Garbage Disposal Plan Advocated By Community Council

Modern and Sanitary Plan Outlined for Community Study

A modern garbage and trash disposal system for Ozona was discussed by members of the community council in session Monday night and the plan placed before the citizenship for study.

The system advocated is known as the trench disposal system whereby all trash and garbage is collected in special trucks and dumped in deep trenches cut by bulldozers and buried. The plan would necessitate the purchase of a bulldozer and the trucks and a plot of land near the city where trenches could be opened and trash buried. The project was estimated to cost upwards of \$15,000 besides the land purchase. The system would eliminate the fly-breeding and unsightly dump ground now in use four miles east of the city.

The Council asked the Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District to consider the plan with a view to the district's financing and operating the new system. modern trash receptacles on sidewalks in the downtown area. Livestock allowed to run at large in the city also came in for criticism at the hands of Council members.

Gas Shows In Ellenburger Top In Clayton Well

Ellenburger 230 Feet Low to Gas-Distillate Discovery

Coring was under way Monday in a Crockett county wildcat 11 miles northeast of Ozona after it showed gas in the top of the Ellenburger.

Magnolia No. 1 Addie Clayton topped the Ellenburger tentatively at 8,620 feet, 6,213 feet below sea level. It is 134 feet high to Magnolia No. 1 Clayton, gas-distillate discovery from the Ellenburger.

Gas showed to the surface in 10 minutes at the maximum volume of 50,000 cubic feet daily and the minimum at the end of the two-hour drillstem test from 8,614 to 8,645 feet was 12.00 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 130 feet of slightly gas-cut mud. No. 1 Clayton, which had earlier topped the Pennsylvania lime at 8,480 feet, 6,073 feet below sea level, is 1,980 feet from the north an east line of section 9-1-GC&SF.

C. P. Laubenheim and others No. 1-B University, wildcat 13 miles southeast of Barnhart, was drilling at 960 feet in gray lime and red shale. The wildcat is 2,389.9 feet from north, 330 feet from the west line of section 13-39-U.

Ted Weiner and others No. 1 J. M. Shannon estate, wildcat 16 miles northwest of Ozona, has been plugged and abandoned at 7,800 feet after recovering mud, water-cut mud and sulphur water. Location was 980 from the south, 1,980 feet from the west line of section 40-UV-GC&SF.

A wildcat 15 miles northwest of Ozona, Ted Weiner and others No. 1 George Bean has been plugged and abandoned at 1,380 feet in Grayburg lime that developed sulphur water. The failure was 330 from the north, 990 feet from the west line of section 34-UV-GC&SF.

Walking Blood Bank Typing To Begin December 4

All Residents Urged to Participate for Com- plete Record

Typing of blood of citizens of Ozona and Crockett county for the blood bank to begin Monday, December 4, it was announced this week. "Walking Blood Bank," believed to be the only plan of its kind so far developed in the state, is scheduled, it was announced this week.

Mrs. Valentine Melvin, medical technician and manager of the Ozona hospital, has assembled the necessary equipment and materials to make the tests in the hospital laboratory.

The venture is being sponsored by the Ozona Rotary Club, which has assumed the expense of materials to be used in the testing.

The "Walking Blood Bank" idea was conceived as a substitute for the conventional blood bank, or stock of actual blood, maintained by the larger hospitals and clinics in larger cities. Such a blood bank would be impractical in a community as small as Ozona, since the demand is only occasional and blood can be retained for a limited time only.

With the "Walking Blood Bank," an unlimited quantity of blood for emergency transfusions will be available in the community at all times, with no loss or expense in maintaining it. Under the plan, every individual in the community, or as many as are willing to cooperate, will submit to blood tests to ascertain his or her type of blood and RH factor.

This information will be recorded on a card index system to be maintained at the hospital, with the name, address and phone number of the individual. In case of an emergency and a patient needs a transfusion, a person with matching blood type will be contacted and asked to volunteer for transfusion and with an available blood bank of all types in the community, a minimum of time would elapse before treatment could be administered.

Every individual whose blood type is of record would share in this time saving element in the event he himself became a patient in an emergency and required a transfusion. His own blood type would be recorded, thus saving the time necessary in making the tests, and with a number of donors of the same type readily available, a minimum of time would be lost.

The blood tests will require but a few minutes of time and may be taken any Monday, Wednesday or Friday, Mrs. Melvin said. It will not be necessary to make an appointment. The hours for taking the tests will be from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, the skip in days being arranged by the hospital staff to allow time for completing records, making tests, etc.

The testing three days a week will be continued as long as necessary to complete the work. School officials will cooperate by sending a consent blank for parents whose parents consent will be dismissed from school long enough to have the tests. Parents of preschool age children may take them to the hospital if they desire blood typing.

Mrs. Melvin will be in Dallas this week-end to attend a meeting of the State Blood Bank Association.

OZONA LATIN-AMERICAN IS MARINE RECRUIT

The Abilene Reporter-News recently carried the following account of an Ozona Latin-American who applied to the Marine Recruiting office there for enlistment in the U. S. Marine Corps. The story, written by Bob Cooke of the Reporter-News staff, follows:

Marine recruiters in the Abilene postoffice building are still talking about a "refreshing experience" they had Friday.

An 18-year-old, good-looking Latin-American boy walked into the office on the second floor of the postoffice building.

When M-Sgt. W. E. Norton, in charge of the recruiting station, asked the visitor if there was something they could do for him, he unhesitatingly replied:

"Si, you send me to Korea to fight."

Sgt. Norton and his staff didn't believe it. Here was a prospective recruit whose first question wasn't: "How can I get a commission in the Marine Corps?"

Still disbelieving, Sgt. Norton asked the prospective volunteer to "Please, run that by again, slowly."

Again the youth, sporting a thin but well trimmed mustache and thick, deep sideburns, replied:

"You send me Korea, me wanna

fight."

Patience, Sgt. Norton explained that it would be necessary first for him to fill out an application, take a physical examination, spend several weeks in basic training and "then maybe they'll send you to Korea."

"No, no," protested the youth. "Me strong, know plenty judo, already."

Whereupon he removed his billfold from a hip pocket and produced a certificate showing that he had successfully completed a course in "Charles Atlas' School of Physical Education."

Again, Sgt. Norton went over the process necessary for the youth to get into the Marines.

"Okay, okay, me ready."

The recruiters again were in for a new experience. The lad had not a gripe about any of the questions on the application.

When asked about the condition of his feet he replied:

"Feet okay. They get me there. Don't fight with feet, fight with arms, eyes, here." He indicated his head by an impatient tapping of noggin with a finger.

Then came the fingerprinting part of the proceedings. Sgt. Stanley Collins, Sgt. Norton's aide, inked a finger and pressed it down on the card. There wasn't a whorl or anything but a black smudge.

"What the devil havy you done

to your fingers?" Sgt. Collins asked.

"Nothing, they just wore smooth by rope."

The lad was from Ozona. He was a member of a horse-breaking crew on one of the big ranches near Ozona. He'd been helping break horses since he was 14 years old.

The years of handling a hard lariat, having it pulled through his bare hands by a stubborn, unruly horse, had worn away practically every ridge and whorl on his fingers.

At last his application was completed. Then Sgt. Collins handed him a razor.

"There's a men's room just down the hall, son," Collins said. "Go down there and shave that mustache off and cut those sideburns down to the level of your eyes."

"No, no, sergeant," he protested. "They part of good fighter."

In his willingness, however, to get a chance to go to Korea, he complied.

Last night Sgt. Norton said, "I sure hope that boy makes it. He's the kind of lad the Marines want. If his 'Charles Atlas' course did him any good, maybe he'll pass his physical."

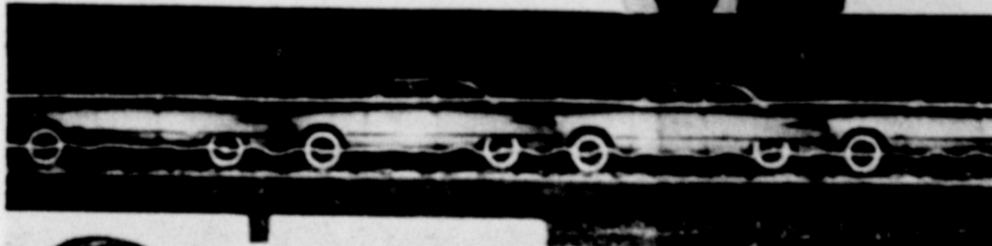

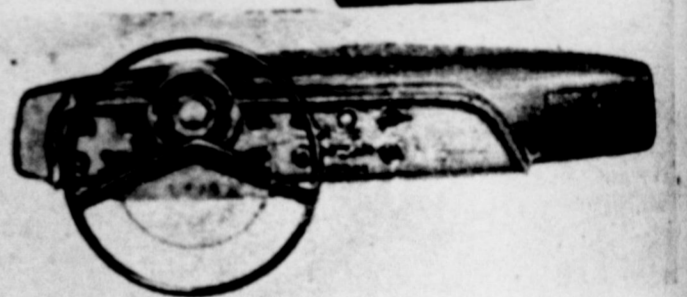

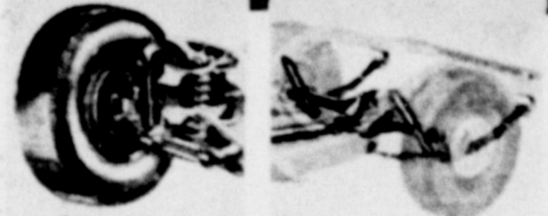

Shivers today issued a formal memorandum urging all Texans to support the 1950 Christmas Seal Sale, conducted by the Texas Tuberculosis Association and its affiliated county associations from November 20 to December 25.

"Tuberculosis is a communicable disease and therefore a public health problem which should be the concern of every Texas resident," the Governor said in issuing his official memorandum. "The work of the tuberculosis associations toward preventing and controlling tuberculosis in this state has helped to improve the health standards of Texas.

The tuberculosis associations work tirelessly the year round to free this state from tuberculosis. Yet they make but one appeal a year for funds to finance their twelve-month program, aimed at the protection of all of us against the dread disease. I urge everyone to buy and use as many Christmas Seals as he can and thereby make an investment of health for the coming year."
