



Article 2981 of the civil statutes of Texas, which was enacted in 1905, specifically provides for the voting of a split ticket in a general election. To vote for Jack Porter, or any candidate of your choice, it is only necessary to scratch the names of every other candidate on the ballot except those you wish to vote

for.' Pinchney went on to say, "The so-called loyalty pledge does not apply to the election which will be held on November 2. This election is a general election which is held all over the United States on the same day. It is not a state or party primary. Our courts and the Attorney General's department of Texas have held this to be so for many years past.'

RAILROADS MUST OPERATE around the clock every day and night of the year.

Although they know this, leaders of 16 railroad unions are demanding a five-day, Monday through Friday, week for one million railroad employes.

They want 48 hours pay for 40 hours work -in itself a 20% wage increase.

They also demand a minimum of 12 hours pay for any work performed on Saturdays, and 16 hours pay for any work performed on Sundays and holidays.

On top of all this they want an additional increase of 25c an hour for every employe!

Summing up these demands, they mean that these union leaders seek to force the railroads to give one million employes an annual raise which would average \$1500 per employe!

The total cost of this would be no less than 14 billion dollars per year, which is more than twice the expected net income of the ailroads this year.
