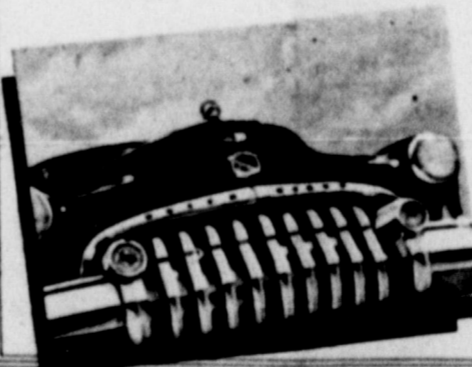

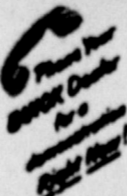

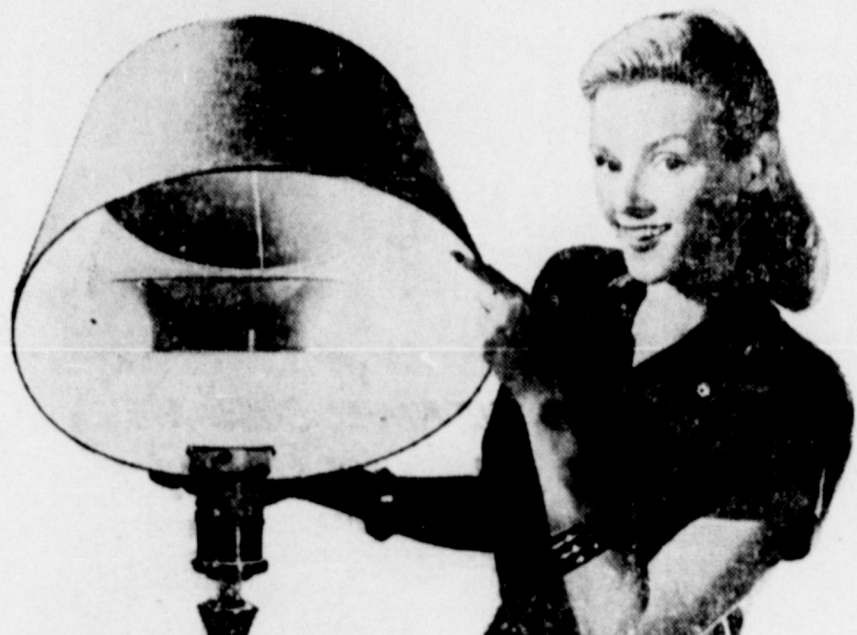

### Light for the Week

#### OUR BEST HOPE

United Nations is five years old. For a five-year-old it has developed considerably.

There have been fighting for 45 years. War has been the known way to correct mistakes. History has been a story of periods of rest and fights. Many assume war is a fighting animal, and it must always be war.

It may not be true. Why do we take a fatalistic view of it? If the United Nations can settle international disputes, and if we have the will to work, it may eventually end war and make prolonged wars impossible.

In Texas there was a time when the sixshooter was the law. A man enforced his own code. The era gave way to a system of written law enforced by judges and juries. Few of us want to go back. The point is, a change is needed.

At this time, there has been a factory alternative to war. It is used to correct mistakes, and to work off grudges. Each war sowed the seeds of the next. It goes on like a squirrel, without arriving anywhere.

The first time, we are beginning to apply the court-and-jury system to nations, as well as to individuals. We should not expect a new system in five years to solve a custom thousands of years old. For a youngster, the U. N. is already piled up an impressive record. We are prone to look at the past and forget its achievements. In the last two years, at least, small-caliber quarrels, any which could have ignited the spark of another world war, have been settled in the U. N. Let's give due credit, and be patient. The Palestine problem, for instance, could have been settled for World War III, but it was settled largely through the U. N.

As we have seen a United Nations army fighting for the first time for the U. N. flag. As the forces are built up, as methods of compromise and lawful procedure are perfected, as veto power is reduced, and as men come to see the U. N. as a genuine institution of the group will-to-peace, its moral power will be greater, and will eventually be greater than the will of any

one nation.

Whatever the defects of the U. N. may be now, it is our brightest hope for peace. If there is to be peace tomorrow at all, it will come through and because of a stronger U. N.

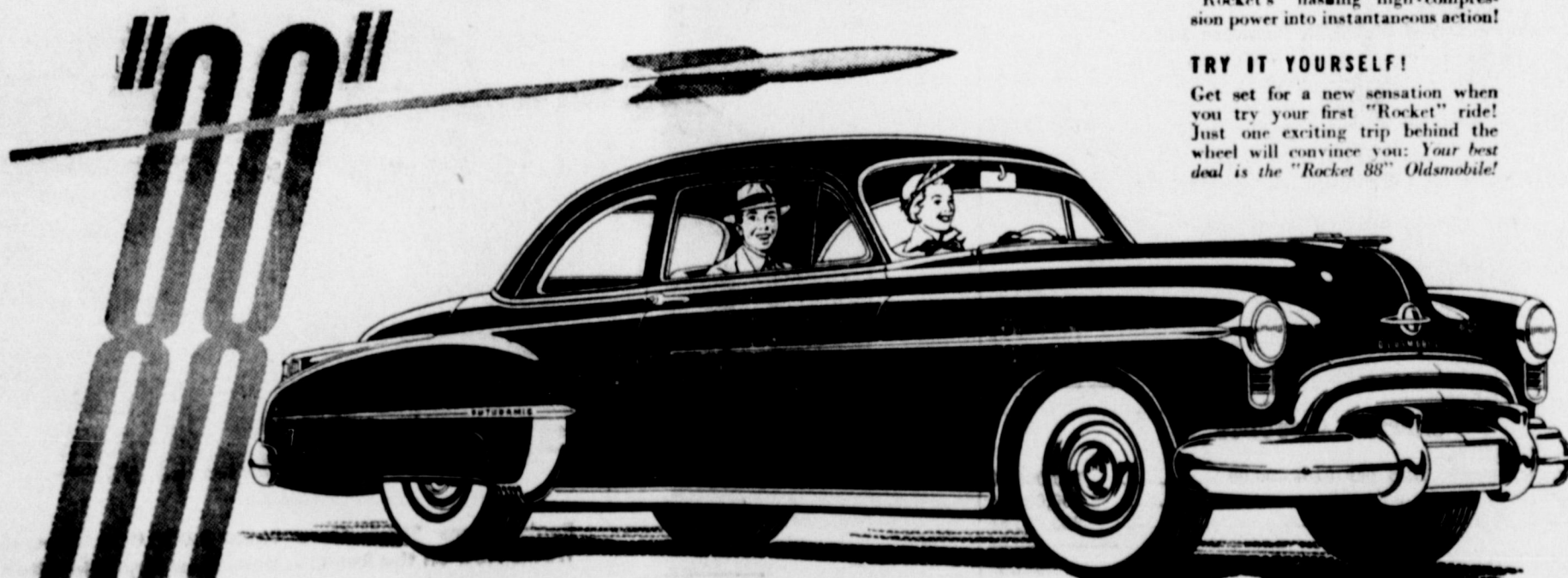
The Coral Sea and other units

Architects in the making are Mr. Matthew's shop students. His second year drawing classes are coming along fine with their house planning. Floor plans are nearly completed. Next will come the foundation plans — elevations for front, rear, and the two ends, — structure of building and houses, roof plans and possibly a symbol sheet.

First year shop students are doing mechanical drawing, including lettering and blocks with different angles and parts cut away. They are drawn isometric, oblique and orthographic.

Junior high shop classes have discontinued mechanical drawing and started woodworking in the seventh grade period. The eighth graders will be woodworking all semester. They are looking forward to receiving their newest piece of machinery. The new lathe will be on its way October 20, and it will arrive approximately November 1.

making has become one of the most important subjects taught in American schools today and shouldn't our school measure up to standards?

The shop, like the band hall, is a makeshift affair, and is insufficient. It is a very important factor in the school's program.

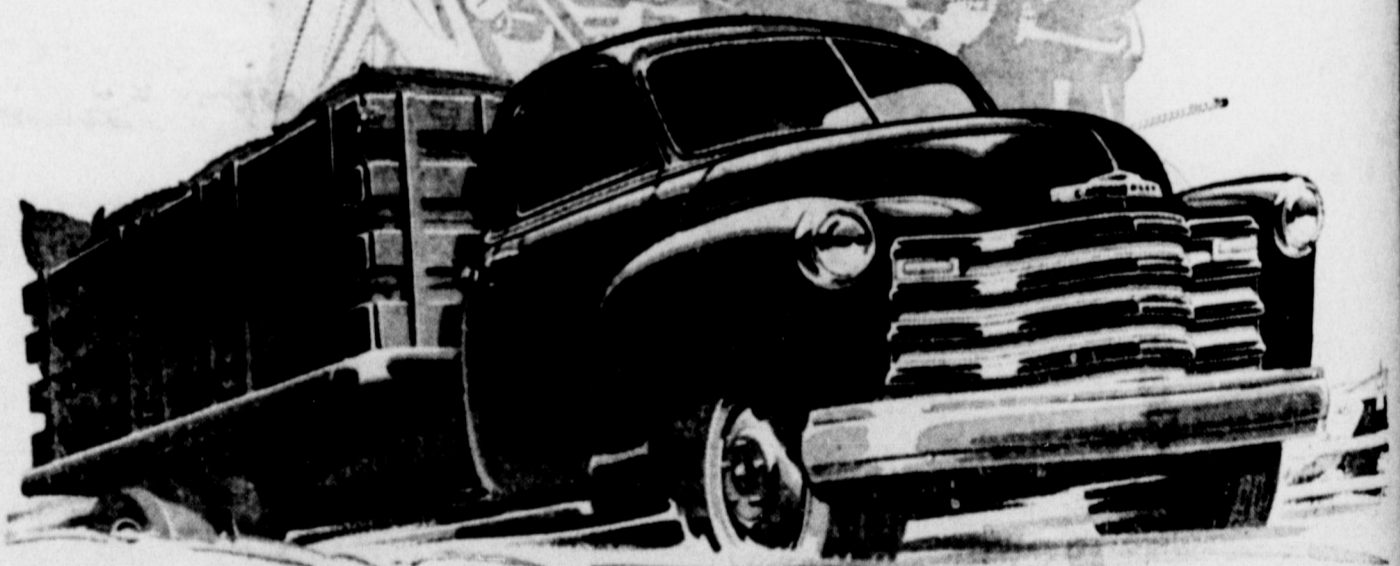

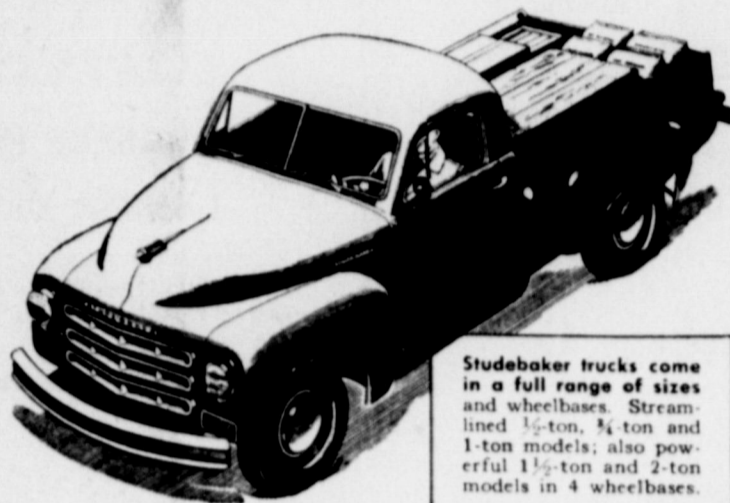

The Democratic slate includes Allan Shivers for governor; Ben Ramsey for lieutenant governor; Price Daniel for attorney general; Will Wilson, Robert W. Calvert and Meade F. Griffin for the three places on the Supreme Court; W. A. Morrison for the Court of Criminal Appeals; William J. Murray for Railroad Commissioner; Robert S. Calvert for Comptroller; Bascom Giles for land commissioner; Jesse James for treasurer; John C. White for agriculture commissioner; Joseph McGill for associate justice Court of Civil Appeals, 8th district; Ken Regan for Congress; Garland Casbier for district judge; Hart Johnson district attorney; Callan Graham state representative; Houston Smith county judge; N. W. Graham, county attorney; Geo. Russell, county and district clerk; V. O. Earnest, sheriff, tax assessor and collector; Jim Dudley, county treasurer; Ira Carson, Charlie Black, Jr., E. R. Both the column for Independent Candidates and for write-ins are blank, carrying only names of the offices with space beneath for the voter's use in the event he should wish to write in the names of a candidate of his own selection whose name does not appear in either of the two parties.

The ballot, too, is the new "secret ballot" form, with a perforated and numbered tab in the corner, the number corresponding to that on the ballot. This tab the voter detaches himself, writes his name on the back and deposits in a locked receptacle at the polling place. The ballots are "shuffled" by election judges in advance of voting and no record is kept of the ballot's printed number in connection with the voter's name. The box containing the torn out corner tab remains sealed unless ordered opened by courts in case of an election contest, and after two months, the numbered tabs are destroyed. The numbered tab makes it possible to find out which ballot a particular voter marked, but under the law, the tab box must remain inviolate, to be opened only upon order of the courts in case of a contest.

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
