**British Writer Mis-Informs Readers With All-Time Low In Garbled Re-hash Of Post Article Under Guise Of A Personal Visit**

Whether its the famous brand of British humor, or lack of it, or a serious attempt on the part of a columnist for the London Daily Express to hoodwink his readers, is difficult to determine, but the complete absurdity of a garbled rehash of the recent Saturday Evening Post article on Ozona appearing in the British newspaper, a clipping of which has been received here, doubtless will generate a hearty West Texas guffaw.

The clipping, from the Glasgow edition of the Express, was sent to Joe Davidson along with a letter from a young man in Glasgow who asked Mr. Davidson for "any kind of work to get me out of this non-progressive environment."

If the article, "C. V. R. Thompson on Tour," and titled "The Millionaires in Cowboy Dungarees," was an attempt on the part of the British Socialist government to ridicule free enterprise America and make Britons better satisfied with their own lot, the attempt evidently fell flat, judging by the letter writer's statement.

The columnist's article was illustrated by a thumbnail map of the United States, with Texas

drawn in heavy lines, the Texas cities of Fort Worth and Dallas located and Ozona in big heavy type, with its fairly accurate location pointed to by an arrow.

Under dateline "OZONA, Texas, Monday," the writer professes to be paying a visit to Ozona, but the material he uses follows too closely to that of the Post article, although badly garbled, to be anything but a rehash of that article. Anyway, for a good West Texas belly laugh, here's the British version:

"OZONA (Texas), Monday. — Lamb chops here are up to around 88. 6d. a lb., and a good joint costs from L2 to L3. ('L' substituted for British pound symbol). The trouble is that men don't want to be shepherds any more. So they are producing fewer sheep today for 150 million Americans than they did when there were 50 million.

But there are plenty of shepherds—mostly Mexicans and Negroes—in Western Texas. Thus they still raise plenty of sheep there.

"And the national scramble for chops and legs of lamb has produced in Ozona, the strangest town I have ever seen.

"In Ozona there are 142 acres of land. And every family in town except one is headed by a dollar millionaire.

"What made me stop at Ozona as I came upon it on my way to an oil boom town, was the trees. In these parts they say the only way to get shade is to crawl under your wagon. Yet, Millionaires' Town, the biggest little town in the world, as it calls itself—is as shady as a Kentish village.

"I found that those trees, pride and joy of the citizens, cost them many dollars and much effort.

"Before they planted them, they had to blast holes in the rock. Every spring they have to haul in new soil to keep the trees alive. And every day they have to water them.

"The citizens of Ozona are mostly of Scottish descent. Typical family names: The Hendersons, the Kincaids, the Montgomerys, the Davidsons, the Massies, the Pierces and the Baggetts.

"Those who do not live in Ozona call them a bunch of snobs. They resent their fine homes, all air conditioned against the insufferable summer heat, all thickly carpeted, all furnished with antiques, mostly from Britain. These outsiders say that a true Texan should live off beans and sowbells instead of caviar.

"But what amazed me about the people of Millionaires' Town, for all their obvious satisfaction with their way of life, was their lack of airs. Only two men in town wear lounge suits—the judge and their banker.

"Except when their wives drag

them to a dance or to a performance of the opera 200 miles away in Dallas, the men wear the cowboy's uniform of dungarees, a rough shirt, a dust-caked ten-gallon hat, and stirrup-rubbed high heel boots.

"In the first flush of success, they named the street where they built their mansions, "Silk-Stocking Street." But one of them told me they decided that that was "putting on the dog." Today, it is known as Broadway.

"The women in Ozona are even more remarkable. They have so much money to spend that in San Angelo, the nearest shopping center, the stores put aside all the most expensive items until they have had their pick.

"For the afternoon bunfights the millionaires' wives dress themselves up in clothes and jewelry that would be just right for the most fashionable first night of the West End season.

But Mrs. John Henderson still keeps her hand in doing odd jobs on the ranch. And Mrs. Max Schneemann still goes to work in the sheep pens at lambing time.

And young Mrs. Ted Montgomery is a champion rodeo rider and the world's champion milker of wild cows.

"Every family but one in Ozona is, as I said, headed by a millionaire. The one which isn't, is the family headed by a widow, Mrs. Madge Bailey.

"And she runs the town's only industry.

"To make both ends meet, Mrs. Bailey began a few years ago to cut up the discarded evening dresses of some of her friends and fashion them into women's slippers.

"First she sold them in Ozona. Then a shop in San Angelo sent her some orders. Then shops further afield found out about them.

"And today, Mrs. Bailey has a factory with 17 employees, turning out the slippers for a nationwide market. She is nowhere near becoming a millionairess, but she is doing alright.

"Millionaires' Town is such a nice town that I shall not get so angry next time I have to pay 88. 6d. a lb. for lamb chops."

**Soil Conservation Heads And Business Men To Hold Dinners**

LEAGUE CITY — Plans for several hundred farmer-business man dinners to be held all over Texas Tuesday night, May 16 were announced Thursday by Waters S. Davis, Jr., president of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors.

There are 156 Soil Conservation districts, each divided into five sub-districts, covering about 90 per cent of Texas and with whom 65,000 farmers and ranchers are already cooperating. The local Chambers of Commerce are cooperating in helping stage the dinners over the state.

These dinners, to be called District Cooperator-Businessman dinners, will be held simultaneously with a Houston dinner, sponsored by the Houston Farm & Ranch club and co-sponsored by member banks of the Houston Clearing House, the Houston Press, Friends of the Land, and various other groups, including the Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors.

The Houston dinner will include a statewide broadcast as part of a special program to be announced later. Awards, as part of a statewide program in which over \$13,000 will be distributed, will be given to the champion farmer or rancher of Texas, the outstanding soil conservation district, the Texas businessman who has made the greatest contribution to soil conservation work during 1949.

Senator Clinton Anderson of New Mexico, former secretary of agriculture, and other agricultural business leaders will participate in the Houston dinner expected to be attended by 700 farmers and businessmen.

"The reason for these soil conservation district supervisor dinners is to get the businessmen to understand that the soil conservation districts are efficiently working for the good of the entire community," Davis said. "Essentially our district work is much the same as that of the manufacturer who improves his plant facilities with modern tools. We are rebuilding and maintaining the efficiency of our soil, the farmer's factory, to

turn out a better product for the consumer and reduce the production cost."

**United States Leads Phone Development**

There were approximately 6,000,000 telephones in the world in 1949, according to the new World of Telephone Statistics of World. Of the more than 2,000,000 telephones added in 1949, nine per cent were gained in America. The United States, with over 40,000,000 telephones, nearly three-fifths of the total, had approximately 23.1 phones per 100 population.

Sweden was second in telephone development, with 22.1 telephones per 100 people, and Canada with 18.8 instruments for each person. The world, as a whole, has 2.8 telephones per 100 population. There were 63 telephones here during the past 12 months, an increase of 9.2 per cent over the previous year, according to F. Levo, manager of the local exchange.

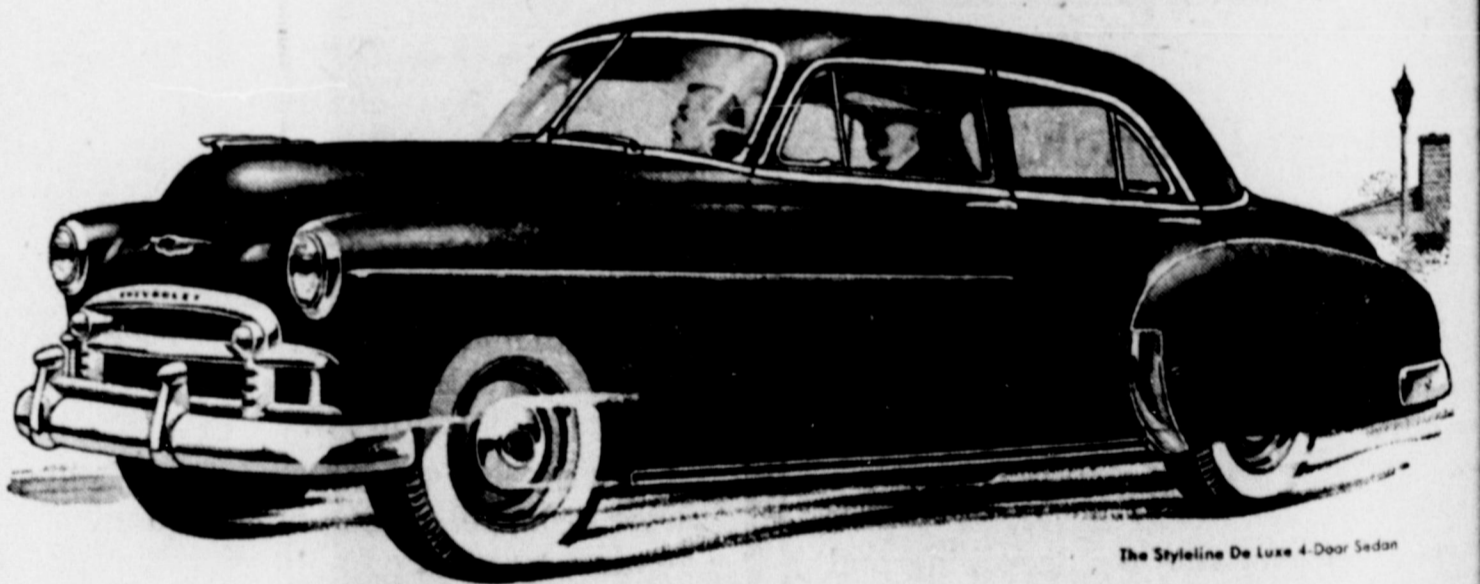

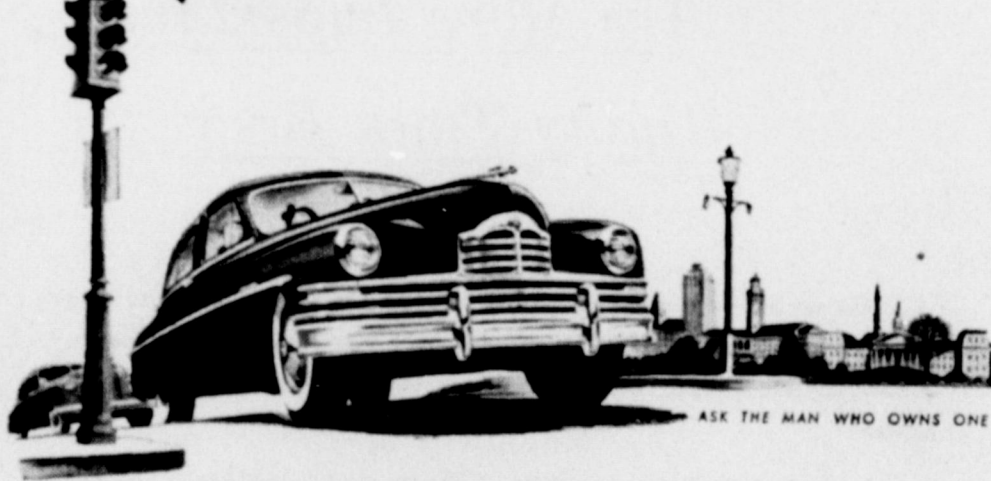
