4-H Clubbers to Be Honored at Houston Fat Stock Show Feb. 10

Crockett county 4-H Club members will be honored on February 10 at the Houston Fat Stock Show and Livestock Exposition, President W. A. Lee announced.

In a letter to County Agent W. A. Bergfeld, Jr., Mr. Lee reported that special concessions in prices would be made on that day which has been designated as 4-H Club Day. Veteran agricultural students will also be feted on the day.

Four-H Club members and veteran agricultural students throughout Texas may obtain special tickets for matinee performances of the World Championship Rodeo, providing their order is received by the Stock Show before January 15, Mr. Lee said. Price of the rodeo tickets will be \$1.80, including tax and front gate admission, less than one-half the established price for tickets.

In announcing the special day, Mr. Lee expressed appreciation for the splendid cooperation accorded the show by members of the extension service staff, county agents and home demonstration agents since the beginning of the show.

Show dates for 1951 are January 31 through February 11. The rodeo will star William "Hopalong Cassidy" Boyd, with Eddy Arnold, nationally known ballad singer, and his Oklahoma Wranglers. A calf scramble is also being set for all 19 performances.

Indian Style Horse Rustling Event to Thrill Rodeo Fans

FORT WORTH — The skill and daring which the Comanches and rustlers displayed when they made a raid and rode off on the settler's best horses will be re-enacted in a new event in the rodeo of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Jan. 26 through Feb. 4.

This contest, announced today by President-Manager W. R. Watt, will be a wild horse race.

It is much different from the event of the same designation which you may have seen at a few other rodeos where two men rope and hold a horse and throw a saddle on him for one to ride.

This is "sissy stuff" in comparison to the Cowtown version. Here is how it will go:

There will be a bunch of wild Mexican and Choctaw ponies in the arena. Twenty cowboys will run in, drive the mustangs into a corner and then climb aboard by grabbin a mane — there will be no saddle, no bridle; it will be Indian style. This is not a team or pair event but it's strictly every individual for himself and while a cowboy is trying to get a horse in position to get on, another cowboy may take advantage of the situation and climb on the horse himself.

After a contestant has succeeded in getting on an animal, he rides alongside of another horse and jumps over to his back. The cowboy who changes from one horse to another the most times and puts on the best all-round riding exhibition will be the winner. That will give you a "rough" idea — and we do mean rough! It will be an event filled with action every minute.

The ponies for the wild horse race are already at the Stock Show grounds.

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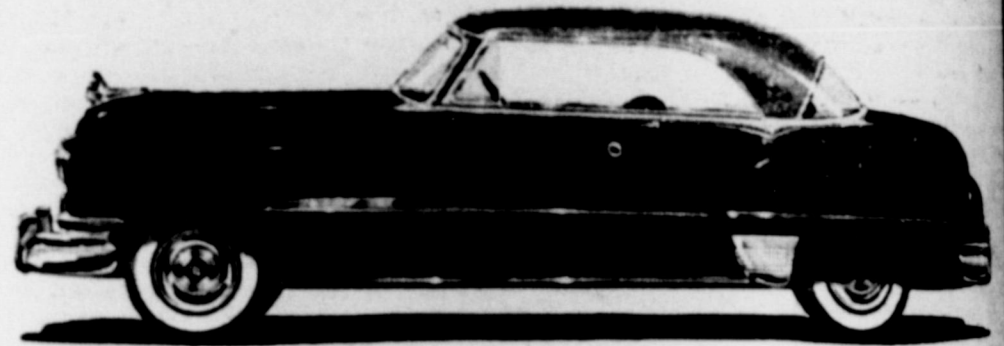
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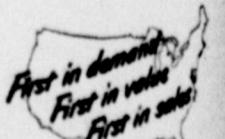

TRAFFIC HAZARDS

er day I was sitting on the side of the Church, looking through the window to the highway. A heavy truck, fully loaded, came by. It was making sixty or more miles an hour. If it passed the Church, it would run out into the street and could not have stopped.

highway through our town is heavy traffic. Both of our streets are also through town. Local people are accustomed to the situation. But they are not. All four highways approaching to Ozona lead into the town. There is no warning to drivers that they are entering residential or business.

for a few hours at high speed on the highway, many drivers become restless. Monotony and fatigue are the cause of it. We are used to passing regular highway traffic but we do not notice them. A driver who has not been on the highway should slow down, especially true of the drivers from the east and from the south. Only a few weeks ago, a Mexican boy on the South was hit by a trucker who is now in the hospital. He has admitted that he was not and did not realize the danger.

or later, if something is wrong, someone will be killed on the streets of Ozona by a car. The streets adjacent to the highways leading into town all have their cars directly into the highway through traffic. In a car, you are sometimes allowed to pass on the wrong side. And that is not a good thing to do.

for families who live between the Methodist Church and the school district, and whose homes are on Highway 290, which is also used by children and grandmothers playing in their homes. Other children use this highway for bicycle traffic. On the west side, the Barnhart road passes the school plant, where there is a concentration of children. A car running into the road after a small toddler who temporarily evades his mother's eye might be killed by a driver who did not realize that he was in town, could not stop in time. Instead of waiting for a tragedy to happen, why not do something now, and save that life? Unless this matter has been considered by local authorities, these remedies may have been overlooked. It has been pointed out in a recent instance, that the red-green

traffic signals would not be effective, unless officers were present to enforce their observance; therefore, it is better to have no lights at all.

I wish to submit another suggestion. At the edge of town on all four highways leading in, why not hang yellow or red "blinker" lights over the center of the road, high enough to clear the tallest trucks, and low enough to be seen, day or night? The yellow blinker is a widely used signal of danger. Everyone who sees one knows what it means. A fifth blinker could be placed at the intersection of the two highways in town. A strange driver passing through the town would get his first warning as he entered, and his second warning as he approached the highway intersection. These lights do not require a full stop. Nevertheless, they do have some effect for good.

The usefulness of yellow or red blinkers would be further increased if a prominent road sign, read-

ing, "Traffic Light Ahead" were to be placed beside the highway, 50 feet or so before the driver reaches the light.

If authorization for the placement of these signals can be had, and if there are no funds available for the purpose, perhaps some civic group might sponsor the project. I should like to be one of a group to help provide private funds, if needed, for such a purpose. It might mean the difference between life or death for some boy or girl.

1951 Buicks Go on Display Next Saturday

FLINT, Mich., Jan. 17.—Buick today introduced its 1951 line of cars, highlighted by an improved Special with new body and new engine.

The new line contains three series of cars, ranging from the low-priced Special up through the Super to the luxury models in the Roadmaster. They will go on display in all dealer showrooms Saturday, Jan. 20.

Important advances in styling features couples with major chassis and body improvements combine to make the 1951 Buick the greatest value in our history," Ivan L. Wiles, Buick General Manager, said.

There are eight models in the Special Series, six in the Super and four in the Roadmaster.

The 1951 Special is completely new throughout. It has a new body and chassis and is powered with the F-263 Fireball engine introduced in the Super last year. This engine develops 128 brake horsepower with Dynaflo and 120 with Synco-Mesh transmission.
