TAXES ADEQUATE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 1."
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LEVY OF TAXES ADEQUATE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 1."

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LEVY OF TAXES ADEQUATE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 2."
"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS, THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES AND THE LEVY OF TAXES ADEQUATE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF, AS SUBMITTED IN PROPOSITION NO. 2."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, as to each proposition, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the two propositions, respectively.

3. That for the purpose of said election the entire District is hereby constituted one voting precinct. The polling place for said election shall be the Crockett County Courthouse, and the following persons are hereby appointed to act as election officers:

W. M. Johnigan, Assistant Judge,
Mrs. A. E. Deland, Clerk,
Miss Mary White, Clerk.

4. The election officials above named shall make and deliver the returns of said election in triplicate, one being retained by the Presiding Judge, one delivered to the President of the District, and one delivered to the Secretary of the District. The ballot boxes and other election records and supplies shall be delivered to the Secretary at the office of the District and shall be preserved in said office as provided by law.

5. The Secretary of the Board of Directors is hereby directed to publish a substantial copy of this order, or notice containing the same, signed by said Secretary and by the President of the Board, once a week for four consecutive weeks in The Ozona Stockman, a newspaper having general circulation in Crockett County, Texas. The first of said publications to be made at least twenty-eight (28) days prior to the date for said election. Said publication shall constitute proper notice of said election.

6. Said election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas for the holding of general elections for state and county officers, except as otherwise provided by Chapter 3A, of Title 128, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas. The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: J. W. North, R. A. Harrell, Sherman Taylor, T. C. Harris; and the following voted NO: NONE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 15 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, as to read as follows:
"Section 15. All property, real and personal, of the husband or wife, or both, owned or claimed by her husband by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be more clearly defining the separate property of the wife, in relation to her separate property as that provided that husband and wife, without prejudice to pre-existing creditors, may from time to time, by a written instrument as if they were a feme sole partition between themselves in severally or in equal undivided interests all or any part of their existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of another spouse in other community property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of each spouse.

This Amendment is self-operative, but laws may be passed prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of executing such instruments, and providing for their recordation, and for other reasonable requirements, inconsistent herewith as the Legislature may from time to time consider proper with relation to the subject of this Amendment. Should the Legislature pass an Amendment and prescribing requirements as to the form and manner of the execution of such instruments and providing for their recordation and other reasonable requirements not inconsistent herewith and anticipatory hereof, such Act shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character and shall take effect as though this Constitutional Amendment was in effect when the Act was passed."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, an election to be held throughout the State on the second day of November, 1948, at which election all voters favoring said Amendment shall write or print on their ballots the words "FOR THE Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Those opposing said Amendment shall write or print on their ballots the words "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that husband and wife from time to time may in writing partition between themselves in severally or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereof.

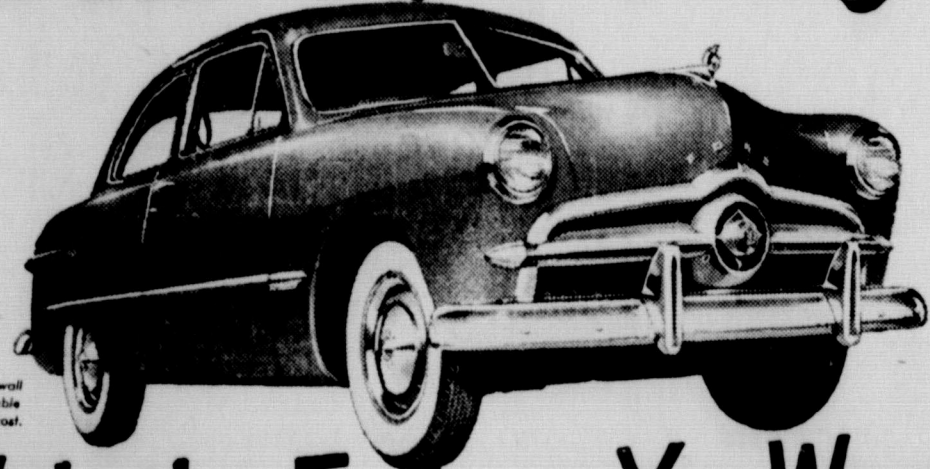

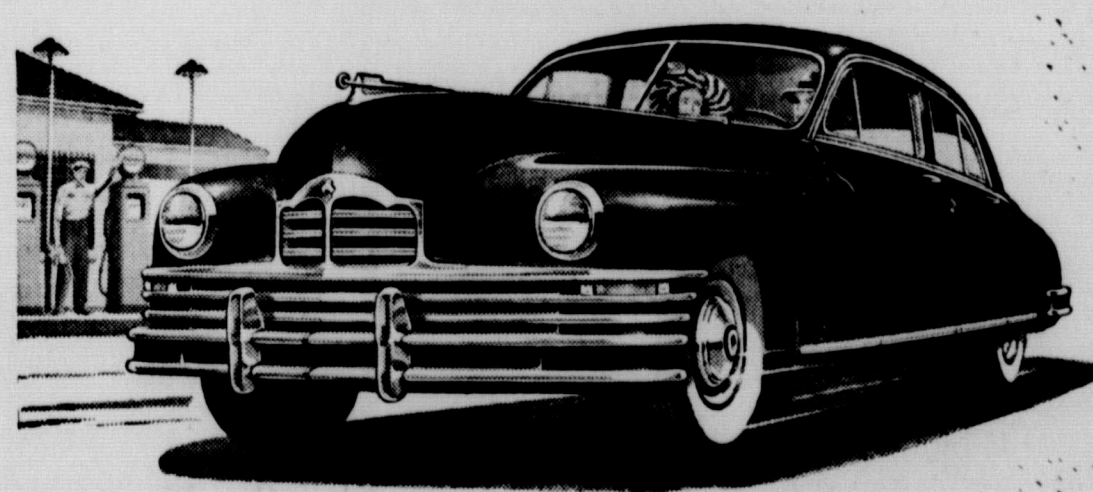

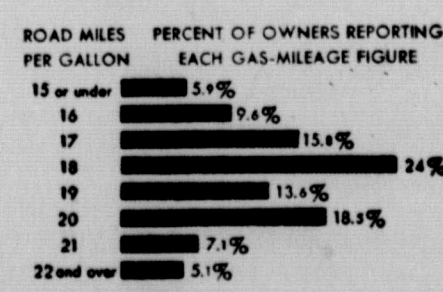

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that ad valorem tax shall be levied for general revenue purposes on January 1, 1951, and on the several counties to levy ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax in counties having tax donations; providing for submission of qualified electors and for necessary proclamation by the Governor.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed one cent (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom is used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as otherwise provided. Provided that in those counties having political subdivisions or areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Automatic Tax Board continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, until all legal obligations hereunder authorized by the law granting such donation or donations have been fully discharged, never shall first occur; provided that such donation to any county or political subdivision for less than the full amount of ad valorem taxes so levied, or portion of such taxes remaining and above such donation be retained by said county or subdivision."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60," to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance, risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion that state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which same is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to complete such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment"; and "Against the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 7
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows: "Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.
