Health Topic Is Discussed at P.T.A. Session Monday

Mrs. Gayer spoke on the work of the Tuberculosis Association and health authorities in attempting to stamp out this disease and of the accomplishment of the mobile X-Ray units being sent over the state by the State Health Department. One of these units is to be in Ozona at an early date and Mrs. Gayer solicited the help of the P.T.A. with the sponsoring organization, the Ozona Rotary Club, in making the visit here a success.

Children under 15 years will be given the patch test and all over 15, including adults of all ages, will be given free chest x-rays by this unit. Every resident of the county should avail himself of this opportunity to check on the presence of the disease, Mrs. Gayer said. The test takes less than a minute per person and everybody should take it. "No home is safe until all homes are safe," Mrs. Gayer pointed out.

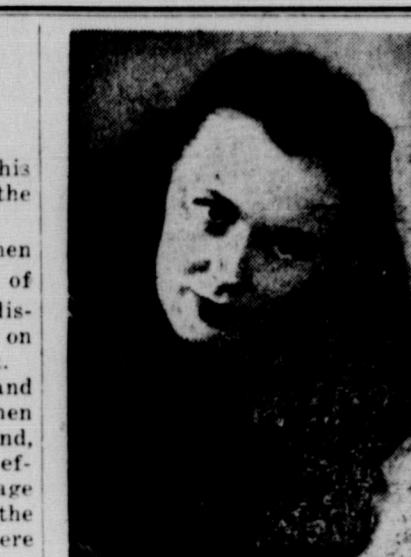

Dedicate New Football Stadium Saturday Night

Program to Precede Ozona-Junction Football Game

Ozona High School's new \$35,000 football stadium will receive its official name and be dedicated at impressive dedication ceremonies to be held at the lighted field Saturday night of this week as preliminary to the Ozona-Junction District 7-B football game set for that night.

The game was postponed from the original Friday night setting until Saturday night so that bands from other schools in this area, football fans and school patrons from nearby towns might be able to attend the dedication ceremonies, football game and queen crowning which is to feature the half-time exercises.

The day's program will begin in late afternoon with a gigantic band parade with bands from five towns, Junction, Big Lake, Sonora-Ozona and Eldorado participating.

The dedication program will get under way at the football field at 7 o'clock, with the invocation to be pronounced by the Rev. Glen Edwards, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Jack McIntosh, superintendent of schools, will act as master of ceremonies. The principal address of the evening will be delivered by Hill D. Hudson of Pecos, Democratic nominee and unopposed in the general election for the office of State Senator from the 29th district. Concert selections and field marching by the five bands will be a part of the colorful program and the official name of the new football stadium will be announced by John Man-

kin, president of the Student Council of Ozona High school. The name was chosen by the Council in secret sessions after receiving suggestions from the citizenship on a broadcast appeal, and will remain secret until announced by the Student Council president at the dedication ceremonies.

The halftime will be occupied with the crowning of the 1948 football queen of Ozona High School. Voting is now in progress for the football queen, four candidates, one from each high school class, being proposed by their respective classes. The candidates are Betty Jo Thompson from the Senior class, Joan Holt from the Junior class, Betty Sue Maddox from the Sophomore class and Patsy Hill from the Freshman class. The Student Council is promoting the queen election, selling votes at 1 cent each, the money to go to the Student Council for school activities.

General Rain Over West Texas Ranch Country

General rains, the first in more than a year in this West Texas area have fallen during the past week to bring moisture to some areas that were parched and barren from a lack of rain for a year or more and bolstering growing range feed in other sections that have been favored by recent rains.

Beginning with falls last Saturday night which covered a wide territory to bring rainfall measuring from a half inch to two and three inches in some sections, the rains returned the middle of this week for a slow falling general coverage, brightening prospects for winter weeds and grasses to bring livestock through to Spring.

WEEKLY SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

(USDA) — Curtailed marketings of livestock reversed price trends at southwest markets during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Hogs recovered some of their re-

cent losses in gains of mainly \$1 at Kansas City, Wichita, Oklahoma City and Denver. Most cattle sold 50 cents to \$1.50 higher for the week and Monday's markets continued steady to strong. Stockers and feeders shared in the strength. Most good and choice stocker steer calves changed hands at \$22 to \$25 at Fort Worth,

whole choice light lots reached \$26 to \$27 at Oklahoma City. Wichita sent light stocker steers and yearlings back to the country at \$19 to \$24. Kansas stocker calves made \$30 at Kansas City. Denver held choice stocker steer calves above \$30. Lambs sold about unchanged at most terminals, though Denver

paid a little more. Ewes lost mainly 25 to 50 cents for the week. Good and choice lambs ranged largely from \$23 to \$25. Medium and good ewes sold at \$9 at Fort Worth, and common and medium at \$8 at Denver. Goats sold steady to weak at San Antonio. Wool trade reflected a better feeling. Texas growers asked 75 cents a grease pound for fine 12-months staple wool. Mohair sold at 38 for adult and 58 for kid.

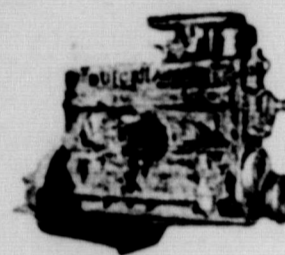

Porter Campaign Manager Explains Split Voting Procedure

Lloyd Wheelock, state campaign manager for U. S. Senatorial Candidate Jack Porter of Houston, said that state headquarters in Houston had received thousands of requests for information on voting the split ticket in the general election.

According to Wheelock most of the requests came from Democrats and states' righters who wish to vote for Mr. Porter but also support some candidate on their own ticket.

Wheelock said he had conferred with Steve Pinchney of Houston, prominent Texas attorney, who is active in Porter's campaign, and that Mr. Pinchney gave him the following information: "It is possible for any citizen of Texas who is qualified to vote in the general election to cast that vote for the candidate of his choice, regardless of party affiliation. Article 2981 of the civil statutes of Texas, which was enacted in 1905, specifically provides for the voting of a split ticket in a general election. To vote for Jack Porter, or any candidate of your choice, it is only necessary to scratch the names of every other candidate on the ballot except those you wish to vote for."

Pinchney went on to say, "The so-called loyalty pledge does not apply to the election which will be held on November 2. This election is a general election which is held all over the United States on the same day. It is not a state or party primary. Our courts and the Attorney General's department of Texas have held this to be so for many years past."

BOYCE HOUSE "GIVES YOU TEXAS"

The old Pecos River bridge, subject of poems, songs and Roy Bean yarns, is doomed. The work of demolition is underway or may even be completed.

A new bridge has been built and the old one has been unused for

several years.

J. C. Carter, executive assistant for public relations for the Southern Pacific Railway, has made a study of the old structure, which was built in 1892 and was in service till 1944.

A large salvage firm bought the old bridge.

Cowboys, to avoid the long ride down into and up out of the canyon, used to ride their horses across the high bridge. A young and pretty woman, "Pecos Kate," rode across and when a suitor was too fainthearted to follow, she rejected him — or so the song says.

Trains used to stop so that passengers could take in the view. Far below was a tiny trickle of silver — the Pecos river. On its bank were even smaller objects, hardly discernable — they were cows.

While the bridge was under construction a scaffolding broke and seven men plunged to the boulders

below. Judge Roy Bean rode over from Langtry to hold the inquest. The bodies were lying in a row. He instructed the jury to return a verdict that "these here seven men met their death by falling from the bridge." One juror spoke up, "But Judge, one of them ain't dead."

"Well," said old Roy, "he will die and I ain't gonna ride 14 miles on a sore back mule to hold another inquest. Officially and legally, he is dead."

The jury so found — and two days later the seventh victim did pass away.

The old bridge is part of the Southwest. Many old timers will hate to hear that it is gone.

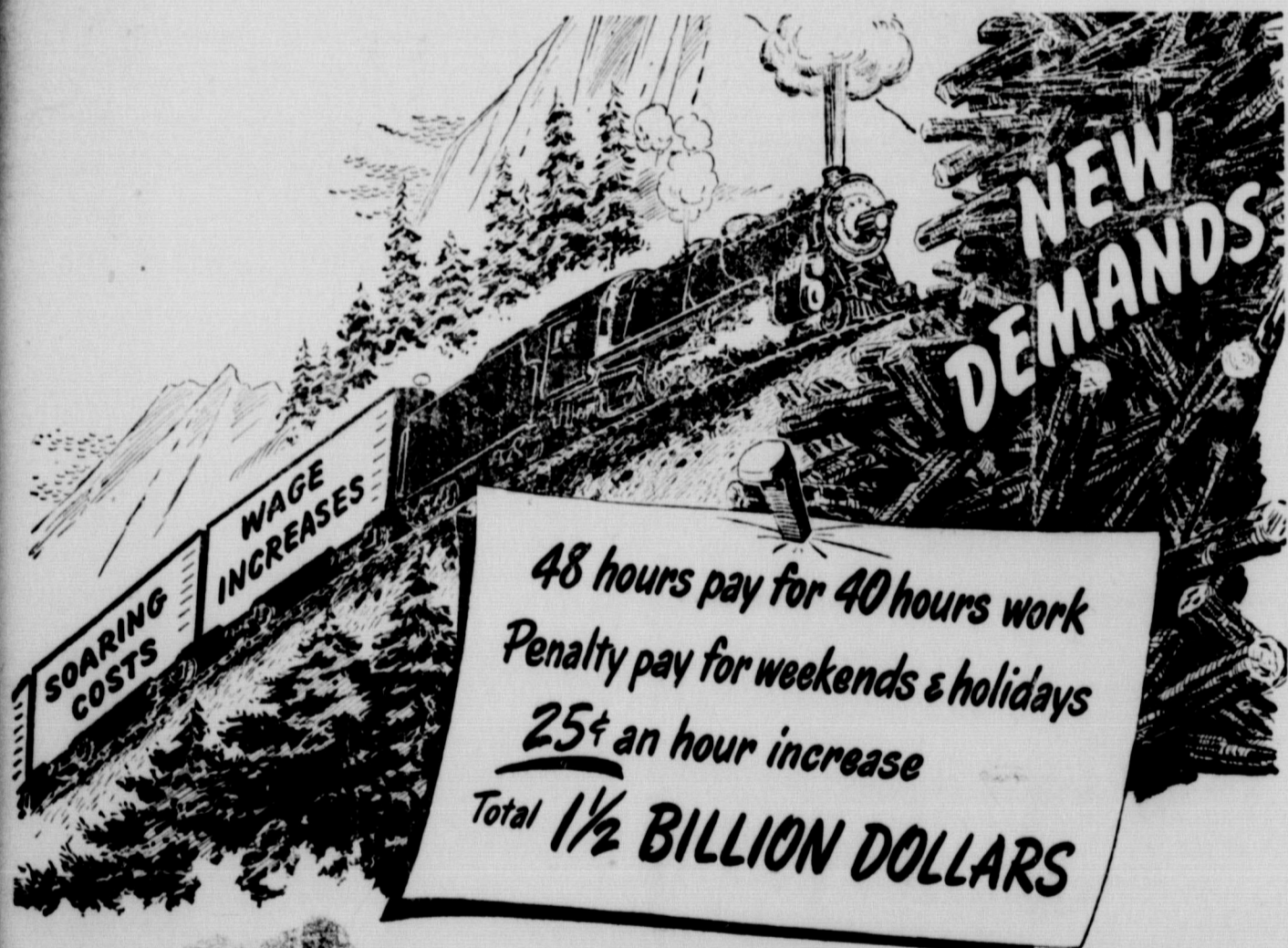

RAILROADS MUST OPERATE around the clock every day and night of the year.

Although they know this, leaders of 16 railroad unions are demanding a five-day, Monday through Friday, week for one million railroad employees.

They want 48 hours pay for 40 hours work — in itself a 20% wage increase.

They also demand a minimum of 12 hours pay for any work performed on Saturdays, and 16 hours pay for any work performed on Sundays and holidays.

On top of all this they want an additional increase of 25c an hour for every employee!

You'd Pay the Bill!

Summing up these demands, they mean that these union leaders seek to force the railroads to give one million employees an annual raise which would average \$1500 per employee!

The total cost of this would be no less than 1 1/2 billion dollars per year, which is more than twice the expected net income of the railroads this year.

You'd pay the bill, because if these increased costs are forced on the railroads,

they must have still further rate and fare increases.

Demands Unreasonable

These employees have had substantial raises during and since the war. Their average weekly earnings are higher than the average weekly earnings of workers in manufacturing industries. They have more job security than the average worker in American industry. They also enjoy paid vacations, a retirement system and other advantages more generous than the average worker receives.

In contrast with the demands of these 16 unions, which add up to the equivalent of 48c an hour, the Conductors and Trainmen recently settled their wage request for an increase of 10c an hour.

Railroads Run for Everybody—Not Employees Alone

The railroad industry must serve not one but many groups—producers, businessmen, shippers, passengers and the general public—night and day, every day of the year. These unions are proceeding in utter disregard of this important difference between railroads and other industries. Industrial plants can be shut down over weekends and holidays, but freight, mail, express and passengers must continue to move. Everybody who enters railroad employment knows this.

Strike Threat

On September 18, 1948, the leaders of these 16 unions began taking a strike vote. But the threat of a strike will not alter the opposition of the railroads to such unreasonable demands!

Fall Fire Warning Given by Commissioner

AUSTIN. — Fall time is fire time, cautions Marvin Hall.

The State Fire Insurance Commissioner says when red leaves begin falling they really should be regarded as signals of fire danger because the greatest fire loss suffered each year is suffered during cold, winter months.

Reminding housewives that one-half of the fires in Texas and the U. S. are home fires, Hall said the fall of the year was a good time to launch a personal fire prevention program with a thorough check-up and clean-up.

"Winter brings additional fire hazards as this season marks the time for heating equipment to be installed and put into use, for dead leaves to be gathered and burned, for lighting equipment to be in more frequent use as the days shorten, for the wearing of clothes that have to be dry cleaned rather than laundered and for greater use of matches," Hall explained.

Urging housewives to prepare for the fire dangerous months, Commissioner Hall named a few special fire safety tips for Texas housewives to keep in mind while making their fall check-ups:

1. Have all gas stoves connected with solid piping and if leaking gas is noticed, call the gas company. Protect woodwork around or under gas heaters. Be sure heaters are a safe distance from curtains or towel racks.

2. By all means rake up all the dead leaves on your premises but bury them — don't burn them —

in your flower beds. Buried leaves enrich the soil and create no fire hazard. Never use gasoline, benzine, naphtha or similar volatile liquids for cleaning purposes. Use an approved solvent for removing spots from clothes. Send to the dry cleaners any clothes needing extensive cleaning.

4. If the wiring system of the house is to be extended, call a professional electrician and have the job done right. Cords to portable electrical appliances should be as short as possible. Replace those that have become the least worn or frayed. Using pennies instead of fuses invites fire.

5. Keep matches in metal containers and out of reach of small children. Be sure matches and cigarettes are out before discarding them. Don't smoke in bed.
