#### **High School Writers** Ask Swimming Pool, Community Center

High school editorial writers who participated in the contest Hospital Feb. 1 conducted by the Woman's Society of Christian Service as a part of its community study project, were overwhelmingly in favor of a community or youth center and a swimming pool in Ozona, according to a tabulation of subjects made by Mrs. D. B. Pettit, head of the Society committee.

The contest was judged by Dr. Blair, president of North Texas State Teachers College at Denton, ning first place in the contest.

Of all the students entering the writing contest, designed to hear youth's side of what the community needs, 44 mentioned the need for a community center or youth center for Ozona for use in community gatherings and entertainments of all kinds. Twenty-two of the writers mentioned the need for a swimming pool. Adult voters of Ozona recently turned down a bond issue for the purpose of building a community center and swimming pool here by a margin of one vote.

A variety of topics were dis cussed by the youthful writers. Nine were in favor of installing a traffic signal light at the highway intersection in downtown Ozona. Nine also favored an activities bus, or a bus to carry groups to other towns for athletic contests, band concerts and other ac-
