Postal Receipts To New High Here For Fiscal Year 48-49

Postal receipts climbed to a new high for the fiscal year 1948-49 ending July 1 of this year, according to a report compiled by Postmaster A. O. Fields.

Receipts for the year just ended reached a total of \$16,098.44, compared to last year's record high of \$14,589.71. Receipts have climbed steadily at about the same pace for the past several years, post office records show.

Garlitz-Simon Final Well In Vaughan Field

New Producer Rates 50 Barrels Daily; New Location Staked

Garlitz-Simon of Ozona had completed a producer and staked location in the Vaughan (San Andres) field in Crockett County at the week's close.

No. 3 Barnes flowed 50 barrels of pipeline oil in 24 hours through a three-quarter inch tubing choke. Gas-oil ratio was 1,826-1. Flowing pressure was 80 pounds on the tubing; There was a packer on the casing.

The producer topped the pay at 1,420 feet in drilling to 1,450 feet. Seven-inch casing was cemented at 1,224 feet. The section was acidized with 1,450 gallons. Location is 1,007 from the south, 330 feet east of the east half of the northwest quarter of section 6-UV-GC&SF.

Garlitz-Simon No. 2 Co. 1111's Vaughan, projected to 1,560 feet with cable tools, will be 330 feet from the south and east line of the southwest quarter of the north east quarter of section 6-UV-GC&SF. Elevation is 2,611 feet. Humble No. 2 J. A. Harvick, Crockett County wildcat six miles north of Ozona, was drilling at 3,220 feet in shale.

Body Of Pvt. Arturo Ramirez To Be Returned For Reburial Sunday

The body of Pvt. Arturo Ramirez, who was killed in Normandy shortly after the invasion of Europe by American forces, is to be returned for reburial here.

Pvt. Ramirez, a son of Merced and Agedita Ramirez of Ozona, was killed in action in infantry fighting in France on July 10, 1944 and was buried in a military cemetery near St. Lo. He was 27 years old.

The body is due to arrive in Barnhart Sunday morning with a military escort and will be met there by a Cody Funeral Coach and brought to Ozona for burial. Funeral services have not been definitely set but will be held Monday or Tuesday, depending on arrival of relatives from California.

Surviving the former soldier besides his parents are two brothers, Raymundo Ramirez of San Angelo and Merced Ramirez, Jr., of Bakersfield California; seven sisters, Consuelo Herrera and Delfina Lara of Ozona, Lupe Carasco, Isabel Fuentes, Amalia Vargas, Odilia Vargas and Eloise Carasco, all of San Diego, California.

Robt. F. Levo New Manager Of Ozona Telephone Office

Barnes Transferred To San Angelo After Five Years Here

Robert F. Levo, installer-repairman with the San Angelo Telephone Company at San Angelo, Monday took over the job as manager of the Ozona exchange of the company.

Levo succeeds Marvin Barnes, manager of the Ozona office of the telephone company for the past five years. Barnes was transferred to the San Angelo plant at his own request and will work in the plant department there. During his five years here, Mr. Barnes saw the number of telephone subscribers increase from 440 to approximately 700 at present. There is still some shortage of materials and the company still maintains a waiting list for telephone service. Two new long-distance circuits to San Angelo are now being installed which should improve long-distance service from Ozona.

Mr. Levo, who was secretary of the West Texas Game and Fish Association in San Angelo, came to that city from Ohio. He spent 28 months before the war as administrative clerk, with the rank of Sergeant, at Goodfellow Field in San Angelo. The 28-year-old veteran was married to the former Mary Elizabeth Beck, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Beck of San Angelo. The Levos have two children, Barbara Ellen, 3 and Beverly Sue, age 1.

Joining the San Angelo Telephone Company in January of 1946, Mr. Levo served first as storekeeper and later as installer-repairman. Mrs. Levo served as operator and supervisor of the traffic department for about four years.

Mr. and Mrs. Barnes and their daughter, Linda, left to make their home in San Angelo. A son of W. R. Barnes, manager of the Sonora telephone exchange, Marvin Barnes has been with the company about 14-years. He was formerly manager at Robert Lee.

13-Year-Old Ozona Boy Polio Victim Recovering

Philip Lee Childress Critically Ill, Now Much Improved

Philip Lee Childress, 13, son of Mrs. Philip Lee Childress and the late Mr. Childress of Ozona, is greatly improved in a San Angelo hospital this week where he is under treatment for polio.

The child had been ill for several days last week and was taken to San Angelo last Thursday and the case diagnosed as bulbar type polio. His condition gradually grew worse and for a time attending physicians and nurses held little hope for his recovery. He was placed in an iron lung Sunday and was breathing through a tube inserted in his throat.

Improvement was noted in the child's condition early this week and he regained consciousness. Physicians are now confident that he will recover, but it is too early to determine whether or not his arms, apparently somewhat affected by the disease, will be permanently affected.

Young Childress is the second victim of polio in Ozona this year, the first being a young Latin-American child who made a complete recovery.

First Day For Teacher Meets; Students Report Tuesday

Mohair Market Research Plan Now Assured

Producers Contribute \$10,000 To USDA Promotion Fund.

SAN ANGELO—Mohair producers are now assured of the Market Research project. Ernest Williams, Secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, announced that a check for \$10,000 was mailed last week to the Marketing Research Branch of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This check represented the mohair producers part of the \$30,000 research project. The U. S. D. A. put up the other \$20,000, he said. "The response to this request for funds was very gratifying," Williams stated. "The committeemen appointed to raise this sum were all very busy men, yet they took the necessary time to do a good job."

Colored Ropers Set For Saturday Night Match Here

Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Goat Sacking On Evening Schedule

Under sponsorship of the Ozona Roping Club, an all-colored men's roping program will be held at the lighted fair grounds arena here next Saturday night.

Negro cowboys from the entire area are invited to enter the three events scheduled for the evening. There will be jackpot calf roping, ribbon roping and goat sacking. The goat sacking is described by club officials as an event in which the roper catches the goat and instead of merely tying the goat's feet must stuff the animal into an oat sack and tie the sack for time.

Entrance fees in each of the three events will be \$5.00. Participants will rope for the entrance fees plus half the evening's gate receipts which the Roping Club will donate to be divided into the three division purses. Admission fees for the event will be 75 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

Already two matched ropings have been arranged between negro cowboys of the area. Billy Ward, employed on the C. O. Walker ranch, and Fred Gipson, employed on the Rob Miller ranch, have been matched in a four-calf event. Bob Bowlegs of Ozona will meet Sam Rayburn of Del Rio in another matched affair.

Arrangements have been made to seat all colored spectators and Bob Bowlegs has announced that a barbecue dinner will be served for local and visiting colored folk at "The Flat" Saturday noon.

In last Saturday night's regular roping program, P. C. Perner and Ted Powers teamed up to beat Vic Montgomery and Tom Powers in a four-calf match. Perner and Powers chalked up a total time of 80.8 seconds to 85.8 for Montgomery and Tom Powers.

In another match, Riley Branch of Stiles beat Mac McClanahan of Ozona by 87.8 to 93.9 on four calves.

Tom Powers was the winner of the first jackpot roping in 12.9 seconds, followed by Kay Black with 20.1 and Ted Powers with 24. Black won the second jackpot with 13.7, followed by Tom Powers with 16.5 and Perner with 18.3. E. J. Smith of San Angelo won the third jackpot with a time of 11.9 seconds. Perner was second in 14.9 and Ted Powers third in 15.1.

In a jackpot for non-winners, Charlie Boy Davidson took first place with 15.2, followed by Bill Melton in 19.2 and Riley Branch with 19.6.

The Roping Club is staging roping programs at the lighted arena every Saturday night.

Body Of Sgt. Martin To Be Buried Aug. 8th In Del Rio Cemetery

The body of Sgt. Wayne L. Martin, USAAF, top turret gunner on a B-17 bomber, shot down over Berlin in a raid on the German Air Ministry February 3, 1945, will be laid to final rest in Westlawn Cemetery in Del Rio Monday afternoon, August 8. Funeral services will be held from the Doran Funeral Chapel at 4:00 o'clock.

Sgt. Martin was reported missing in action and declared dead after 12 months. His body was located 18 months later, after the war's end. The burial site was a POW cemetery at Dalgow, Doberitz, two miles west of Spandau, a suburb of Berlin in the Russian sector. The body was removed to a U. S. Military Cemetery in southeastern Belgium.

Sgt. Martin, a former Ozonan, is survived by his mother, Mrs. W. P. Martin, and two sisters, Miss Margery Martin and Mrs. Doris Kessel of Fallbrook, California, the father, J. L. Martin of Sonora, the maternal grand mother, Mrs. J. M. Puckett of San Antonio, and paternal grand mother, Mrs. J. W. Martin of Fallbrook, Calif.

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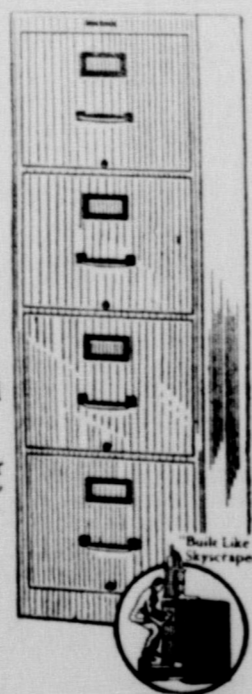

OIL HAS A BIRTHDAY

On August 27, the American oil industry will be 90 years old. On that historic date in 1859 Colonel Edwin L. Drake brought in the nation's first commercial oil well at Titusville, Pennsylvania.

Today oil is one of the basic necessities—practically every American uses it in many forms each day of his life. But matters were very difficult then. Colonel Drake was ridiculed. He was harassed by creditors. He was forced to contrive his own tools and techniques as he went along, on a trial and error basis. But he had a full measure of perseverance and ingenuity—traits which still mark the great industry he founded.

We have demanded oil, for the arts of peace and war, in an ever-increasing flood. We have demanded more products and better products. The industry has never failed. It has built up our proved reserves to an all time high, even as consumption was outrunning all the forecasts. It has devised conservation measures to prevent waste. It has performed miracles in its research laboratories. It has re-invested a large part of its profits to expand and modernize and improve its facilities, so that we can obtain the oil products we want at any time.

All of this has happened in less than a century. When Colonel Drake sank the first well, a new and brilliant chapter in the history of the world was started. We are a long way from the end of it.

LOOK THROUGH THE CAMOUFLAGE

The Senate Appropriations Committee has knocked out a considerable number of items appearing in a bill giving funds to the Interior Department. These items concerned the construction of power plants and transmission lines by the government. The Committee's reason for dropping them was that in every instance they would constitute wasteful and unnecessary duplication which private utilities have already con-

structed or will construct. Witnesses who appeared before the Committee brought their facts with them, and showed how many millions of dollars of the taxpayers' money could be saved.

Whether Congress will go along with the Senate Committee's recommendations remains to be seen. But there is no excuse for wasting huge sums on tax-exempt government power lines the country does not need. The utility has shown its willingness to cooperate with the government time and time again.

For example, in the southwest, a group of power companies has offered to buy all the electricity generated at government dams, at rates to be set by the Federal Power Commission which will amortize the government's investment in 50 years, plus interest and operating costs. The power will be sold to consumers at rates held fair by the regulatory authorities. Large sums in taxes would be paid to all units of the government. And the companies also agree to let the government, under contract, use their transmission systems, thus making the construction of duplicating lines totally unnecessary.

In the words of one observer, "Those who really are in favor of government in the power business, for its own sake, may have to come out for socialized industry." Its time we saw through their camouflage. Those who want to lead us down the collectivist road that has led to destruction of liberty in half of the world ought to be identified.

Check On Old-Age And Survivor Insurance Account, SSA Advises

Checking on your old-age and survivors insurance account is a

good deal like having an account balanced and a good business. This is the San Angelo office of the Security Administration, reminding workers of this service of his agency.

"We urge all workers at intervals on their payrolls," Clark explained, "to be sure of receiving credit for wages they earn. We take precaution to insure the accuracy of our records but facing trouble. Most errors are due to mistakes in name or account number. Failure to show any number times the wrong amount is reported and occasional report at all is made."

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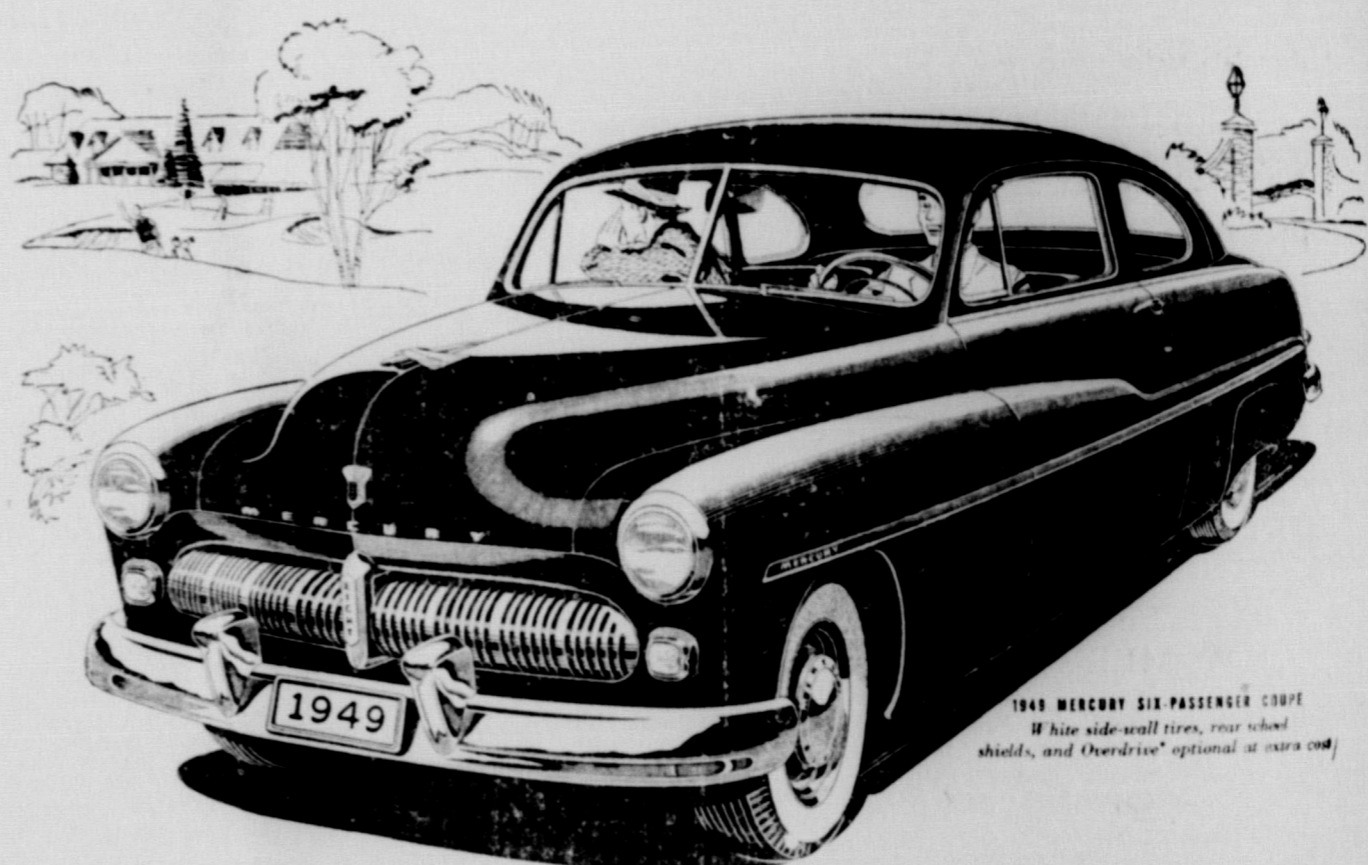

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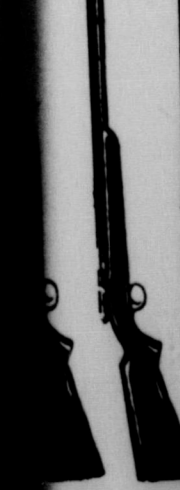

August Top Month In Motor Accidents; Drivers Get Warning

AUSTIN—Pointing out that August of 1948 was the most dangerous of the year for motorists, Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, appealed today for all drivers to exercise extreme caution in their driving this month. During August of 1948, 212 persons lost their lives in Texas traffic accidents surpassing the month of December for the first time. December, Colonel Garrison stated, was normally the month of most traffic fatalities.

Contributing factors toward August's high death rate, according to Garrison, is the fact that this month is a period of many vacation trips during which numerous people travel unfamiliar roads and devote too much attention to scenery rather than their driving; too, August heat results in fatigue and induces drowsiness thus making this month the highest in vehicle-with-vehicle accidents.

The Texas Department of Public Safety has set as its goal less than 1,949 traffic deaths in 1949. If not more than 162 persons are killed this month it will mean a saving in human lives of 50 over the same period last year and this, alone, would effect a 2 1/2% reduction for the entire year.

20 Texas Tumor Clinics Aid Cancer Control

DALLAS—Where would your doctor send you for a diagnosis, if he suspected that you had cancer?

"That is a question that few Texans can answer," Dr. William F. Mengert of Dallas, Chairman of the Committee on Projects and Allocation of Funds of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, pointed out today, while discussing cancer control facilities in the State.

"Few Texans realize the great strides toward a control of cancer which have been achieved in Texas in just a few short years," Dr. Mengert continued. "Four organizations are devoting almost constant effort to improve cancer diagnostic and treatment facilities in the state, and their results have been very noteworthy. They have sponsored and assisted the establishment of 20 tumor clinics. It is one of these tumor clinics that your doctor would send you for a diagnosis and treatment. These four organizations are also conducting a cancer educational program to warn Texans that cancer can be cured, if caught in time."

Dr. Mengert listed the four organizations as the American Cancer Society, Texas Division; the Cancer Committee of the State Medical Association of Texas; the State Board of Health; and M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research.

Pre-School Health Check Of Children Urged By Health Dept.

AUSTIN—The month of September brings a return of school days, and thousands of Texas boys and girls will be returning to classrooms for the next nine months. Every one of these children, according to Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, should be as free as possible from all physical defects that can be corrected, and protected against other diseases which frequently spread through classrooms.

A complete medical and dental pre-school check-up is of the utmost importance in getting the child ready for school. Eyes, ears, nose, throat and teeth should be carefully examined, and all remed-

iable defects corrected or placed under treatment. Such defects can lead to serious impairment of growth and progress academically socially and emotionally.

Defects of hearing and vision handicap a child in his class work, and often result in the false impression that he is backward and unable to learn. Such defects can often be corrected, and the child is not only more progressive in his school work, but is a happier, better balanced individual as a result of being more socially acceptable.

"In addition to correcting such defects as already exist, young children should be protected by immunization against disease, when possible," Dr. Cox said. "Immunization is safe and dependable, and every child is entitled to this protection against disease."

Swing Farm Markets

Lower prices for most fruits and vegetables caught strong markets for farm products during week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production Administration reported.

Lamb closed the week at mostly 50 cents medium to choice spring from \$20 to \$23.50 and Oklahoma markets \$25 at Denver Monday advanced 50 cents at 50 cents to \$1.25.

Medium weight butts mainly from \$21.75 in Texas and Oklahoma, to \$24 at Denver. Sows \$7.50 and down at Texas.

Most cattle showed gains for the week ranging from 25 cents to around \$2, but cows lost similar amounts at San Antonio, and bulls recorded general declines. Canner and cutter cows brought \$11.50 to \$14.50 Monday at Houston, \$10 to \$13 at San Antonio, \$10 to \$13.50 at Fort Worth, and \$12 to \$14 at Denver.

Less cattle arrived at Texas and Oklahoma markets last week than the week before, but other livestock numbers changed little in the southwest and midwest.

Pork lost \$2 to \$6 for the week as other dressed meat sold weak to lower.

Wool trade was quiet, but Texas reported scattered sales of 12-month wools around \$1.55 to \$1.60 clean basis. Mohair remained nominally 38 and 53 cents.

High protein feeds continued to rise in price this week, as most other feeds showed little change. Stronger alfalfa hay markets contrasted with sagging prairie hay values. First harvesting of early-planted peanuts began in south Texas.

Texas Livestock Shipments Decline

AUSTIN—Shipments of livestock in Texas dropped 29 per cent from May to 5,341 carloads in June, a 40 per cent fall from June 1948, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

All classes of livestock contributed to the general down turn in both comparisons. Sheep shipments dropped 48 per cent from May; cattle, 25 per cent; hogs, 14 per cent; and calves, 12 per cent.

Junction C of C Urges Towns On 290 Erect Signs At Intersections

Dr. H. E. Wright, manager of the Junction Chamber of Commerce, has taken the lead to redirect traffic over U. S. Highway 290, diverted in a large part the past two years because of construction work under way on the highway between Junction and Kerrville and between Junction and Sonora.

In a letter directed to Chambers of Commerce in the interested towns along the route, Dr. Wright suggests a co-operative undertaking to erect signs at the main intersections with other highways directing traffic over this scenic route, now that work has been completed on the section between Junction and Kerrville and nearly complete from Junction west toward Sonora.

"We would like to have your opinion upon the feasibility of the several towns along this scenic highway joining together and placing a sign or signs at the main intersections of the other highways, directing the traffic over this beautiful route, as much of

this traffic has been sent over other roads due to constructions," Dr. Wright wrote.

"We would also suggest that upon completion of this work that each Chamber of Commerce put forth special effort to obtain all publicity possible, notifying the public that this route is completed. If we can work out some such plan, it is suggested that each city along the route share the cost and maintenance, figured upon a per capita basis."

Senate Joint Resolution No. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in

accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

House Joint Resolution No. 5

Proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month."

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Section 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year."

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session."

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Section 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January 1st, A.D., 1950.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law."

Section 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

House Joint Resolution No. 36

Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tues-

day in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

House Joint Resolution No. 38

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51-f of Article III.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51-f of Article III."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Section 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Section 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much hereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

House Joint Resolution No. 22

Proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary."

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding."

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary."

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding."

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

House Joint Resolution No. 32

Proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact the law necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A.D., 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases;" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his

vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

House Joint Resolution No. 15

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof;" and

"Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published

as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

House Joint Resolution No. 12

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people in said counties, but any system so authorized established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said counties. Any Civil Service system established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices heretofore provided for in Section 30 of this Article, but not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five (75,000) people."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein;" and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Texas Farm Cash Income Continues Uptrend In June

AUSTIN—Texas farm cash income in June continued its upward trend for the fourth consecutive month, according to estimates of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research placed June income of farmers at \$133,436,000, a 1.5 per cent climb over the previous month and a 1 per cent gain over June 1948.

The rise in farm cash income can be largely attributed to increased marketings since prices received by farmers have risen substantially below their earlier levels. The index of prices received on June 15, 1949 was 100 (August 1909—July 1948) compared with 256 for May 1949 and 295 for June 15, 1948.

Texas farmers received \$88,000 in June from sale of wheat, June as compared to \$88,000 a year earlier.

Holiday Accident Predictions Prove Tragically Accurate

AUSTIN—N. K. Woerner, Chief of the Statistical Bureau of the Texas Department of Public Safety, and his staff, recently came up with a prediction concerning motor vehicle traffic deaths over the past July 4th holiday week-end and though they proved to be almost 100% correct no one is particularly happy over the whole thing, according to Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Public Safety Department.

Prior to the Independence Day week-end Mr. Woerner's bureau predicted that 27 persons would be killed in traffic accidents in Texas on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th of July. Moreover, they went out on a limb to say that 22 of the deaths would occur in rural sections and 5 would be on city streets. The total count for the State over that period was 28 deaths, 24 of which were rural and 4 urban. Had but one driver entered a city limits before becoming involved in a fatal accident, Mr. Woerner's figures would have missed the exact picture in the over-all total by one death.

The records indicate that the DPS Statistical Bureau is consistently as accurate in predicting traffic fatalities but Mr. Woerner alleges that he would be happy to sacrifice accuracy if the public wishes to prove him wrong by holding the death rate far below his estimates.

Texas USO Campaign Seeks \$500,000 For Service Organization

DALLAS—The growing USO program has advanced to the point that 170 clubs, lounges and other centers in the United States and overseas daily are serving an average of 72,500 members of our peacetime armed forces, T. E. Braniff, campaign chairman for the USO in Texas, reported today.

The reactivated USO observed its first anniversary July 28, turning in a total of nearly 25,000,000 individual services during the 12-months—a figure equivalent to 15 benefits for each of the 1,600,000 American men and women in the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Mr. Braniff emphasized the importance of this program to Texas which has more than 98,000 men and women in service, more than half of whom are still in their teens.

"If Texas can send 98,000 of its finest young people to serve in the nation's peacetime defense establishment, I don't think there can be any question about our raising our USO quota of \$500,000 to back them up," Mr. Braniff said. "Many of these young people daily are returning to civilian life as others are inducted into service, and we want every one of them to return to us as alert and useful citizens. We can assure that by letting them know through the USO that the folks at home are back of them."

Mr. Braniff reported that thru USO funds in the past twelve-months more than 100,000 servicemen in Army, Navy and Veteran Hospitals have been regularly supplied with music and "live" entertainment by some of the top professional entertainers of the country.

The USO is providing long-term

and temporary housing facilities in overcrowded areas near military establishments at the rate of 2,500 persons per day.

It also provides a wide variety of other services ranging from

storage lockers to game rooms and gymnasiums.

The USO has been recalled to service by the President and has the complete backing of the government.

James Rollie Cunningham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard M. Cunningham of Ozona, has enlisted in the naval service for three years and will receive his recruit training at the NTC, San Diego, Cal.



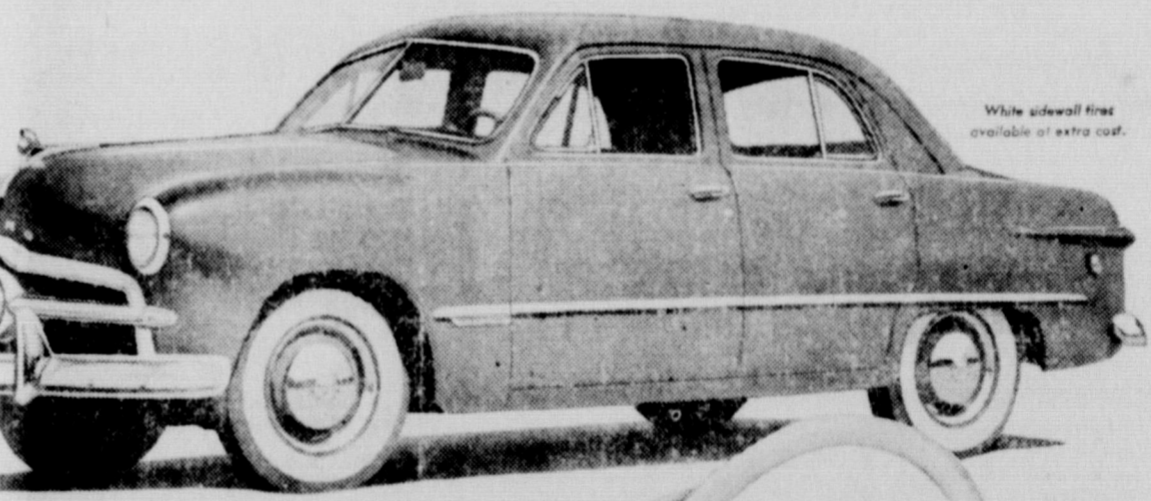
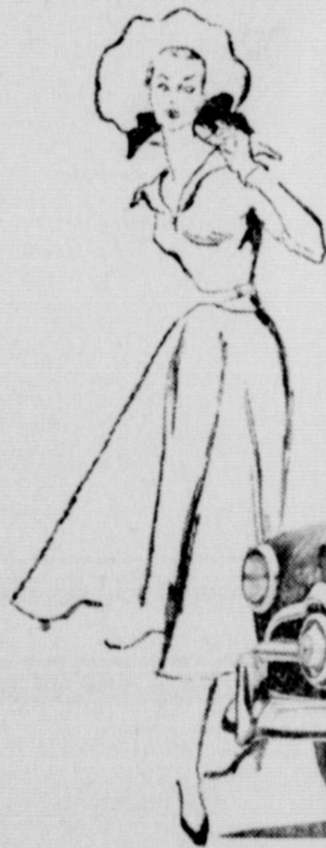

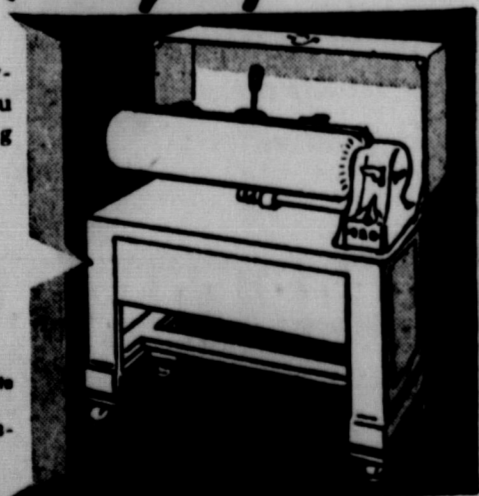

The market research project will be carried out by the Ralph E. Burgess Services, Inc., New York City. 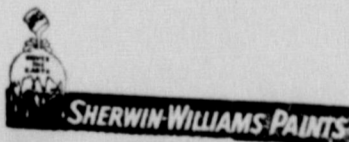

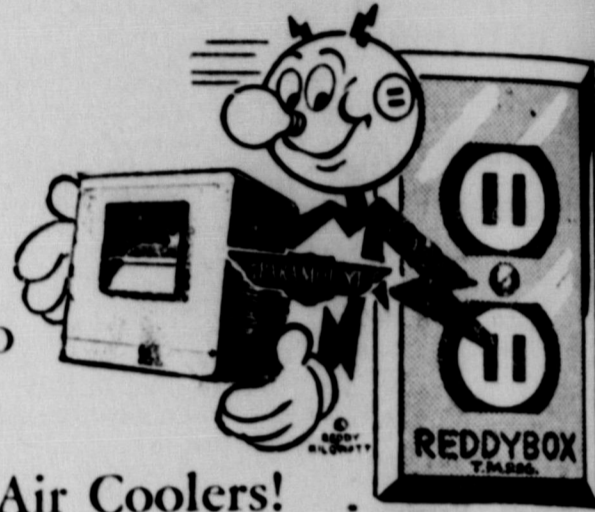

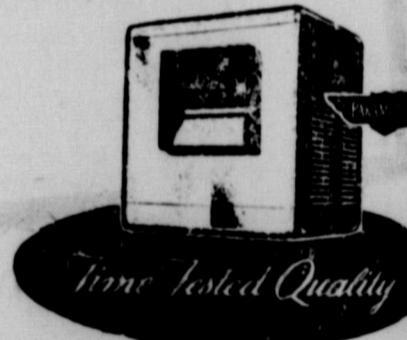
