Officers who investigated the shooting said that the two men had been involved in a fisticuff earlier in the evening, the trouble growing out of an argument over wage payments to a third man. All were employed as plasterers on the new Methodist Church now under construction here, with Northcutt as foreman of the crew.

Information gathered by the officers indicated that the men had engaged in heated arguments over the wage question until Freeman finally went to bed in his room, Northcutt, Sheriff Earnest said, then started to "serenade" Freeman with his violin, to which the latter evidently objected, with the result that fists flew and Northcutt was ejected from the room.

This is the first year that the seventh and eighth grades have been able to take shop work.


