Pair Found Dead In **Closed Car 20 Miles** North Of Ozona

Two men were found dead in a tightly closed car parked beside the Ozona-Barnhart Hi-way about 20 miles north of Ozona shortly after noon Tuesday.

The dead men were identified Angelo, and Ferris E. James, 37,

who made his home with a cousin on Ben Ficklin Road, San Angelo,

The men had been dead an estimated ten to fourteen hours when their bodies were discovered by a passing motorist, oil field employee, who passed the parked car for the second time during the day, stopping the last time to investigate.

Sherrif V. O. Earnest, Deputy Hearst Laws, Justice of the Peace Bill Johnigan and Fire Chief Bill Cooper investigated the deaths.
