Oil Co. Pays Rental On Pecos School Tract 100 Years in Advance

AUSTIN. — Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles, has found a 'steady customer' for a small tract of school land in Pecos County.

The commissioner has received payment from an oil company covering rental on the tract for the next one hundred years, making the present lease effective until the year 2049.

The tract, less than two acres in size, is one of the smallest in the School Land Board's records. However, it has paid off unmanufactured hunk — \$20,000.00 to the

WEEKLY SWING OF SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

(USDA)—Most southwest farm products held about steady to strong during the past week, but some easy spots appeared, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Sorghums advanced 10 cents a hundred for the week, but other grains lost 1 to 3 cents a bushel.

Higher feed prices reflected strength in the grain markets. Slackened demand for middle grade hay brought lower quotations.

Southwest cattle prices ranged largely from 50 cents to \$2 above a week earlier, although some classes showed little change. Houston moved cutter cows at \$15 Monday. Canners and cutters brought \$12 to \$16 at San Antonio, \$11 to \$16 at Fort Worth, \$13 to \$16 at Oklahoma City, and \$14 to \$15.50 at Denver.

Wide fluctuations during the week left hog prices \$2 higher after Monday's trading at San Antonio, and around 50 cents higher at most other markets.

Lambs gained \$1 to \$2 for the week, and ewes changed little. San Antonio bought common and

medium fresh shorn lambs at \$17. Fort Worth took medium and good grades at \$21. Top slaughter lambs reached \$23.50 at Oklahoma City.

Receipts of cattle, calves and hogs last week dropped well below the week before, although sheep increased. Dressed beef, lamb and pork remained strong as trade opened in New York and

Chicago Monday. Gains in week ranged from \$3 to \$4 and calf dropped \$1 to \$2 last Monday, depending on and grade.

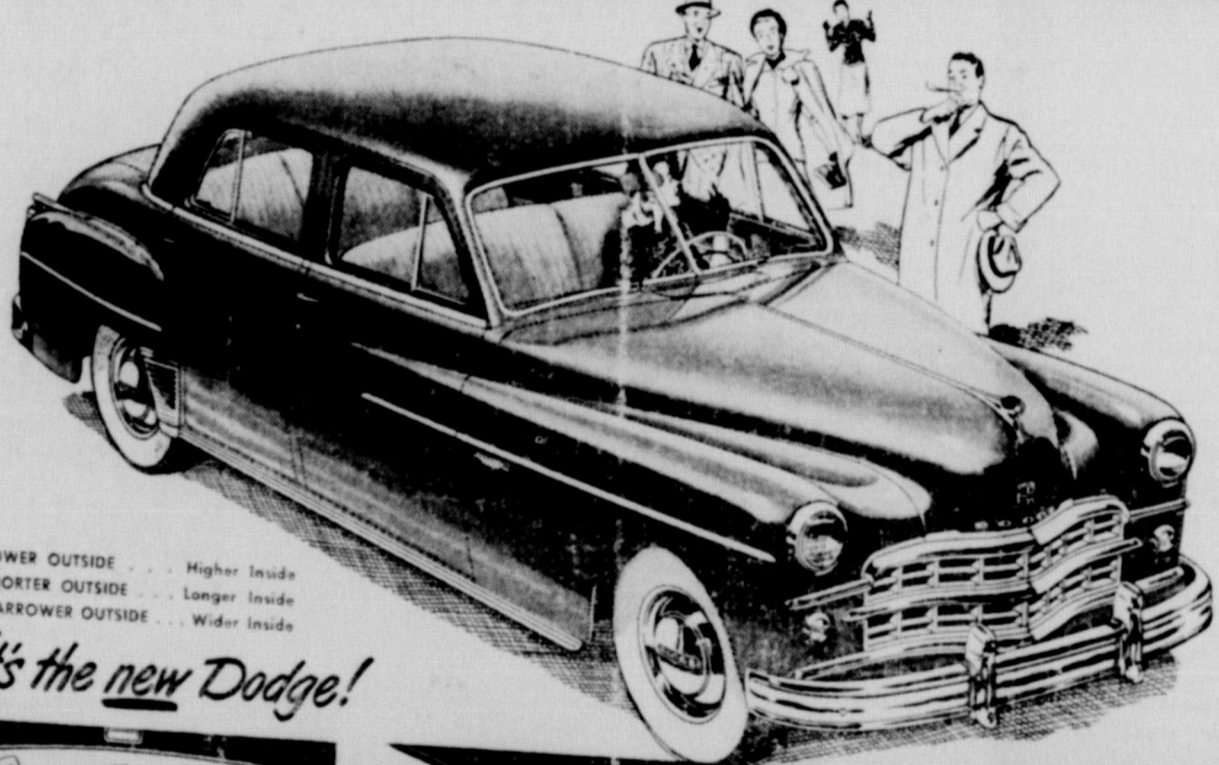
