No New Polio Cases; Continued Clean-Up Urged By Council

Ozona doctors report no new cases of polio here this week, but they join with a request issued by the Community Council urging Ozona residents to continue their clean-up campaign and to continue the spray treatment for the control of flies and other insects.

One case of polio, an 8-month-old Latin-American baby, developed here last week and the child was taken to San Angelo hospital for treatment. He is reported doing well.

The Community Council in meeting Monday night spent considerable time in discussion of the local clean-up drive and urged residents to continue the campaign and urged those who have not yet cleaned up to do so at once. There are still uncut weed patches in the city, and in many instances garbage is not being kept under sanitary cover, thus attracting and breeding flies. A careful screening, spraying and cleaning of all outdoor toilets—one of the gravest of all the health menaces in any city—is also urged. In the case of such toilets, persons having knowledge of any such unsanitary conditions is urged to notify authorities so that remedial action can be taken.

Crockett 4-H Team Has Good Record In First Time In State Contest

Crockett County 4-H Club boys returned to Ozona last Thursday after placing third in the state wool and mohair contest at A&M College. Menard County placed first with 1516 points, Coke placed 2nd with 1483 points and Crockett placed third with 1462 points.

After winning third place on Monday, the team members were presented their awards Wednesday night at 8:00 p.m. at Guion Hall. Bill Schneemann, Jimmie McMullan and Graham Childress were presented third place team ribbons by Mr. J. A. Gray, Animal Husbandryman from San Angelo, Texas. Ronnie McMullan was alternate member on the team. Bill Schneemann was presented a ribbon for being the third high individual in the state contest. Bill was just 16 points under the high scoring individual who was Le Drew Arrott from Coke County, with 529 points. Carl Menzies from Menard was second with 523 points and Bill third with 513 points.

In their first year of active participation in wool and mohair judging, the Ozona 4-H Club boys placed just 54 points under the Menard boys. The Menard team won first place in livestock judging in the state last year and represented Texas at the National Contest in Chicago.

A well rounded program was held for the boys while they were at A&M. Activities were scheduled from 6:15 until 10:00 p.m. each night. Highlights of the Round-Up at A&M were speeches by N. L. Wilson, Director of Extension Service from Washington, D. C., Durwood Manford, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Texas Legislature; a 4-H Club Amateur Talent Program, a free carnival, tours of the college campus and demonstrations by different Agricultural specialists connected with the college.

Tuesday, June 28, the Ozona team will leave for Sonora to participate in the Twelfth Annual Wool and Mohair Show. This is an all-Texas show for all 4-H Clubs and F.F.A. Chapters in the State of Texas. At this contest the boys will have a class of Rambouillet, Delaine, Corriedale sheep, and Angora goats to judge as well as the wool and mohair.

The two top teams of the Trans Pecos League will go into action against each other on the Powell Field diamond in Ozona next Sunday afternoon and on the result will hinge the leadership in this infant league.

The league leading Ozona Rebels of Manager Byron Stuart again will mix with the strong soldier team from Goodfellow Field in San Angelo, the second place team in league standing. The crucial bout is slated for its start at 3:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon on the home lot.

The Rebels toppled the Goodfellow Skyhawks out of the league leadership in a close 3-2 game played here in May and the sky riders are expected to be gunning in earnest for the locals in the Sunday combat.

Hits were rather meager on both sides but the Rebels last Sunday managed a 6-0 victory over a team sponsored by the M System stores of San Angelo in an exhibition bout at Powell Field here. The San Angelo team was made up of youngsters of high school age and down, and showed some promising talent, but ragged fielding and weak pitching made their day's effort here futile.

Hits were not too plentiful for the Rebels, however, but they took advantage of walks and errors by the opposition, plus well placed hits to score one in the first and five in the fourth for the day's win. Tom Ed Montgomery slammed a homer to center field in the 4th to score two ahead of him. Three walks, a wild pitch and a single by Frank James accounted for the other two runs. Eddie Bower slammed a sizzling three bagger to left field in the fifth but three outs in a row by Clegg, Kyle and James nullified the blow. Humble To Drill No. 2 J. A. Harvick 6 Mi. North Ozona

8,500-Ft. Rotary Wild- cat Scheduled To Begin At Once

Site was being prepared this week in preparation for spudding in of Humble Oil & Refining Co's. No. 2 J. A. Harvick, a scheduled 8,500-foot rotary wildcat, to be drilled on the Harvick ranch 6 miles north of Ozona.

The company's No. 2 J. A. Harvick will be 1,980 from the north, 660 feet from the west line of section 100-GH-GC&SFRR. Elevation is 2,505 feet. The wildcat will be 1 1/2 miles west of Humble No. 1 Harvick, Ellenburger failure recently abandoned at 9,000 feet.

Darrell W. Smith of Midland has filed application to drill a 1,500-foot cable tool wildcat 15 miles northwest of Ozona. His No. 1 J. M. Shannon estate will be 330 feet but of the southeast corner of section 17-UV-GC&SFRR.

Amerada staked location in the World field for No. 3-F Shannon estate, 1,104 from the north, 330 feet from the west line of the west half of section 43-BB-TCRY. Co., 933 feet north of the firm's No. 2 Shannon estate, a completed producer. Permit is for 2,800-foot cable tool test.

Texaco No. 2 Victor I Pierce, wildcat 2 1/2 miles south of Ozona, was shut down for orders after plugging back to 11,642 feet, running tubing and finding a hole in the tubing.

Mobile Recruiting Unit Of Army To Be Here July 17 and 18

First Lieutenant O. E. Alton, recruiting officer in charge of the Big Spring recruiting area, which includes this county, was here the first of the week making arrangements for bringing a mobile recruiting unit to Ozona July 17 and 18.

The unit will be fully manned and equipped to receive enlistment applications, to give examinations and complete enlistment on the spot. Both men and women recruits will be sought for all branches of the Army, including the Army Air Force, Aviation Cadet, Women's Army Corps and Women's Air Force. In addition to recruiting, the officers and men in charge of the unit will be glad to give any assistance to any former service man or dependent who may have problems of dependency allotments, lost service men, etc., Lt. Alton said.

The big recruiting truck is equipped with a public address system and spot announcements will be made. The unit will be set up at the west side of the downtown park across from the bank.

The unit carries a 16 mm movie projector outfit and 12 World War II combat films which will be shown in the city park each of the two nights, or as many of the films as can be shown in the two nights, the recruiting officer announced. These films are official films of combat in the recent war, mostly invasion actions, the Lieutenant said. Everybody is invited to see the movies.

Ten Amendments To Constitution Proposed Sept. 24

Anti-Poll Tax, Women On Juries Feature Change List

Ten more proposed changes in the amendment-riddled Texas Constitution are to be decided by the people of Texas at an election the fourth Saturday in September, the 24th of that month. Publication of these proposed constitutional changes as required by law begins this week in the Stockman. The publication will continue for four issues and qualified voters are urged to study each proposal so that an intelligent vote may be registered in September.

Repealing the constitutional provision making the payment of a poll tax a requisite to qualification to vote and substituting therefor a system of registration of voters is proposed in one amendment, Senate Joint Resolution No. 1.

Removing the sex barrier for service on petit and grand juries in this state—making women eligible to serve on juries—is another proposal. This one the ladies should decide for themselves but the male vote will probably be strong also.

The inevitable proposal for pay raises for the men who serve in the legislature is also included, a double provision for setting legislators' salaries at \$3,600 a year and providing for two regular sessions of the legislature each biennial, or one regular session each year.

Another proposal would authorize the legislature to create rural fire prevention districts and another would provide for creation of hospital districts in the several counties—each opening the gate to local taxes for support of same.

One amendment proposes to create a Civil Service system for county employees in counties of 75,000 and up population—which wouldn't concern this county. Still another heart bleeder for the county employees would provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of counties.

Another of the proposed changes would make it possible to conduct lunacy trials without a jury—another would require District Courts to "conduct proceedings in the county seat of the county in which the case is pending."

Mrs. Hattie North, Pioneer Mother, Claimed By Death

Early Day Resident Is Laid To Rest After Service Wednesday

Death has claimed another from the early thinning ranks of the early-day residents of Crockett County as this community mourns the passing of Mrs. Hattie L. North, 75, who died at her home here at 10:30 Tuesday evening following a stroke suffered last Sunday.

Funeral services were conducted for the pioneer mother from the First Baptist Church at 6:00 o'clock Wednesday evening by the Rev. Clifton R. Tension, pastor. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery, with Cody Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. North was born in Woburn, Mass. on April 30, 1874, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Bellows. She came with her family to Texas at the age of three years, the family settling in Bandera county, near Medina. They moved to Ozona in 1895 and in 1896 she became the bride of J. J. North.

Mr. North operated a grocery and later a garage in Sonora in the early days, and it was there that the family lived for 23 years. They moved to Ozona in 1919 when Mr. North established the North Motor Company, now being operated by a son, Joe W. North, and continued his connection with the rapidly expanding automobile business until his death in 1928. He had entered the ranching business, too, in the intervening years, operating both with his sons.

Mrs. North became a member of the Baptist Church at an early age and continued active in church work as long as her health permitted.

Six children, three sons and three daughters survive Mrs. North. They are Joe, Hilton and Carl North, Mrs. Wayne W. West, Mrs. Gertrude Perry and Miss Mildred North, all of Ozona. Six grand children and two great grand children also survive. The grand children are Wayne E. West, Mrs. Larry Albers and Mrs. Jerry Hays, children of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne West; Mary Ann and Janet North, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Hilton North, and Joe Perry, son of Mrs. Gertrude Perry and the late A. A. Perry. Great grand children are Wayne Walter Albers and Helen Hayes.

Formal Opening New Kerrville Hospital Scheduled For July 3

The Sid Peterson Memorial Hospital, now nearing completion in Kerrville, will be formally opened at 2 p.m. Sunday, July 3, according to an announcement by the hospital board of trustees.

People of the hill country and others from all over Texas will be invited to attend the opening program and to inspect the million-dollar, 55-bed hospital. Patients will be admitted beginning about July 11.

The Sid Peterson Memorial Hospital is the first undertaking of the Hal and Charlie Peterson Foundation, a non-profit corporation dedicated to humanity. The Foundation was formed in 1944 by Hal and Charlie Peterson, prominent Kerrville businessmen, as a means of returning something to the community where their enterprises have been successful.

Born on a ranch near Kerrville, the Peterson brothers are now owners of the Kerrville Bus Company, the Peterson Garage and Auto Company, several ranches, a part interest in a bus manufacturing company in Ohio, and various other businesses.

The two brothers gave the money for the Foundation, which was incorporated as an institution "limited to and exclusively for public charitable or educational purposes." Its charter specifies that no profit shall go to any individual or private shareholder, but that it will operate on a non-profit basis.

Sonora Lions Annual Wool Show & Auction Sale Set June 29-30

You in the market for a buggy whip? Or maybe a blooded Hereford bull, between 900 and 1,000 pounds, with a pedigree which places him among the "400" in the Hereford family?

The Sonora Lions Club has both, and just about everything between the two, and will offer it all for sale on the afternoon of June 30, at the Lions Club auction, a part of the Twelfth Annual Sonora Wool & Mohair Show.

The auction, which is only a part of the two-day show, will see some choice articles brought out for sale by Col. Nelson Johnson, auctioneer. During the wild bidding at the 1948 sale, a registered Rambouillet buck sold for \$85, while a banana cake finally sold for \$45.

Meantime, plans have been completed to handle more than 300 entries in the wool show proper, which gets underway Wednesday morning, June 29. Prizes and awards totaling \$900 will be given to contestants and a reward on both team and individual performances. They range from \$20 for

first place to \$1 for individual eighth places and \$5 for team 4th places.

Awards will be given in both Junior (4-H and FFA boys) and in the Adult Division of the show. Team awards will include a trophy for the best all-round 4-H Club or FFA Chapter.

Contestants in the events will be housed and fed in the school gym, and will participate in a competitive rodeo on Wednesday night, with loving cups and medals being awarded the winners. Teen-aged girls will stage a clover-leaf race that night.

Final event of the show will be a Thursday night dance at the Sonora Wool & Mohair Company warehouse, featuring Bob Wills and his Texas Playboys. The dance will be from nine o'clock to 1:00, and a capacity crowd is expected to gather and hear the popular musician.

Bay Petroleum Co. Completes Producer In Clara Couch Field

A test has been completed in the Clara Couch field in Crockett County and another has been refilled on the pump in the World pool.

Bay Petroleum Corp. No. 10 Hoover pumped 89 barrels of oil plus eight per cent water in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 210-1.

Production was through 55 perforations from 2,198 to 2,201 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing cemented at 2,186 feet, with total depth 2,006 feet. The section was acidized with 2,000 gallons. Location is 2,310 feet from the north and west lines of section 13-GG-GC&SF; elevation is 2,725 feet.

Ashland Oil and Refining Co. No. 4 Sorg, with a current daily allowable of 18 barrels, made 17.27 barrels of 30 gravity oil in 24 hours. The producer was drilled to 2,764 feet and 7-inch casing cemented at 2,660 feet. Location is 650 from the south, 1,400 feet from the west line of the J. P. Sorg estate in section 61-BB-EL-4RRRR.

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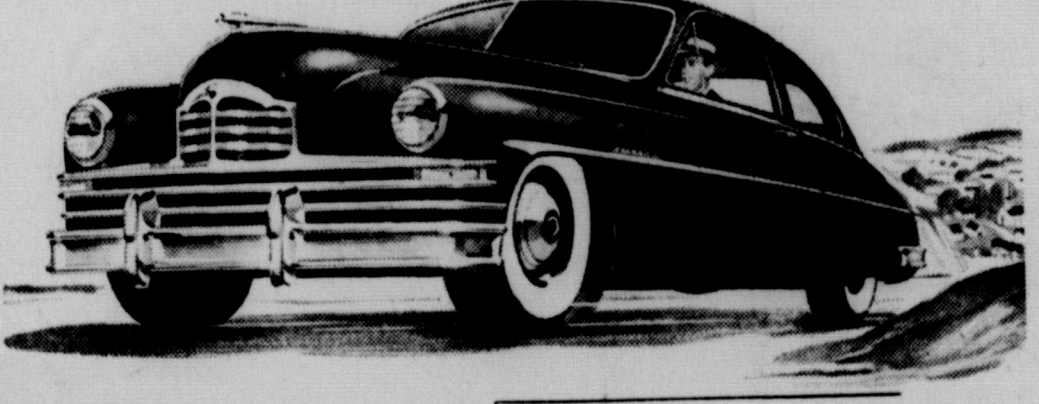

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House Joint Resolution No. 36

Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

House Joint Resolution No. 38

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county,

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and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51-f of Article III.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51-f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much hereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

House Joint Resolution No. 22

Proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for a period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his service an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary."

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding."

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on September 24, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its

proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

House Joint Resolution No. 32

Proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, A.D. 1949 at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions

using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

House Joint Resolution No. 15

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof"; and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Senate Joint Resolution

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same be amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize the ad valorem property tax in said districts, not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

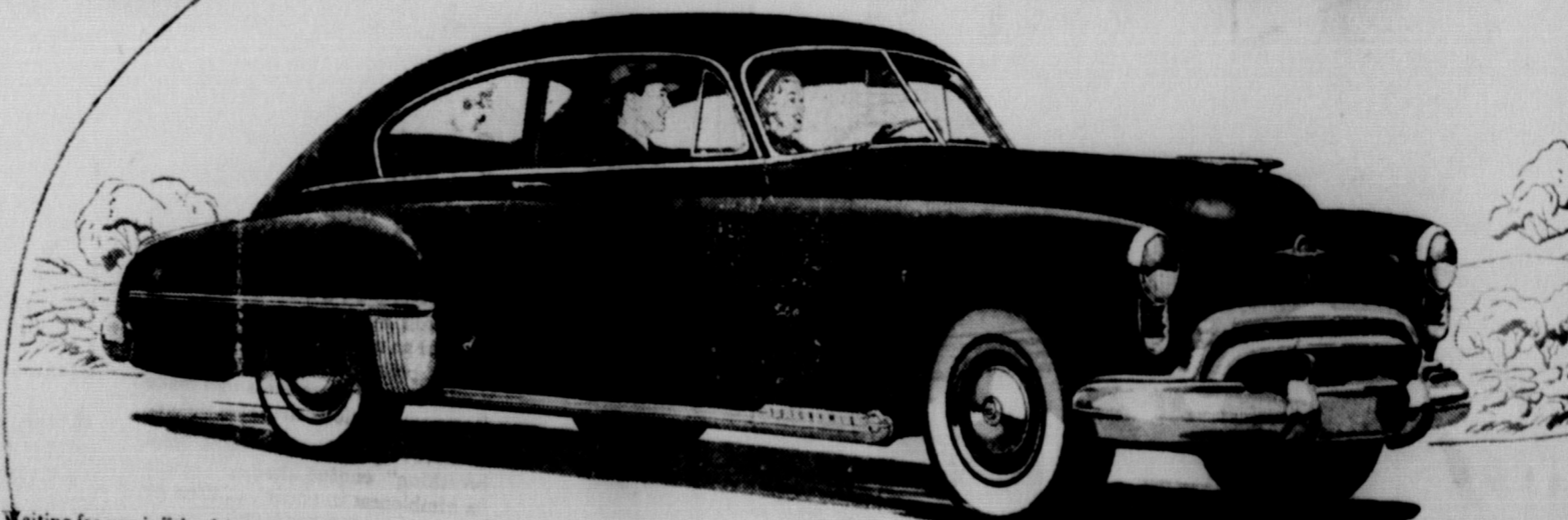

A reception at the parsonage followed the ceremony. The couple left on a wedding trip after which they will make their home in Ozona.

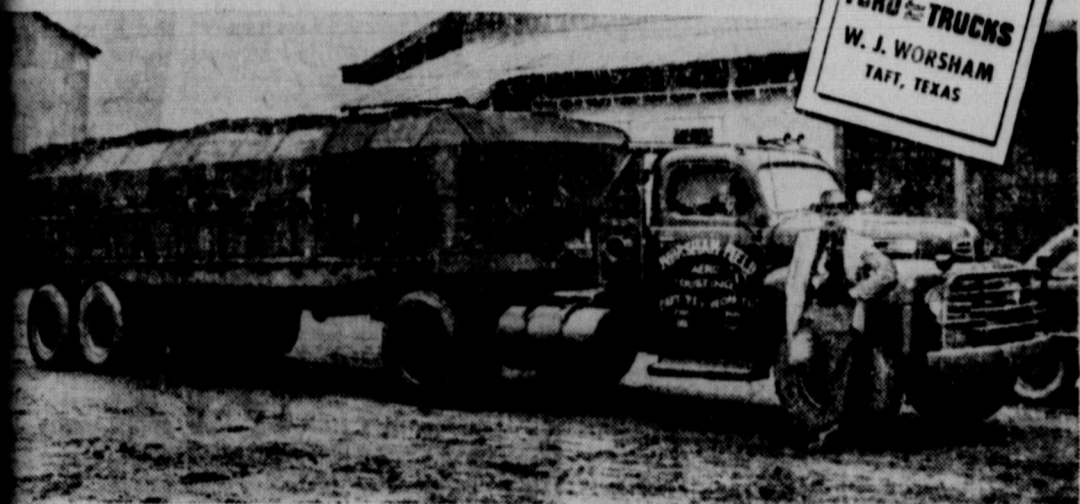

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein.";

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article III, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors." "AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors." Each voter shall scratch out one

of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

House Joint Resolution No. 5

Proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Section 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Section 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January 1st, A.D., 1950.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, same being September 24, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Section 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

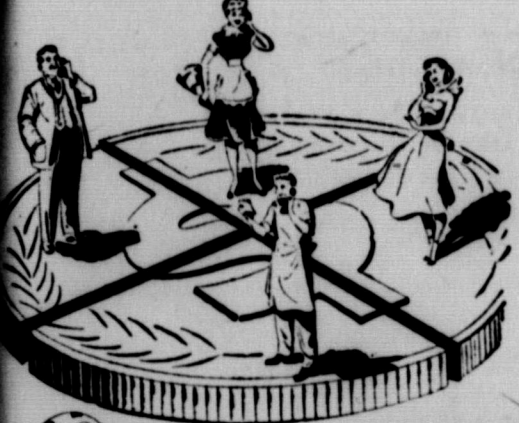

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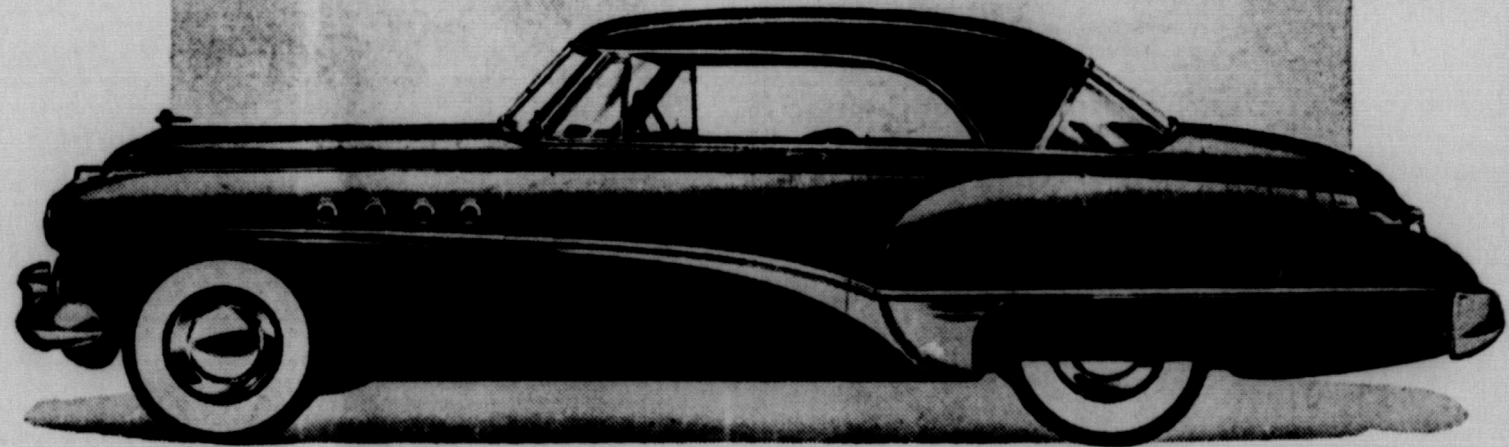

Procedure For Veterans' Land Program To Be Made Simple, Says Giles

(Editor's Note: This is the concluding article of a series of three by Bascom Giles explaining the newly created Veterans' Land Board Program.)
In keeping with the terms of the legislation creating the Texas Veterans' Land Board, its administration and operating policies will be kept as simple as the problems of this huge program will permit. The fact that approximately 13,000 veterans have already contacted this office for information on the working details of the plan indicates the commendable desire of veterans to own a farm or ranch home under the idea originally conceived by the author five years ago.
Paper work involving application to participate has been cut to the minimum. Each successive step has been shorn of all encum-

bering delays.
For example, proof of the applicant's eligibility can be established by submitting a certified copy of his honorable discharge plus substantiation that the applicant was a resident of Texas at the time he entered military service and is still a legal resident at the time of application for land program benefits. For those taking advantage of the 90 day priority offered those who have a service-connected disability sustained in combat, certification of such must accompany the application.
Each veteran will be limited to one purchase not exceeding \$7,500 cost to the Board. He will be required to pay not less than five per cent down and execute an on-or-before note for forty years at three per cent interest for the balance.
Should a purchaser desire to acquire a tract of land costing NOT more than \$10,000 he will be required to pay the difference between \$7,500 and the purchase price plus the five per cent down payment on the \$7,500 loan.
He shall have served not less

than 90 days on active duty in some branch of the armed service between September 16, 1940 and December 31, 1946, unless discharged sooner for service-connected disabilities. A certified copy of the applicant's honorable discharge will be required to be filed with application. In addition, a veteran who leases his land for oil or gas, must apply one-half of all bonus and rentals to the retirement of his debt.
The veterans will NOT be required to live upon the property but he will not be permitted to dispose of it for a period of three years.
Payments of principal on note with interest will be made on a semi-annual basis. Each veteran will receive a contract of sale from the state and upon final payment he or she will be granted absolute title.
Failure to make payments when due, permits the Board to revoke the contract of purchase and to forfeit the land which can then be offered for resale to other veterans.
A veteran may reinstate his land which has been forfeited, up to the announced date of resale by the payment of a penalty and placing account in good standing.
The Board in its first meeting named Alvis Vandygriff as executive secretary.
Vandygriff, an attorney, who hails from Equis, Texas has been serving as Chief Clerk of the General Land Office. He is a veteran of World War II having served as a Major in the Army Air Force. He was selected by the Board to direct the administrative machinery of the new program on the basis of his long experience in the Land Office where the offices and records of the program will be maintained.

M&M To Deepen 2-B Bouscaren In Western Crockett

Deepening with rotary from 3,978 feet to 7,400 feet, or 200 feet in the Ellenburger if the top is above that point, has been begun by M&M Production Co. No. 2-B Bouscaren at the north end of the Noelke (Seven Rivers) field in Western Crockett County. Olson Drilling Co has the contract.

Weekly Swing of Southwest Farm Markets

(USDA)—Southwest farm markets presented a mixture of rising and falling prices during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.
Leading markets received fewer livestock of all kinds last week than the week before. A third less

sheep arrived in Texas last week than a week earlier. Wholesale dressed meat prices declined mostly \$2 to \$4 for hogs at New York. Pork hams fell to \$8 and lamb \$5 to \$12.
Cows, calves and business classes unchanged to \$12. Medium to good killing steers ranged from \$22 to \$25 at Oklahoma City, and \$23 to \$26 at Fort Worth.
Monday's strong hog market reduced the week's losses at terminals to around 50 cents.
Sheep and lambs closed unchanged to \$1 lower than the day before. Good spring lambs brought \$23 at Texas terminals. Good and choice natives sold \$27.50 to \$28 at Denver, and \$25 to 50 cents.
