OLD TOWNS

ago a newcomer to Ozona reported to have said, "I don't like this town. I don't like it here. It is not friendly to me." I am sure he is honest but his opinion is not mine. As the son of a pioneer school teacher and a pioneer preacher, I have known more than a dozen newcomers here in my lifetime. It is my opinion that Ozona is not unfriendly to newcomers at least not intentionally. Some times we imagine that Ozona is unfriendly, when in fact we just don't know. For instance, take the newcomers who have lived here all their lives. They are the natives. They are a hundred per cent Ozona. All except the older ones were born here and here all their lives. They have intermarried, and live under these circumstances fairly close. They divide time between the ranch at home in town and usually pretty busy. The newcomers are fairly complete and they are only natural that they should spend their spare time with others of their kind. They are not hostile to the newcomers. They are just not aware of the newcomers. They do not know he is here. They do not know the case of the newcomers. Unless he is an oldtime business of being a newcomer feels a little lonesome, and even a little when he moves to a new place. He has pulled up his social life at the last place of residence and feels lost; he wonders if town will take him in. In his mind, he is fairly friendly to every contact with natives. He may imagine hostility where there is nothing more than a new acquaintance. You have to be fair to yourself, at least once in a while, how it feels. The newcomers are in the old social rules. Time was when newcomers were scarce in Ozona. When one came, his name was always noted and he usually visited him first. As people move into Ozona all the time. Some are here a few months only, and don't feel that it is worthwhile to cultivate friends and so on. The natives think, "Well, those people will soon go, why bother to make home among us?" What I want to say is that the newcomers cannot be blamed for anything; it is our way of life. It is our fault, but it is more or less inevitable. Nothing can be done about it? The first place, the natives are a little harder to understand a newcomer feels, and a little more effort to demonstrate friendliness. If each one would just meet and welcome newcomers in his own way eventually everyone would be in a better care of. A newcomer should meet the natives at least half way, if not more. He should show that he is friendly. If he goes to a rent house or apartment never goes where people do not meet.

years ago two families from the town where I lived, they came to church on Sunday and got acquainted. He belonged also to the men's class at Sunnyside. The woman attended the Women's Society and a class. The children came to school too. In a couple of years these people had a circle of acquaintances and friends. They began to get social with the natives. The lady told me, "I like this very friendly town." The other family sat at home at home. They said, "We are going to wait and see who we are, and whether the town is friendly." Despite the fact that they had bought a business (Continued on Last Page)

Little League Baseballers Play Here Sat. Night

Top Teams of Kid Circuits in Exhibition Game in Ozona

Two top teams from the San Angelo Little League Baseball Circuits will play an exhibition game in Ozona next Saturday night under the auspices of the Ozona Lions Club. President Charles Ratliff announced this week. The San Angelo Little League organization is composed of boys aged nine through 12 years and two separate leagues are booming in that city now, with a "little world series" a possibility to decide the city championship in the fall. The leading team in each league will be pitted in the exhibition game to be played here next Saturday night under the lights at the Lions Club softball field. The boys play in late afternoon but are excited by the plentiful lights at the Lions park here.

The team sponsored by Nathan's Jewelry is expected to be one of the teams to play here. The other team, from the other league, may be G & G Sales, Shepperson's or Bateman's, depending on the outcome of games slated the middle of this week. The three teams were in a potential tie at midweek but the one emerging on top at the close of play today will get the nod to make the trip to Ozona. Persons who have seen the Little League Leagues in action say that the boys do some exceptionally fine baseball playing most of the time and semi-pro grown-up baseball team managers sometimes look with covetous eyes upon the kid pitchers.

Proceeds from the local exhibition game will be split by the Ozona Lions Club and the Little Leagues. Admission charges will be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children. The game will go six innings and will last about an hour and a half.

Victim Eldorado Gas Truck Blast Is Buried Here

Collins Lad Grandson Of Former Ozonans, Bob Williams

Funeral services were held here Tuesday afternoon for Albert Alfred Collins, 9 years old, who was killed instantly about 7:30 Monday night in an explosion of an oil field tank truck in Eldorado. Three other children and the driver of the truck were injured in the blast.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Baptist Church here Tuesday afternoon with the pastor, Rev. Clifton R. Tennison, conducting the services. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery. The Collins child was a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Williams, former Ozonans, now living in Seminole, Texas, and a nephew of Buck Williams of Ozona. The father, Dan Collins, lives in Cleveland, Ohio.

The freak explosion occurred near the city hall in Eldorado while the tank truck, regularly used in hauling crude oil from the Schleicher county fields, was being filled with water to be hauled to the oil fields. The four children were playing on the truck when somebody dropped a match into an opening on the partly filled truck, igniting gases from the oil residue to cause a terrific explosion.

The Collins' child's body was hurled some 125 feet and landed on the roof of an adjoining church building, 20 feet from the ground. The body was badly mangled. The three injured children were Dale Bates, 7, Billie Bates, 8 and Carol Sue Bates, 10, children of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Bates of Eldorado. The truck driver, Luke Stevens, 37, suffered a broken ankle and other injuries.

Ozona Butane Leads Fastball League As First Half Ends

With only one game lost to date, that to Williams Magnolia last week, the Ozona Butane fastball team, defending champions of the city league, seem destined to repeat for the 1951 championship.

At any rate, the Gassers are leading the pack right now and the end of the first half of the league split season is near. The schedule is made through June and after that date league members will decide whether to continue the schedule to fall or make it a split season, with a play-off in the fall to determine the league champion.

All four teams composing the league, the Butaners, Magnolia, Williams Grocers and T & R Drillers, are gaining strength as the season progresses and the present league leaders by no means have a cinch on the crown again. Some interesting games are being played four nights a week, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday night of each week, at the Lions Club softball park, and a lot of fans are enjoying the games.

Moore Wildcat Tests Ellenburg; 2 Vaughan One Olson Oilers Final

Moore Exploration Co. of Midland No. 1 Don Ryburn, Crockett county wildcat 17 miles east of Iraan, was preparing to drill stem test from 8,110 to 8,150 feet in the Ellenburger after having good shows of oil in samples.

The Ellenburger was topped at 7,880 feet on elevation of 2,736 feet. Location is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 3-Q-MK&T survey.

Sinclair No. 1-65 University, one mile west outpost to the Midway Lane field, was running electric log surveys after getting water on a test from 8,082 to 8,130 feet in the Ellenburger, topped at 8,084 feet, 5,429 feet below sea level.

A 4,152-foot northwest outpost to the opener of the Lula (Devonian) field nine miles northeast of Iraan, Continental No. 3 C. T. Harris has been plugged and abandoned at 9,080 feet in the Devonian. The failure was 660 feet from north and east lines of section 16-3-WCRR survey.

Conoco No. 2 C. T. Harris, with 5 1/2-inch casing at 8,709 feet and total plug back depth of 8,680 feet, was swabbing two barrels of fluid hourly after acidizing.

Pumping 69.1 barrels of 25 gravity oil in 24 hours, Terrell Petroleum Co. No. 1-D Vaughan, Vaughan field, section 14-UV-GC&SF, was completed from open hole between 1,357 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1,393 feet with total depth 5,727 feet. The section was acidized with 3,000 gallons.

Pure No. 13 R. L. Vaughan, Vaughan field, section 61-OP-GC&SF, was completed on the pump in 13 hours, rating 168 barrels of 28.5 gravity oil from open hole between 1,394 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and 1,424 feet, the total depth. The section was acidized with 8,000 gallons. Gas-oil ratio was 345-1.

Plymouth No. 14-M Shannon, Olson field, League 1, Archer CSL was finished on the pump in 24 hours for 96.67 barrels of 21.4 gravity oil from open hole between 2,140 and 1,143 feet, the total depth.

Jack Harris, Ozona football coach, this week received a call to report for physical examination by the United States Marine Corps. Coach Harris served in the Marines in the last war and remained in the Marine reserve. He was alerted for call to active service in July.

Two-Way Radio Installed In New Grass Fire Truck

Ranchers Donate Equipment to Aid Work of Department

Ozona's newest fire truck, the versatile unit which is equipped with water tank, booster pump and an auxiliary pressure pumping unit useful in fighting grass fires as well as town fires, has been outfitted with a two-way radio unit to increase its usefulness, especially in fighting grass fires.

The unit was installed last week and is tuned to the local sheriff's department station. The equipment was donated to the Volunteer Fire Department by Crockett county ranchmen as a token of appreciation to the department for its work in fighting grass fires over the area during the past winter and to provide a means of more effectively fighting such outbreaks in the future.

Sometimes valuable time is lost in fighting grass fire over a wide area, and with the radio equipped truck and the two cars of the sheriff's department working together, new outbreaks or changes in the direction of a fire can be quickly reported and fire fighting tactics changed to meet the new situation before it gets out of hand, members of the department have pointed out. The new radio equipment might also be useful in summoning additional trucks to the scene of a fire, either in town or on grassland, through the local sheriff's department station.

The sending and receiving unit is mounted in the cab of the truck, with the power unit mounted in a compartment just behind the cab.

92 Enrolled In Baptist Vacation Bible School Here

Commencement Exercises to Be Held at 7:45 Friday Night

The annual Vacation Bible School of the First Baptist Church here had attracted an enrollment of 92 children at midweek and attendance so far in the school has averaged 82.

The school got under way Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock and classes are being held each morning from 8:30 to 11 o'clock. A full staff of teachers is in charge of the various departments and a routine of study, play and hand work is carried out each period.

Commencement exercises are slated for Friday evening, starting at 7:45 o'clock. The commencement program will consist of demonstrations of the joint service program of worship, scripture lessons, school motto and pledges to the flag and the Bible. The various departments will then be invited to view the handwork of the students and graduation certificates will be presented to each child attending three days or more of the school. Rev. Clifton R. Tennison, pastor, is the school principal.

New Pavilion for State Fair Livestock Show

Construction has started on a new \$125,000 Livestock Judging Pavilion that will be completed in time for the 1951 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 6-21.

R. L. Thornton, president of the state fair, said the new pavilion will fill a need long felt by fair officials, livestock exhibitors and fair visitors. The pavilion will have an arena 90 feet wide and 180 feet long. There will be seats for 3,200 spectators.

Adjoining the huge \$250,000 cattle barns completed in 1948, the structure will complete facilities for showing and viewing livestock that are unsurpassed in the Southwest, Mr. Thornton said.

Hollywood Writer Interviews Ozonans on Trail Driver Story

Allen Ervin, Hollywood, Calif., screen writer and double for Robert Taylor, popular screen actor, was a recent visitor to Ozona gathering material for a forthcoming story on the trail driving days of the early West.

Mr. Ervin came to Ozona to interview Hugh Childress, Sr., and Lee Childress to get some information about the life of their father, the late William Francis Childress, and other old timers of that and earlier ages.

Mr. Ervin also visited Mrs. Adah Clendenen, local antique and book shop dealer. He told Mrs. Clendenen that his new story will be titled "Gone West" and will be an epic of the trail driving days. Mr. Ervin doubled for Robert Taylor in "Ambush" and other pictures and will soon go to England with him to make a picture.

Rushing had requested a meeting date with Ozona civic leaders and air enthusiasts Tuesday of this week, but stormy weather in the Abilene area forced his plane down and he was unable to keep the date.

Ozona Teachers Join TSCW Traveling Unit To Study Industries

DENTON, Texas.—Getting college credit at Texas State College for Women for a three-week's trip over southern and eastern United States is part of the summer plan of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Joiner, teachers in the Ozona schools. Joiner is sixth grade instructor in the South Elementary School, and Mrs. Joiner, first grade teacher in the North Elementary School.

The couple will be in a group of 35 Texas teachers who left the TSCW campus Monday morning to tour industries and non-profit institutions and to sight-see en route. They travel by air-conditioned buses.

As a means of acquainting in-service teachers with the use of industrial resources in teaching, this traveling workshop is sponsored by the TSCW Department of Education, and is directed by Wayne Taylor of Denton.

Stops will be made in such places as Shreveport, Birmingham, Chattanooga, Oak Ridge, Roanoke, Richmond, Washington, D. C., New York City, Philadelphia, Wilmington, Pittsburg and Hershey, Pa.

State Approves Farm-Market Road To Vaughan Field

Nine Miles of Paving; Study Extensions to Other Fields

Texas Highway Department has approved the road from Ozona to the Vaughan oil field for Farm-to-Market construction and will pave nine miles of the road from its intersection with Highway 163 at the north edge of Ozona.

This was announced this week by County Judge Houston Smith. The Highway Department has allocated funds for the project and construction will begin as soon as engineering work can be done and the right-of-way secured and fenced.

The county will be required to secure the right-of-way and fence it, the state doing the balance of the job and maintaining the road, Judge Smith said.

This will be the second Farm-to-Market road project to be approved for this county, the first being the connecting road at Midway Lane from Big Lake to Eldorado, already under construction.

The nine miles of paving toward Vaughan field will connect that field by paved road to Ozona. County Commissioners are eyeing the project with a view to ultimately connecting the road to both Todd field and Midway Lane fields. Such a project would require approximately seven miles of road to connect Midway Lane and about five to connect with Todd field.

Colored Folk All Set For Ozona's All-Colored Rodeo

3rd Annual Event at Fair Grounds Monday And Tuesday

Colored folk of the entire West Texas area are looking forward to Ozona's third annual All-Colored Rodeo scheduled for Monday and Tuesday of next week, June 18 and 19.

A number of new features have been added to the show this year and one of the largest gatherings of colored people is expected for the two-day event.

The two nights programs will be packed with a varied program of calf roping, goat roping, goat hair pulling, bronc riding and steer riding and ribbon racing for the ladies.

The two-day Juneteenth celebration will be topped off with a free dance for the colored people at the fair grounds platform the night of June 19, with Pop Harrison's orchestra furnishing the music.

The all-colored rodeo, sponsored by the Ozona Roping Club, will be held at the fair grounds starting at 8 p.m. Admission charges will be \$1 for adults and 50¢ for children at each night's program. There will be added money in all the contest events and contestants will compete for day money and two-day average.

Ozona in Path of Local Shower Tuesday

Although most of the Crockett area has missed the bountiful rains that have been falling over a wide section of West Texas during the week's weather disturbances in the state, Ozona was in the path of a local shower Tuesday afternoon.

The fall came from the north and a swath of country in that direction and a few miles to the south of Ozona was benefited. The fall amounted to a little over a half inch here.

A brilliant electrical display last night was accompanied by a slow falling shower which added about a quarter of an inch of additional moisture here, with most of the county sharing in the fall in varying amounts.

HOW TO SAVE \$10,000,000,000

The Committee on Federal Tax Policy, a private organization headed by Roswell Magill, former under-secretary of the Treasury, has called for a \$10,000,000,000 cut in next year's federal budget. It states that this can be accomplished by prompt withdrawal of the federal government from the field of lending, a heavy reduction in Federal works spending, drastic curtailment of federal grants and subsidies, and an end to the federal purchase of commodities under the farm price support program.

This plan is in line with others — notably that of Senator Byrd, who has offered a detailed plan whereby the budget can be slashed by a comparable amount. In no case would the cuts affect the defense and rearmament effort. As a matter of fact, they would be of great service to the build-up of

our national strength by releasing materials and manpower which are now being expended in huge amounts on unnecessary undertakings. And, finally, they would stop, in part, government activities which are a strong spur to more inflation.

The people have been told that the world situation makes it necessary for them to accept heavy financial sacrifices, through higher taxes. No one doubts that the people will willingly pay whatever is needed to make the country secure. But this is a two-way street. The politicians must, as their part of the sacrifice, accept major retrenchment to nonessential government activities. So far, most of them have been completely unwilling to do that.

The choice is not between guns and butter. It is between sound, economical government and government which follows the example of the drunken sailor.

"CURE THE REASON"

A short time ago a plan to provide ample meat at staple prices for all consumers was presented to congressional leaders. It is called the "More Meat and How to Get It with a Common Sense Meat Program," and it is sponsored by a long list of national and regional organizations which represent farmers, ranchers, grain producers, meat packers and others — the people who grow, process and sell the nation's meat.

The plan is essentially a simple one. It recognizes the plain fact that price control cannot be effective and that it creates inflationary black markets, meat shortages, and consumer rationing. By contrast with this, the plan advocates all-out production, careful use of meat supplies, and sound anti-inflationary monetary and fiscal policies on the part of the government. As a press release states it, "Congress and the federal administration must strike at the cause of inflation and unsound dollars. Consumers must do their part with thrifty meat buying and use. It is good common sense to 'cure the reasons' for inflation."

The program emphasizes several specific objectives — to supply meat at prices in line with production costs; to guarantee the present and future meat needs of the country; to continue to provide the meat by-products used in manufacturing such vital medicines as insulin and cortisone, and to remove the opportunity for chiselers and crooks to take over the meat business as they so largely did in OPA days. To accomplish these ends, the sponsoring organizations have been grouped together in task forces with recommendations for concrete action.

This is the right kind of approach to the problem of infla-

tion. It should do a great deal to focus the public mind on the causes of inflation instead of just the symptoms.

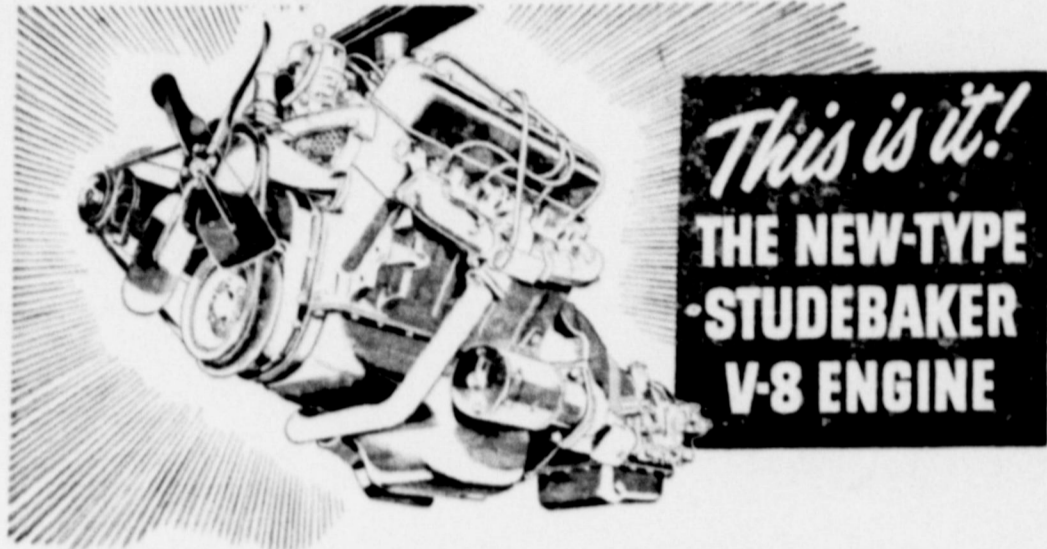

New Wildlife Laws In Texas Reviewed

AUSTIN. — Fifty-six bills bearing on wildlife were passed by the recent Legislature. A tentative check on the measures enacted indicates that only a few have a state-wide affect. Most of them were local bills. The major acts, according to the

Executive Secretary, were those to: Increase the Game & Fish Commission from six to nine members. Provide one hunting license at a cost of \$2.15 instead of the old small game license of \$2.00 and the big game license for \$2.15. Authorize the Commission to accept the state's share of the new federal tax on sporting fishing

equipment. Require boat-for-hire operators to furnish life preservers for each person using a rented boat, with game wardens empowered to enforce the law. Give local courts power to revoke hunting and fishing privileges after game or fish law violations. Phone the news to The Stockman.

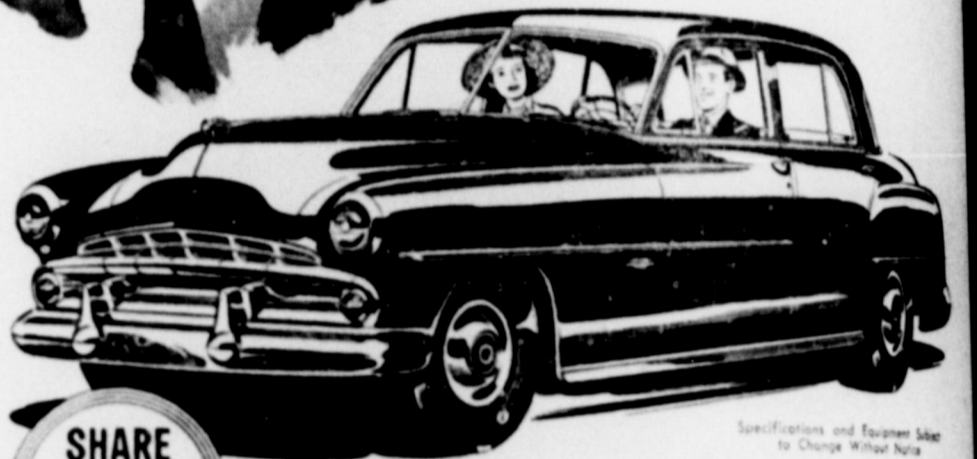

116,713 Texas Boys And Girls Engaged in 4-H Club Work in 1950

COLLEGE STATION. — Midway of the century 116,713 Texas rural boys and girls were enrolled in 4-H demonstrational work in agriculture and home economics. This great army of youths organized into 4,793 clubs "to make the best better," represented one out of every seven rural boys and girls of admissible age in the state. By groups they numbered 94,063 white and 24,174 Negro boys and girls.

The supreme value of this practical educational work conducted by the A. & M. College Extension Service is its formative influence upon youth. It touches all phases of agriculture and homemaking in the form of demonstrations. Doing it themselves not only removes prejudices against methods, but teaches that advanced practices in the business of farming and ranching are economical and profitable. In learning by doing, club members averaged 1.87 demonstrations in 1950 and 73 per cent completed them. As a consequence youth demonstration work reached 67,782 farm and ranch homes and 21,146 others.

The most popular demonstration on the basis of the number participating was swine, with poultry (including turkeys) beef cattle, home gardens, dairy cattle and sheep next in order. Clothing topped the list with home economics demonstrations, while foods, home furnishings and room improvement, home gardens and food preservation followed. It is worth noting, however, that girls did not overlook opportunities to demonstrate their versatility in agricultural demonstrations popular with boys. In 1950, they conducted demonstrations with poultry, dairy and beef cattle, sheep, swine and horses and mules. All demonstrations were supervised by county extension agents.

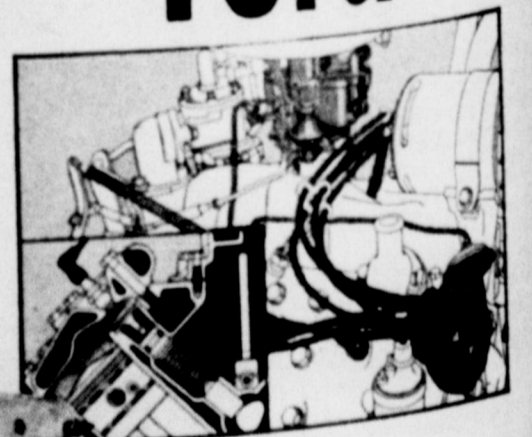

Advise Home Canners Not to Use Subtilin

AUSTIN. — Housewives should avoid use of subtilin, a new antibiotic, as a spoilage preventive in home food-canning, Dr. O. B. Williams, University of Texas bacteriology professor, reports.

Other researchers have claimed that the antibiotic — sold under various brand names at grocery stores — would prevent canned-food spoilage and cut canning costs when used with a mild heat treatment.

University researchers submitted approximately 30 types of bacteria to the new subtilin process under a wide variety of conditions and found some of the bacteria did survive and grow.

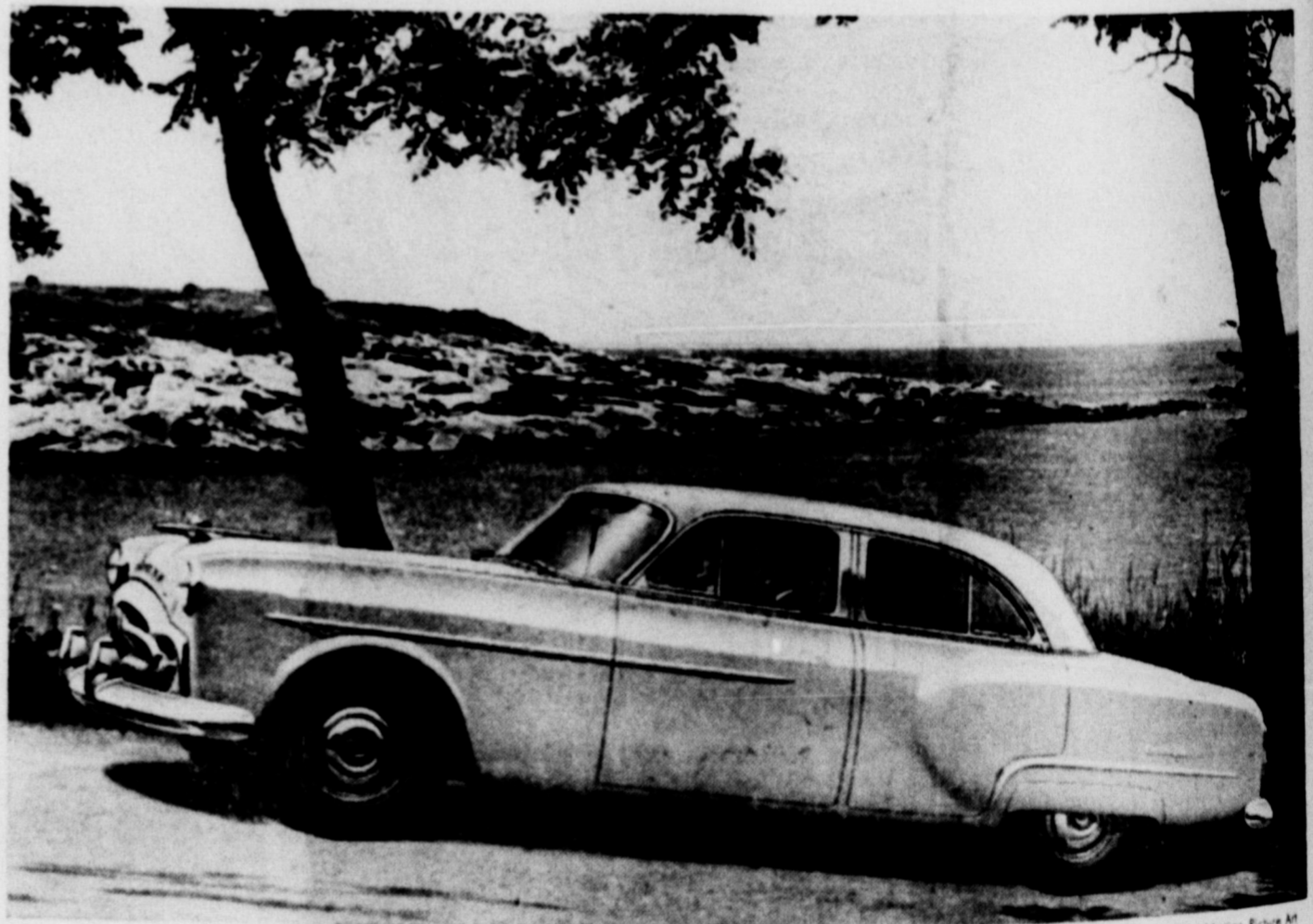
