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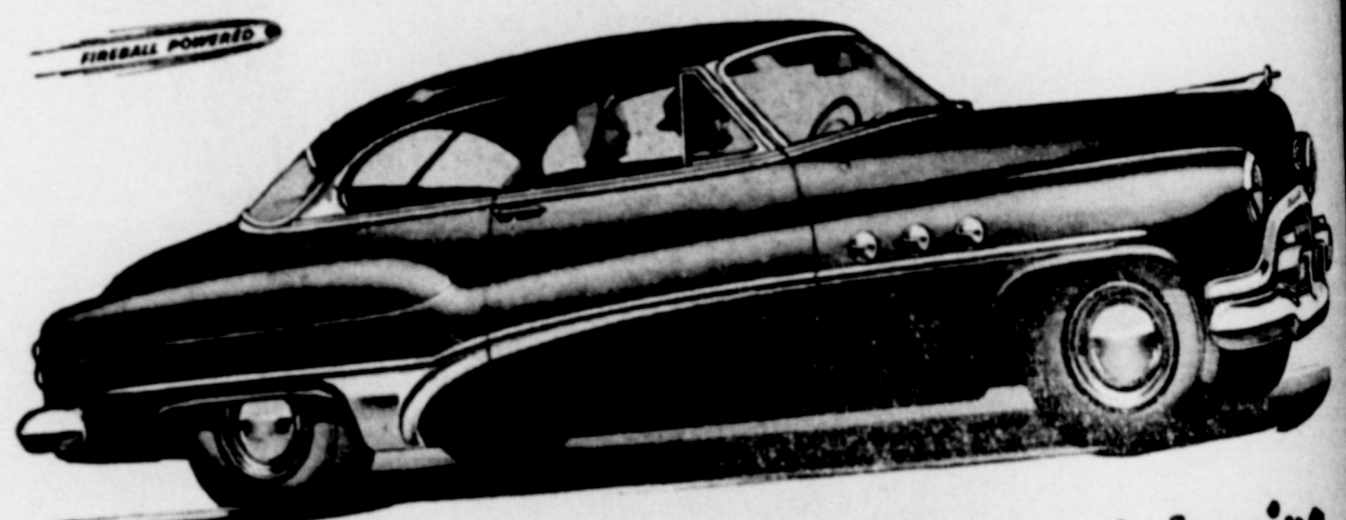

Spring Football Training Wind Up Game Friday Night

Coaches Optimistic on Team Prospects for Fall Season

In the first practice tilt Monday afternoon, the Purple Panthers were able to fashion a 19-13 victory over the Geese. High winds and a snappy cold day proved a small handicap to the hard-playing boys. Coach Harris complimented both squads on their passing game. At the Monday game, there were a number of spectators.

The Friday night wind-up will be played under actual game conditions. The coaches and team will give a short demonstration of some of the points of the game before game time. A large crowd is expected to attend.

"We have had a fine spring training. Coach Peltó and I are very well pleased with the progress shown by the boys during the month we have worked. All have shown a sincere desire to learn and work. Several of the new boys out have developed very well. We should have a good team next fall," Harris commented.

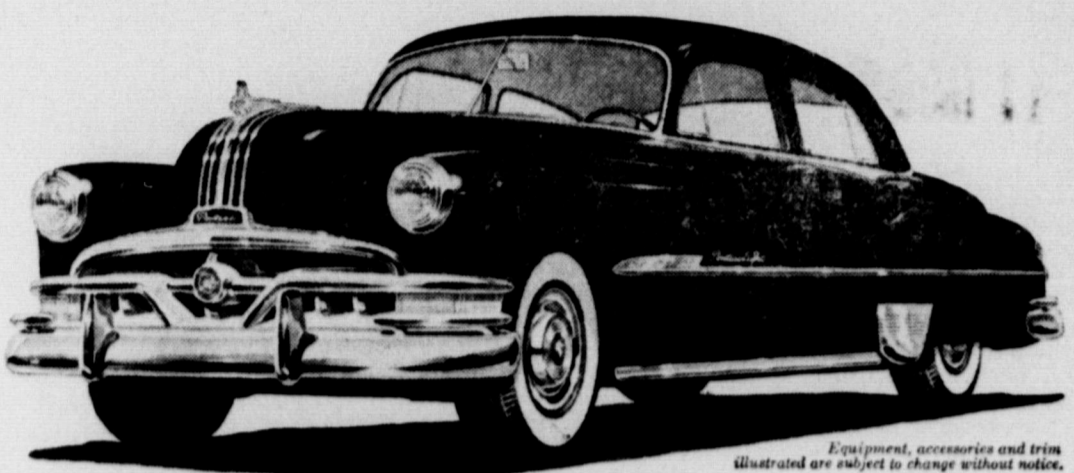

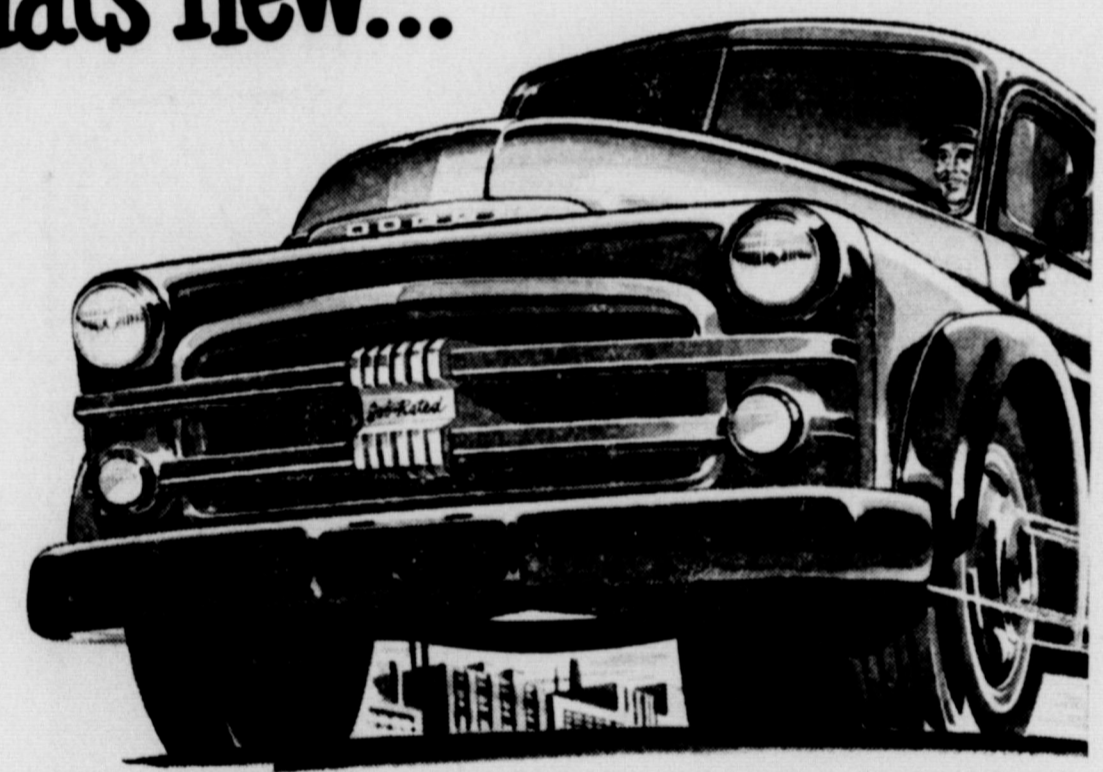

Regan Gets Assurance Steel Available for Oil Industry's Needs

WASHINGTON. — After a series of conferences with government officials, Rep. Ken Regan, 16th District, expressed confidence here this week that persons wishing to drill for oil will be able to get steel pipe and other necessary equipment.

Maj. J. R. Parten, the Texan who is special consultant to Interior Department Secretary Oscar Chapman, personally assured Regan that the steel would be available.

Recently Regan led a delegation of Odessa citizens to talk with another independent oil operator now in government, R. C. Lawton, who is director of the oil production branch, Petroleum Administration for Defense. They came away assured that West Texans could get steel. They expressed optimism about future development of the oil industry.

"This question of steel supplies for the oil drilling program is of great importance to us in West Texas," said Regan. "Our economy depends on it."

Here's what Lawton told Regan

and the citizens from Odessa: Sufficient steel for both independents and majors to drill more wells for oil and gas is now felt to be assured. Arrangements have been made through the entire set-up of government to channel supplies to the oil men. All departments are agreed that to secure record production for defense, 44,000 wells must be drilled this year.

Steel mills will start working on this on April 1 and close to 1,000,000 tons of steel has been allocated for well pipe. The program will provide that independent operators and independent supply dealers will have just allocation of pipe which appears to be ample to take care of both major and independent oil operators without steel going into the black or gray market.

Lack of Elementary Training Makes Poor High School Spellers

AUSTIN. — Decreased emphasis on spelling in elementary grades is causing a decline in high school students' spelling ability, Dr. Fred C. Ayer, University of Texas distinguished professor of educational administration, says.

Dr. Ayer discovered the decline in his 1950 national survey, similar to 1915 and 1925 investigations. In 1915, for example, 100 per cent of the ninth grade pupils tested spelled "trouble" right. In 1925, 95 per cent spelled it correctly, and in 1950 only 91 per cent could spell the word.

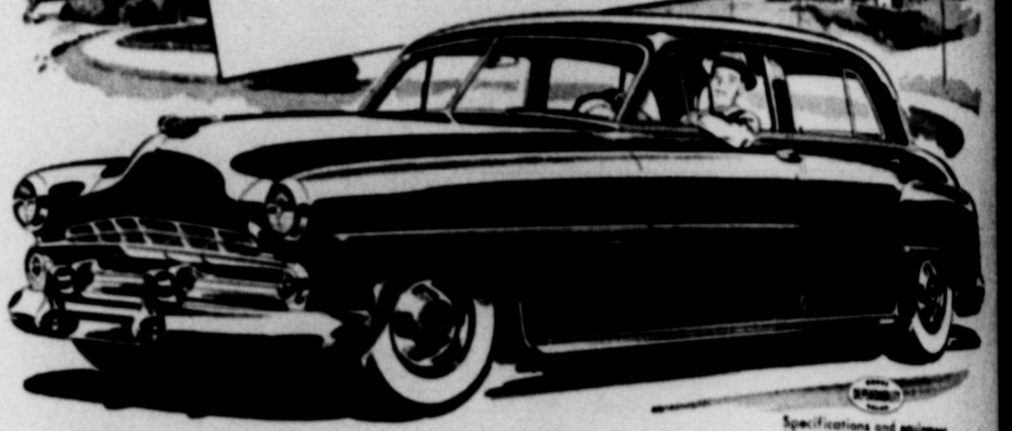

NOTICE OF ENFORCEMENT OF LAWS REGARDING STRAY DOGS IN CROCKETT COUNTY

It has come to the attention of the Commissioners Court of Crockett County that stray dogs are depredating on livestock in pastures adjoining the town of Ozona and causing considerable financial loss to ranchmen. Stray dogs have become so numerous in Ozona that the Court feels that immediate action toward curbing their depredations is imperative.

Therefore, the court has decided to employ a dog pound man whose duty it shall be to catch and destroy stray dogs in and around Ozona in so far as the law permits and directs.

Crockett county has a dog law license law which requires all dogs to be registered and tagged. The law provides that it shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog six months or more of age to allow any such dog to run at large unless the animal has been registered and tagged.

The law further provides that "it shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog to allow such dog to run at large between sunset and sunrise of the following day, unless such dog has securely fastened about his mouth a leather or metal muzzle as will effectively prevent such dog from killing or injuring sheep, goats, calves or other domestic animals or fowls." The above paragraph applies whether the dog is registered or not.

The law offers protection to owners of domestic animals against depredation by dogs, in the following language, being Sec. 3 of Art. 1371, Tit. 17 of the Penal Code:

"Any dog, whether registered and tagged or not, when found attacking any sheep, goats, calves and or other domestic animals or fowls, or which has recently made, or is about to make such attack on any sheep, goat, calves and / or other domestic animals or fowls, may be killed by anyone present and witnessing or having knowledge of such attack and without liability in damage to the owner of such dog. Any dog, whether registered and tagged or not, known or suspected to be a killer of sheep, goats, calves or other domestic animals or fowls, is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and such dog may be detained or impounded by any person until the owner may be notified, and until all damage done by said dog shall have been determined and paid to

the proper parties. Any dog known to have attacked, killed or injured any sheep, goat, calf or other domestic animal or fowl shall be killed by the owner of such dog, and upon failure of such owner so to do, any sheriff, deputy sheriff, constable, police officer, magistrate, or County Commissioner is authorized to kill such dog, and such officer is further authorized to go upon the premises of the owner of such dog for such purpose."

The Commissioners Court does not want valuable and harmless dogs destroyed and such officer as is employed for this duty will make every effort to spare those dogs which are being cared for and whose owners are making every effort to prevent their running at large in the town and countryside. However, any dog found running at large at night, whether tagged or not, and any untagged dog found running at large at any time, will be subject to impounding and destruction.

This notice is being published so that dog owners throughout the community may be apprized of the situation and plans of the county authorities to curb the depredations of stray dogs, and in order that owners of dogs may take steps to restrain or muzzle their pets and thus prevent loss of such pets.

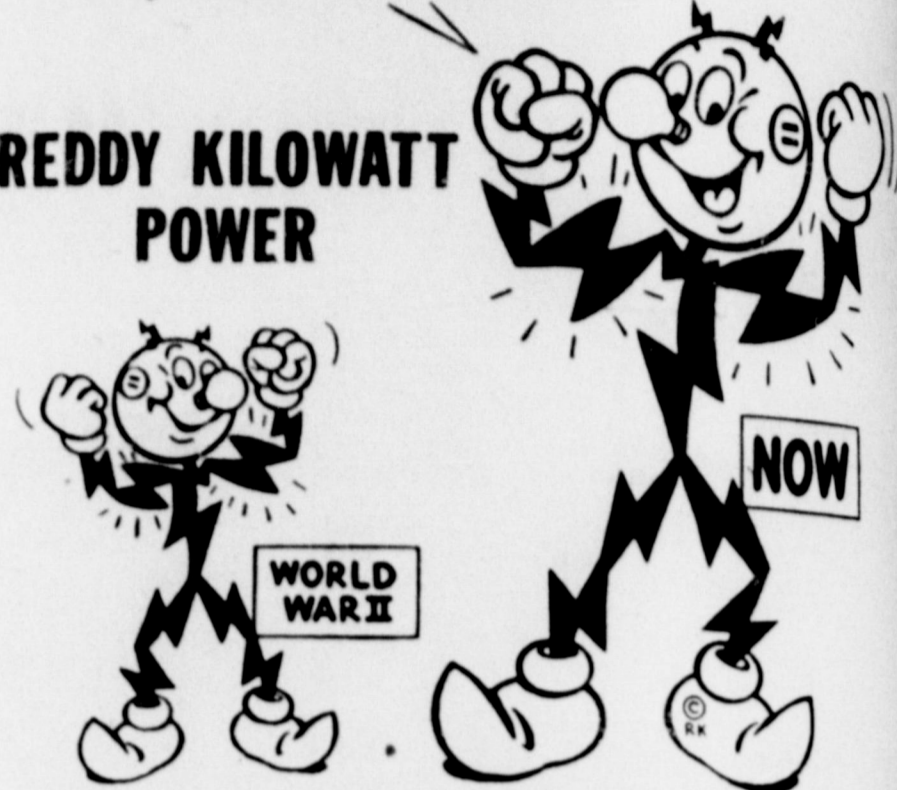

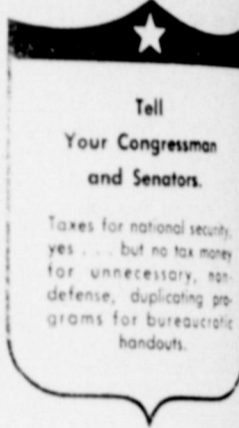
