LOOPHOLES in the Law

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short case histories, all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas.)

Joe was a small town tough. He had the reputation of being mean—and when he got drunk, which was often, he was meaner than ever.

He was both drunk and mean one day at high noon. He staggered down Main Street in his home town, shouting and shooting a pistol into the air. He was arrested and charged with unlawfully carrying a pistol.

The charge read, in part, as follows: "... that Joe — on or about the 4th day of October, 1939, in the County of Harrison, the State of Texas, did then and there unlawfully, on or about his person, carry a pistol."

Joe was brought to trial, but then the charge was dropped and he was released.

The reason for this action was that the word "and" should have been used instead of the word "or" in the sentence about "did then and there, on or about his person, carry a pistol." Joe could not be convicted on the charge because the court ruled that the charge should have read, "did then and there, on AND about his per-

son, carry a pistol." Technicalities like that one often defeat justice. The State Bar is working for the elimination of such technicalities by seeking to bring about revision of Texas' criminal statutes.

Farmers-Ranchers To Name New ACA Committees In Nov.

Texas farmers and ranchers will have the opportunity to reaffirm their faith in the democratic farmer-committee system for local administration of Federal farm programs when they go to the polls during November to choose the fellow farmers and ranchers who will represent them as county Production and Marketing Administration committeemen during the coming year.

In announcing the elections, the State PMA Committee points out that these non-partisan committees are the local administrative units for such Federal farm programs as Agricultural Conservation, price supports, acreage allotments, marketing quotas, the sugar program and Federal Insurance.

"As representatives of their farmer-neighbors, they see to it that national and State programs are adapted to local conditions and provide the 'grass-roots' experience and thinking necessary for

the intelligent formulation of new programs that changing conditions may require," says B. F. Vance, Chairman of the State PMA Committee.

The State PMA Committee has designated the period from November 1 to November 23 for the holding of elections in the State's 1,505 agricultural communities. County conventions—at which the new county PMA Committeemen will be chosen—are to be completed by November 30. Actual dates of the county election will be determined by the present county committee.

Eligible voters in each agricultural county will choose from among their neighbors a county committee consisting of three regular and two alternate members, Vance explains.

An eligible voter, according to Vance, is any owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper on a farm which is participating in any program administered through the County Agricultural Conservation Association during 1949. These include the Agricultural Conservation Program, the Sugar Program, Crop Insurance.

Weekly Swings
SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS
PRODUCTION AND MARKETING ADMINISTRATION U.S.D.A.

(USDA)—Higher prices for some farm products about balanced lower trends on others at southwest markets during the past week, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Wheat, yellow corn and sorghams declined 3 to 4 cents, as Texas white corn advanced 2 cent.

Mohair prices rose 2 cents a pound for the week, and ran 9 to 12 cents above a year ago. Texas

sales averaged 47 cents a pound for adult and 67 for kid. Wool prices held firm. Good French combing 12-months Texas wool sold at \$1.40 at Boston.

Slaughter lambs were unchanged to a little lower for the week at most markets, and ewes and feeder lambs steady to a little higher. Cull to medium ewes ranged from \$7.50 to \$9.50. Mature goats sold a little higher, and kids about unchanged.

Slaughter hogs lost around \$1 on all classes at all markets. Feeder pigs fell \$1 at San Antonio but held steady elsewhere.

Week's trends on cattle and calves varied unevenly from \$1

lower to \$1 higher, with most changes within 50 cents up or down. Good and choice killing calves sold \$1 lower at Fort Worth and \$1 higher at Oklahoma City.

Except for sheep, last week's livestock receipts came close to the week before despite heavy rains in the southwest early in the week.

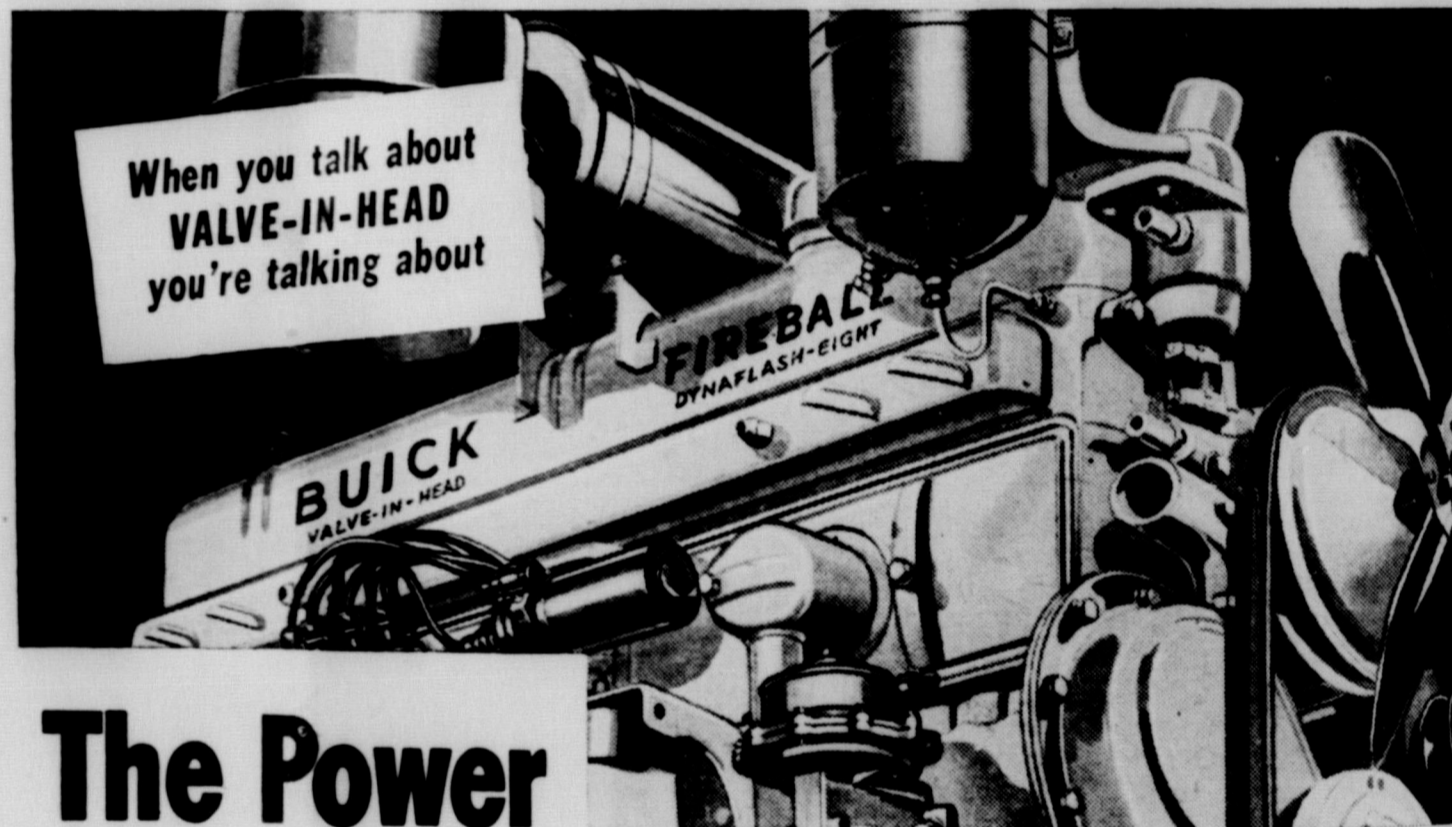

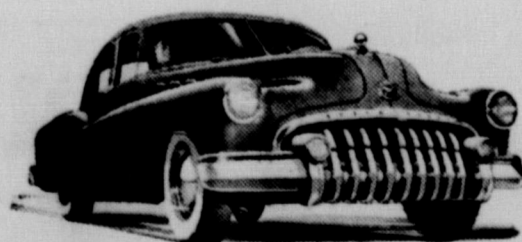

(Continued from Page One) ranch equipment to put the ranch in full operation and open to its capacity of boys.

The ranch now is in actual operation, with one boy, a victim of parental discord and neglect, under the care of the ranch foreman and his wife. Livestock, including a few head of cattle and sheep, are already on the ranch, and a feed crop, consisting of several thousand bundles of feed and some 2,000 bushels of oats, all produced on the farm land in the ranch, are in storage to feed the stock. The farm land has been planted to oats and a good stand has developed, Mr. Mayer reported to the local group.

The executive committee plans to admit at least six additional boys within the near future under the present set-up, and as soon as the indebtedness is retired and funds are available for expansion, it will be opened to all eligible boys in the area. At present, there is only the ranch home, occupied by the foreman and his family, but a barracks building has been purchased and will be moved to the site and furnished for occupancy by the boys as soon as funds are available.

The ranch has a truck and trailer which will be sent to pick up livestock offered as gifts to the ranch and such gifts are solicited as a start toward making the ranch ultimately self sustaining.

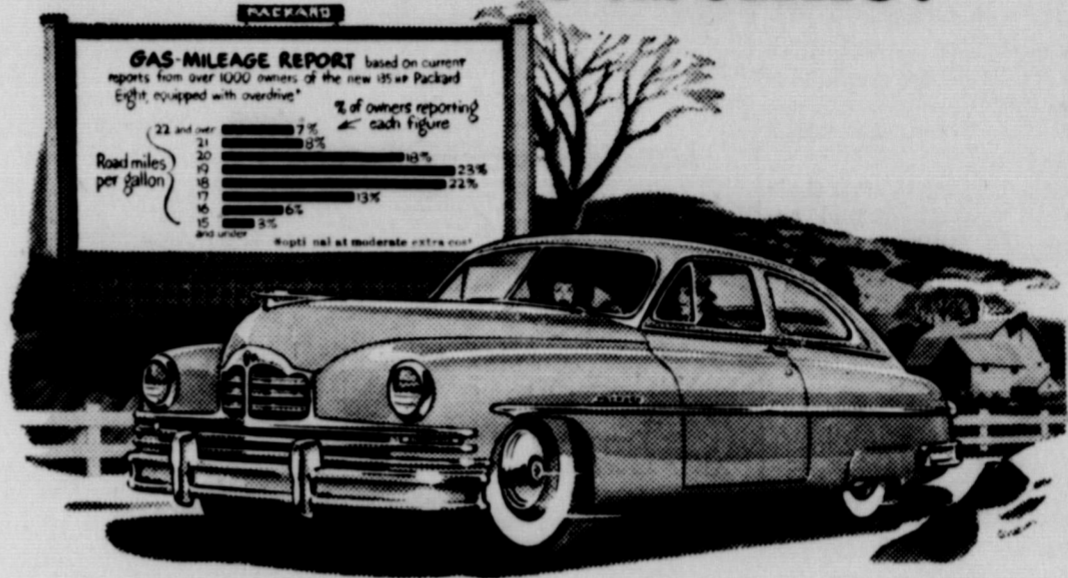

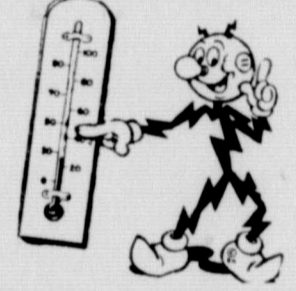

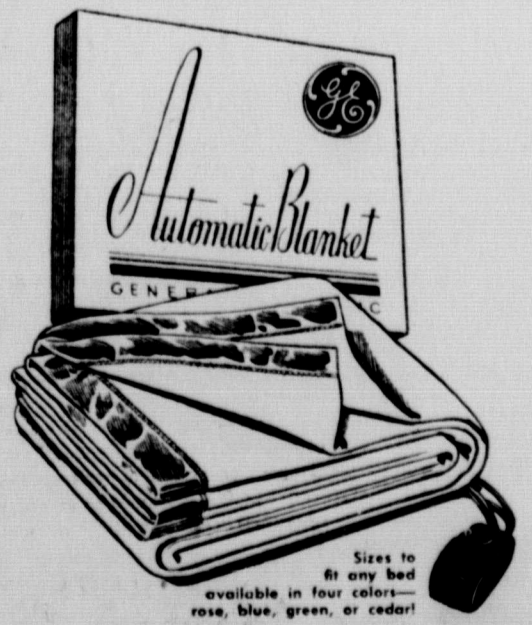
