## Boys Prep State Wool, Air Judging

State Judging Saturday In Sonora; To Meet June 13

Arrangements are being made for the Crockett County 4-H District Champion Wool and Judging Team to participate in the state judging contest at the College on Monday, June 13, at the Ozona team. The Ozona team will participate in some more judging at the Sonora Mohair Co. warehouse at 10 to 11:30 a. m. The date set for the Club Round-Up and County Conference. The 4-H Round-Up will be held June 13th, and the Agent's Conference the 16th and 17th. Crockett's 4-H Judging team will meet at Ozona Sunday morning, June 13th, and will arrive at A&M that night; June 13th has been set aside for all Boy's Judging contests. The Ozona team will meet Monday morning, June 14th, at the State and judge in the State and Mohair contest on that day.

Boys from Ozona will be in the new dormitory area at the college together with their teachers and county agent. The boys and their leaders are charged \$4.00 each to cover cost of lodging for the night of June 12 through 15th. They will be required to bring their own linens, toilet and other necessities. Meal tickets will be available to them at \$4.00 each and will be valid from supper, June 13, through June 15th at the college.

Regulations and instructions governing the state contests will be held on June 13th, which will result in all contestants arriving at Ozona Sunday evening, June 13th.

The first and second teams in the district will be selected to represent the district, thus allowing a maximum of 28 teams per district for the entire state. Crockett, and Glascock County represent District 6. Any boy can participate on any one team since most contests will be conducted simultaneously.

## Ozono Negro Woman Held In Slaying Of Husband At Big Lake

BIG LAKE—Vivian Holland, Negro woman of Ozona, remained in the Reagan County Jail late Monday on charges she murdered her husband, Johnnie Holt Holland at Big Lake. Holland was shot to death at 11:45 o'clock Sunday morning at the residence of a friend, Sampson Ezell, whom he was visiting. Witnesses said the woman came to the door and fired a shot which missed. Holland went outside and a second shot was wild. A third shot struck him in the left chest. The woman was arrested at a stoplight some 10 minutes after Deputy Sheriff Bud Chatwell got a call on the shooting. She had a .38 caliber revolver when arrested. She offered no resistance. Vivian Holland was arrested at San Angelo about two years ago for the fatal shooting of Ethel Farmer, another negro woman at a cafe on North Randolph Street there. Charges were dropped later. The body of Johnnie Holt Holland was taken to San Angelo.

## Ozono-Forsan Game In Angelo Rained Out

A great array of baseball talent was assembled at beautiful Guinn Field in San Angelo Friday night for what promised to be almost a "battle of the century" in baseball, but a few minutes before game time, J. Pluvius opened up with a deluge that sent a few hundred disappointed fans back on the homeward trek. It was the heralded Ozono-Forsan, or Ozono-Shelton game that had attracted dozens of carloads of Ozono fans to the Tom Green capital. A local shower in Ozono in mid-afternoon had caused some long-distance queries about the weather outlook in San Angelo along about leaving time, but prospects seemed excellent there. But the clouds thickened in early evening and twenty minutes before game time, Guinn Field and surrounding area stood a few inches deep in water as a heavy downpour ended game possibilities for the evening. And Manager Byron Stuart of Ozono had assembled all hands, including Bob McChesney, left hand chunker, Gibbs and Carmel from Abilene, Scott, Homer, Cox, Montgomery, Sheffield, Harrison, and even an outfielder who reported to the Colts in San Angelo, playing out of town the evening, and "loaned" to the Rebels through the good offices of Massie West, Ozono director of the Colt club.

## Rebels Nose Out Big Lake 5-4 In Trans Pecos Tilt

### Texon Field Scene Of Sunday Afternoon's Thriller

Ghosts of the players of other years—the semi-pro Oil Belt league days of the thirties—Dorley, Heatherly, Crostwaite, Slim Harris, Dusty Boggess, "Millet Seed" Duncan, and other greats of those great days of baseball in Ozono stalked the old Texon diamond for many of the older Ozono fans Sunday afternoon. And just such a bang-up game as the league produced in those days was witnessed on the 1949 playing field—a 5-4 victory for the Ozono Rebels (Giants in the semi-pro days) over the Big Lake Oilers of the present-day Trans Pecos League in a slam-bang ball game that was not decided until the last man was out in the last half of the ninth. At least four of the "ghosts" of the old days when Ozono and Texon vied for leadership in West Texas baseball, were on hand in the flesh. There was Tex Stuart, "rookie" catcher in the latter days, now sparking the Rebels from behind the platter in the role of player-manager; Curtis Barbee, hard hitting catcher for the Texon Oilers, then and now; the old war horse, Snipe Conley, still managing the Oilers and still pinch hitting—though not as effectively as in yesteryears; Jacot, left hand chunker, still able to get 'em across; and Cotton Kerlin, former fifth man on the Texon team, now mellowed with years and calling 'em a little nearer right from behind the inflated chest pad. The Rebs got off to a three-run lead in the opening inning. Harrison and Scott drew walks off Pitcher Bud Jordan and Harrison scored on Cox's single. Stuart forced Cox at second and Bob McChesney, pitcher, rapped a double to center to score Scott and Stuart. Big Lake bunched three hits and one free pass in their half of the opener to cross two runs. Stuart's double and a single by McChesney in the fourth produced another Ozono run to make it 4 to 2. But the Oilers took advantage of a couple of Rebel errors, a walk and a hit batter and a single by Barbee in the fifth to tie the score. The Ozono winning run was scored in the seventh when Scott singled to score Kyle from third base. Kyle had reached first when the right fielder dropped his high fly, went to second on a sacrifice by Clegg, and advanced on a bobble at second base of Harrison's grounder. The Oilers threw a chill into Ozonans in the final half of the ninth when Barbee and Bankston singled in succession after one was out. With Barbee on third for the tying run and Bankston at second with the winner, the veteran Conley went in to pinch hit for Jacot. He rolled one to Bower at third and Barbee was thrown out at the plate. The ball game was sacked up when Cobb hit one to Carmel at short to force Conley at second for the third out. The Rebels continue in league combat on the home ground next Sunday afternoon when they entertain the Iraan crew, only league team so far that has chalked up a win over the locals to put them in a tie with the Goodfellow Field Skyhawks for league leadership. It was the Rebs who pulled down the Hawks for their lone loss in a recent game.

The revival services of the First Baptist Church opened Wednesday night with good attendance at the opening service. The pastor, Rev. Clifton R. ## County Furnishes Means For City Clean-Up Drive

### Spraying, Weed Cutting To Be Furnished At Cost To Residents

As a means of encouraging a citywide clean-up campaign in Ozono, including DDT spraying and weed cutting to minimize the chances of a summer outbreak of polio here, Crockett county officials this week announced a plan which will make it possible for property owners to get DDT spraying and services of a power mower for weed cutting at a minimum cost. County Judge Houston Smith announced that the county's power spraying machine, which will be used to spray county property and along draws and other public spots, will also be available to property owners' use for the cost of the material used only. DDT is being used in spraying operations to kill insects, flies, mosquitoes, etc. and the average cost of DDT to spray the premises about a residence is approximately \$2.50. A power mowing machine, owned by the county, is also available to property owners for use in cutting the tall weeds which have covered the town as a result of recent bountiful rains. The mower is operated by two men and a private property owner may have use of the machine and men at a rate of approximately \$2 an hour, which covers the salaries of the two operators. The epidemic of polio now raging in San Angelo is cited as reason for concern on the part of every resident here in seeing that a thorough clean-up of the town is pursued. Insects are believed carriers of the disease and for that reason every method of controlling insects should be adopted as a precaution. With the county's cooperation in furnishing the men and machines for weed cutting and spraying, property owners will be able to have this work done at a minimum of cost. Every owner of a weed-covered vacant lot or other property is urged to contact county officials for use of the mower. The weeds provide a harbor for insects of all kinds and should be cut for the safety of the entire community.

J. P. Pogue, chairman of the Lions softball committee, says that ticket sales have been booming all week and plans are complete to give the customers their money's worth and more. In addition to a full scale softball game played by players mounted on donkeys, the evening's entertainment fare will include music by the Ozono Hillbilly Band and a ceremony dedicating the new improved softball park, which is expected to furnish nightly entertainment this summer as soon as local softball teams are organized into a city league. The fleet of donkeys to be used in the Monday night game are specially trained brutes, trained, that is, to make it more difficult for base runners to negotiate the base paths aboard one of these stubborn beasts and the fielders, likewise mounted, to retrieve hit balls. fabricated vet village to seek refuge from a severe hail storm. Children slept on couches and chairs for the night.

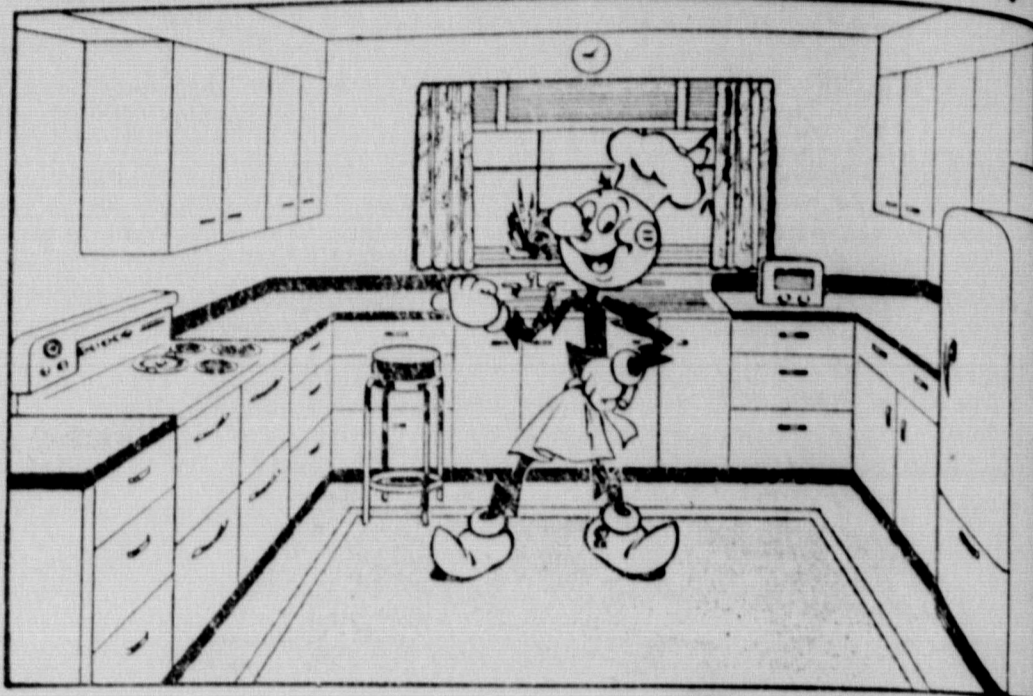
The hail storm, which knocked out hundreds of windowpanes in

A well has been completed in the World Field and a location staked in the Vaughan (San Andres) pool, both in Crockett County.

Pumping 45 barrels of 30 gravity oil plus 30 per cent water in 20 hours, M&M Production Co. No. 2-E Powell in the World Field established a daily potential of 54 barrels.

Production was through 32 perforations 2,676 to 2,684 feet in 7-inch casing cemented on bottom at 2,717 feet. The section was acidized with 300 gallons. With elevation 2,777 feet, the well topped the pay at 2,676 feet. It is 1,332 feet from the west line of the lease in section 63-BB-GC&SF.

Alford Oil Company of Dallas staked location for No. 1 Isabel Vaughan in the Vaughan field 330 feet from the north and west lines of the northwest corner of section 87-OP-GC&SF. Drilling 1,500 feet with cable tools is scheduled, starting June 1.

**Before Band-Aids, Pioneers Used Dirt Packs To Bind Wounds**

AUSTIN—There wasn't a doctor handy when the daughter of a Texas pioneer had her finger almost severed, so the mother put the finger back in place, packed dirt around it and wrapped it with a rag.

Today the finger is as good as new. Mrs. H. Willis, 73, one of the only two survivors of the early town of Nesterville in Wichita County, relates in a story told to Bobby Lovelace of Wichita Falls senior high school.

Young Lovelace has written down experiences of Mrs. Willis as member of a pioneer family in the current issue of the "Junior Historian," publication of the Texas State Historical Association, which has headquarters at the University of Texas.

Mrs. Willis came to Texas with her mother in 1878 and remembers a friendly Indian named "Chief Jack," who often came to eat with the family.

T. W. Loffland and J. M. Loffland, Jr., of Fort Worth No. 1 L. R. Cox, Crockett County wildcat 25 miles southwest of Ozona, was plugged and abandoned at 1,078 feet in grey lime. It struck sulphur water at 1,015 feet. Location was 330 feet from the north and east lines of the southwest quarter of section 25-2-I&GN, on a farm-out from Signal and Honolulu. Garrett M. Smith No. 1-D L. P.

Powell in the World Field completed, pumping 47 barrels of 28.6 gravity oil in 24 hours at a current daily allowance of 54 barrels, the well is 407 feet south, 330 feet from the east line of the lease in section 63-BB-GC&SF.

The Texas Co. No. 2 V. W. Pierce, exploring the Ellenburger of Ozona was drilling at 21 miles south and slightly east of Ozona was drilling at 21 feet in Ellenburger lime and mite and streaks of chert. It had no shows and had many tests recently. Location is SE NE 10-000-GC&SF.

### Oil Field Worker Bitten By Vinegaroon; Suffers No Ill Effects

Most West Texans have heard hair-raising stories about the deadly effects of the bite of the ugly looking vinegaroon—pro- nounced by most of us "vinega- rone"—but few people have per- sonal knowledge of anyone being bitten by the insect.

Now comes a worker at the Ply- mouth Oil Co. field in western Crockett County to testify that the wicked look of the vinegaroon is not all bluff—they actually will bite.

The man—he did not give his name—called Dr. Royce W. Pruet early this week, told the doctor he had been bitten by a vinega- roon and asked for a remedy to counteract the poison. Dr. Pruet had never before had occasion to

treat a patient for the bite of a vinegaroon. He went to the medi- cal books in a hurry, but it seems that the books failed to include the horrific looking Mexico-West Texas denizen in its treatises on poisonous insects.

Classified as a "whip scorpion" by dictionary definition, the vine- garoon's venom—if any—is per- haps like that of other scorpions—painful but not necessarily fatal except in cases of extreme sensi- tivity, the doctor determined.

The victim of the bite did not make it clear whether the vinega- roon bit with its mandibles or with the big crab-like pincers with which it seizes its food, or used a stinger in its attack. The man was bitten on the finger, he told Dr. Pruet, but said at the time he was suffering no ill effects and that the finger was not paining him.

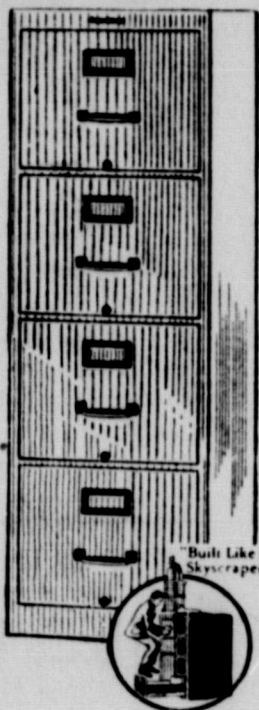

first week of the drive and others showed sales of more than 50 per cent of more of quotas.

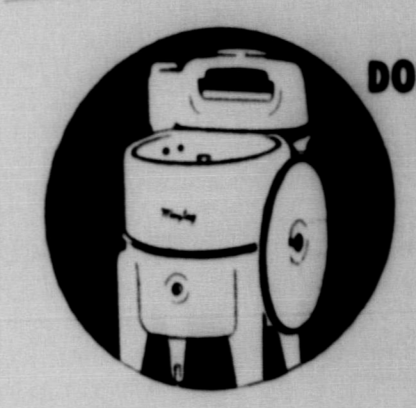
