## Ed Roping For Ozona Roping Club Plan

### Night Roping, To Follow By Dance For July 22

Night roping in a lighted Ozona's history is promoted by the Ozona Roping Club on Monday evening, July 22.

The club, with about 35 members, will install lighting at the fair grounds at a recent meeting and on July 22 as the date for the night roping program.

Arrangements for the program have not yet been completed, the program will include pot ropings and some matched ropings. Efforts are being made to bring some top talent here to participate in the matched event, and a decision will be made later.

A fashioned cowboy dance will be staged on the platform at the fair grounds following the roping program. Music has been selected but a good band will be secured for the square dancing may be held during the evening, committee men said. Admission will be 75 cents for roping program and \$1.50 per person for the dance to follow.

The roping will begin at 8:00 o'clock and last about two hours. There have already been placed lighting equipment and members plan extensive improvements in pens to take full advantage of the lighting.

Producing naturally 149.52 barrels of gravity pipeline oil in 24 hours, Forest Oil Corp. No. 4-A Tippett field has been completed in Crockett

## Army, Air Forces Recruiting Unit To Be In Ozona Monday

Ozonans who would like to see official U. S. Army moving pictures of combat scenes taken during World War II will have an opportunity next Monday evening on the city park lawn.

A mobile Army and Air Forces recruiting unit will be in Ozona all day Monday and will show the combat films Monday evening. The unit will bring 12 different combat films, mostly invasion scenes, and will show as many of the films as possible while here. Lt. A. E. Alton, recruiting officer at the Big Spring office, said while here recently arranging for the unit's appearance.

The recruiting unit will be set up on the west side of the park opposite the bank. The big trailer containing offices and examination room will be manned by recruiting officers and any person interested in enlisting in the Army or Air Forces will be given an examination and enlisted on the spot if qualified. Both men and women recruits are sought for the different service branches, including U. S. Army, Air Force, Aviation Cadet Corps, Women's Army Corps and Women's Air Force.

While here the unit personnel will assist any veteran or family with any problems in connection with service in the armed forces, Lt. Alton said.

## Rebels Outhit Iraan But Lose Decision 4 to 2

### Locals Cling To Lead By Narrow Margin In Spite Of Loss

Failure to hit in the clutches, erratic base running and errors in fielding accounted for a screw ball game at Powell Field here Sunday afternoon wherein the Iraan team copped a 4 to 2 decision over the Ozona Rebels in spite of the fact that the Rebels out-hit the visitors 10 to 5.

It was a Trans Pecos League game and in spite of the loss, the Ozona team still holds a one-game lead in Trans Pecos play. The win by Iraan over Ozona and a victory for Big Lake over Goodfellow Field leaves Big Lake and Iraan in a tie for second place, with Goodfellow in third position and Fort Stockton trailing.

The veteran Frank James went the entire nine innings on the mound for Ozona, limiting the Iraan clouters to only five hits in nine frames. James struck out three Iraan batters, issued six walks, hit a single, drove in one run, got on base on an error and drew a walk in four times up by way of contributing to the ball game.

But his teammates, in spite of the fact that they slammed out ten hits off the pitching of Homer Hefley and Wetherby, were short of the scoring punch in many a clutch and in spite of ten hits, five bases on balls and two errors by the opposition, were able to score but two runs. The visitors took advantage of five hits, six bases on balls and seven errors by Ozona fielders to score 4 tallies. Not one Iraan run was earned and only one Ozona tally was so classified.

The Rebels had twelve left on base and Iraan had 11. Ozona batters nicked Hefley for five hits in six innings and got as many off Wetherby in three. It was a heart breaker for local fans, for, except in one inning, Ozona had from one to three men on base in every inning, once filling the bases with none out, and yet able to score but one run in that frame.

Iraan scored one in the fifth when Harelson walked, stole second and third and scored on a single by Ransleben. Another run crossed in the sixth by virtue of one hit and two errors, and in the seventh two hits, a walk, a wild pitch and two errors all combined to spot the visitors two more runs, the necessary margin.

## Road To Vaughan Field Promised By Commission

### Delegation Appeals For All-Weather Road At Court Meet Mon.

Immediate action was taken by the Crockett County Commissioners Court in session this week to provide an all-weather road to the fast developing Vaughan field northwest of Ozona following presentation of a plea for such a road presented by a delegation of representatives of companies operating in the field.

A committee was appointed by the court to survey out and determine the best route and promised the delegation that a new road would be graded and surfaced with caliche to make an all-weather road as soon as the proper route can be determined. Later the court intimated that a hard surfaced road may be built if the field development justifies.

A concise statement of the present extent of development in the Vaughan field and potential expansion was presented to the court in a written statement.

There are 18 producing wells in the field, and based on 37 barrels of oil per well per day for 17 allowed producing days each month, present production of the field will total 11,322 barrels per month, the statement revealed.

There are 10 rigs operating in the area, and two deep wildcats are scheduled to commence within a few days to bring the total to 12.

"Number of proven acres at this writing will justify a total of 100 wells to be drilled in this immediate area," the statement continued. As other outcrop wells and other surrounding wells are drilled, the magnitude and future potentiality of this area will no doubt be a valuable asset to Crockett county.

"Approximately 100 employees and their families are dependent entirely upon the development in the Vaughan area, 75 per cent of whom reside in Ozona and Crockett county."

Service companies and other businesses that directly serve the oil companies in the area were listed as the Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Co., Dowell Inc., acidizing firm; Independent Eastern Torpedo Co., well shooters; supply men, specialty men, construction crews, road building and dirt moving crews, surveyors, etc.

The new road will be a continuation of the present road to the W. R. Baggett ranch. At present, residents and workers in the field use a meandering road which follows the West Texas Utilities Co. highline.

## Three Youths Held On Federal Charge After Wrecking Stolen Car

Three Detroit youths who were arrested in Pecos by Highway Patrolmen after wrecking and burning an allegedly stolen automobile on the highway 35 miles west of Ozona last Sunday, are being held in San Angelo under \$1,500 bond fixed by federal district court.

The youths were taken from the Crockett county jail by Deputy Marshall Clarence E. Luce of Lubbock for a hearing on charges of car theft and violation of the Dyer act, transporting a stolen car across state lines.

The youths are John T. Hill, Jr., 20, his brother, Gerald T. Hill, 16, both on parole from youth correction prisons and Thomas Gerald Fitton, 20. The trio named a fourth man whom they charged set fire to the 1947 Ford convertible which they admitted stealing in Detroit. The car was badly wrecked before it was fired.

## Shell Producer Extends Tippett Field Northwest

### Rates 287 Bbls.; Two New Producers In Vaughan Field

Shell No. 1 Marris in Crockett County Saturday extended the Tippett (Wolfcamp) field in the panhandle of northwestern Crockett County one-third mile northwest.

The well was finished for a natural daily flow of 287 barrels of 38.8 gravity, pipeline oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1030-1. Flowing pressures were 1,090 to 1,200 pounds on the casing, 980 to 1,050 pounds on the tubing.

Production was through 12-64 inch tubing choke. Pay was topped at 6,304 feet in drilling to 6,334 feet. Five and one-half-inch casing was set at 6,293 feet. No. 1 Marris is 440 feet from the southeast and southwest lines of the lease in section 3-B-GC&SF.

Forest Oil Corporation of San Antonio plans to drill a 6,500 foot rotary test in the Tippett field No. 1 Lampkin and Bassett will be 440 feet from the southeast and southwest lines of the north half of section 3, abstract 3,951, GC&SF.

Gar-Ter Drilling Corporation of Fort Worth has completed two producers on the pump in the Vaughan (San Andres) field in Crockett County. No. 5-B Vaughan made 53 barrels of 37 gravity oil in 24 hours. It topped the pay at 1,247 feet, drilled to 1,285 feet and set 7-inch casing at 1,231 feet. The section was shot with 30 quarts of nitroglycerin. Location is 330 feet from the south and west lines of the 87.6-acre lease in section 6-UV-GC&SF.

Gar-Ter No. 3 Gulf-Shannon made 48.75 barrels of 35 gravity oil in 24 hours. It topped the pay at 1,245 feet, drilled to 1,293 feet and set 7-inch casing at 1,221 feet. The section was shot with 20 quarts of nitroglycerin. The producer is 330 feet from the south and east lines of the northeast 40-acres of the 120-acre lease in section 5-UV-GC&SF.

Plymouth No. 3-O J. W. Owens in the Olson field has been completed on the pump in 24 hours for 72.97 barrels of 29.1 gravity oil. It topped the pay at 2,035 feet, drilled to 2,080 feet and cemented 5 1/2 inch casing at 2,010 feet. The section was shot with 112 quarts of nitroglycerin. Location is 990 feet from the north, 1,650 feet from the west line of section 12-GG-T&NO.

### Lowell Littleton New Head Of Revived Service Group

Voted out of existence once by a majority of members present, later disbanded on a temporary basis contingent upon reorganization by members or ex-members, the Ozona Rotary Club jumped back into active status this week quite as suddenly as it had gone on the inactive.

At the last meeting of the club in June, the end of the club fiscal year, a motion taken previously to disband the club as of that date was amended, and the club was inactivated for a period of 30 days.

At the end of that specified period, if no successful move to reorganize and reactivate had been made by the members, the charter was to be surrendered and the club disbanded.

At the request of several members, the club's new president for 1949-50, Lowell Littleton, cashier of the Ozona National Bank, called a meeting of members at the bank Monday night and 17 were present. The club was voted back into active status and the Monday night meeting was counted for a meeting missed last week and the first luncheon of the reorganized group was held at noon Tuesday.

## Williams Child Still Critically Ill From Snake Bite

### 19-Months-Old Bitten By Rattler Sunday, Some Improved

Still in critical condition from the effects of venom from a rattlesnake which bit him Sunday night, Larry Williams, 19-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Williams, was reported to have made some improvement Wednesday, and late Wednesday afternoon, doctors were still hopeful of winning their battle to save his life.

The child was bitten on the leg just above the knee at about 8:00 o'clock Sunday evening while playing in the backyard of the Williams ranch home, 11 miles north of Ozona, with a brother and sister.

Rushed to Ozona, the child was in a coma and turning blue by the time the family reached town. Doctors immediately injected anti-venom and other first aid measures and the child was taken to a San Angelo hospital where doctors have been battling three days to save his life.

Jacqueline Sue Williams, 10-year-old sister of the child, who was playing with him in the yard, screamed and when the parents ran to her she told them that Larry had been bitten by a snake. The parents applied a tourniquet above the bite and rushed to town with the child.

The snake evidently was a very large one, judging from the distance between the fang marks, according to the attending physician. It was estimated almost an inch and a half between the fang wounds on the child's leg.

## Federal Bureau To Take Business Census Here Soon

### Retail, Wholesale And Service Firms To Fill Forms

Ben H. Davidson, district supervisor, District 12, U. S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, was in Ozona this week making arrangements for enumerators to begin the work of taking the federal business census in Crockett County at an early date.

Mr. Davidson, whose headquarters is at Odessa, is supervisor for the Census Bureau in ten West Texas counties, including Loving, Winkler, Midland, Ector, Glasscock, Ward, Crane, Upton, Reagan and Crockett.

This year's census will be the most extensive ever taken by the United States government or any other government, Mr. Davidson said. Business enumerations were made in 1929 and 1939 and under a law passed by Congress last year enumerations hereafter will be made every five years.

The census of transportation, drilling and manufacturing concerns has already been made by mail and the present census will include only retail, wholesale and service businesses.

Two different forms are used in the enumeration, Mr. Davidson said, the short form being a simple form used for small businesses and the long form with a little more detailed information used for larger businesses. About 75 per cent of the nation's businesses are being enumerated on the short forms, he said.

The business census will cover operations in 1948. Information to be required of operators includes gross receipts for 1948, total payroll for the year and some breakdown of the payroll and business operations, a more extensive breakdown for the long form users.

All information gathered in the census will be held in strict confidence, Mr. Davidson said, the information being confined to the Census Bureau and used only for statistical information.

#### WHY DODGE THE ISSUE? \*\*

There has been endless debate over the problem of labor legislation, from all points of view. But one of the biggest difficulties is rarely mentioned. It is simply this: So long as labor monopolies are permitted to exist, the public, and the working man himself, will always be subject to exploitation. At the whim of one man or one group of men, it will be possible to stop the production of commodities which are necessary to the public health and comfort and the national security. That, indeed, has happened many times in the past—notably in the coal industry, where industry-wide bargaining has made possible industry-wide strikes and shutdowns and stoppages.

The way to prevent labor monopolies is the way we have prevented financial and industrial monopolies—bring the labor unions within the scope of the anti-trust statutes. At present the Norris-Laguardia Act exempts labor from the anti-trust laws. Interpretations of the law, by the courts, have in effect upheld this special privilege granted to one group of our citizens.

The anti-trust laws were passed

for an obvious reason—to protect the public against monopolistic combinations. In more recent years, the unions have sought and have obtained a clear monopoly in their field. The rest of us are at their mercy.

Neither labor nor management should be penalized or favored. This nation cannot permit monopoly of any kind. The unions must be made subject to the same laws which govern industry.

#### MORE MEAT IS COMING

Meat doesn't go through the packing houses in a constant unrelenting stream. Unlike manufactured goods, the production of livestock is governed by certain natural laws. During the summer, supplies are ordinarily less plentiful than in other seasons and fewer animals are marketed by farmers and ranchers. The decline in a supply and demand market, is reflected in higher prices paid for livestock and in an increase in some wholesale meat prices. This summer, however, prices generally are well below the peaks that were reached last year.

The future outlook for meat, according to the American Meat Institute, is excellent. Supplies

during the last quarter of 1949 are expected to run 15 per cent above the summer level. And next year, it is forecast, about 1,000,000 more pounds of meat will be available than in 1948 will give the average consumer 150 pounds of meat against 146 this year.

**Radioactive Tracers  
 Used In Study Of  
 Corrosion Of Metals**

AUSTIN—Radioactive tracers are now being used in University of Texas research on corrosion.

The technique is part of the research of Dr. Norman Hackerman, director of the University's Corrosion Research Laboratory. Stearic acid containing radioactive carbon is being applied to steel surfaces so disposition of the acid molecules on the steel may be traced by Geiger counter.

Corrosion costs the oil and gas industry millions of dollars annually. University scientists have been determining what actually happens during the corrosion

process and are now concerned with the manner in which metals corrode.

Because exposed metal presents a highly diversified surface, metal corrodes in different ways at different points, Dr. Hackerman explains. "For this reason our research is largely a study of the surface of metals," he says. He and his assistants are trying to discover active spots on surfaces and hope radioactive tracers will help show them the way.

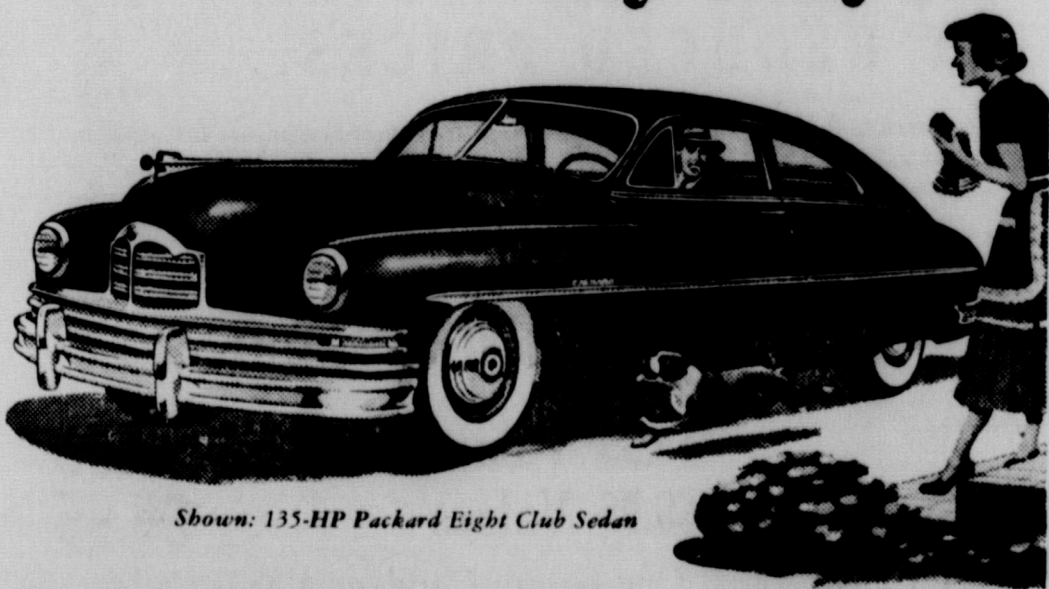

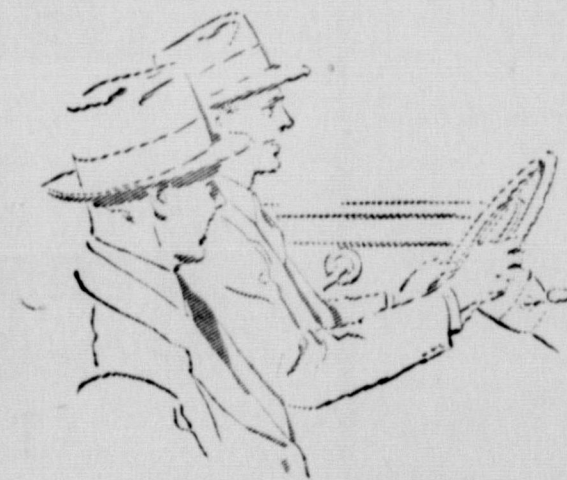

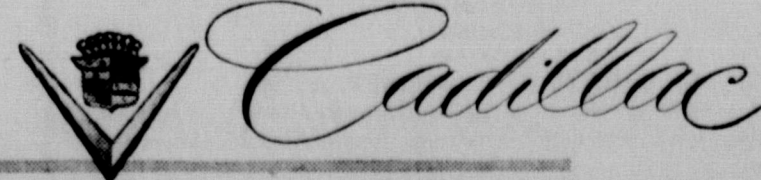

A "LITTLE BIT OF SOCIALISM"

There is a saying to the effect that "a little bit of socialism" is a good thing for a country—that it puts free enterprise on its toes and keeps it humping.

However, having a "little bit of socialism" is much like having "a little touch of leprosy." It always grows and feeds upon itself.

And in time it consumes everything that stands in its way.

As an example, on June 8 the New York World-Telegram carried a revealing news story. It said that "Britain's Labor Government served notice that if it wins next year's parliamentary elections it will transform the United Kingdom into a collectivist state as soon as possible." It will de-

mand and undoubtedly enact a law giving the government permanent authority to impose rationing and other such controls. It has marked at least six more major industries for socialization, including sugar refining, meat wholesaling, cement making, and various forms of insurance. A high labor spokesman warned that "people must be ready to change their jobs and managements to change their lines of production if the need arises." He said further that private industry must watch its step.

The meaning and intent of all this is certainly clear. If the labor party wins, "a little bit of socialism" will be made all inclusive, and a total, regimented economy established by the government. All the principal instruments of production and employment will become possessions of the state. Labor will be a tool of the state, to be used in whatever way the bosses think best.

It is only a step from this to the police state that exists behind the iron curtain. When you have a dictated economy, you eventually have a dictator and lost liberty. Powerful political forces in the United States want us to go the way of Britain, and are using every subterfuge to sell us on a similar program, before the people are aware of the danger.

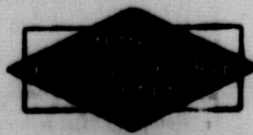

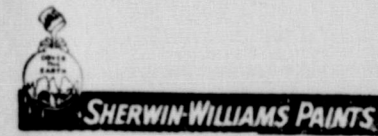

**Mrs. McIntosh Takes Special Educational Course At A&M**

Mrs. Jack McIntosh of Ozona, who is enrolled in an educational course at A&M College, went with her class on an educational tour to Austin Wednesday.

The class was officially welcomed and recognized by the State Senate. After visiting the Woodridge and Rosedale schools, the group spent some time in the publication department of the Steck Company.

Education 433-434 is a course taught at A&M College by Mrs. Cornelia Brown Sloop. It utilizes

a comprehensive method of phonetics in developing and improving ability in reading, speech and spelling. Although the course is designed primarily for primary and intermediate teachers, it is equally adaptable for higher grade levels. Mrs. Sloop, a first grade teacher in the A&M Consolidated School in College Station, Texas, has developed this method and has written "The Home Life Series of Readers" which inculcate this method.

Such is the popularity of the course that each year it has attracted more and more teachers from all sections of the country. This summer 22 different towns in Texas, and three other states are represented in the course, which is in the nature of a workshop course involving both observation and participation on the part of the personnel enrolled.

**Sanitation Urged In Fly Control Program**

COLLEGE STATION—Sanitation is the number one item in a successful fly control program. Insecticidal treatment is of little or no value unless a thorough job of cleaning up all fly breeding places is done, says James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A&M College.

It is a known fact, adds Deer, that flies carry the germs of many diseases and with the increasing amount of polio in the state it is more important than ever to get rid of the flies and other insects that may be carriers of the disease.

Deer says, if DDT is not giving good results, try a 2 per cent chlordane household spray. It should get the flies as well as other insects that are bothersome in and around the house.

Premises should be kept clean at all times. Keep garbage in covered containers and keep the lids on these containers. Clean up and destroy breeding places around the house and don't expect the insecticides to do the entire job. They'll help, says Deer, but there is nothing that can be substituted for cleanliness, but he concludes, if you mix the two together in liberal proportions and use them, you can keep flies under control. One treatment is not enough and

if complete control is to be maintained, constant watch must be kept to see that the flies are kept in their place and the only good fly is a dead fly.

### By Swing ST FARM MARKETS

Steady to higher livestock prices were declines on cotton, some many fruits and ve-

tables during the past week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Wheat advanced 10 cents a bushel since last Tuesday, as barley gained 7 to 8 cents, and white corn 1/2 to 5/2 cents. Cotton declined 25 cents to \$1.50 a bale for the week.

Sheep and lambs sold unchanged

to a little higher than a week ago. Greatest gain was at San Antonio, where goats also sold steady to strong for the week. Wool and mohair trading was slow in the southwest.

Hogs found active demand at southwest markets Monday. Prices averaged 50 cents to \$1 higher than a week before at Denver and San Antonio, and unchanged to slightly higher at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City.

Cattle trade was slow at Fort Worth Monday. Slow to moderately active at Denver and San Antonio, and active at Houston. Prices were unchanged to slightly higher than a week earlier. Good fed yearlings brought \$23 to \$25 at Fort Worth.

Livestock receipts last week fell moderately below those of a week before at southwest markets on all classes of livestock. Twelve-market total of cattle receipts showed the only important increase over the same week last year.

Dressed pork advanced \$3 to \$5 a hundred at New York for the week. Veal, calf and lamb sold unchanged to \$4 higher, and beef and mutton changed little.

### Statewide Educational Campaign For Control Of VD Is Planned

AUSTIN—A statewide educational campaign for the control of venereal diseases, which will be carried out throughout the summer and possibly into the fall, has been announced by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, who states that the public will be reached by means of radio, newspapers, movies, and lectures by health authorities.

"While it is true that great advances have been made recently in the control of these diseases, nevertheless a lack of full information on the part of the public has hindered the complete success of the program," Dr. Cox said.

"There has been a steady decline in the incidence of new cases reported, in infant and adult mortality rates, and in admissions to mental institutions due to syphilis, since 1938 when intensive measures for the control of venereal diseases were initiated. But this decline has not been great enough," Dr. Cox added, "and this is partly attributable to a lack of accurate information and the general apathy concerning venereal diseases which followed the termination of the war."
