Hospital Finance Campaign Shaped **At Council Meet**

Donations Sought for Furnishings and Equipment

Organizational groundwork was laid at a meeting of the Crockett County Community Council at the courthouse Monday night as the first move preparatory to launching a county wide campaign to raiss \$30,000 in donations for the purpose of finishing and equipping Ozona's new hospital.

Heads of committees to direct the soliciting work were named and general plans for conducting the campaign were discussed.

Family groups and individuals, oil companies operating in the Crockett county area, business firms, ranchers and others will be solicited for substantial donations to complete the hospital fa-

Estimates of costs of furnishings and equipment, including the elevator, have been secured, although not complete, and the total cost will run near the \$30,000 mark. Estimates place the two largest items, the elevator and operating room equipment, at \$11,-000 and \$7,000 respectively, with costs for furnishings for the five private rooms at approximately \$500 each and the three wards at \$1,200. Complete estimates on costs of the kitchen, linens, and various other needed items have not been secured but it is thought they can be secured within the estimated total on which the drive is to be based.

Workmen are nearing the final stages of construction of the upper floor of the three story structure and the Community Council was asked to name a committee to help the Commissioners Court in deciding the color schemes and decorations for the interior. WEEKLY SWING OF SOUTHFARM MARKETS

(USDA)-Most southwest farm products held about steady to strong during the past week, but some easy spots appeared, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Sorghums advanced 10 cents a hundred for the week, but other grains lost 1 to 3 cents a bushel. Higher feed prices reflected strength in the grain markets. Slackened demand for middle grade hay brought lower quots

largely from 50 cents to \$2 above. a week earlier, although some classes showed little change. Houston moved cutter cows at \$15 Monday. Canners and cutters brought \$12 to \$16 at San Antono, \$11 to \$16 at Fort Worth, \$13 o \$16 at Oklahoma City, and \$14 o \$15.50 at Denver.

Wide fluctuations during the week left hog prices \$2 higher af ter Monday's trading at San Antonio, and around 50 cents high er at most other markets. Lambs gained \$1 to \$2 for the week, and ewes changed little.
