Friday of next week, January, when all accumulated trash and rubbish is to be hauled by a fleet of trucks and pickups provided by the county and individuals who have donated use of such vehicles in the citywide cleanup drive.

There are conditions which need correcting all times of the year, a spokesman for the sponsoring organizations said, and a wintertime cleanup is being undertaken as a means of preventing early Spring disease outbreaks if possible and to remove rubbish accumulations which are likely to have been overlooked through the indoors winter months.

One of the greatest health menaces is the fly and effective control is a matter of removing their breeding places permanently, authorities declare. This insect is a known vecctor of dystentery or-22 ganisms and is suspected of complicity in the transmission of poirus, these officials sa

"The most important point to remember in municipal fly control is that the use of insecticides such as DDT is a supplemenetary measure and not a substitute for proper environmental sanitation, a bulletin of the Texas State Health Department says, "Every fly control campaign should begin with a comprehensive survey, and correction, if necessary, of local insanitary conditions.
