You May Still Be Counted in '50 Census But Hurry!

In case the census taker did not visit your home or place of business and you were missed in the 1950 count of heads, you still may be counted if you will

Although the actual taking of the census is closed, persons who were missed by the enumerator may still be counted if they will fill out the "missed persons" form and mail it to the Census Bureau, Courthouse, Odessa, Texas.

In a long distance telephone conversation with George T. Kesler, Census District Supervisor in charge of the Odessa office, yesterday, The Stockman learned that the Crockett county census report will not be closed and sent to the U.S. Census Bureau for another week or ten days. Mr. Kesler said that all 'missed persons" who report in that time will be counted.

Elsewhere in this issue of The Stockman is a form, not identical with the government form, but containing blanks for filling in the essential information needed by the Census Bureau, according to information given by Mr. Kesler.

If you have not been enumerated here or elsewhere and no member of your family has given census takers information on you, then you should fill out the form and mail it at once to the district Census Bureau in Odessa.


experience and all." (Moose used to play a little semi-pro ball.)


