Any dog, whether registered and tagged or not, known er suspected to be a killer of sheep goats, calves or other domestic animals or fowls, is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and such dog may be detained or impounded by any person until the owner may be notified, and until all damage done by said dog shall have been determined and paid to


