Outline Policies for Student Participation In School Athletics

Broad policies governing participation of students in athletics in the Ozona Public Schools were reduced to writing and approved by the school board at its meeting Tuesday night.

The policies as outlined require permission from parents for students to participate in athletics, an agreement on the part of parents to assume financial obligations incident to injuries suffered by participating students, above that received by the school on insurance to be carried by the school covering athletics, limits raveling squads and specifies requirements for awards in the various sports.

Travelling squad sizes will be limited to 33 in football, 12 in basketball, 12 in girls volleyball, 6 in boys tennis, 11 each in girls

uates. The rules also cover re- positions. quirements for reserve letters and playing time for lettering in the various sports.

The school administration also drew up rules and regulations governing participation in band. Rental charge of \$5 per year was set for use of school owned instruments. Fifth grade students will be required to take band for a period of one year in lieu of Pubtic School Music, with instruments to be furnished fifth graders at \$1 per semester to cover maintenance and repairs. After one year of band, pupils must furnish their own instruments.
