## Over 150 Visit New Hospital In First Showing Interested Crowds Pour Into Institution During Open House

Between 150 and 160 Ozonans visited their new hospital on the first floor of the former Methodist church building Wednesday afternoon and almost all of them were in their praise of the beauty of the interior and the convenience and completeness of the facilities. With nearly all of the furniture in place and enough linens, etc., to dress up the beds, the hospital has the appearance of being ready to receive patients after the approval of the Community Council, sponsors of the open house, had completed preparations for the first showing of the new hospital. Approximately \$7,000 worth of linens, serving equipment, kitchen equipment, sterilizing equipment and various other needed items are still short and will be contributed by interested individuals and business firms, the hospital is one of the most complete in the state and will be a real community need once it is completed and open to patients. Although no deal has been made, local doctors have offered to lease the hospital from the county and employ a manager and staff to operate it.

## Resuscitator To Be Delivered In Next Few Days

Delivery is expected within the next few days of a new resuscitator, the gift to the community of the Ozona Lions Club. Order was placed several days ago and the machine was to have been delivered in time for display on the occasion of the Second Annual Auction Sale last Thursday, but was delayed in transit. The resuscitator is the latest machine on the market, combining artificial respiration in cases of suffocation or drowning and administration of oxygen in cases of shock, heart attack or other conditions requiring administration of oxygen. The portable resuscitator will be kept with the Cody Funeral Home Ambulance until the new station is constructed and will be available for use of the community in case of need. Most of the fund which the resuscitator was purchased was secured through sale of tickets on the dance which closed the auction day last Thursday night.

## Crockett 4-H Steer Places 7th. At Dallas Fair

### 4-H Group Returns After 2,500 Mile Trip To KC Royal

Jumbo, a 795 pound Hereford steer exhibited by Jodie Jones, placed seventh in his class at the Dallas State Fair last week, County Agent Bill Bergfeld reported on his return this week. Jones did not sell his steer in the Dallas sale, planning to exhibit Jumbo at some of the major livestock shows in Texas next Spring.

The seven 4-H Club members and their sponsors, Bill Bergfeld and Miller Robison, returned this week after a 2,500 mile trip thru the mid western states to attend the American Royal Livestock Show at Kansas City.

The 4-H delegation left Ozona Tuesday morning at 5:00 o'clock and drove to Oklahoma City for the night. The following morning was spent visiting the Wilson & Company packing houses in Oklahoma City and then on to Stillwater, Oklahoma, where they were taken on a tour of Oklahoma A&M College. Beef cattle, hogs, horses and sheep were observed, including all the new, modern buildings on the campus. Oklahoma A&M boasts some of the finest livestock in the U. S. and their winnings at national shows bears out the claim.

Wednesday night was spent in Wichita, Kansas, and the next morning the group drove to Kansas State College at Manhattan, where they were taken on a tour to observe the livestock. Leaving Manhattan, the travelers passed through Fort Riley, and saw a portion of the huge Army base before driving to Topeka. On the outskirts of Topeka, the Ozonans spent several hours looking over a chinchilla ranch.

Spending Thursday night in Topeka, the group drove to Kansas City Friday morning. Ice skating, visiting the American Royal Livestock and Horse Show and an ice hockey game, were part of the Kansas City sightseeing. The entire party had dinner and saw an ice show at the Hotel Muehlbach as guests of Nathan's Jewelers of San Angelo. They toured Kansas City by trolley, saw President Truman's home at Independence, visited the Ford assembly plant in Kansas City, and the Swift & Co. plant.

Leaving Kansas City at 4:00 p.m. Monday, the party arrived in Dallas at 4:00 a.m. where they were met by most of the parents and Buddy Phillips, who had driven some of the 4-H Club livestock to the fair.

## Ozonan Held In Brutal Slaying Of Aged Woman

### Jose Ramirez Confesses Bludgeoning Of Wisconsin Woman

Jose Ramirez, 23-year-old Ozona veteran and ex-convict, is being held without bail in Tomah, Wisconsin, in connection with the rape and brutal murder of an 82-year-old widowed grandmother in that city last Friday night.

Ramirez, who was convicted here and sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary on a charge of theft of an automobile belonging to Hillery Phillips, and later paroled from the pen, was described as "an itinerant farm worker" and a patient in a veteran's hospital in Tomah in Associated Press reports of the slaying.

Ramirez pleaded guilty to the slaying when arraigned before Police Justice Lawrence Clark who ordered him held without bail on a charge of first degree murder. Victim of the brutal slaying was frail Mrs. Etta Hoag, 82, of Tomah.

District Attorney William J. Gleiss of Tomah announced that it was likely a mental hearing would be ordered for Ramirez.

Gleiss said Ramirez had admitted waylaying Mrs. Hoag as she walked home Friday evening along a windswept, rainy street and dragging her into a private garage. The woman's body, benten badly and stripped of its clothing, was found Saturday in the garage after her purse and hat were discovered in the street. An autopsy, Gleiss said, revealed Mrs. Hoag had been raped.

Ramirez bore scars from a number of gunshot and knife wounds. He was wounded several times in combat during the war in the Pacific and was accidentally shot in the head while a prisoner in the state penitentiary. The wound affected his power of speech and it was after this incident that his release from the penitentiary was effected. He was wounded in a knife fight at a local dance after his return from the penitentiary.

## Gar-Ter Adds Another Producer In Vaughan Field

### Application Filed For 5,000-ft. Test On Shannon Lands

Pumping 53.8 barrels of 27 gravity oil in 24 hours, Gar-Ter Drilling Co. No. 5 Shannon has been completed in the Vaughan field in Crockett County.

Pay was topped at 1,441 feet in drilling to 1,459 feet, with 7-inch casing at 1,395 feet. The section had been acidized with 1,500 gallons. The pumper is 330 feet from the north and west lines of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 5-OP-GC&SF.

Cummins, Berger and Smith has filed application for permit to drill a 5,000-foot cable tool test in the Vaughan field as No. 3-A Shannon estate, 330 feet from the south, 1,015 feet from the east line in the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 5-UV-GC&SF.

M&M Production Co. No. 2-B Bouscaren, Crockett County wildcat, plugged back to 4,710 feet and cemented casing at 4,648 feet. Washing open hole from 4,648 to 4,710 feet with acid and cementing from the Clear Fork was scheduled. The wildcat is 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of section 29-GG-HE&WT.

Other Crockett wildcats, Moore No. 1-65-A Half was drilling at 2,870 feet in sand, Michaux & Kidd No. 1 C. E. Davidson at 8,156 feet in shale; and Humble No. 2 Harvick was preparing to drillstem test to 9,159 feet in lime.

## Lions Second Annual Auction Is Huge Success

### Club Community Fund Enriched \$2,500 By Day's Sales

Another spectacular success was chalked up by the Ozona Lions Club with its second annual auction sale staged last Thursday afternoon at the Crockett County fair grounds.

With Nelson Johnson of San Angelo, auctioneer supreme, at the microphone and a liberal crowd nodding their bids at a fast clip, the afternoon's sale of merchandise and livestock donated by ranchmen and businessmen and individuals enriched the Lions Club's community fund coffers by an approximate \$2,500.

And besides the Lions Club's own receipts, a number of other local institutions profited as liberal donors kicked back their purchases to be resold for the benefit of these institutions and organizations. From such re-donations, the Ozona Methodist Church received \$470; the new Ozona hospital, \$110; the P.T.A., \$95; the 4-H Club, \$50; and the Senior Class and First Baptist Church, \$30 each.

Most active bidder in the afternoon's auction was George Montgomery, Ozona ranchman, whose total purchases amounted to \$450. Joe Pierce was another liberal bidder, buying a total of \$330. Nathan Donsky of Nathan's Jewelers in San Angelo, always a liberal supporter of such events here, made purchases totaling \$315. Other liberal spenders were Wren Jackson of Texon, Buzzy Stokes of Sonora, and San Angelo, Doug Kirby, W. E. Friend, Jr., and many others.

A complete list of donors, buyers, items and price will be found on another page of this issue in which the Lions Club combines its own official report of the sale with a lusty "Thank You" to all who aided in making the event a great success.

Members of the Senior Class provided a tasty barbecue dinner on the dance platform at the noon hour, proceeds from the sale of plates going to the class' fund being built up for its senior trip in the Spring. The High School band furnished a concert to entertain the crowd prior to opening of the festivities in the arena at 1:00 o'clock.

Crowds were entertained before and after the auction sale with some fast roping by Crockett County and visiting cowboys. Featured event of the afternoon was a team matched roping between Vic Montgomery and Tom Powers of Ozona against Jim Espy of Fort Davis and Buddy Neal of Balmorhea.

Each roper roped and tied six calves. Montgomery and Powers turned in a total time of 209.7 seconds to edge out the visiting team by a margin of 18.9 seconds. Powers had the best time on his six calves of 92.9 seconds and also the best individual time of 13.9. The four were presented silver belt buckles by the Lions Club in appreciation for their performance.

Two jackpot ropings were sandwiched into the afternoon's program in addition to the match. Winners in the first event for a purse of \$85 were Kay Black of Ozona, 13.8 seconds; Bill Low of Crane, 14.1 seconds; and Jim Espy, 14.6.

Second jackpot winners for a \$100 purse were Tom Powers, 12.5 seconds; Walt Poage of Rankin, 13.1; and Vic Montgomery and Rex Beck of Valera, tied for third with 13.7 seconds.

Bill Seahorn, Lefty Walker and Charlie Davidson were time keepers and Oscar Kost announcer.

The day's festivities ended with a dance at the James Motor Co. with Snuffy Smith and his Snuff Dippers from San Angelo furnishing the music.

## \$351,564 In Taxes Collected In Crockett To Last Saturday

Taxpayers may earn a 3 percent discount from their total tax bill by paying taxes during the month of October. The discount allowed drops to 2 percent in November and 1 percent in December.

## 6 Inches Rain Falls Here In 3-Day Period

### Draws Flooded As Section Gets Bountiful Fall Soaking

Ozona and a large segment of Crockett County was about the wettest spot in all West Texas the end of last week as bountiful fall rains drenched the area.

Ozona recorded more than six inches of rain the week-end, with a fall registered at nearly four inches Friday night and another two inches Saturday night followed by lighter moisture the balance of the week-end until brisk winds from the north finally blew the clouds away.

Draws were bank-full and some times out of banks over the county and both draws through Ozona were flooded twice, running clear water like mountain streams in the latter stages of the rainy spell.

The rains, general over the county, will add to already generous stores of moisture to assure good winter feed for livestock.

## Conservation Of Soil Subject For Ranchmen Meeting

### Barbecue Supper Nov. 8 To Precede Discussion Of Dist. Plan

Soil conservation and the benefits to be derived from organization of a Soil Conservation District in Crockett County will be the subject for full discussion by SCS leaders from all over the state at a meeting of ranchmen to be held in the social hall of the Ozona Methodist Church Tuesday evening, November 8th.

Under the leadership of a group of interested ranchmen, plans are being perfected for the meeting at which leaders in the Soil Conservation movement will explain details of the district organization and operation. A free barbecue supper for ranchmen and their wives and invited guests at 6:00 o'clock, the discussion to follow.

Paul H. Walser, Soil Conservationist from Temple, Texas; Doolley Dawson, with the Second National Bank of Houston, and Horace Fawcett of Del Rio, a member of the State Soil Conservation Board, are among those who have been invited to be present for the local meeting to explain details of the soil conservation plan.

The meeting is being held for the purpose of determining whether or not ranchmen of this county are interested in forming a soil conservation district. Such districts are already in operation, some as long as ten years and more, in nearly 90 per cent of the state, a strip including Crockett County and extending to the north west being among the few remaining unorganized areas in the state.

In the event sufficient interest is manifested by ranchmen at the meeting in forming a district, application will be made to the State Soil Conservation Board which will order an election in the district. Resident land owners in the district will, by their vote determine whether or not such a district is to be formed and if it is approved, machinery will be set in motion to perfect organization and to elect a board of supervisors to administer district affairs. Soil Conservation Districts are independent local governmental units similar to counties and cities and are entirely democratic in operation, with no authority to force cooperation by ranch or farm operators. Cooperation in soil conserving practices is entirely voluntary on the part of operators, who are privileged to make use of the technical knowledge and, in some cases, the equipment maintained by the district organization to their own benefit, and policies and practices of the district are dictated by the land owners and operators themselves through their elected representatives.

Allocation of first year appropriation from the \$10,000,000 appropriation made by the last legislature for distribution among the various Soil Conservation Districts of the state for the purchase of soil saving equipment is to be made at an early date and Crockett County has made tentative claim on a pro-rata share of this fund.

At a recent meeting of a group of ranchmen with representatives of the State Soil Conservation Board here, the state men were told that there is a possibility of organization of a district here and by this action brought about a tentative allotment from the fund for the proposed new district. In the event the district is organized, it will be in line to receive its share of the state fund, but if organization does not materialize, the fund being held will be distributed among existing districts.
