Hospital Bldg. Finishing Work Is Under Way

Kay Johnson Heading Crew Completing Top Story

After many months of delay, work was started during the past week toward completion of the third floor of the new Ozona hospital building.

The top floor of the three-story combination courthouse annex and hospital is to be the hospital proper, the bottom floor being used for county purposes, the second floor for doctor's offices, X-Ray and laboratory rooms.

Work was suspended on the building when funds being supplied by the county were exhausted. The first two floors were partitioned and finished but the hospital floor left in an unfinished state, with the roof complete and plumbing and electrical work roughed in but not completed.

The present program calls for finishing the interior of the floor, partitioning off the hospital rooms and making the building ready for use as soon as necessary furnishings and equipment are made available.

Kay Johnson, local building contractor, is in charge of the new building work.

Bay-Vickers to Drill Deep Test in Northeast Crockett

C. U. Bay and Vickers Petroleum Co. of Midland filed application Tuesday for a permit to drill an 8,500-foot rotary wildcat in the northeast corner of Crockett county. Testing the Ellenburger is planned.

The wildcat will be No. 1 University, 660 feet out of the southwest corner of section 4-39-U. The section comprises 676.4 acres.

The Bay-Vickers operation will be 2 1/2 miles northeast of Stanolind No. 1-TT University, C SW NW 12-39-U, which early in the summer of 1947 developed small discovery production from the detrital after failing in the Ellenburger. It will be 5 1/2 miles west of the Schleicher county line and six miles south of the Irion county line.

Frankels Stake Ellenburger Test in Crockett Co.

University Block West Of Ozona Site of Deep Test

Frank and George Frankel of Houston Thursday staked a scheduled 9,800-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett county, seven miles southwest of the Todd Deep pool, on a block of 2,560 acres for which a bonus of \$8,000 was paid at the June 1948 auction of leases on University of Texas land.

The wildcat is the No. 1-503 University, 660 feet from south and west lines of section 12, block 30, University land, 20 miles west and slightly north of Ozona. The acreage, all in block 30, consists of the northeast quarter, and south half, section 1, north half and south-west quarter, section 12; west half, section 13; west half, section 14; north half and southeast quarter, section 11; northeast quarter and south half, section 2.

New producer for the southern part of the Midway Lane pool is the Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 10 Chambers, Chambers county school land, completed for 154 barrels of oil out one-tenth of one per cent with basic sediment. Gas-oil ratio was 1,430-1, with oil testing 46 gravity. Total depth is 7,584 feet.

Air Force Major Discusses Aspects of Cold War in Europe

Major Stephen Crosby, stationed at Goodfellow Field in San Angelo, discussed the political and economic aspects of the cold war in Europe and the so-called Berlin crisis, in an interesting talk before the Ozona Rotary Club at its meeting Tuesday.

Major Crosby participated in the infamous Bataan Death March after which he was a prisoner of the Japs until near the war's end. He was one of 1800 American officers crammed in the hold of Jap ships and moved out of the Philippines ahead of the American landing to retake the Islands, saw hundreds of his companions die of suffocation, disease and starvation on that trip, but was one of 200 to survive the ordeal. Some of the horrors of these experiences Major Crosby related to Ozona Rotarians on a visit to the club several weeks ago.

The present crisis in Berlin is the outgrowth of a continuing struggle between western democracies and totalitarian east, the major said, and gave some of the background international dealings which has led to the Berlin stalemate. He pointed out the repeated Russian violation of the terms of the Potsdam agreement, the day-to-day struggle of the western allies to offset Russian infiltration methods and to promote better economic conditions in their sectors to overcome the Soviet bid for control of all Europe. So far we are winning the cold war, he said but at tremendous cost.

Funerals Friday For First Two Returned War Dead

Manuel and Pablo Diaz Reburial Services At 4 p.m. Friday

Reburial services for Crockett county's first returned World War II dead are scheduled for 4 o'clock Friday afternoon.

The bodies of Manuel and Pablo Diaz, sons of Mrs. Enemencia Diaz, who were killed in action in Germany, reached Ozona this morning by train, each with a military escort, and are at the family home pending funeral services. Services will be held at the Catholic Church at 7 o'clock Friday morning, the graveside rites at 4 p.m.

A military funeral will be held at the graveside in Cedar Hill Cemetery, with a bugler and firing squad from Goodfellow Field in San Angelo here to conduct the services.

Manuel Diaz was wounded in action on October 16, 1943, in the fighting in Normandy after the invasion of the continent. He was taken prisoner by the Germans and died the following day in a German prison hospital.

Pablo Diaz was killed in action in the latter stages of the war in Germany on March 15, 1944.

Body of another Crockett county casualty, Ismail Najjar, who was killed in Germany less than three weeks before the Germans surrendered is to be returned here for reburial soon. Notification of his death from the War Department came to the family here after the war's end in Europe.

New Elementary School Complete By Christmas Day

Grades Through 3rd To New School After The Holidays

Contractors have promised delivery of the new elementary school building, now near completion, by Christmas day and plans are being made to have the building in readiness for occupancy when classes are resumed on January 3 after the Christmas holidays, Supt. Jack McIntosh announced this week.

The new 10-classroom structure is being completed at a total cost of approximately \$160,000. In addition to the ten classrooms the building has a library and teacher offices.

Pupils of the two kindergartens, two first, two second and two third grade classes will initiate the new building after the holidays. A music room will be designated for the use of the public school music teacher's classes and one of the extra rooms which will not be in use at the start will be used as a teachers' work room.

Mrs. Harvey Smith will be principal of the new elementary school. Mrs. Smith, who is serving her second year as teacher in the Ozona schools, has had 12 years of teaching experience, teaching in the Odessa schools before coming to Ozona. She holds a master's degree from North Texas State Teachers College.

Record Gathering Ropers Here for Davidson Rodeo

Ideal Weather Pre-views for Opening of Largest Event

They came from all over the nation, the top rodeo hands of these United States, in record numbers to take part in the fourth annual Joe Davidson December rodeo which was kicked off after the big ranch barbecue dinner spread by the host Davidsons at noon Wednesday.

From California, Oklahoma, Arizona, New Mexico and from all over Texas, the cream of the nation's roping talent, top hands in Madison Square Garden, Cheyenne or any of the other big shows, they all came to fling a loop at the big Davidson Brahma calves and steers in the three-day free rodeo — "Joe's little party" — an event unique in all the country. "Bring your bedroll" is the Davidson invitation, and plus a place to spread it under the stars in and about the big ranch arena, there are three "squares" a day for all comers, ranch style, and horse feed and stable space. But beyond that, Host Davidson picks out four of his top quarter horse colts to be given as prizes for the best times in the varied events.

Since Sunday, the pick-ups and trailers, hauling from one to three roping horses and as many and more ropers, have been rolling into Ozona for the big event. And when the first calf was shooed out of the chute Wednesday afternoon, it was estimated that more than a hundred ropers were gathered to take part in the unfolding events.

Big names in the rodeo business, like Lanham Riley of Fort Worth, Buddy Neal of Fort Davis, Jack Skipworth of Clovis, N. M., Jim Espy of Fort Davis, Sonny Edwards, Big Spring, Everett Shaw of Stonewall, Okla., Royce Sewall of Brownwood, Troy Forte of Lovington, N. M., Toots Mansfield of Big Spring, Walt Poage of Rankin, James Kenney of Carlsbad, N. M., Ike Rude of Newhall, Calif., Dick Truitt of Stonewall, Okla., Shoate Webster of Nowater, Okla., Joe Glenn of Douglas, Ariz., Harry Howard, Jay Lane, plus Ozona's own Lewis and Tom Powers, Vic Montgomery, John D. Holleyman and others were listed on the entry cards for the three-days roping.

Starting at one o'clock Wednesday afternoon, the events were reeled off in rapid fire order but even so, darkness caught up with the performance and one steer tie-down contestant had to wait until the following day to try for his time.

Eighty-eight calf ropers were clocked in the opening day's event. John D. Holleman of Ozona turned in the best time in this event, 13.9 seconds to win first day money. Buddy Goff of Bandera was second in 14.2, Tom Powers of Ozona third in 14.7 and George Epperson of Cherokee, Texas, fourth with 14.9. Although not in the money, Buff Douthitt of Pecos was in there close with a time of 15.1 seconds.

First place in the steer tie-down contest went to Dick Truitt of Stonewall, Okla., whose time was 21.5 seconds. Second place was won by Ike Rude of Newhall, Calif., with a time of 25.1 seconds. In third place was Buddy Neal of Fort Davis whose time was 25.2 and fourth place was held by Joe Glenn of Douglas, Ariz.

The girls, too, are having a fling in the arena and in an opening event, the girls clover leaf race, fourteen girls were entered. First money went to Amy McGilvery of Sheffield who made the complicated ride around the barrels in 24.7 seconds. In second place was Betty Barron of San Angelo in 25 seconds flat and third place went to Alena Faye Powers, daughter of the Tom Powers of Ozona.

Fifty-two teams of ropers were entered in the team tying event. Because one team is yet to rope, no places are yet designated in this event. Leading the pack at (Continued On Last Page)

Campaign Launched By Growers to Stop Misuse Term 'Mohair'

SAN ANGELO. — A campaign to end misuse of the term "Mohair" in upholstery fabrics and other products containing little or no Mohair was put into motion at the annual convention of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. The campaign includes

application to the Federal Trade Commission for rules governing the use of the word "Mohair", notification to better business bureaus of the "Gross Deceptions" being practiced upon the public, and drastic legal action against offenders.

Chemical analysis will be made of upholstery fabrics, drapes and other household products labelled as being Mohair or containing Mohair, and where these analyses in-

dicade deception through absence of the fiber or use of only a small percentage, legal action for fraud will be undertaken.

The educational program will be directed to the public through appeal to better business bureaus, consumer organizations and state bureaus enforcing laws covering upholstery. It will be financed by a special tax on the Mohair Growers of Texas and other states.

Application to the Federal Trade Commission will be made by Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, The National Wool Grow-

ers Association and The American Wool Council. The determination to initiate the campaign was decided upon after speeches by Nathaniel Duval of the Massachusetts Mohair Plush Company of Boston, and F. Eugene Ackerman, Textile Consultant and Executive Director of the American Wool Council. Mr. Duval explained the extent of the misuse of the term "Mohair" in upholstery fabrics containing only small percentages of the fiber. He urged that the name "Mohair" be protected not only in the interest of mohair growers and manufacturers using mohair, but also in the interests of the public, which, he said, was being sold upholstery which gives

inferior use and service. Mr. Ackerman emphasized the necessity for fiber identification in all fabrics as an essential for honest merchandising.

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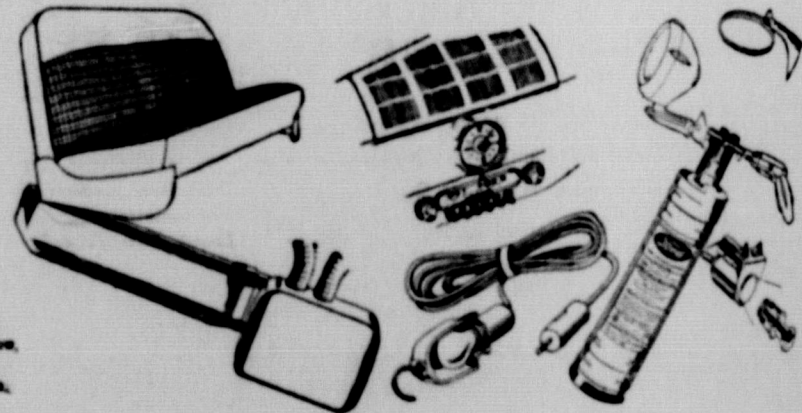

Twice during those 21 years, six
men were hanged at one time,
probably a record in America.
And, three times, five men were
executed at one time. In all 88 men
were executed after having been
tried and convicted before Judge
Parker.

Hangings were witnessed by
large crowds, sometimes thou-
sands of people, many of whom
came from a great distance and
camped near the gallows the night
before so they would be sure of a
good, close-up view.

Although the court was in Ar-

kansas, it had no jurisdiction over
frimes committed in that State
— only in Indian Territory, the No-
Man's Land where outlaws and
fugitives abounded. Judge Parker
tried 9,500 men who were convicted
and the court was known as
"the Gates of Hell." Sixty-five U-
nited States marshals were killed
in line of duty in Indian Territory
during the 21 years that Judge
Parker was on the bench.

In passing sentence of death, the
judge usually delivered a scathing
denunciation of the prisoner.

There was one defendant so bold
as to interrupt Judge Parker and
denounce him in the courtroom.
That man was Henry Starr, the
notorious bank and train robber.
He was accused of killing a man,
which he admitted but claimed it
was his life or the other man's.

Starr was convicted and when
Judge Parker began a scorching
lecture, the prisoner broke in:
"Don't try to stare me down, old
Nero. If I am a monster, you are
a fiend, for I have put only one
man to death, while you have

slaughtered scores."
Judge Parker, without more dis-
cussion, pronounced the sentence.
However, after Judge Parker re-
tired, the new judge permitted a
plea of guilty to manslaughter and
a prison term was imposed. Starr

served more than half of the sen-
tence and then was pardoned.
Strict and stern though the
"hanging judge" was, he felt that
he was only doing his duty — that
only through the greatest severity
could crime be repressed.

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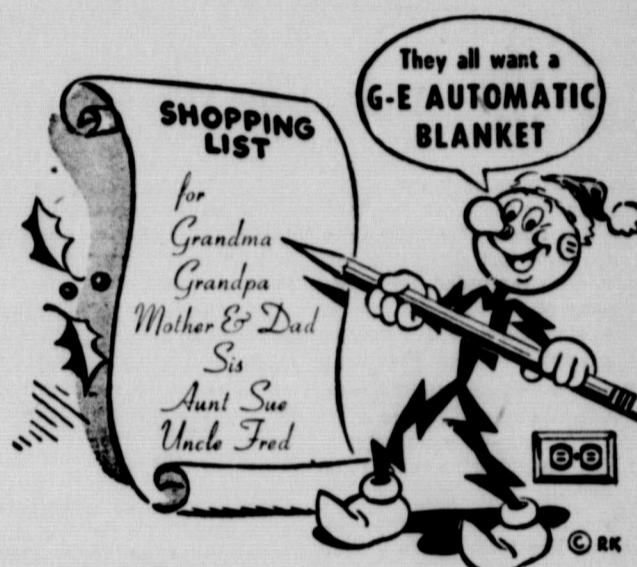

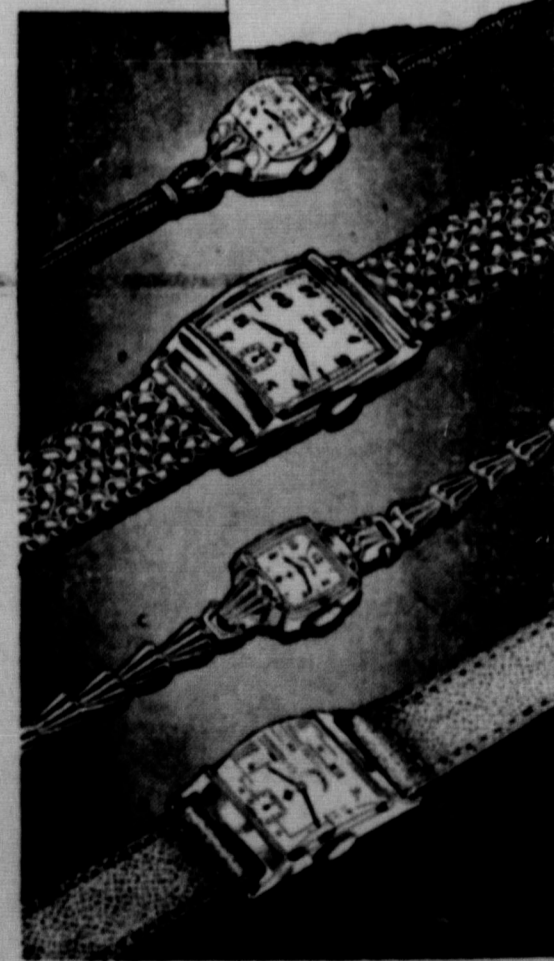

Tarahuma Indians To Race from Sierra Madres to El Paso

EL PASO. — Dr. Robert Zingg, anthropologist who is an authority on primitive Indian tribes in Mexico, left Saturday by Lamsa Airlines on the first leg of a long junket into the Sierra Madre

Mountains on behalf of the Southwestern Sun Carnival.

The Sun Carnival has retained Dr. Zingg to arrange a race to El Paso between the Tarahuma Indians. The Indians are famous for their long distance running and have been known to run as far as 360 miles without stopping.

Dr. Zingg hopes he will be able to arrange the race so that the winner will arrive in time for start of the five-day carnival here on December 28. It is possible, he said, that the race may prove to be the longest in history. Dr. Zingg on arrival by plane at

Chihuahua City will go by train high into the Sierra Madres to the town of Creel. From there he will go by pack mule into the isolated mountainous terrain where the In-

dians make their homeland. The Indians are the only remaining cave dwellers in the western hemisphere. Their aptitude for running makes it possible for

them in hunting to run a deer to death. Dr. Zingg spent a year with the Indians in 1930 on a grant from the University of Chicago.

Saga of Sheffield In Early Days Written By Iraan Student

AUSTIN. — Paint and powder would be of no avail to women of today if standards of judgment were the same as those of the frontier at the turn of the century, according to an article of Polly Hardin of Iraan in the current issue of "The Junior Historian."

"Men on the frontier prized a woman by the way she conducted herself and not by her beauty,"

Miss Hardin writes in the magazine published by the Texas State Historical Association which has headquarters on the University of Texas campus.

She describes life at Sheffield on the south side of the Pecos River in the days when people came 25 miles on horseback or in a buggy to attend a dance, and a woman had to be introduced properly before she even thought of speaking to a man.

When cowboys were grazing the cattle, she related, they slept outdoors with no thought of danger

from Indians, but woke many mornings to find arrows sticking in the ground around them. The Indians prided themselves on being able to prowl around a camp without awakening its occupants and just wanted to let the cowboys know they had been there.
