U. S. Army Officer, Captured By Communists In Korea, Escaped On Way To Execution, Tells Rotarians Of Experiences In Korean Fighting

Capt. Billy M. McCarver, U. S. Infantry, who recently was returned from service with the U. N. forces fighting the communists in Korea, gave Ozona Rotarians a graphic description of his experiences on the battle lines and as a captive of the communists in a talk before the club at its luncheon Tuesday.

Capt. McCarver, now stationed at the Abilene Army Recruiting office, was captured by the communists, held prisoner for 16 days and marched off with a group of U. N. soldiers to be executed before a firing squad but escaped during a raid by American aircraft on the way to the execution spot.

Unbelievable atrocities committed by the Chinese and North Koreans against U. N. captives was witnessed by the Army officer, he told Rotarians, but he refrained from recounting these in detail. "You simply would not believe me," he said.

While being interrogated by communist intelligence officers, Captain McCarver was told frankly of the communist plan to dominate the world.

"We'll take your country, too," the communist official told him. "And we think, without firing a shot."

A group of prisoners, handcuffed in pairs, were being marched out to face a firing squad, the officer told his audience. American planes came over in a raid and in the confusion, Capt. McCarver and the soldier handcuffed to him, made their escape. He presumed that all the others in the group were shot, since none have been heard from since.

U. N. forces are always outnumbered, from ten to a hundred to one, he said, and he described one defense line along a river which formerly figured in news dispatches from Korea as a strong defense line. Actually, it was a couple of foxholes atop each of a series of hills, he said, a thin line with no depth of defense.

Gas Distillate Strike On Owens By Cities Service

Well Flows 46.6 Bbls. In 2 Hours; Vaughan World Gain Oilers

Cities Service Oil Co. and others No. 1-D Owens, Crockett county gas-distillate strike one mile west of the Clara Couch (San Andres) field, flowed 46.6 barrels of 68 gravity, water white distillate in two hours and 15 minutes.

The flow was through a 3 1/2-inch tubing choke and perforations from 5,920 to 5,977 feet, which were acidized with 2,000 gallons. With 24-hour gas-oil ratio 30,900-1, flowing pressures were 900 pounds on the tubing and 1900 pounds on the casing.

No. 1-D Owens, with total plugged back total depth 5,978 feet, is in section 17-GG-GC&SF, 1 1/2 miles southwest of the Wolfcamp discovery in the Clara Couch pool and 3/4 mile south and slightly west of a shut-in Wolfcamp gas producer.

An oiler each has been gained by the World and Vaughan pools in Crockett county.

Rating 240 barrels of 29.5 gravity oil plus 58 per cent water on the pump in 24 hours, Standard No. 15-A Shannon in the World field was finished in 12 hours. Production was from open hole between 2,426 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 2,542 feet, the total depth. The section was acidized with 1,500 gallons. With Derrick floor elevation 2,644 feet, the well is in section 42-BE-EI&RI survey.

Pure Oil Co. No. 4 R. L. Vaughan in the Vaughan pool was completed on the pump in 24 hours for 225 barrels of 30.3 gravity oil plus 1-10 per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was 442-1. Production was open hole between 1,385 feet, where 5-inch casing was set, and 1,450 feet, the total depth. Location is in section 61-OP-GC&SF.

March Draft Call to Take 4,145 in Texas

AUSTIN. — Induction of 4,145 men for March was received by state Selective Service headquarters today, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, director of Selective Service for Texas, announced.

The call, Texas' part of a national quota of 80,000, compares with a state quota of 4,317 for February and 4,142 for January. The March call brings the number of men called for since the beginning of the conflict in Korea to 22,912.

Calls by month have been as follows: September, 2,513; October, 2,514; November, 3,453; December, 2,008; January, 4,142; February, 4,137; and March, 4,145. There is no indication yet as to size of the April call.

Local board quotas for the March call will not be made up until the latter part of January or the early part of February, the state Selective Service director said. Quotas and calls section of state headquarters must figure local board quotas, giving credit for enlistments from each area.

The men called up for the March quota will be furnished for the Army as well as those for January and February. All those called up in 1950 were furnished for the Army. So far only the Army has requested manpower under the Selective Service Act.

Calls are made by the Secretary of Defense on the director of Selective Service in Washington, who allots quotas to the states on the basis of federal draft law regulations, giving credits for enlistments of men from the states.

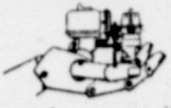

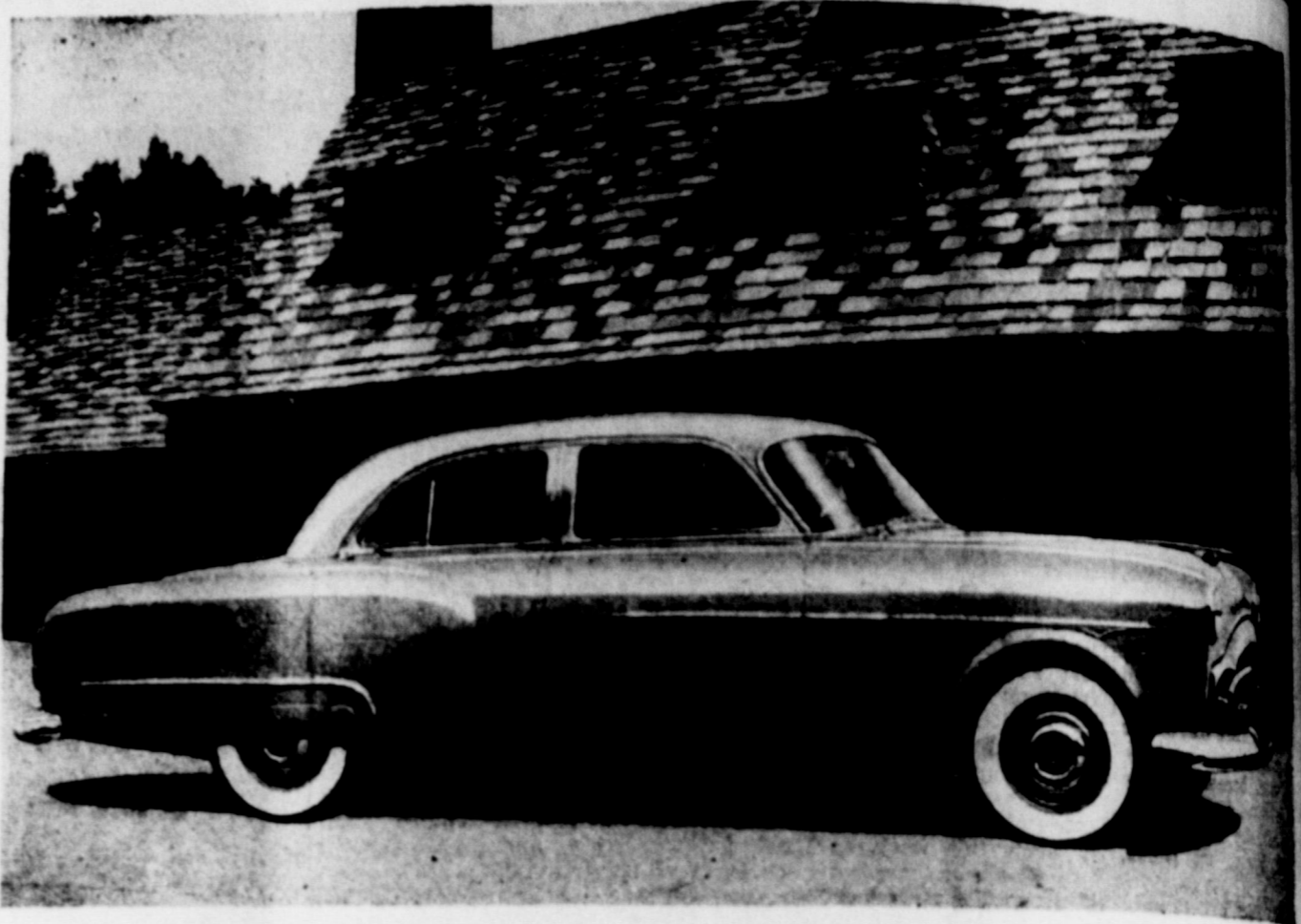
