With the "Walking Blood Bank," an unlimited quantity of blood for emergency transfusions will be a vailable in the community at all times, with no loss or expense in maintaining it. Under the plan, every individual in the community. or as many as are willing to cooperate, will submit to blood tests to ascertain his or her type of blood and RH factor.

This information will be recorded on a card index system to be maintained at the hospital, with the name, address and phone numing blood type will be contacted and asked to volunteer for transfusion and with an available blood bank of all types in the community, a minimum of time would elapse before treatment could be administered.

Every individual whose blood type is of record would share in this time saving element in the event he himself became a patient in an emergency and required a transfusion. 


