Ranch Program At Experiment Station June 11

Area Ranchmen To Attend Annual Field Day At Sonora Station

Several ranchmen from this area are expected to attend the annual Ranch Day Program at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station near Sonora Saturday, June 11.

Program for the annual field day at the Experiment Station was announced this week by Wallace H. Dameron, superintendent of the Sonora station.

The all-day program will begin at 9:00 a.m. with a tour of the eighteen pastures of the range management test begun February 17, giving the visiting ranchmen an opportunity to observe the results of varying rates of stocking and treatment of the different plots of land.

"This work is vital to the Edwards Plateau region for reasons of determining proper stocking rates in pasture management to maintain the range in its highest productive state," Hr. Dameron says. Leading the discussion on this tour will be Dr. Vernon A. Young, head of the Department of Range and Forestry, Texas A&M College; Leo A. Merrill, assistant Range Specialist, and W. H. Dameron, superintendent, Substation No. 14.

The range tour will end at noon at the Experiment Station headquarters, where lunch will be served by the Sutton County 4-H Club at a nominal charge.

The afternoon program will begin at 1:30. Dr. R. D. Lewis, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station System, will discuss research as it is related to range management and various phases of animal husbandry.

Dr. W. T. Hardy will discuss internal parasites. A report on results of the first year's test on "Improvement of Sheep through the selection of performance-tested and progeny tested breeding animals," will be made by Dr. J. C. Miller, head of the Department of Animal Husbandry, Texas A&M College; Dr. R. E. Patterson, assistant director, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and W. H. Dameron, superintendent.

The test was begun on July 21, 1948, with 75 rams entered by 12 cooperating ranchmen. "Insofar as we know, this is the first and only test of this nature ever to have been conducted with sheep," Mr. Dameron reports. "It offers unlimited possibilities for the location of breeding animals that are most prepotent in characters for the greatest improvement of sheep. Practically all of the tests are on a mechanical basis, which eliminates guess work in the purchase of breeding animals of highest value."

An address by Sayers Farmer of Junction, president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, will conclude the day's program.

Garlitz Petroleum Completes Pumper In Vaughan Field

Pumping 46.67 barrels of 37.2 gravity oil in 24 hours, Garlitz Petroleum Co. in the Vaughan field in Crockett County has been completed. The producer topped the pay at 1,230 feet, drilled to 1,265 feet and cemented 7-inch casing at 1,215 feet. The section had been shot with 60 quarts of nitroglycerin. Location is 330 feet from the north and east lines of the southwest quarter of the northeast quarter of section 6-UV-GC&SFR. Elevation is 2,620 feet.

Two Men Injured In Truck-Car Crash On Barnhart Highway

Two Sanderson men were injured, one seriously, in a truck-car crash on Highway 163 about four miles north of Ozona early Saturday morning.

John Lewis Whistler of Sanderson suffered a deep cut on his neck and lacerations about the face and head and J. W. Leatherwood, also of Sanderson and occupying the car with Whistler, was less seriously injured in the crash. G. E. Bingham of Sonora, driver of the truck, a water tank truck used in seismograph work, was badly cut and bruised but not seriously hurt.

Whistler was taken to a San Angelo hospital in a Cody Funeral Home ambulance and at last reports was resting well. The other two men were treated in the office of local physicians.

Both the car and truck were proceeding toward Ozona. As the car approached the rear of the truck, something went wrong with the steering gear, according to the two men, and when they attempted to turn out to pass the truck, the car swerved into the rear of the truck. Both vehicles turned over and were badly damaged, the car almost demolished. The accident was investigated and reported by the local sheriff's department.

Malco ReCompletes Vaughan Well; New Location Is Staked

A well has been recompleted and a location staked in the Vaughan (San Andres field in Crockett County).

Malco Refineries Inc., and others No. 1 Isabel Vaughan pumped 56.75 barrels of 27 gravity oil on a 24-hour retest. Production was through perforations at 1,435 to 1,438 feet. Location is 330 feet out of the northwest corner of the lease in section 86-OP-GC&SFR.

Ted Weiner and others of Ft. Worth will drill No. 1 R. L. Vaughan 330 feet from the south and east lines of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of section 6-UV-GC&SFR. With elevation 2,624 feet, the test is projected to 1,500 feet with rotary.

Texaco No. 2 Victor I Pierce, wildcat 21½ miles south of Ozona, failed in an attempt to drillstem test to 12,105 feet in Ellenburger lime. It ran tubing to 12,100 feet and early Tuesday was preparing to swab and test.

Timely Showers Bring More Needed Moisture To Area

Falls Here Monday And Wednesday Total Over One-Inch

Timely showers that will help to continue the recovery of the West Texas ranch country from drought damage fell in this area during the week, covering a wide section of the county and surrounding area.

Rainfall totalled a little more than an inch in Ozona for the week, with falls Monday morning and Wednesday evening. Other showers have been noted during the week that bypassed Ozona, but brought moisture to more of the grassland.

The fall here Monday was registered at .47 of an inch and Wednesday evening at .56 of an inch at the government weather station maintained by Mr. and Mrs. Leo Bawcom.

Wool & Mohair Judging Team Leaves Sunday

Ozona Boys To Attend 4-H Round-Up At A&M College

4-H Club members on the Crockett County District 6 champion wool and mohair judging team will leave Ozona Sunday morning to participate in the State Judging Contest at A&M College on Monday and to attend the state 4-H Club Round-Up at the College Tuesday and Wednesday. William A. Bergfeld, Jr., Crockett County agricultural agent announced this week.

Members of the Ozona champion judging team are Jimmie McMullan, Bill Schneemann, Graham Childress and Ronnie McMullan.

The entire facilities of the Agricultural Department of A&M College will be made available to 4-H Club youngsters from all over the state. All state contests are being held in conjunction with the 4-H Club Round-Up. Almost every county in the state will be represented by at least two boys and two girls, with some additional members for those counties with judging team. Approximately 1,200 boys and girls will attend the 3-day event.

The Crockett County club boys and their agent director will leave Ozona at 10:00 o'clock Sunday morning and will be housed in the college dormitories during their stay at A&M College.

No Polio Cases Here So Far As Local Physicians Know

So far as local doctors know there have been no cases of poliomyelitis to develop here this year, a check this morning showed.

One case from Ozona was listed in a check-up of sources of cases under treatment in San Angelo in an article appearing in the San Angelo paper early this week. If there has been a case from this county local doctors have no record of it.

Rumors were reported afloat this week to the effect that a case had developed at the Hatton Tourist court, but R. L. Hatton, proprietor, said that the rumor was unfounded, that there had not been a child ill from any cause at the courts.

Spraying with DDT has been under way the past week or more with the County spraying equipment in use. Property owners are paying for the DDT used, with County labor and machine donated.

Method For Control Of Termites In Plant Outlined By Specialist

COLLEGE STATION—Your plants may have termite trouble and you not know it. A plant may be killed by them without showing outward signs of injury. Yet, the inside of the plant may be hollowed out by these wood pests. Termites often kill trees or

shrubs by starting underground in the dead or dying roots of the plant, and working upward, says

Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A&M College. Or they may enter the plant at the ground level, boring into dead or diseased wood that attracts them. When you know your plant has been infested with termites, the best idea is to dig it up and burn it.

If the plant dies without showing any signs of disease, take a look at it and see what the symptoms are. Cut the stems and roots in several places and examine the centers. If they are hollowed out there's a good chance that termites did it, says Mrs. Hatfield.

And they may attack other garden plants unless you destroy them. All dead wood and other decayed vegetable matter should

be removed. Treat the soil with DDT, using 10 pounds of 100 per cent DDT or 100 pounds of 10 per cent DDT for every thousand square feet. Distribute evenly, work it into the soil, and soak the ground thoroughly with water.

New Texas Highway Map Shows Over 31,000 Miles Of Highways

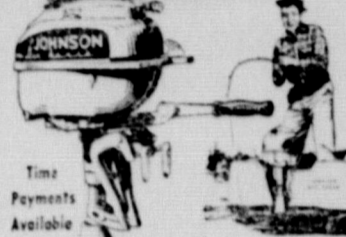
AUSTIN—The 1949 Texas Highway Map comes off the presses today ready for free distribution

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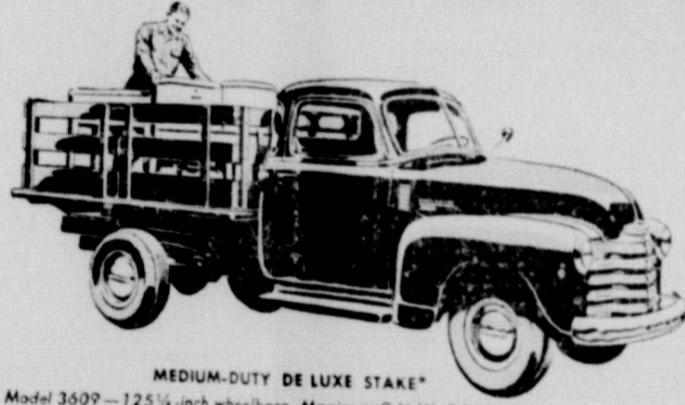

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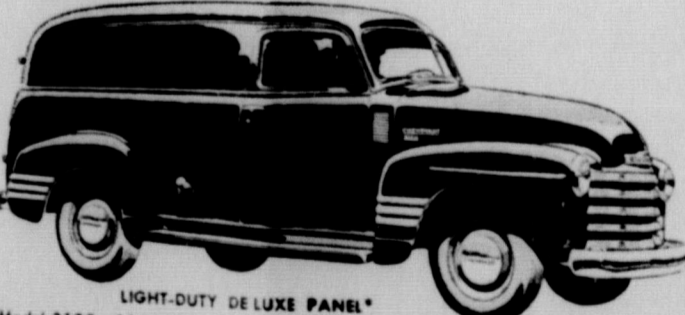

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Prizes In Wool Contests

A five thousand dollars scholarship, savings machines and fabrics will be awarded in the "Make It Yourself" home sewing contest, an official brochure by The Wool Bureau.

Contest, conducted in the states of the West, is an official event sponsored by the Bureau and the Women's of the National Wool Association.

To promote wool fashion and home sewing among women, it is open from 14 through 21 years of age. Contestants from 14 to 19 will compete in the Junior Class, and those from 19 to 21 in the Senior Class.

Now entered in the contest are California, Colorado, Montana, Nevada, New

Mexico, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wyoming. Local and state contests will be under the direction of the State Wool Growers Auxiliaries, which report directly to the National Auxiliary.

The 1949 contest will culminate December 8th with a national fashion show in which state winners will model their self-made fashions for national awards at Denver, Colorado.

Grass Plot Experiment Carried On At Uvalde

COLLEGE STATION—A 50 by 25 foot exposition valuable pasture grasses common to the Uvalde area is being developed and sponsored by a commercial lumber company in Uvalde.

Signs giving both the common and scientific names, relative grazing value and certain plant characteristics will be mounted at the location of each grass, says Eugene W. Trotter, assistant county agent in training in that county.

Representing the irrigated grasses are hardinggrass, Suitors

K31 and perennial ryegrass for the cool season. Warm season grasses include KR bluestem, blue panicum and rhodesgrass. The native grass plot is subdivided according to the grazing value. Grasses with good grazing value include little bluestem, indian grass, big bluestem, switchgrass, tanglehead, sideoats grama, Texas wintergrass, buffalograss and plains bristleglass.

Those with only fair grazing value are Texas cupgrass, curly mesquite and pink pappusgrass. Red grama and prairie three-awn are found in the poor grazing group, says Trotter.

Engleman's daisy—the absence of which is an excellent indication of overgrazing and range deterioration—will also be present.

Both attractions will be making their first appearance in the Southwest.

Mohair Upholstery Becoming Popular With Furniture Buyers

Mohair upholstery is becoming more popular to buyers of furniture, says Bradley V. Borst, representative of Collins & Aikman Corp., New York City. That firm manufactures mohair fabrics for upholsteries and is the largest buyer of raw mohair.

Borst was in San Angelo week before last and is appearing in the other larger Texas towns and cities where he conducts special training periods for furniture salesmen.

Customers are now becoming more critical and are demanding fabrics that will give longer wear and better service, he said. This means more mohair.

"The public and the reputable upholstery manufacturers will gain by the recently introduced amendment to the Wool Products Labeling Act," Borst said in commenting on the efforts of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association to have the Labeling Act amended whereby upholstery manufacturers will have to state the amount of mohair their fabric contains.

Russell Martin, Del Rio, mohair buyer for the company, said that the outlook for mohair looks better now than it has for the past two years.

"Mohair is being consumed now. It is going into wearing apparel, furniture upholsteries and carpets, and I look for it to appear again in automobile upholsteries before long. Buying it and then storing it somewhere does not help the mohair producer. It has to be moving," he said.

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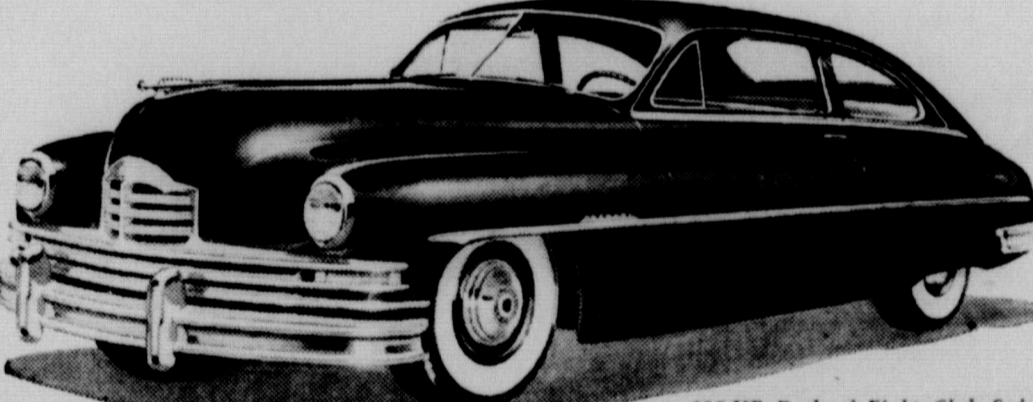

Bascom Giles Explains Operation Of New Veterans Land Purchase Program In Texas

The Veterans land program is now a reality.

The idea was born in the hearts of the veterans themselves while they were overseas and thinking about home. Their letters to my office asking how they might obtain a farm or ranch home if and when they returned, inspired me to put the machinery of this program in motion.

Last week Governor Jester's signature made the Veteran's Land bill into formal law. The bill was sponsored in the upper House by Senator John Bell of Cuero and in the lower House by Representative Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba.

The legislation grew out of a Constitutional Amendment adopt-

ed by the citizens of Texas in a special election in November of 1946. At the following session of the Legislature the necessary enabling legislation failed to receive final consideration in the Senate.

The 51st Legislature, promptly and without a single negative vote in either House carried out the mandate of the people, making it possible for Texas Veterans of World War II to own a farm or ranch home of their own choosing by making a small down payment with the balance financed by the State at a low interest rate.

The Legislature has placed the administration of this program in the hands of the Governor Attorney General and the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

Here briefly are some of the outstanding provisions of the new law:

The Board may issue up to \$25 million in bonds to finance the program.

Land may be purchased from an individual, from the State, or Corporations for re-sale to veterans at cost. (This provision will be more fully explained in a separate article—Editor's Note.)

Veteran may select land which he desires to purchase subject to the approval of the Board.

The maximum purchase by each veteran shall not exceed \$7,500 to be financed by the State.

Veterans disabled by combat service connected disability have 90 days preference right to purchase.

Lands may be purchased for a minimum of 5% down payment with 40 years to pay the balance at 3% interest. (This indebtedness may be retired sooner if the veteran wishes.)

All money received during the six remaining years of operation shall be used to pay interest on

bonds and to purchase additional land for re-sale to veterans. The purchaser shall not transfer or sell lands purchased for a period of 3 years from the date of purchase. The veteran will not be permitted to make more than one purchase. The veteran is not required to reside upon the property.

All applications should be addressed to Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Austin, Texas.

Rheumatic Heart Disease A Leading Killer Of Children

AUSTIN—The disabling and often fatal disease of children, rheumatic heart disease, is one of the leading causes of death among children and young adults in the age group 10 to 25 years.

Unfortunately, there has been developed for this disease no vaccine such as we have for smallpox, diphtheria and whooping cough, but by recognizing the early symptoms and obtaining a competent physician's diagnosis and treatment, some of the damaging results of rheumatic heart disease can be prevented or moderated.

The State Health Officer, Dr. George W. Cox, says that "in general the early symptoms of rheumatic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows or wrists. The pain is felt usually in one of these joints, and spreads frequently to the others.

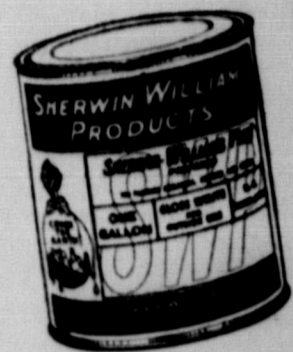
Often a doctor's examination of a child who becomes irritable and cross without apparent cause, cries easily and develops nervous habits, will disclose the presence of rheumatic heart disease."

Predisposing causes to this serious illness include frequent body chilling, living in damp, steamy quarters, poor diet, frequent colds, and sometimes scarlet fever or other infections caused by certain streptococcus germs. All such conditions should be avoided if at all possible.

Protection for children against rheumatic heart disease, should

include a well balanced and fishy diet; sufficient sleep, and dressing at all times in accordance with the temperature of the room or playground.

4-H Meat Animal Program Gets Under Way In Texas

Today meat provides one-third of the food energy in the American diet, and latest U. S. Department of Agriculture figures show that almost one-third of the farmer's total cash income in 1948 came from the sale of meat animals. Aware of the vital contribution livestock makes to the nation's health and economy, Texas boys and girls enrolled in the 1949 National 4-H Meat Animal program learn to select, feed and show their beef cattle, sheep or pigs. More than 200,000 4-H Club members throughout the country are taking part in the project, according to the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

Some of the highlights of the program are keeping records of feeding and weight gains and
