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Phone Co-op Up Must Be Complete By 24th

Application Blanks Available at County Agent's Office

Crockett county ranchmen who have not yet signed applications for telephone service from the Texas Telephone Co-operative, Inc., who wish to do so may obtain application forms at the office of County Agent Wm. A. Kincaid, Jr., it was announced today by Ira Carson, chairman of the sign-up campaign in this county.

A recent meeting of representatives of the 13-county area included in the proposed new co-operative, held in San Angelo, the sign-up campaign was scheduled to July 24 when all data would be finally assembled and application made for a government grant of \$500,000 to complete the system.

All applications from prospective subscribers to the co-operative must be in the hands of the county committee by that date when another meeting will be held in San Angelo to make final plans.

A deposit of \$5 is required of the subscriber with the application. When the system is installed, the payment of \$45 will be required, making the total initial cost to the subscriber \$50. Monthly rental fees will be a maximum of \$1.50, it has been announced.

A committee, composed of representatives in each of the 13 counties, was named at the start of the sign-up drive in this county. It was estimated that 60 per cent of the possible subscribers of the system in this county had signed up in that original campaign. It was at first hoped to make the loan application on the basis of prospective subscribers, but the date was extended to July 24 to permit a more complete sign-up to determine full extent of coverage of the proposed cooperative lines.

George Paul Moss of Odessa, Texas, has been waging a strenuous campaign for the congressional nomination. He has been invited by the club to speak on campaign issues at its next meeting.

Congressman Ken Regan, who is seeking re-election as representative from this district, is scheduled to speak before the club at its meeting Thursday, July 13.

The third candidate in the three-way race, Fred Harvey of El Paso, Texas, is to be heard at the club's recent meeting, the first of candidates on the club's invitation list.

Ozona Country Club Building and Golf Course At Northeast Edge of City Nearing Completion

On a site located at the foot of a low hill, with inviting liveoak groves to the sides and rear, workmen are making rapid progress toward completion of the new Ozona Country Club building on the plot of land acquired by the club from W. E. Friend, Jr.

Meanwhile progress is also being made on a snappy nine-hole golf course being laid out on the acreage around the club house. Fairways have been marked and clearing operations are under way. Excess brush is being cleared and rocks removed from the fairways.

The golf course is to have oiled sand greens and these have been excavated and sand is being delivered this week to complete the greens. The boxes are in place and with a little more work the course will be ready for the first call of "fore!"

The club house is being constructed of concrete and haydite tile. The subfloor and outer walls of the building are complete, with steel casement windows installed. Steel trusses for the roof have been delivered and rough-in work for the plumbing is about complete.

The club house will have a large ballroom with rooms cut off at each end, game rooms, refreshment and rest rooms.

County machinery was used to open a road to the club site. The new road intersects Highway 163 near the roadside park north of town and winds back southeasterly to the club house.

Ford Mercury Agency Here Changes Hands On July 1st

T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Crockett county ranchman and native Ozonian, and C. O. Spencer, owner and operator of the C. O. Spencer Welding Service here, became joint owners of the Melton Motor Co., local Ford and Mercury agency, in a deal which went into effect last Saturday, July 1.

The deal for purchase of the garage and service station and automobile agency was closed with N. E. Melton, owner, following a conference with officials of the Ford Motor Co. in Dallas last week.

The business will continue to operate under the name of Melton Motor Co. until official transfer of the agency designation by the Ford Motor Co. After details of the agency transfer are completed the business will be operated under the name "Kincaid & Spencer," Ford and Mercury sales and service.

Mr. Kincaid and Mr. Spencer assumed operation of the business last Saturday. Essentially the same personnel will be retained in the business. Charlie Hale is foreman of the service department and J. W. Tatum will continue to operate the paint and body department in the basement. H. W. Maddoux is filling station attendant and Mrs. Taylor Word bookkeeper. Bernard Templeton of Menard was employed this week as parts man and will be in charge of the expanded parts department. Mr. Templeton was parts man for his father, Ford dealer at Menard, for four years. He and Mrs. Templeton and two children have rented the Lee Snyder house and will move this week.

The transfer of the business did not include the building, built three years ago by Mr. Melton. Mr. Melton has purchased ranch property in New Mexico and ownership of the building was transferred to New Mexico owners in that deal. The Meltons, Mr. and Mrs. N. E. Mr. and Mrs. Newell and infant son, and Bill Melton, plan to move to the ranch south of Las Vegas at an early date.

Mr. Melton established the Ford agency here about four years ago. Previously Ozona had had a Ford agency at intervals but for several years prior to 1946 there had been no Ford agency here.

The new owners have been assured of continuing shipments of new cars, both Ford and Mercury and plan to maintain full service and parts facilities.

The building, to house four fire engines and provide living quarters for a paid attendant, in addition to storage rooms, a stag room and office quarters, is to be constructed of haydite tile with Austin cut stone front. The building is expected to be completed by the end of the present summer.

T-P To Drill Deep Wildcat In N'west Crockett

8,500-foot Test Planned in Crockett Grayburg Pool

Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Co. filed application Wednesday for a permit to drill an 8,500-foot rotary wildcat in extreme northwestern Crockett county.

The test well will be No. 1-G University, 660 feet out of the northeast corner of section 16, block 14, University lands survey. It will be in the Crockett (Grayburg) pool, which extends into Southern Upson county. The northeast quarter of section 16-14-U is Glycerase Oil Co.'s X "Y" lease, with eight shallow producers. Some maps show Gulf Oil Corp. has deep rights.

The Texas Pacific wildcat will be 11 miles east of McCamey. It is due to start on July 8.

E. T. Hays of Big Lake staked location in the Vaughan (San Andres) field for No. 1 Isabell Vaughan, slated 1,500-foot cable tool test, 330 from the north, 380 feet from the west line of section 87-0P-GC&SF.

Magnolia No. 2 Clayton Ranch, C NE NE 12-GH-GC&SF, 4,000 feet northeast of No. 1 Clayton Ranch, Ellenburger gas-distillate discovery 10 miles east of Ozona, was drilling at 3,545 feet in lime and shale.

The efficient machine, which is kept in readiness by the fire department in case of need, will be demonstrated by members of the department who have been schooled in its use by factory representatives.

Membership cards and badges are ready for distribution to the membership at the Tuesday evening meet. Refreshments will be served by the entertainment committee.

Ballots Ready For Absentee Primary Voting

New Secret Ballot to Be Used in Voting On July 22nd

Ballots for the first Democratic primary election, July 22, have been delivered in readiness for absentee voting in Crockett county. Absentee voting could begin last Monday, July 2, and absentee ballots may be cast through July 20.

Voters in this year's primary will have a choice of candidates for the different offices in at least half of the places sought in state district, county and precinct offices. There are six candidates for governor, twelve for lieutenant governor, three for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court in Place 1, three for Place 2 and four for Place 3. There are eight candidates for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, two for comptroller of public accounts, two for commissioner of the general land office, four for commissioner of agriculture, three for United States representative to Congress from the 16th district and two for state representative from the 86th district.

For county and precinct offices, there are two candidates for county and district clerk, two for commissioner of precinct 1 and three for commissioner precinct 4. The unopposed Candidates are Attorney General Price Daniel, Railroad Commissioner Wm. J. Murray, State Treasurer Jesse James, Judge Joseph McGill of the 8th District Court of Civil Appeals at El Paso, District Judge Garland Casbier, District Attorney Hart Johnson, County Judge Houston Smith, County Attorney N. W. Graham, Sheriff V. O. Earnest, Treasurer Tom Casbeer, Commissioner Charlie Black, Justice of the Peace W. M. Johnigan, Constable Tom Smith and B. B. Ingham, Jr., unopposed for the post of county commissioner of precinct 3, to be vacated by J. W. Owens at the end of his present term.

County and precinct races which are expected to bring out a near record vote in Crockett county this year include that for district and county clerk between Edwin G. (Eddie) Bower and the incumbent, George Russell; between Ira M. Carson and the incumbent commissioner of precinct No. 1, Rob Miller; and the three-way race for the No. 4 commission post, with Sid Millsap, Jr., and James Childress opposing the incumbent E. R. Kinser.

The new secret ballot, provided by a new election law, will be in use in a primary election for the first time this year. The new ballot has a perforated tab in an upper corner with a number corresponding to a number on the ballot proper. The voter detaches this perforated tab, signs his name on the back and deposits the tab in a separate box from that in which the judge deposits his ballot but the number does not correspond to that on the ballot, election judges being required to "shuffle" the ballots so that they are not handed out in consecutive numbers. The tab boxes remain sealed and unless an election contest develops, are destroyed in two months. This system makes it impossible for an election official or anybody else to check a marked ballot with a poll list number to see how a particular voter cast his ballot, except a court in case of a contested election.

THE PIECES FIT

For many years rising costs and prices have beset the country. With monotonous insistence one group blames another group for the trend. Labor has been suspicious of industrial profits. The housewife is "robbed" by farmers, manufacturers, middlemen, etc. Some businessmen lay the blame almost wholly at the door of high wages. Many political officeholders and candidates with vicious acumen seek to capitalize on this national tragedy, turning the blame for inflation in whatever direction may seem expedient at the moment. Meanwhile the public debt has soared. To an ever increasing extent local communities, counties and states are leaning upon a federal treasury that cannot carry the load. The result is steadily depreciating money — or in other words — rising prices.

The inevitable egg and hen relationship of debt, money value, and prices should no longer puzzle anyone. The pieces in the problem can be fitted together with dreadful clarity from the front page of practically any newspaper. For example, the Omaha, Nebraska, World Herald recently carried on page one the following news stories: "U. S. Funds Main State Cash Supply—Grants in Aid' Help Given 39 Accounts in Nebraska Treasury. This federal money is being spent by the state at the rate of more than 60,000 dollars a day or \$21,950,000 a year. This is an increase of 50 per cent from a year ago..." In the next column Senator Hugh Butler warned that deficit spending is the biggest issue before congress and said that "If we do not take decisive action promptly, we may never see another balanced budget until we have gone through disastrous inflation..." And finally, in another column of the same paper was a factual report on rising prices with the simple three word headline, "Prices Edge Upward."

The United States on the present course will one day face a financial crisis that will wipe out the material possessions of all the people and may result also in destruction of representative government. There is an alternative.

Get busy now. Call for a curb on federal spending. Every chamber of commerce and civic organization, every newspaper and community leader should demand a halt to the shameful, tragic practice of sending men to the Congress of the United States pledged to "bring home the bacon" in the form of bigger and bigger appropriations for local projects. No one knows how long in terms of years our country can stand the present farce — but the end cannot be far off.

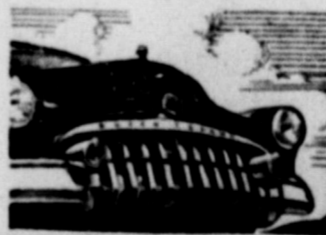

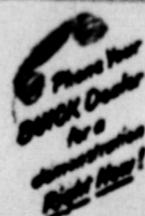

**Absence of Proof
Delays Settlement of
Social Security Claims**

Delay in furnishing proofs slows up the settlement of approximately 45% of all claims filed for payment filed with the San Angelo office of the Social Security Administration, according to George Clark, manager of the office.

Mr. Clark pointed out that most application for old-age and survivors insurance are handled promptly, but that unfortunately in some cases the person filing the claim cannot, or will not, furnish promptly, the evidence needed to support his application. Rarely, though, does a person fail to get payment just because he has no proof.

Clark explained that government records are used to determine whether a person has worked long enough to qualify for payments, and to calculate the amount, but that most other types of evidence must be supplied by the person applying for payment. The proofs most often required are date of birth, death, marriage, divorce adoption and legal guardianship. Public records are of course, the next best evidence, but it may be possible to establish the facts from a variety of sources, including Bibles or other family records, and insurance, military, union, and lodge records.



IS GOD ON OUR SIDE?

During the Civil War someone asked Abe Lincoln, "Mr. President, do you think that God is on the side of the Union?" Mr. Lincoln is said to have replied, "Both sides are claiming His favor. It is certain that he cannot be on both sides. But the important question is whether we are on His side."

In this threat of a Third World War the old question and answer become important again. The answer is still the same, "Are we on God's side?"

God rules His world with even-handed justice tempered with mercy. He will always uphold the right in the end, although He may let the wrong get on top for a while. He never changes His mind. He is no respecter of persons. The same judgment hangs over us all.

We hope there will be no third World War. But if it is, the outcome is certain. The side with the most right will win. Not the side with the biggest cannon, as Napoleon said; or the side with the most alliances. But the side that has the best cause.

I am one who believes that Communism will eventually die from within. It is rotten inside; and God's axe is lying at its root now. But just as a dying bear may do much damage after a mortal blow has been dealt him, so a dying Communism in its convulsions could set the world back a century or so.

Even though we believe that Communism, because it is out of focus with reality, cannot win, it does not follow that we can. We have armaments; but do we have spiritual stamina? We live under democratic ideals; but how sincerely do we practice them? We proclaim an equal chance for every man; but does every man really get that chance? If there is evil in our way of life, God will deal with it like He deals with it everywhere. For God is no respecter of persons.

We have just passed the Fourth of July. But we have not passed the danger of an all-out struggle to the death. These ought to be days of private and national heart searching and prayer.

We can't know for sure whether God is on our side until we decide in all truth whether or not we are on God's side.

Brooks, Business Man Candidate for Lt. Gov. Calls for Economy

Pierce Brooks, Dallas business man, has opened his campaign for Lieutenant Governor with a declaration that he is opposed to any new taxes until the state's financial affairs are put on a sound and sensible business basis and waste and extravagance are eliminated from the operations of the state government.

Brooks declared in his opening campaign address that the state is facing the worst financial crisis in its history.

"It is overspending its prospective income at the rate of \$6,000,000 per month," he said, "and reports from Austin say that in addition to the \$500,000,000 the state is spending this year an additional \$150,000,000 in new tax money will be needed next year."

The Dallas business man candidate pointed out that the cost of the state government has increased more than 500 per cent since 1935, while the cost of the federal government, aside from the cost of World War II, did not increase that much.

"I believe," Brooks said, "that through the elimination of waste and extravagance, by spending the tax dollar more wisely and by getting a full dollar's value for every dollar spent, the \$500,000,000 the state is spending this year can buy all needed supplies and equipment, pay adequate salaries to all essential employes, take care of the old folks, and provide all essential services without any new taxes."

Care Necessary to Avoid Food Poisoning

AUSTIN. — Food poisoning and the spread of food-borne diseases can be "things of the past," State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox asserted here today.

"People need only remember three things to bring about an end of the food poisoning disease classification," Dr. Cox declared. "Buy food from safe sources, prepare it in a sanitary fashion, and serve and store it properly."

He said state laws covered the sale of contaminated food to the housewife, but "only the home maker can see that food is properly stored and cleanly prepared for serving to the family."

There is a difference between food infection and food intoxication, he pointed out.

Food infection comes from eating or drinking a product contaminated by a germ. Dysentery, typhoid fever and tuberculosis are examples. Animal parasites can also gain entry to the body in this way. That, the doctor said, is how

people get trichinosis and tape worm.

The growth and multiplication of certain toxin forming bacteria in unrefrigerated foods bring on food intoxication, according to the explanation. That is the source of staphylococcus infection and the deadly botulism. Some kinds of

mushrooms and certain shellfish are also poisonous.

Some poisonous substances may be accidentally introduced into food, Dr. Cox said. "For instance, rodent and insect poisons, spray residues on fruit and vegetables, and poisons from metal contain-

To point up the deadliness of some food poisons, he related the story of the housewife who suspected some home-canned beans she had just opened were tainted. "She barely tasted one of them, but it killed her in a matter of hours. Such instances are rare, but do occur."

16th Congressional District Gains 53 1/2% In 1950 Population

The 16th Congressional District, comprising 19 of Texas' western-most counties, gained 123,188 in population in the period from 1940 to 1950 on the basis of census figures released the first of the week. Its percentage of gain — 53 1/2% — is expected to be among the highest in the state. In 1940 the 19 counties had population of 230,700, while currently the figure tests at 353,888.

Though paced by El Paso county on the far west and the "oil" counties of Midland, Ector, Ward and Winkler in the northeast corner of the district, the gain in population was spread over 15 of the nineteen counties.

Population losses were sustained in Presidio, Loving, Jeff Davis and Glasscock counties, all being areas depending largely on agriculture.

El Paso, the "city" of the district, grew from 96,810 in 1940 to 130,003, but Austin grew still faster and edged El Paso into sixth place among Texas cities.

Odessa had the most spectacular growth of any larger town in Texas, with an increase of more than three times. It jumped from 9,573 in 1940 to 29,432 in 1950. This 200% gain still was far below the expectations of many Odessa citizens, who had been estimating the city at 40,000 or more.

Midland, oil office capital of West Texas, had what would have been a spectacular growth anywhere except in the shadow of Odessa. It jumped from 9,352 to 21,614 in the decade.
