## Workman Injured in Moving Derrick for Magnolia No. 2 Clayton

John Parker, employed on the Magnolia Clayton ranch drilling operations, is under treatment in the Ozona hospital for injuries suffered in an accident which occurred Sunday at the Clayton No. 1 gas-distillate discovery well 10 miles east of Ozona.

Mr. Parker suffered severe bruises but escaped possible death or serious injury when a derrick finger, weighing some 700 pounds, fell on him while the derrick was being lowered to move the rig to location for Magnolia No. 2 Clayton ranch wildcat. The injured man was rushed to the local hospital where x-ray examination showed no broken bones.

## Ozona 4-H Team Second In State Wool Judging Meet

### Sutton County Team Wins First Place at A & M

The Crockett County 4-H Club Wool and Mohair judging team took second place in the state wool and mohair judging contest at the annual 4-H Club Round-Up at College Station starting Monday of this week.

The Crockett county team was nosed out by the Sutton county team by a margin of 44 points. The Sutton team won first place in the judging contest with a total of 1,859 points and the Ozona team took second place with 1,815 points. Composing the Ozona judging team, coached by County Agent Wm. A. Bergfeld, Jr., were Jimmie McMullan, Graham Childress, Bill Schneemann, Ben Conklin and Ronnie McMullan.

Joe David Ross of Sonora was high point man of the meet, with a total of 647 points. Graham Childress of Ozona was high point man of the Ozona team and placed fourth in the individual scoring in the state.

The Menard county 4-H Club grass identification team won first place in that event at A & M Round-Up. Comanche was second and Rannels county third in grass identification.

A well rounded program of instruction and entertainment was in store for the visiting 4-H clubbers from all over the state during their two-day stay Tuesday and Wednesday. The Ozona club boys are due to return today.

County Agent Bergfeld planned to remain at the college to attend a statewide county agents' conference due to follow the 4-H Club Round-Up.

Rev. Troy Hickman, pastor of the Methodist Church of Ozona, has announced his sermon topics for the entire summer. "The Commandments of God," the Sunday morning theme, includes the Ten Commandments and will last until after Sunday, August 20.

## Plans Set For Colored Rodeo Sunday & Monday

### Roping Club Sponsors 2-Day Event for Col- ored Folk of Area

Under sponsorship of the Ozona Roping Club, the colored people of West Texas will celebrate June-teenth with a two day all-colored rodeo to be staged at the Crockett County Fair Grounds Sunday afternoon and Monday night.

Colored cowhands of the area have been practicing up with their ropes for the past several days since the announcement of plans of the Roping Club for the second annual all-colored rodeo. And the women, too, have been practicing but on their footwork in preparation for the hair-pulling contest which is to be a feature of the rodeo.

The hair-pulling is not just as it may sound—it's goat hair that gets pulled. The gentleman roper ropes a wild goat from a chute and his lady helper races to the scene of the catch, grabs a tuft of mohair and legs it back to the judges' stand in a race against time.

Another special feature will be a colt roping contest. A young horse will be turned out with all entrants lined up with ropes ready. The first man to lay a loop on the colt's neck in a secure catch will take the animal as a prize. A \$5 entrance fee will be charged for this event.

In addition to these special events, there will be calf roping, goat roping and bronc riding. The Juneteenth celebration will be topped off with a big all-colored dance on the fair grounds platform with an orchestra from Sonora furnishing the music.

The Crockett County Sheriff's Posse will have charge of the concession stand during the two-day event, offering cold drinks and other refreshments.

## Magnolia Stakes Second Clayton Well Location

### Rig Moved to New Site 4,000 Feet North- east of Discovery

Rig is being moved and set up this week by Magnolia for its second deep test on the Clayton ranch.

The new location is 4,000 feet northeast of the company's No. 1 Clayton ranch, discovery Ellenburger gas-distillate producer 10 miles east of Ozona. It will be Magnolia No. 2 Clayton Ranch, 660 feet from the north and east lines of section 12, block GH, GC&SF Ry. Co. survey. Application was for a 9,000 drilling permit. The location is about half a mile north of Highway 290.

Flowing 120 barrels of 57 gravity distillate daily, Magnolia No. 1 Clayton Ranch has been completed as an Ellenburger gas-distillate discovery.

Gas-distillate ratio was 77.292-1. Production was through a 23-64-inch tubing choke and perforations from 8,680 to 8,730 feet. Gas showed to the surface at the rate of 9,275,000 cubic feet daily.

Estimated capacity was 50 million cubic feet of gas daily. The well has been shut in pending disposition of the gas and erection of storage facilities for distillate production.

## No Announcement of Ozona and Crockett Co. Census Figures

Although 1950 population figures have been made available for a number of neighboring cities and towns in this area by the United States Census Bureau, no announcement has yet been received here on the census count in Ozona and Crockett county.

An announcement was made last week of the count for the city of Sonora which showed a gain of only 102 persons in the ten-year period from 1940 to 1950, while the county showed a loss of 243 persons.

George T. Kesler, Census District Supervisor at Odessa, said recently that the Crockett county population figures would be forwarded to the county judge as soon as they are available.

Since no local crew chief nor local enumerators were available to handle the census taking job in this county, there is some misgiving here about the outcome of the county. A crew of women enumerators from McCamey was sent here early in the census taking period to make the count while later Wayne Snader was employed to complete the enumeration.

## Oliver & Kotyza Wildcat Abandoned; World Adds Producer

Oliver & Kotyza No. 1 University, wildcat six miles northeast of the Vaughan field and three miles east of the Midway Lane Ellenburger field, has been plugged and abandoned at 1,650 feet. The failure was 330 feet from south and west lines of section 22-45-U.

Sanotex No. 12-3 J. M. Shannon estate in the World field has been finaled on the pump in 24 hours for 120 barrels of 25.6 gravity oil plus 60.3 per cent water. Production was from open hole between 2,419 and 2,535 feet, total plug back depth. The section was acidized with 1,000 gallons. With elevation 2,637 feet, the pumper is 2,650 from north, 1,350 feet from east line of lease in section 42-4B-EL&RR.

## German Youth to Speak Sunday Morning At Church of Christ

Helmut Prochnow, a young man from Frankfurt, Germany will speak Sunday morning at 11 o'clock at the Ozona Church of Christ. Young Prochnow has been a ministerial student for the past two years at David Lipscomb College in Nashville, Tennessee. Prochnow, who is only 21 years of age, was converted in 1947 by some missionaries sent to Germany by the Churches of Christ. When these missionaries found him in a bombed out building in Frankfurt, he was at the point of death from starvation.

The German youth, who speaks English fluently, has turned to New Testament Christianity as the only solution of the problems of Germany and he states that, God, willing, he will preach the "unsearchable riches of Christ" to those who knew Him not, so long as he shall live.

He will sail from New York on July 12 returning to Germany with his American bride to take up his work for which he has been preparing himself.

The Ozona Church of Christ extends to every one who can be reached throughout this locality, a very sincere invitation and earnest welcome to their service. A spokesman for the membership of the Church said, "We want, more than anything, our friends and neighbors to hear Helmut Prochnow speak Sunday morning in the church building."

## Gas Companies Test Supply In Clayton Gasser

### Holders of Franchise For Ozona Also Investigate

Tests made during the past week by representatives of two big companies, and renewed interest on the part of the three men who were granted a franchise by the Commissioners Court recently to bring a natural gas distribution system to Ozona, indicate that the Clayton gas well drilled by Magnolia 10 miles east of Ozona may result in a supply of natural gas for the city.

Representatives of the Lone Star Gas Co. and the El Paso Natural Gas Co. are understood to have visited the well recently and made tests of the gas with a view to negotiating for purchase of the well's production.

In a letter to County Judge Houston Smith, the franchise holders asked for an extension of their franchise but the Commissioners Court took no action on the matter at this month's meeting. The judge recently received an inquiry from a Hobbs, N. M., man who expressed an interest in securing a franchise for supplying gas to Ozona. When some operator comes along who is ready to begin operations, the county will grant him a franchise, the judge declared.

The Magnolia gas-distillate discovery well on the Clayton ranch has a potential of 50 million cubic feet of sweet gas daily, according to estimates of the operators.

## Award Contract For Construction Of Fire Station

### T. S. Hughes Gets Contract on Bid of \$27,156

Contract for construction of Ozona's new fire station and courthouse annex, for which bonds were approved at a recent election, was awarded by the Commissioners Court last Thursday to T. S. Hughes of Ozona on his general construction bid of \$27,156.

Two other contractors submitted bids on the construction job. Bill Taylor of Ozona bid \$28,644-57 and Louis Pyatt's bid was \$41,181.20.

The Western Sheet Metal Works of San Angelo was awarded the contract for installing the oil-burning central heating system on its bid of \$814.75. Wendland Sheet Metal Works, also of San Angelo, was the only other bidder on the central heating system.

The new building to be constructed on a lot immediately south of the county jail, purchased by the county from Mrs. W. E. West for \$6,000, is to be approximately 50 x 70 feet overall size. It is to be built of double thick Haydite tile, the front of the building to be faced with Austin cut stone.

The engine room where fire trucks are to be kept at ready, will be large enough to accommodate four fire engines. A fireman's assembly room 26 x 34 feet in dimensions will be used by the department for its business and social gatherings and by the county as quarters for bedding down jurors which might be held over night in the trial of a criminal case. The county plans to purchase cots which are to be stored and ready for use by jurors in case they are needed. The county at present has no quarters available for sleeping jurors.

A two-room apartment is also to be included in the building. It will consist of a bedroom, kitchen, hallway and bath. A small stag room, which may be used by a single person for sleeping quarters and as bath and rest room by members of the department and a heater and storage room are also included in the structure.

Sale of the \$50,000 bond issue which will be used to finance the new building and repairs to the courthouse has been completed by the Commissioners Court. The issue was purchased by Columbia Securities Co. of Dallas at par and accrued interest.

The first \$20,000 of the bonds bear interest at the rate of 1 1/2 per cent and the last \$30,000 at 1 3/4 per cent. The bonds are serial bonds in \$1,000 denominations and the county retains an option to retire the entire issue after 5 years.

## Salt Water Shows in Montgomery Wildcat; Test Permian Show

A Crockett county wildcat 10 miles south of Ozona Wednesday was preparing to plug back to about 3,400 feet and test slight shows in a Permian sand after it recovered water in the Ellenburger.

Spartan and Hamm No. 1 H. W. B. Montgomery showed gas to the surface in 80 minutes and recovered about 8,000 feet of salty water and salt water-cut mud on a two-hour and 15-minute drillstem test from 10,100 to 10,190 feet. The test is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 5-J-GC&SF.

Humble No. 1-C Alma Cox and others, wildcat one mile north of the operator's No. 1 Alma Cox, 8,221-foot Ellenburger failure, was making hole at 7,856 feet in shale.

H. E. Chiles, Jr., No. 2 Clara Couch( wildcat nine miles south of the Vaughan field and a twin to Glasco and others No. 1 Couch, 9,368-foot Ellenburger failure, has been plugged and abandoned, at 1,255 feet in brown lime. The failure was 2,310 from north, 330 feet from east line of section 15-ST-GC&SF.

Comparisons of commodity prices in the various countries of the world mean little unless they are related to wage rates. In other words, it is the ability of the workman to "bring home the bacon" that counts.

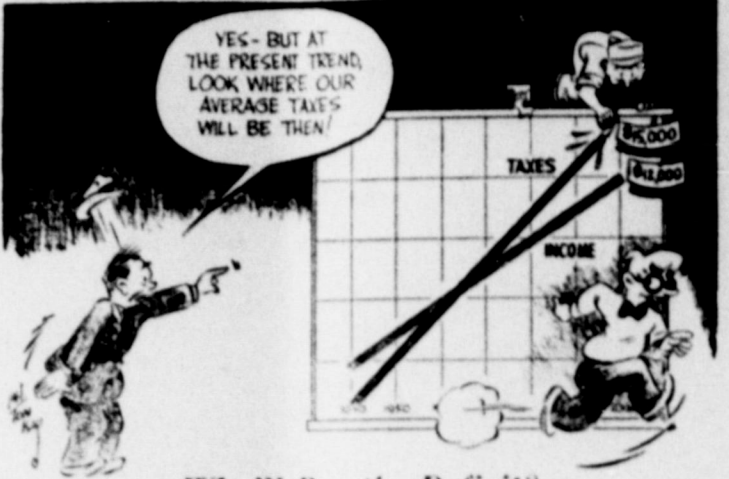
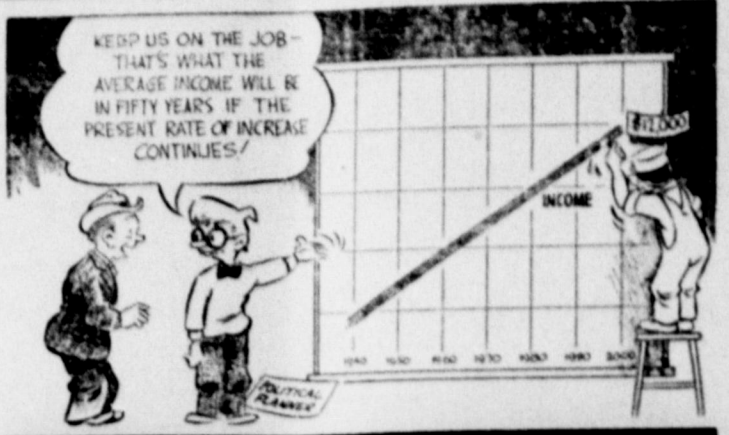
The U. S. Department of Labor has calculated the minutes of working time required to earn enough money to buy a pound of bacon in ten countries. It is a revealing example of the superiority of our living standards as against those of the rest of the world.

The average American worker works 30 minutes for his pound of bacon. His equivalent in Canada works 45, and in Great Britain, 53. In Ireland he must put in 96 minutes. Finally, the Soviet Union—that wonderful "worker's paradise"—is last on the list, with 466 minutes of work needed for that precious pound of bacon! The communist workers see bacon at long, long intervals, if at all.

These enormous differences are principally due to the economic and social systems under which men work. In the United States we have a free economy. That pound of bacon is one of the products of a highly efficient, extremely competitive industry that can live and prosper only if it meets the needs of free consumers. The same thing is true of everything else we buy, whether it be an automobile or a pair of shoes or a ticket to a movie. The fact that only a free economy can produce abundance for the masses of the people can't be repeated too often.

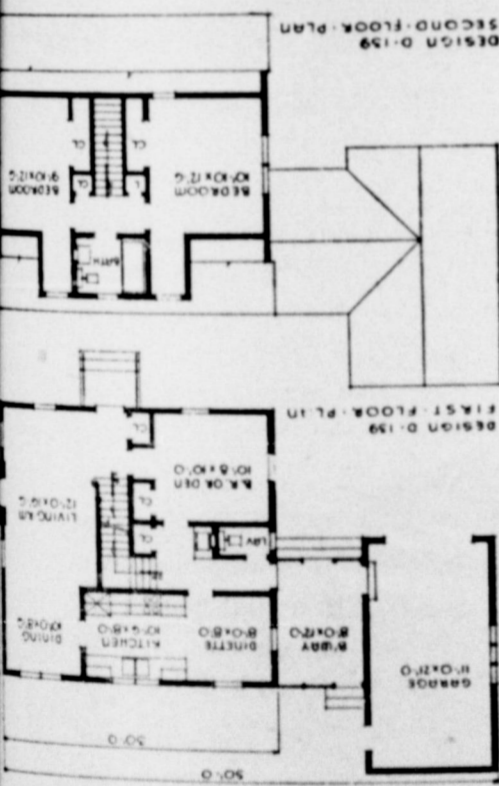

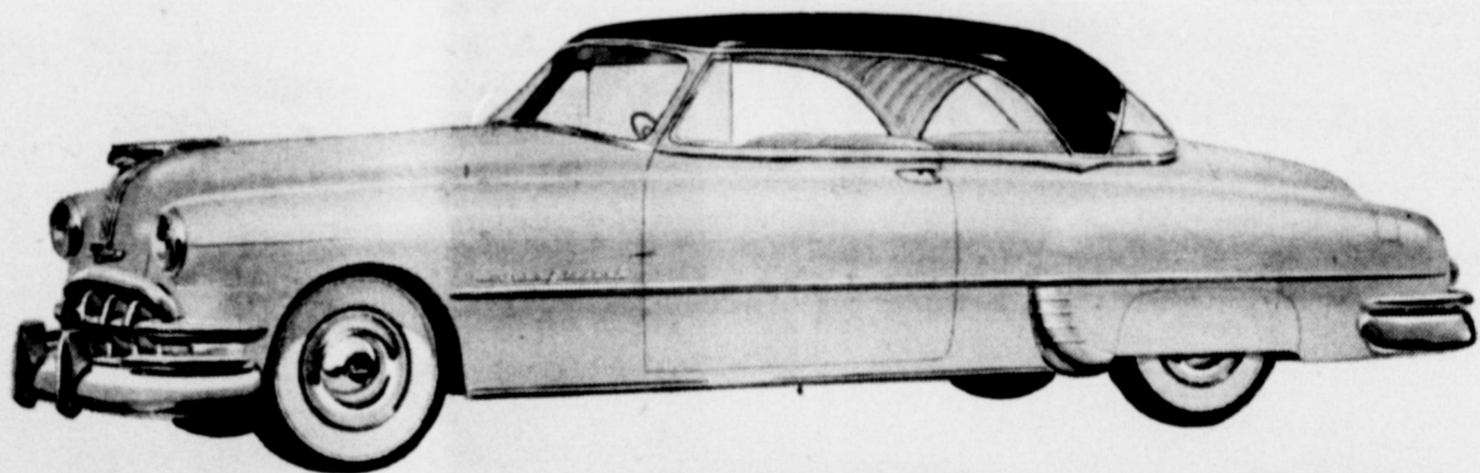

**Game Dept. Urges  
Cooperation in Wild  
Turkey Stocking Plan**

AUSTIN—Cooperation of Texans in protecting turkey hens, their eggs and their brood was solicited today by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission. Emphasis was placed on not molesting the big birds in areas recently restocked, particularly heavily populated parts of north, central and eastern Texas.

The assistant director of Wildlife restoration explained that persons in areas unfamiliar with wild turkeys might innocently cause costly damage. He said the range of house cats and of dogs which suck eggs should be restricted.

Newly-stocked birds were not so evident to the populace before the mating and nesting period because they had been in flocks generally in wooded areas. But when the breeding period begins, the birds scatter widely and are found in fields, open pastures and meadows.

"Folks noticing the turkeys are naturally curious," said the assistant director. "If they will restrain their curiosity during this crucial period, many benefits will accrue. Turkey hens are very sensitive to human contact. They do not have to see persons peering into their nests and approaching their young. They can scent them

The hens, being wild, often abandon nests or young in their inherent fear of human beings.

Touching the eggs is certain to prove disastrous, even though they

are left in the nest. Persons placing eggs from abandoned nests under setting hens or under tame turkey hens are just wasting time. If the eggs hatch, the young usually perish from common poultry ailments. They are very susceptible away to become the prey of predators."

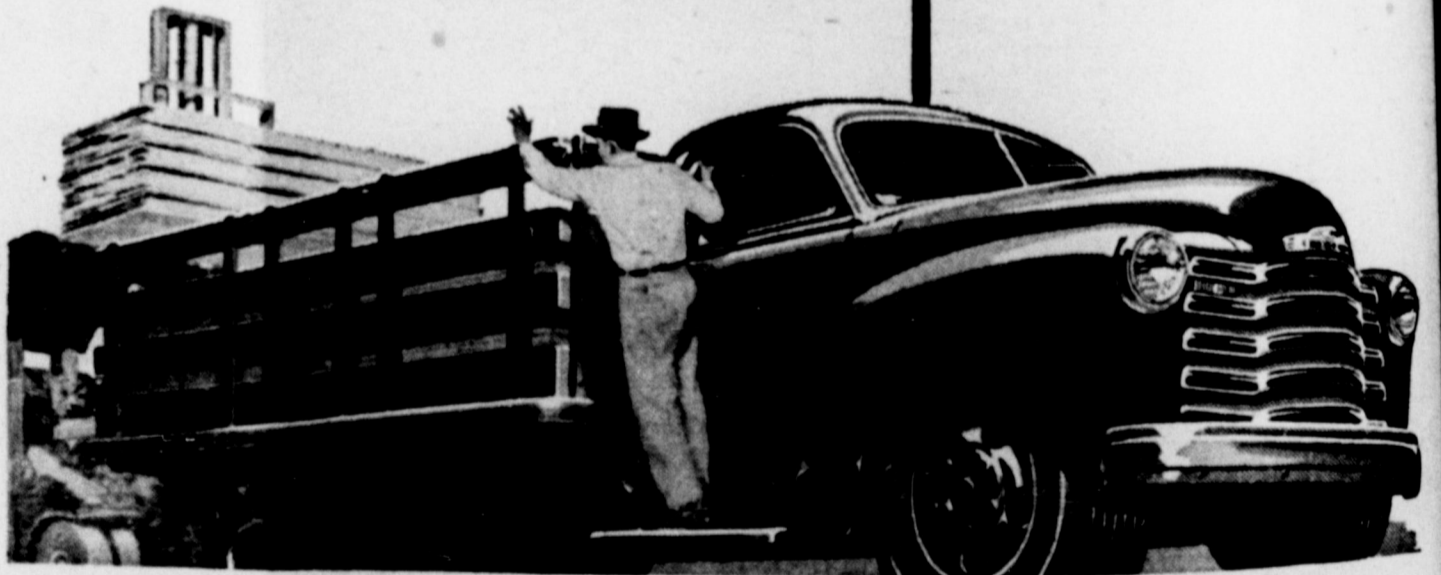

**Health Official Urges Caution in Use Of Cleaning Solvents**

AUSTIN. — There's a lot of punch cooked up in that little bottle of cleaning solvent out on the back porch. State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox called them "hazardous, when special precautions are not used."

It seems that solvent vapors are heavier than air, which means that they will collect at floor levels. The danger of using solvent for such household chores as taking spots off the linoleum or cleaning dirt or grease off the back steps, is that you have to get on your knees to do the job.

And when you are on your knees you're closer to the accumulation of solvent vapor.

The state health officer proved his whole point with this story. A man attempted to remove the grease from the under side of his car by spraying it with a spray gun he had brought home from his construction job. He was found dead under the car, suffocated by the vapor of the cleaning agent.

Proper use of cleaning solvent, says the doctor, calls for opening all the doors and windows when

cleaning floors, the underside of household furniture or clothing. The idea is to get as much ventilation as possible. A fan blowing on the working area is helpful.

When doing a job of this sort, work for a short time—avoiding inhaling the vapors as much as possible—and then get into the fresh air for a minute or two.

The first symptoms of vapor poisoning are nausea, dizziness, headache and fatigue. When you notice them, get outside as soon as possible, the health officer advises.

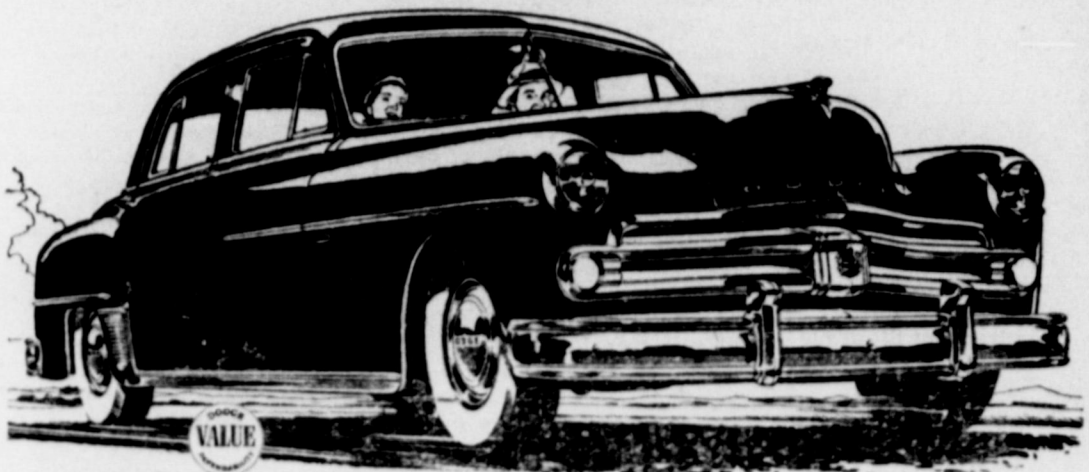

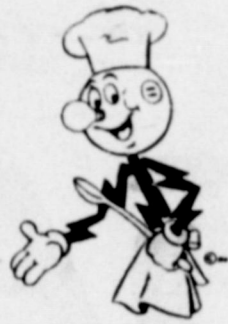

**Beef Grading to Be Demonstrated at A-M Extension Conference**

COLLEGE STATION — A highlight of the program for the annual State 4-H Club Round-Up and Extension Service Conference to be held at Texas A. & M. College from June 12-16, will be grading demonstrations involving slaughter steers, calves and carcasses. According to A. L. **Shivers Asks of My Own' Texas Governor**

Allan Shivers, in formally being his candidacy for a selective term as Governor has done his best to carry out a program for Texas in a way acceptable to the people. He has added:

"I have succeeded, I will appreciate their votes for a term of office."

During his public career Shivers has given particular attention to the welfare, rural roads and educational facilities:

improved educational facilities. Shivers, who assumed the governorship last July, had not held a full-time governmental job before becoming governor. He was elected to the state senate in 1934 and twice re-elected. In 1946 he was elected lieutenant governor and re-elected to that office in 1948. Born in Lufkin, he spent his boyhood in Tyler county and later moved with his family to Port Arthur.

He was a co-author of Texas' original old-age assistance law and helped to write the tax bill which still meets the cost of old-age assistance. Under his leadership

last February, the legislature approved a far-reaching reform and improvement program for state hospitals.

**DEFEND PRESS FREEDOM**

Erwin D. Canhan, editor of the Christian Science Monitor, told the International Federation of Newspaper Editors, meeting in Rome, that a proposed United States treaty may damage rather than defend press freedom. He said there was a danger of an "international agreement limiting and restricting freedom of the press instead of lowering the barriers to such freedom," and described as "fantastic" a proposed ban on the publication of news considered offensive to national pride and dignity — a device, incidentally, to which dictators always resort when they want to hide the truth.

Johan van de Fieft of Holland said: "There is a remarkable press situation in Argentina. Newsprint is distributed by the government, and because of the so-called shortage, the government distributes

only to government papers and not to opposition papers. This is a most peculiar way to get rid of the opposition. It is only one case of many in the world today, but it is necessary that we oppose restrictions on the press everywhere."

It is certainly understandable

that some members of the UN would like nothing more than a high-sounding, carefully camouflaged treaty that would destroy the free press. And it is certainly axiomatic that newspaper people in those countries which still have press freedom fight with every possible weapon to defend it. A

free press is a people's greatest protection against tyranny and injustice whether imposed by government, business, labor or any other group. When a free press is destroyed, all other basic freedoms are destroyed with it.

**Business Women's Sorority Makes Gift to TB Assn.**

Another gift for tuberculosis control in Texas has been made by the Texas chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, announced Elliot A. Mendenhall, M. D., Dallas, as he accepted a check for \$1,341.21 from the business women's organization on behalf of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, of which Dr. Mendenhall is president.

"This brings the Beta Sigma Phi contribution for tuberculosis control in Texas to well over \$31,000," said Dr. Mendenhall, explaining that in 1948 the sorority had presented the tuberculosis association with a 70 mm X-ray bus and in 1949 had contributed \$5,000 to the Association for use in its state-wide program.

In the year and a half of its operation by the Texas Tuberculosis Association, the Beta Sigma Phi X-ray Bus has served 20 Texas counties, taking an average of 7,559 films per month, according to Dr. Mendenhall. Out of a total of 113,385 X-rays made, he continued, 3,682 apparently healthy persons have been referred to pri-

vate physicians for suspicious tuberculosis or other chest abnormalities.

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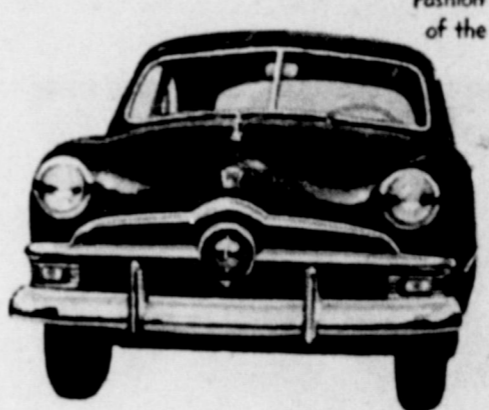
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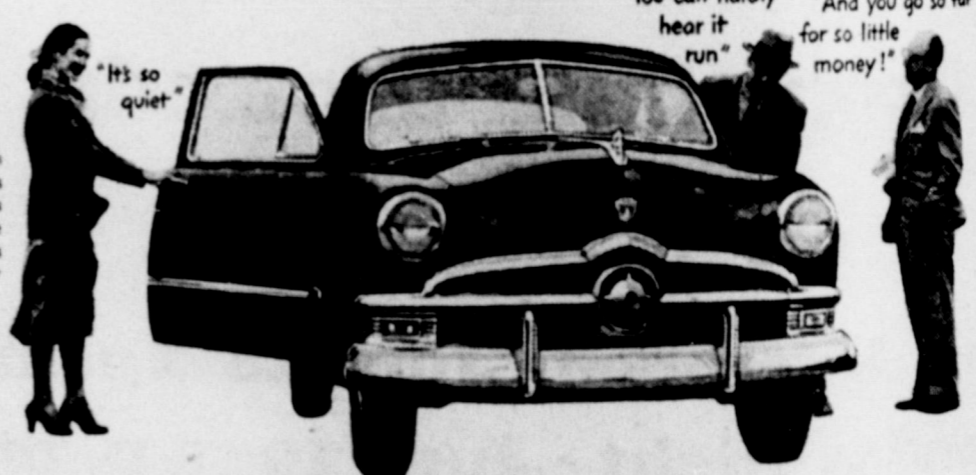


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
