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25 Lambs Placed On Feed by 4-H Club Boys Here

Twenty-five lambs have been placed on feed by 4-H Club boys in Ozona the past week, Bill Bergfeld, county agent, reported this week. Eighteen of these lambs are cross-bred Suffolk-Rambouillet, five are Rambouillet lambs and two are Rambouillet ram lambs.

The lambs were selected during the week from ranches of T. A. Kincaid, Jr., John Fogarty, Lindsey Hicks and Dempster Jones. Boys feeding lambs so far include Philip Childress, Tom Kincaid, Buddy Phillips and Lin Hicks.

The lambs from Dempster Jones ranch are registered ram lambs and the first selected to make up a good class of ram lambs for the Crockett county show next January. In the near future some ram lambs will be chosen from every registered Rambouillet breeder near Ozona, the county agent said.

The selection of lambs to be placed on feed will continue until school starts, Mr. Bergfeld announced. Club boys are being urged to make arrangements for their lambs before too many are shipped to market.

Tippett, Midway Lane Fields Each Get New Producers

Gulf 2-WO-G Tippett and Sinclair 3-62U Are Finaled

The Tippett field in extreme northeast Crockett county Tuesday gained another producer and a location.

Gulf Oil Corp., finaled its No. 2-WO-G Tippett for 303.60 barrels of 38.9 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 87.0-1 with the flow coming through a 7-64ths-inch choke. Top of pay was found at 6,130 with total depth at 6,151 feet.

Location is 2,568 from the north, 330 feet from the west lines of section 40, block 31, H&TC survey.

Forest Oil Corp., of Midland, filed application with the District 7-C office of the Railroad Commission in San Angelo for its No. 2-A-J. H. Tippett, 660 feet from the southeast line of section 4, 1,220 feet northeast of the company's No. 1 Tippett. It is in Abstract 5-552. It is contracted to 6,500 feet with rotary.

The Midway Lane (Ellenburger) field in northeastern Crockett county gained another producer Tuesday when Sinclair Prairie completed its No. 3-62U well for 216.14 barrels of 46.4 gravity oil on a 24-hour flowing potential.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,890-1 with top of pay at 7,530 feet with total depth of 7,585 feet.

It was perforated from 7,518-83 with 396 shots. Flow was through a 26-64-inch choke with flowing pressure on casing of 750 pounds and on tubing, 350 pounds. It was acidized with 1,500 gallons.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of section 21, block 46, University 62 lease. Elevation is 2,666 feet.

Voters To Decide Race For Senator In Run-Off Sat.

State Senate Race Also Issue In Local Balloting

Next Saturday, August 28, is election day again.

It's the Democratic run-off primary election.

Since there's to be no local contest to generate interest in the run-off the election is expected to be a listless affair here, unless the two principals in the hotly contested race for the post of junior United States Senator from Texas inject some issue of local interest between now and Saturday.

Interest in the run-off centers around the race between former governor Coke Stevenson of Junction and Congressman Lyndon Johnson of Blanco county. Stevenson, who as governor wiped out a deficit of more than 30 millions and left a surplus of nearly 40 millions in the state treasury, is a West Texan and a favorite of this area and expected to carry most of the ranching country. However, the race will probably be decided in the populous centers of the state, especially Houston, home of George Peedy, third ranking candidate in the first primary race, San Antonio, Dallas and Fort Worth.

Some local interest may be generated in the one district run-off race, that for the post of State Senator from the 29th district, which includes Crockett county. The run-off candidates in this race are Hill D. Hudson of Pecos, and Henry A. Coffield of Marfa. Each candidate has visited in Ozona both before and after the first primary in the interest of the campaign, but the race has been a quiet one on the whole.

Rapid Progress Toward Completion Of Street Paving

Giesen Bros. Applying Hard Surfacing To Many Blocks

In a matter of only a few more days, a dream which many Ozonians have held for many years, will become a reality.

Paved streets throughout the city, more than five miles of new construction, are fast becoming that dream realized.

Giesen Bros. Construction Co. of San Antonio last week started in the east section of the city to lay the first hard surface topping on city streets, which had been prepared by county machinery and curbed under contract by a cooperative move on the part of property owners and the county government.

Nearly 20 blocks of new paving had been completed or was nearing completion at mid week and contractors estimated that the southeast sector of the city would be completed by the week-end.

Meanwhile, four carry-all dirt movers are hauling caliche base for other streets in the city which are being prepared for paving. All curb work has been completed and to speed up the base work the county recently worked out an agreement with Sutton county for use of its two carry-alls on the local job. This county is to reciprocate by lending its two such machines for use in Sutton county for an equal number of days.

The caliche base has been watered and rolled and just before the surfacing begins, it is given a final grading and smoothing to receive a primer coat of heavy oil. This oil is allowed to stand two days and then the first course asphalt and rock coating is laid. This in turn is smoothed and rolled and then another asphalt shot is given and the final surfacing of fine rock laid on, brushed and rolled to a smooth surface.

Rebels Win 7-2 Decision In First Of Title Series

Ozona Hitters Crack Out 11 Safeties In Afternoon Play

Behind the four-hit pitching of Hefley, the Ozona Rebels took the lead over the Bronte Longhorns in the Concho Basin League Shaughnessy play-off championship final series in Bronte Sunday afternoon when they uncorked a slashing hitting attack which turned up eleven hits and seven runs for a 7 to 2 win over the Longhorns.

The Rebels held a comfortable lead from the first inning when they scored two runs, then added three more in the fourth and one each in the sixth and ninth. The Bronte nine was able to scratch cut but one hit the first five innings off the formidable pitching of Hefley, who has just recovered from a broken finger suffered in a game on the local diamond a month ago. The Coke county nine scored one run in the sixth on a walk issued to Pitcher Bon Spoons the only one of the day for Hefley, and a hit by Cord. Hefley gave up two more hits in the ninth which gave the Bronte crew another tally.

An error, a sacrifice and three hits were combined by the locals to score three runs in the opening inning. McClanahan was safe on an error at first base, went to second on Harrelson's bunt and scored on Sheffield's single, Sheffield going to second and a moment later scoring from that sack on Cox's hit. Stuart sent a long one to the outfield and Buddy Homer, who hit three for five and handled seven fielding chances without a bobble in the afternoon, singled to score Cox. Hefley singled in the second and Homer again in the third, but neither could be turned into a score.

But in the fourth, after two were out, the big bats of the champs again set up their booming and after eight batters had had their rap, the scorer showed three hits and three runs for the inning. Hufstetler struck out to start the fourth. Hefley was given a free pass but was forced by McClanahan on an infield grounder. Then Harrelson and Sheffield singled in succession, Cox was hit by a pitched ball and Stuart singled.

It was Sheffield again in the sixth, getting his third hit of the day and scoring Harrelson who had gone to second when the short stop fumbled his grounder. In the ninth it was manager Stuart who rapped out a triple to score Cox, who had reached first on an error at the third sack.

Sheffield and Homer racked up three hits apiece. Stuart got a couple and one each went to Cox, Harrelson and Hefley. Hefley struck out eight batters, gave up four hits and one walk. Bon Spoons, pitching for Bronte, allowed eleven hits, struck out seven and walked three.

Owner-Drilled Well On Archie Bean Ranch Said Showing Oil

Oil, like gold, is where you find it but seldom does a rancher drill his own well on his own property and strike pay.

But that is apparently what Archie Bean, San Angelo and Crockett county ranchman has done. Unofficial reports say Archie Bean No. 1 fee, wildcat test located on his north central Crockett, is showing signs of becoming a 25 to 35-barrel-a-day producer. At last reports, the wildcat was running tests after waiting on pump and tanks. It is bottomed at 1,405 feet in the Grayburg of the San Andres.

No. 1 Fee is 330 feet out of the northwest corner of the east half of the southwest quarter of section 27, block UV, GC&SF Ry. Co. survey. It is 11 miles northwest of Ozona and 1 1/2 miles east of E. M. Wahlenmaier, Steve Currie and Percy Bosworth No. 1-A George Bean, which in 1941 developed small, short-lived discovery production at 1,451-56 feet.

Feedstuffs sold unchanged although wheat millfeeds further strength. Top of hay were in good demand but weather lowered in many areas. Sold around 50 cents to for the week at most markets. Common and cows ranged from \$20 Houston, San Antonio, North, Oklahoma City and Monday and up to \$21 at City. Denver paid as high for good cows, which spread to \$23 at Kansas City, and Fort Worth, and to \$21 at San Antonio. Markets tended toward levels during the past week. Onio turned medium spring

lambs at \$21.50 Monday, while Fort Worth took medium and good grades at \$25 to \$26. Good and choice lots cashed at \$25 to \$26 at Oklahoma City and Wichita and \$23.50 to \$29.25 at Denver. Angora raisers asked 40 cents a pound for adult mohair and 60 for kid.





100 Increase in Scholastics Is Expected in Ten Years

IN — Texas must adequately prepare for 150,000 more in its schools in the next or lower its educational standards.

H. Tennyson, director of relations for the Texas Teachers Association, soundly warning here today.

Large increase in the birth rate during the last four years led to the enrollment in Texas by nearly 82,000 pupils from now and by 152,000 in 1957, Tennyson said.

Mostly accelerated birth throughout the United States in 1941 has cheered business at it is causing great concern among educators," the TSTA declared.

There is no exception. From the annual birth rate by the United States Bureau of Vital Statistics, we know births increased 1,549,601 about the United States from

2,360,399 in 1940 to 3,910,000 in 1947.

"Enrollment started increasing throughout the country last year. In Texas it was up more than 7,000 pupils. The State Department of Education this week estimated an additional 8,000 students would enroll this fall.

"That is just the beginning. Enrollment will snowball from then on. The situation will become acute in 1953. An accurate estimate places the hike in enrollment in Texas that year at 81,568 pupils. Nine years from now we will have 152,004 additional students in our schools, or a total of 1,660,004.

"An increase of 80,000 pupils in the short time of four years and 150,000 in nine years does not seem so tremendous until it is realized that we will need 2,719 more teachers by '52 and 5,066 more classroom instructors by 1957," Tennyson declared.

"It stands to reason we will have to have that many more classrooms.

"Leaders in school districts and

state government should take careful note. The situation calls for planning along practical lines in order that adequate provisions be made for education of these children."

Public Cooperation Urged in Maintaining Clean Eating Places

AUSTIN.—The Texas State Department of Health cannot maintain daily inspection of all eating places and the public is urged by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer to insist on the proper sanitation of the establishment where they eat. If the public is careless in his respect the incentive to maintain clean food service will be lessened and operators will only maintain the level the public is willing to accept. He urged that the public patronize "eating establishments which measure up to a high standard of cleanliness."

The State Health Department is making every effort to improve sanitation of eating places, Dr. Cox said, and there is "no excuse for cafe owners not taking advantage of the food handlers schools

which are being offered all over the state." He added that there are laws, rules and regulations which require the use of approved equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The public should be aware of these sanitary rules and regulations and insist that restaurants observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warned.

He urged milk appraisal by the patrons also. Texas law requires that a milk bottle cap state the grade of milk, and whether it is raw or pasteurized. "Insist on having the milk in its original container, with a covered cap and a legal label," Dr. Cox advised.

"Obviously," he said, "the best sanitation can be had only by close co-operation between the public and the investigators of the State Health Department."


