Ozona Sector Gets Inch and Half of Moisture

A timely and most welcome rain drenched a wide sector of the West Texas ranch country last night, giving added impetus to already growing grass and other range vegetation, started by recent rains. A deluge which brought an inch and a half of rain in less than an hour struck Ozona in the early night, following on the heels of high wind from the west which kicked up a pelting dust storm for a few minutes before the rain hit. After the heavy rain, the fall tapered off and slow rain continued until around 2 o'clock.

886 Scholastics In County Shows Gain Of 110

Largest Gain Shown In Elementary Grades

Completion of the 1950 scholastic census of Crockett county was announced this week by Supt. Jack McIntosh of the Ozona Public Schools.

A total of 886 children of school age were counted, an increase this year of 110 over last year's total of 776, Mr. McIntosh said.

The heaviest growth in scholastic population is in the elementary grades, the superintendent pointed out. Already the newly constructed Elementary School is pressed for classroom space, the superintendent said, and the enlarged South Elementary faces the same situation.

The scholastic census was taken by A. J. Deans, teacher in the South Elementary school.

The enlarged scholastic count will mean more than \$5,000 additional in state funds to be apportioned to this county next year. The state apportionment is based on the net scholastic census, after checking at the state office, this year's apportionment amounting to \$48 per pupil, a total of \$42,728 for the local schools on the basis of the total reported.

High School Library Wants Old Magazines For Permanent Files

The high school library recently subscribed to the Abridged Readers Guide, which indexes all magazine articles every month in approximately 30 magazines. This is quite an addition to the library as periodical material may be easily and quickly located for use in writing papers and reports, and should be of great help to the women of Ozona in planning club programs, and to the students.

The index has been purchased back to July, 1946, and the library would like to receive any old magazines included on the list to help build up the files to that date. Back numbers of the following magazines are wanted: Atlantic Monthly, Better Homes & Gardens, Building America, Christian Science Monitor Magazine, Coronet, Current History, Flying, Good Housekeeping, Harper's Magazine, Holiday, Hygeia, Ladies Home Journal, National Education Association Journal, Nature Magazine, New York Times Magazine, Parents Magazine, Popular Science, Popular Mechanics, Saturday Evening Post, Saturday Review of Literature School Arts, Scholastic, Scientific American, Science News Letter, Time and U. S. News & World Report. The school's files of National Geographic Magazine, Readers Digest, Life and Newsweek are nearly complete, although a few scattered copies are still missing in these magazines.

A committee was named to arrange for an annual audit of the school's finances another to investigate the purchase of a new school bus for next year, and another to investigate the need for additional building recommended by the superintendent.

In approving the budget, the board cut some and added some items to the recommended budget. Purchase of two new school buses as recommended was cut to one and funds were allocated for travel expenses in activities other than athletics, band and choral groups particularly.

Victim Of Auto Accident Dies From Injuries

W. J. Mayfield, Jr., 24 Of Rankin, Fatally Hurt Friday

W. J. Mayfield, Jr., 24, of Rankin, died at 11 o'clock Sunday night in the Ozona Hospital of injuries received in an auto accident about 32 miles south of Ozona on Highway 163 Friday.

L. H. Lewallen of McCamey, driver of the car, was seriously injured in the accident but is well on the road to recovery. He suffered severe neck injuries and cuts.

The men were hurt when the car went out of control after the driver swerved to avoid hitting a deer which leaped across the road in front of the car. Mayfield suffered a punctured lung, concussion and other injuries.

Mr. Mayfield was employed by the Spiers Well Equipment Co. at McCamey and Mr. Lewallen is an employee of the Hewgaley Drilling Co.

Mr. Mayfield is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Mayfield, Sr., of Fort Worth, a sister, grandmother and a number of uncles and aunts. Funeral services were held at Indian Gap, Texas.

Mrs. D. B. Pettit of Ozona, a director of Boys Ranch near Tankerville and in charge of the Ranch Library, has announced receipt of \$50 worth of books from the Murray Publishing House of Dallas as a gift to Boys Ranch.

The books were designated for use at the Ranch by the Rev. Vern Swartzfager of Dallas, Episcopal rector and at present Chaplain at A&M College. Rev. Swartzfager, founder of the famous Boys Court in Dallas, recently visited Ozona at the invitation of the three study clubs of the town and spoke to a meeting of parents on the subject of juvenile delinquency.

The Dallas book firm offered Rev. Swartzfager \$50 worth of books to be placed as he chose. The West Texas Boys Ranch is in process of building to care for neglected boys of a 21-county area and the minister chose it for the gift.

Street Drainage Of Air Conditioners Brings Final Warning

Draining of air conditioner systems into the streets in the business section of Ozona creates an unsightly and unsanitary condition, creates a health menace and is damaging to street paving, says a statement issued through the County Commissioners Court and the county health officer this week coupled with a final warning to owners of such equipment to make arrangements at once to remove the cause of such condition.

The Commissioners Court has investigated means of correcting these air conditioners and finds that circulating pumps may be installed at a cost in the neighborhood of \$25 to \$30 or by using copper tubing to pipe the overflow to sewers, the cost would probably be less.

Health authorities have pronounced the constant flow of water into streets an unsanitary condition and the flow of water has done considerable damage to street paving, the Commission observes. Businessmen who have these offending air conditioners are urged to make immediate plans to correct the present arrangements before the summer season arrives.

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Eddie Bower Enters Race For Clerk's Office

Young Business Man Seeks Chance at Public Service

E. G. (Eddie) Bower, young business man and World War II Veteran, added fuel under an already furiously boiling Crockett county political pot this week when he filed for a place on the Democratic primary ballot and authorized announcement of his candidacy for the position of county and district clerk of Crockett county.

Mr. Bower became the sixth "outsider" candidate seeking to unseat present holders of office in this county. He will oppose George Russell, who has held the office of county and district clerk for around 20 years.

Mr. Bower is in the general insurance business in Ozona, returning here after his discharge from the Army after the war to make his home. He was bookkeeper and manager of the feed business for Childress Bros. and when J. M. Lea purchased the Ozona Wool & Mohair Co. he became bookkeeper and assistant manager of that firm where he remained until its sale to the present owner, Beall Barbee.

A native of Dallas, Mr. Bower was graduated from high school in that city and attended Southern Methodist University. He was employed for seven years with the Atlantic Refining Co. in the geological exploration division of that company, and for several years was district scout for the company in northern Louisiana and southern Arkansas, keeping tab on land and geological activities of oil companies in the area.

Mr. Bower spent two years in the Army during the war, advancing to the rank of T. Sergeant. He was with combat troops in the Philippines and at the war's end, was transferred to Japan where he served a year before being returned home for discharge. He was married in 1938 to Miss Jean Baker, daughter of Mrs. Vera Baker. The couple have an 8-year-old daughter, Joan.

Mr. Bower says that he feels that his education and training qualifies him to render competent service in the office and if elected he will devote his entire time to rendering courteous and efficient service, never losing sight of the fact that he is a public servant and obligated to serve the citizenship of this county.

"I have been solicited by a number of my friends to make the race and because I need the job and feel that I can render service, I have decided to do so," Mr. Bower said. "I will be grateful to all who support me and pledge your faithful service as your public servant if you see fit to elect me."

We started off the basketball season by losing our first game

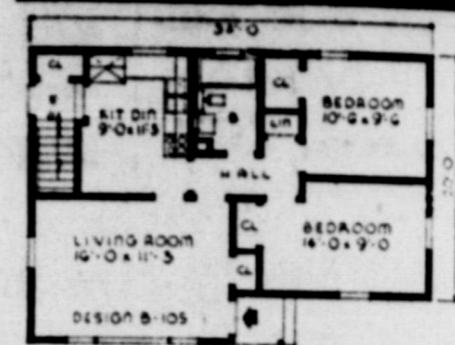

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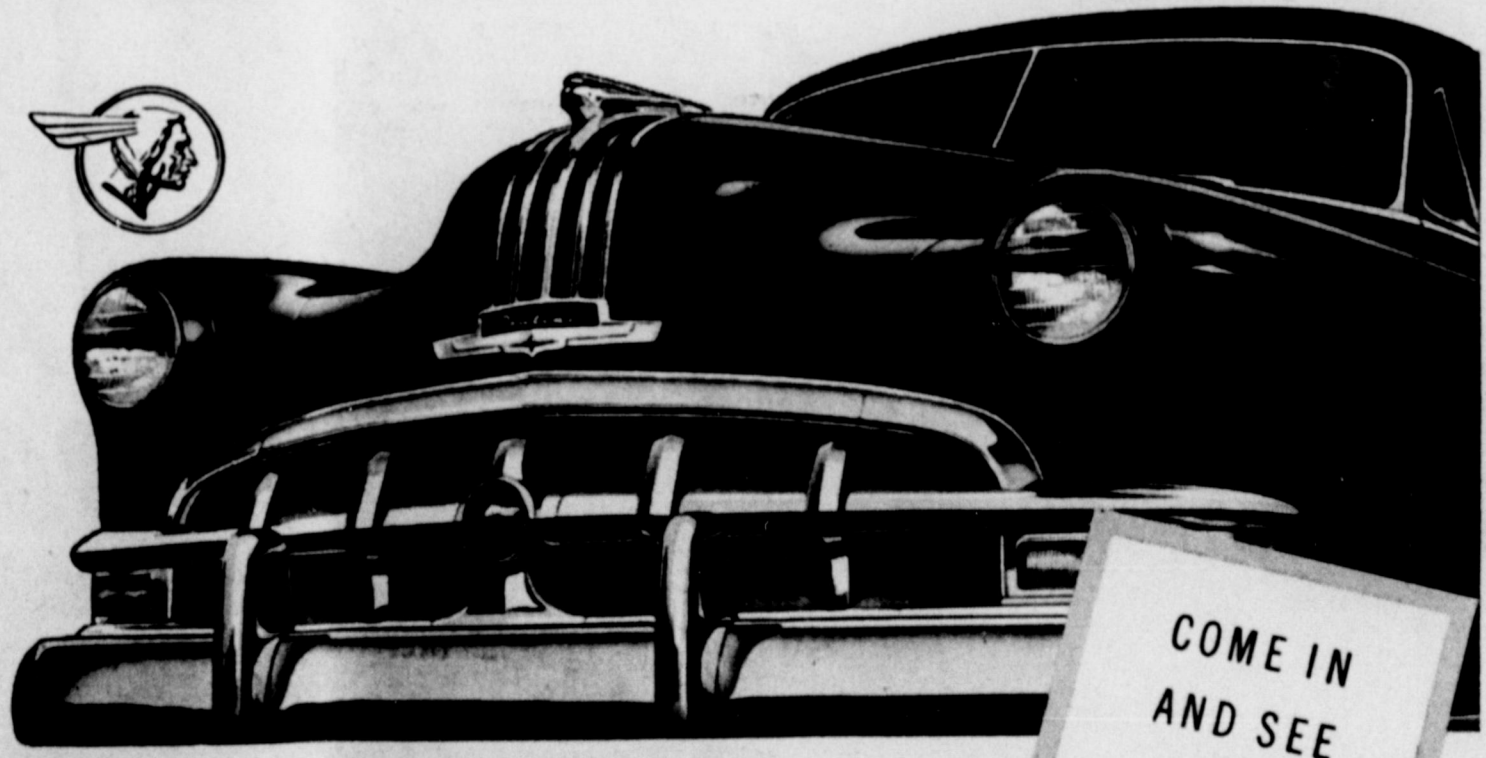

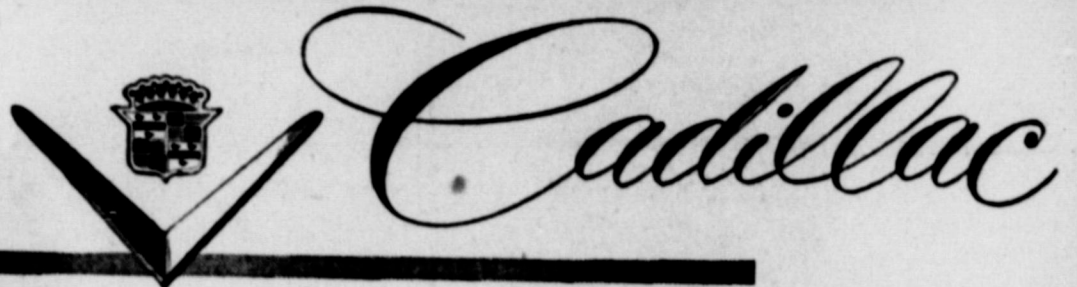
