Women Rescued By Ozonan From Flooded Draw

Eddie Bounsall Pulls Pair From Stranded Auto In Gurley

Lives of two McCamey women, Mrs. Clyde Ash and Mrs. Hoot Gibson were saved here Friday night by Eddie Bounsall, 20-year-old Ozona youth, who rescued the two from Gurley draw at the Highway 163 crossing when their car was swept downstream by high water coursing down the draw from a flash flood that had fallen northeast of Ozona a short time before.

The two women were on their way to Upper Devil's River lake to join their husbands on a weekend fishing trip. Failing to notice the depth of the sharp dip in the draw through which the waters were coursing, the women drove into the high water and their car was washed downstream approximately 100 yards. The women, unable to swim, clung to the car until their rescue was effected nearly an hour later through the efforts of young Bounsall and several Latin-American people who rushed to the scene.

Bounsall had driven to the water's edge in his car and heard the women's screams. He located them through use of a spotlight on his car and seeing that they were still clinging to the car, he obtained a length of garden hose. He attempted to toss the hose to the women but found it necessary to swim out to get Mrs. Gibson. He then returned to the car, crawled over the top and tied the hose to Mrs. Ash and pulled her to the car top and then carried her to safety.

The women, who were badly bruised in the swift waters, were given dry clothing at the home of Deputy Sheriff Hearst Laws, and Laws then drove them to Rankin where they obtained a car from a relative and continued on to their homes in McCamey. They lost luggage and personal belongings in the mishap and their car was damaged but can be repaired. Mrs. Ash operates an insurance agency in McCamey and Mrs. Gibson is employed by Trebol Oil Co. here.

Week-Long Rains Worth Millions End Long Drouth

County Soaked; Falls Reported Up To Nine Inches Total

Soaking rains, worth millions to the drouth ridden ranch industry of West Texas, fell over most of this section of the state in one of the wettest and most prolonged rainy periods the section has enjoyed in many years.

While radio announcers in the eastern part of the state speculated on the return of "good weather," West Texans were enjoying to the fullest what is recognized as "good weather" in this section—rainy weather.

Starting the first of last week and continuing at intervals through Sunday, the rains soaked dry range lands for many inches deep and set the stage for revival of range feed that has been stripped from many sections by continued drouth.

Varying from moderate falls of an inch or two to totals up to nine inches in some areas, the rain was general throughout the western half of the state. Ozona recorded approximately two inches of moisture in the period but a short distance to the east and to the south, the rainfall measured up to a nine inch total, according to reports of ranchers. Torrential rains of six or seven inches which put drouth out of banks and swept out water ways, filled water holes and in some instances laid down fences on the high ground, and southeast end falls.

5-County Wool School Attended By Ozona Boys

Crockett-Sutton Co. 4-H Clubs To Compete In Contest May 7

Ozona 4-H Club boys attended a five-county Wool and Mohair School at Eldorado this past Saturday. The five counties represented were Menard, Crockett, Schleicher, Sutton and Tom Green Counties.

J. A. Gray was in charge of conducting the school. Mr. Gray is Animal Husbandryman for the Extension Service and his headquarters are San Angelo. After receiving instructions from Mr. Gray, the club boys were given 20 wool fleeces to judge according to grade, length of staple and shrinkage. The boys also graded 20 samples of mohair.

During the day, the boys were also taken on a tour through the West Texas Woolen Mills of Eldorado. The boys were shown the different stages the wool goes through, from the time it is received until it comes out a finished product, either a blanket, car robe or saddle blanket.

Because time did not permit, the boys were not given a score at Eldorado, but the checking was turned over to the County Agents who were present. Graham Childress was high point man among the Ozona boys, followed by Bill Schneemann, Jimmie McMullan and Carroll Stratton. Six Ozona club boys made the trip.

On Saturday, May 7th, at 9:00 a.m., at the Sonora Wool and Mohair Co., there will be a Wool and Mohair Judging Contest between the Ozona and Sonora 4-H Club boys. Stanley Davis will be in charge of the contest. The four highest scores made by club boys from each county will make up the total to determine which team is high. High scoring individuals from both counties will be placed according to the score made by each club member in the contest.

Crockett Bond Quota Is Set At \$8,500 In "Opportunity Drive"

The people of Crockett County are being asked to invest a total of \$8,500 in Series E Savings Bonds during the Treasury Department's "Opportunity Drive," May 16 through June 30.

This quota was announced Saturday by Scott Peters, County Savings Bonds chairman, after he had received the figure in a letter from Nathan Adams of Dallas, chairman of the Treasury's advisory committee for Texas.

Announcement of quotas for this and all other Texas counties followed a dinner given in Houston Tuesday night by Governor Beauford H. Jester and at which volunteers from all sections of the state were honored for their work in the Savings Bonds program.

The Texas quota in the drive is \$36,950,000, and the national quota is \$1,040,000,000.

Socialistic Trends Endanger American Way, Speaker Says

A pattern of government which is following the paternalistic and socialistic trends of Julius Caesar's days in Rome has taken hold in these United States, threatening to undermine and destroy the American Way of life as it did the great empire that was Rome.

Thus did the Rev. Clifton Tension, new pastor of the First Baptist Church here, repeat the warning that has been sounded by thinking Americans from time to time since 1932, when he addressed members of the Ozona Rotary Club at its luncheon Tuesday noon on the topic, "The American Way."

Just as top-heavy government payrolls, government in business, government aid in varying forms and consequent high taxes destroyed individual enterprise in Rome, so are the same trends undermining the system of free enterprise which has made the United States the greatest nation on earth, the Rev. Tension said. Government in this country is becoming more and more the master rather than the servant of the people as our constitution provides it shall be, more and more is it seeking to regulate and regiment its people until the blessed freedoms we have known for generations are gradually being lost to us through the encroachment of an ever growing government, he declared.

Barnhart Field Extended East By Small Producer

The Barnhart (Ellenburger) field in southeastern Reagan County has been extended one-half mile east by a small well.

Amerada Petroleum Corp. No. 4 Ella Owens flowed 41.35 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil in 21 hours to establish a daily potential of 47.26 barrels. Gas-oil ratio was 1600-1.

Production was through two-inch flow valves from pay in open hole at 8,988 to 9,117 feet, which had been jet perforated with 272 shots and acidized with 5,000 gallons. Flowing pressures were 400 pounds on the casing and 50 lbs. on the tubing. The well topped the pay at 8,988 feet, drilled to 9,117 feet and cemented 5½-inch casing at 8,975 feet.

No. 4 Ella Owens is 1,900 from the north, 3,300 feet from the west line of section 7-O-HE&W-T-RR survey. It is one-half mile east of No. 1 Owens, a producer, and the same distance south of Amerada No. 1-D TXL, a 9,170-foot dry hole.

Melton Motor Gives New Car For School Use

Ford Tudor Sedan To Be Used In School Business By Supt.

An offer made by N. E. Melton of the Melton Motor Company, local Ford and Mercury distributors, to supply a new 1949 Ford car free of charge for use of the schools in school business was accepted by the school board at a meeting Tuesday night.

Mr. Melton's generous offer will provide a car for use of the superintendent in attending to school business, in visiting the different school buildings, attending school meetings and in taking students to other towns for school affairs. Heretofore, it has been necessary for the school official to use his personal car in such activities.

The car is being turned over for school use with the title remaining with the Melton Motor Co. If at the end of the first year, the dealer chooses to continue the arrangement, the schools will be provided with a new car and the old one sold by the motor firm as a used car. The schools, of course, will pay for the car's maintenance and operation.

The car, a black Tudor-sedan, is expected to be ready for delivery this week. It will have painted on each side, "Ozona Public Schools," "Courtesy of Melton Motor Company."

Boys Damage Baseball Park By Playing In Mud

Several dozen Mexican boys, playing softball or baseball on the Powell Field diamond sometime during or shortly after the rains of the past week, damaged the baseball field several hundred dollars worth in a few hours of play.

Playing in soft mud, the boys ploughed up the playing field until it will be unfit for play until it is completely reworked. The grass, which was just getting a good start, was trampled and uprooted and will require several weeks of care to get the field back in the condition it was.

Tippett, Vaughan, Olson Fields Get New Locations

The Tippett (Wolfcamp) field in the panhandle of northwestern Crockett and the Vaughan (San Andres) field in northeastern Crockett have gained a location each.

The Tippett operation will be Shell and others No. 1 Marr, 440 feet from the southeast and southwest lines of the 93.28-acre lease in section 3-3-GC&SF. Drilling 6,500 feet with rotary and cable tools is planned.

Cummins, Berger & Smith No. 1 Shannon estate in the Vaughan field is projected to 1,500 feet with cable tools. It will be 330 feet from the south and east lines of the 80-acre lease in section 5-UV-GC&SF.

Plymouth Oil Co. has staked locations in the Olson field in Crockett County for two scheduled 2,250-foot cable tool tests.

No. 3-O-J. W. Owens will be 990 feet from the north, 1,650 feet from the west line of section 12-GG-T&NO, 660 feet south of Plymouth No. 1-O Owens, a completed producer.

No. 4-O Owens will be 330 feet from the north, 2,310 feet from the west lines of section 12-GG-T&NO, 660 feet east of No. 1-O Owens.

Porter Rankin and Mann Rankin have staked location for a 1,500 foot cable tool test on the Upton County side of the Crockett field.

No. 1 Phillips-University will be 330 feet from the south, 1,650 feet from the east line of the 80-acre lease in section 20-14-U. Drilling is due to begin April 26.

Hospital Fund Drive Making Progress Here

Approximately \$5,000 Already Subscribed By Ozona Groups

Public spirited individuals and family groups have so far pledged a total of between \$4,000 and \$5,000 toward furnishing and equipping Ozona's new hospital but a lot more interest must be manifested in the campaign if its completion is to be realized this year, committees working on the fund drive have reported.

It is estimated that another \$6,000 to \$7,000 will be needed to purchase necessary private room and ward furnishings, kitchen equipment, linens, dishes and serving equipment, sterilizing equipment, etc., to complete and furnish the hospital on an equal with modern hospitals in other cities.

Mrs. Max Schneemann is head of the committee designated by the Community Council to supervise the drive for donations toward a fund for furnishing the hospital. Arrangements are believed completed by the county which will make it possible to provide the elevator for the building and furnish and equip the operating room.

Family groups among old timers of the county are being offered an opportunity to make suitable donations to furnish one or more rooms, or wards, or to provide some particular part of the long list of equipment and furnishings needed. Many such groups have already responded and many individuals have made their pledges or indicated their willingness to do so.

Since it will take time to interview all persons who may be interested in donating to the hospital fund, Mrs. Schneemann has asked for help in the way of volunteers to get in touch with her if interested in making a contribution of any size for this cause.

Workmen have completed the partitioning and finishing of the hospital interior and little work remains to be done before the hospital floor, third floor, will be ready for use as such.

Ozona's two physicians, Dr. H. B. Tandy and Dr. R. W. Pruet, and Dr. H. A. Gustavus, dentist, have indicated to members of the County Commissioners Court their willingness to lease and operate the hospital and as soon as it is complete, a deal will be made for its lease and operation.

Wilson Quitting After 24 Years In Business Here

Motor Firm To Continue Wilson Name Under J. K. Colquitt

Effective next Saturday, Lee Wilson will step out of business in Ozona after 24 years, divided into two twelve-year periods, during which he has been in the automobile business in Ozona.

Wilson has sold his interest in the Wilson Motor Company, which he established in Ozona and which he has operated for the past twelve years and previously for another 12-year period except for a break of about 7 years during which he lived elsewhere.

J. K. Colquitt, Mr. Wilson's stepson, who had owned a one-fourth interest in the business since 1945, has bought Mr. Wilson's half interest and thus will own a three-fourths interest in the enterprise. His brother, Will M. (Shorty) Colquitt, who has also owned the fourth-interest for the past three and one-half years, will retain that interest under the new management.

Mr. Wilson came to Ozona on April 7, 1918, to accept a job as mechanic for the old Ozona Garage, owned at that time by the Miller Brothers. Following erection (Continued on Page Seven)



Acreege Reports Due In ACA Office June 1

With the view of wheat and cotton acreage allotments forthcoming for 1950 the Crockett County ACA Office is ready to start gathering past crop acreage data from County Farmers for the years 1941 and 1945 to 1949 inclusive. Miss Mary White, secretary, has announced.

Acreage reports will be required for every farm in the State that has cropland including:

All farms consisting wholly of orchard acreage.

All farms and ranches having cropland used only for grazing crops in some or all years, and

All farms placed in cultivation for the first time in 1948 or 1949.

All crop acreage must be reported by JUNE 1. These figures will be used in determining all future crop allotments, whatever the type of crop.


We urge all farmers to turn their acreages in early. If each farmer's correct acreage data is not in the office by June 1 there will be no records for use in setting up allotments for his farm.

done comfortably, and the merchants have a better place to park than they had before. Just took a little friendly co-operation to make everybody happy.

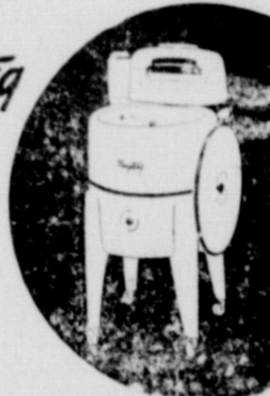

Except for the seven-year period when he was out of business here from 1930 to 1937, Wilson has been dealer for the Buick automobile in this county since 1925.

His efforts to obtain the local

dealership for Buick bore fruit on March 11, 1925, when he was awarded the dealership. He sold the first Buick to T. A. Kincaid, Sr., he recalls. The second went to N. W. Graham and the third to J. A. Harvick.

Mr. Wilson continued in business until May 30, 1930, when depression had cast its pall over the country and he sold out to J. H. Johnson of Big Lake.

In the 1930 era, Wilson, an accomplished airplane pilot, took up flying for a time on a commercial basis, piloting a ship for A. R. Eppenauer, oil man. He had previously

flown his own plane in shuttling back and forth between Ozona and a branch business he established at Big Lake and in pleasure tours. Later he went to El Paso and became a salesman for the Watkins Motor Co., Chevrolet and Buick distributors for that city. He continued there four and a half years and then for the next years was salesman for the Schuch Motor Co. of San Angelo.

In 1937, Wilson returned to his first love, the automobile business in Ozona. He bought back his original business, re-establishing the Wilson Motor Company name and

starting back up the financial trail. He built the business to and beyond its former importance, improved and enlarged the building which houses it and expanded its sales and services.

He took the two sons, J. K. and Shorty Colquitt, into partnership in 1945 following their return from the service.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson are offering their household goods and many personal possessions for sale and plan to leave Ozona. Plans are at present indefinite but Mr. Wilson expressed two choices, the Pacific Northwest or the Texas Valley as the spots where they most likely will land after a bit of traveling and just "fooling around."
