## Roping Club Names Officers; Plans Programs

### Vic Montgomery Club Head; Matches for Summer Planned

New officers were chosen and plans made for the summer roping programs at a meeting of the Ozona Roping Club Wednesday afternoon.

Vic Montgomery was named president of the club for the coming year; Bob Bailey was chosen vice president and Bud Cox, secretary-treasurer.

The club set the first summer roping event for the third week in May, a week before the annual Sheriff's Posse Horse Show. A roping and some jackpot events will be held Sunday, June 1, following the Horse Show on May 30 and 31. The club plans to buy roping calves between April 20 and May 1 and put them on feed here to be ready for the summer programs. Saturday night ropings throughout the summer are on the club's program.

Plans were also discussed for the annual All-Colored Rodeo set for June 18 and 19. Several new features are to be added to this year's program including bronc riding, wild mare races in addition to the usual calf roping, goat roping, hair pulling and other tests. A greased pig race for the colored youngsters is also among added features planned.

Purses will be added to all events this year and the two-day show will end with a big dance on the fair grounds platform for the colored folk, with a colored orchestra providing the music.

Committees have been named to secure bucking horses for the colored rodeo and range mares will be secured for the mare races. The arena is to be reconditioned and another bucking chute made to speed up the events.

### March 25 Deadline for Filing for April 5 Trustee Election

With the annual trustee election a little over two weeks away, only one candidate has so far filed for place on the ballot. County Judge and Superintendent Houston Smith announced this week.

Brock Jones, president of the school board, whose term expires this year, is the first to file for a place on the ballot. Other members of the board whose terms expire this year are T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Vernon Ratliff and Beecher Montgomery.

The deadline for filing application for a place on the ballot is March 25, Judge Smith advised. No filing fee is required and any citizen may file and have his name placed on the ballot.

The election at which four trustees will be chosen will be held Saturday, April 5.

Holdover members of the board, who will serve one more year on their present terms are Arthur Kyle, Henry Witcher and George Buzger.

## Stragglers Sought To Make Scholastic Census Here Complete

In a whirlwind campaign, in which all members of the faculty of the Ozona school system took part, the annual scholastic census was completed here Tuesday afternoon, with the exception of those homes where residents were away at the time the census takers called and in the oil and pipeline camps over the county.

The deadline for completing the count of children of scholastic age in the county is April 1 and the time remaining between now and that date will be spent by the faculty members in rounding up as many of the stragglers as possible.

The school system's receipts from the state apportionment of funds depends on the scholastic enumeration, each pupil so enumerated the past year meaning \$62 in state funds for operation of the schools. This fact was pointed out by school officials in calling for all parents of children between the ages of six and eighteen, inclusive, to lend a hand to the faculty in seeing that their children are enumerated.

Parents who are not sure their children have been counted are urged to call Supt. Lem Bray at the high school building and give him the information. As nearly a complete count as possible is desired and the cooperation of parents to that end is earnestly solicited.

## Pure Slates Shallow Wildcat on Cox Ranch

Pure Oil Co. has staked a Crockett county wildcat, its No. 1 L. B. Cox. The project will drill to 1,500 feet with cable tools.

Location will be 330 feet from north and 2,310 feet from west lines of section 7-J. H. Gibson survey, on a 960-acre lease. It will be 1 1/2 miles west and slightly south of Delta-Gulf No. 1 Lee, dry hole abandoned March 24, 1951, at total depth of 10,996 feet. This project topped the San Andres at 1,120 feet on elevation of 2,485 feet.

Crockett wildcat drilling depths: Sun No. 1 Mitchell, 8,367 feet in shale and sand; Sinclair 1-76 University, 6,640 feet in sand and shale; Magnolia 1 Henderson, 9,394 feet in lime and shale.

## Board Renews Contracts Of All Ozona Teachers

### New Salary Schedule To Result In Increases For Teachers

New contracts for the 1952-53 school year were offered all present members of the Ozona Public Schools faculty in action taken by the board of trustees in meeting Tuesday night.

A new salary schedule adopted by the board, to be effective with the new school year, will result in slight salary raises for a majority of the teachers.

The new schedule leaves the base pay at the same figure, \$2,800 for teachers with B. A. degrees and \$3,000 for those with Master's degrees, but raises from \$50 to \$60 a year the additional amount per year added for each year of experience a teacher has had, up to 12 years with B. A. degrees. Teachers with maximum experience in each category will be able to earn an additional \$720 a year in the case of B. A. degree holders and \$1,200 a year additional for those with master's degrees.

The school board gave a life to proposed Little League baseball program in Ozona this summer when it agreed to contribute \$250 in cash toward success of the program and in addition will provide housing in one of the vacant teacher housing units for the paid director of the program.

The Little League is being sponsored here by the Ozona Lions Club and Charles Ratliff of that organization presented the facts of the plan to the board at its Tuesday night meeting. The Lions Club has a fund of approximately \$250 on hand, profit from the recent "Shooting Stars" home talent show, which is allocated for use in its promotion of the Little League program.

The building program now under way and other routine matters occupied the board in the balance of its discussion.

## First Baseball Workout Slated Sunday Afternoon

### Stuart Must Recruit Team to Play House Of David Apr. 11

There's no surer way to find out whether or not there are enough baseball players to form an independent team, than to start batting and throwing the ball around in practice.

So says Ozona's number one baseball player-manager-promoter Byron Stuart and he has set next Sunday afternoon as the time for the first baseball workout of Spring and has invited all potential players to be at the Powell Field park at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon to have a part.

Stuart has promised to rake up a few bats and balls for the first lumber-up session. Later, if enough material shows up to give promise of an organization to play independent ball this summer, means will be sought to put the team in business for the campaigns.

The first game has already been matched for the still formative Rebels, and Stuart faces the necessity of getting a team of some sort together by April 11. That is the date when the House of David baseball team will be here for a go with the Rebels, and unless enough local talent shows up to form a team, Stuart says he may have to "borrow" some players from surrounding towns for the game.

Anyway, there'll be a baseball game on that date, with the players on one side wearing long whiskers.

Several prospective players have shown up in the past week in response to Stuart's invitation of last week and he is optimistic over prospects for assembling an aggregation that can hold its own in West Texas independent circles.

## Two Arrested for Theft of Drill Line In Crockett Oil Field

Two Iran men were arrested late Wednesday and brought to the Crockett county jail to await hearing on a charge of theft over \$50 filed in justice court here in connection with the alleged theft of an oil field drill line, valued at approximately \$400.

Charged here in connection with the theft were Eugene Whittaker and Joe Whitefield, both said to have been employed with a road construction contractor.

The drill line, property of the McGowan Drilling Co., was stolen from a McGowan rig being operated under lease by John Childress and J. B. Miller, Ozona independent operators. Childress and Miller had bought a new drill line for the rig and laid aside the McGowan line, used for one well.

The operators found the line Tuesday near the location where it had been loaded aboard a two-wheel trailer. They let air out of the trailer tires and removed one valve core and summoned officers. When they returned, the trailer and drill line were gone.

Deputy Billy Mills and Hearst Laws went to investigate the theft Wednesday and after a tour of the oil field area traced the missing line to Iran where it was discovered in possession of one of the men, the officers reported. A winch truck had been used to load trailer and line.

A hearing for the two men was scheduled this morning.

## Crockett Water Control Dist. Wins Loving Cup For Attractive Plant

AUSTIN. — Twelve Texas cities have won awards from the Texas Department of Health, and twenty-three others have been recognized for maintaining municipal water supplies which conform to State Health Department standards.

The awards — loving cups and plaques — are presented every year by State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox to cities making outstanding progress in water and sewage treatment plant operation.

Named to the 1951 Honor Roll were:

Jefferson County Water Control and Improvement District at Groves for having the highest percentage of its population connected to the public water system.

Marshall for having the best water plant for control. The Marshall plant daily performs bacteriological and chemical analysis of its water.

Fredericksburg, for having the highest percentage of its population connected to the sanitary system. No outdoor toilets exist in Fredericksburg.

Del Rio for having the highest ratio of sewer connections completed last year. Del Rio made 450 connections in 1951.

Burnet was designated as making the most advantageous use of its sewage effluent for irrigation. San Angelo was selected for making the best use of its sewage sludge.

San Antonio was designated as maintaining the best sewage plant laboratory. Modern facilities are available at this plant, Dr. Cox said, and competent personnel are in charge.

Crockett County Water Control District at Ozona won a loving cup for keeping the most attractive water plant, and Baird won a cup for making the most improvement to its water system.

Loving cups were also presented to Bandera for having the most attractive sewage plant; Mason for making the best quality sewage effluent; and to Longview for making the greatest improvement to its sewage plant.

## One Dead, Five Injured In Two Highway Crashes

### Sanderson Man Dies In Comstock Accident; 3 Hurt North of Ozona

One man is dead, two seriously hurt and two others slightly injured as the result of two auto accidents in the area the past week-end.

Raymundo Escamilla, whose home was in Sanderson but who had been living in Ozona for several years, was fatally injured early Saturday morning in an accident 11 miles north of Comstock on Highway 163. Escamilla died in a Del Rio hospital Sunday morning.

Guadalupe Garza, Jr., of Ozona, driver of the 1949 Ford in which Escamilla was a passenger, and Fermin Garza, also a passenger, were only slightly hurt in the accident. The car overturned and was badly damaged.

Three Ozonans, Eusevio Ramirez, Sostenes Porras and Lorenzo Ramirez were hospitalized here following the crash of a 1952 Studebaker car on the Ozona-Barnhart highway Sunday afternoon. Eusevio Ramirez, owner and driver of the car, lost control of the vehicle and it turned over several times after striking a bridge. The car was practically demolished.

Mr. Jacoby will succeed Paul Newton, who left last week for Menard to assume his duties as county agent there.

Mr. Jacoby occupied several official offices in Junction, all of which he has resigned to become Crockett county agent. He was secretary-manager of the Junction Chamber of Commerce and a member of the Junction Independent school board, of which he was secretary.

The new agent, a native of Menard county, is a graduate of A & M College, class of 1940, and is a veteran of four years service in the Army during World War II. He was with the Houston Stockyards for two years before going to Junction.

Mrs. Jacoby and their two sons, Billy, 8, and David, 4, will remain in Junction until the close of the present school year.

#### TYRANNY THROUGH IGNORANCE

One of the best signs of the times is the angry attention that is being given to the President's proposed budget. Individuals and newspapers the country round have been denouncing it as an economic monstrosity which is practically beyond understanding. As an example, the Washington Post, which has usually followed a pro-Administration editorial policy, demanded a balanced budget without new taxes or further borrowings, and said, "The President's budget estimates are almost always wrong. . . The President, through his subordinates, is also influenced to exaggerate beyond normal error." The Post then advocated deferring such new proposals as federal aid to state educational systems, and cuts in costs all along the line. Life strongly criticized Congress for having lost its powers over or national purse strings and said, "Congress had damn well better pass some self-reforming acts and give itself these powers. Otherwise the federal budget will remain the incomprehensible sign

of America's creeping retreat from political self-control to tyranny through ignorance."

That phrase, "tyranny through ignorance," should stick in the mind of every American who has the slightest interest in honest, efficient government and in the preservation of economic and political freedom. When the people and their elected representatives are basically ignorant of matters affecting their welfare and very survival, the stage is all set for the appearance of the tyrant. The proposed budget is just one more grim example of how a nation can destroy itself from within.

#### ANOTHER LABOR GROUP OPPOSES SOCIALISM

In the last year or so, an impressive list of labor organizations has gone on record in opposition to the socialization of industry.

The Michigan State Utility Workers Joint Council, which is made up of CIO utility unions, took that step recently. It called for a halt of government ownership of utilities "before it enmeshes the entire labor movement." It pointed out, in effect, that "cheap" government power is a fraud, as many of the real costs are paid for by taxes. It then asked that this be changed "so that the taxpayers of one section of the country are not paying for lower electric rates charged in other parts of the country."

Union labor's changing attitude toward socialism is highly significant. Up until relatively recently the major labor organizations stood solidly for public ownership of utilities of all kinds. Now labor has been discovering that when government takes over, labor's hard-won rights go out the

window. No group can bargain on fair terms with all-powerful government.

Free labor and free enterprise have fought many battles. But one thing is certain — they'll live together or die together.

#### Soil Conservation Week Designated May 4 to 10

Landowners throughout this area are making plans for observing Soil Conservation District Week, a special period set aside by the Texas Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors to emphasize the importance of conservation in all its phases.

The March issue of "Soil and Water," the magazine published by the landowners of Texas, gives prominent display to the special week by publishing a proclamation by Gov. Allan Shivers, along with pictures and articles.

In his proclamation Gov. Shivers, pointing out the "Texas landowners have organized 164 soil conservation districts under state law covering approximately 95 per cent of the land area of Texas," says that "these districts and the Texas landowners who operate them, assisted by the many organizations concerned with conservation of our soil and water resources, are proving that known con-

servation techniques will stabilize our water and render our land more productive. "Soil and water conservation," he said, "is bringing benefit to Texas, and that all groups and whether government or private, should assist in and its observation." The week of May 4 has been designated by the Texas Association of Soil Conservation District Supervisors throughout the state as "Soil Conservation District Week," and district operators throughout the state are observing the week.

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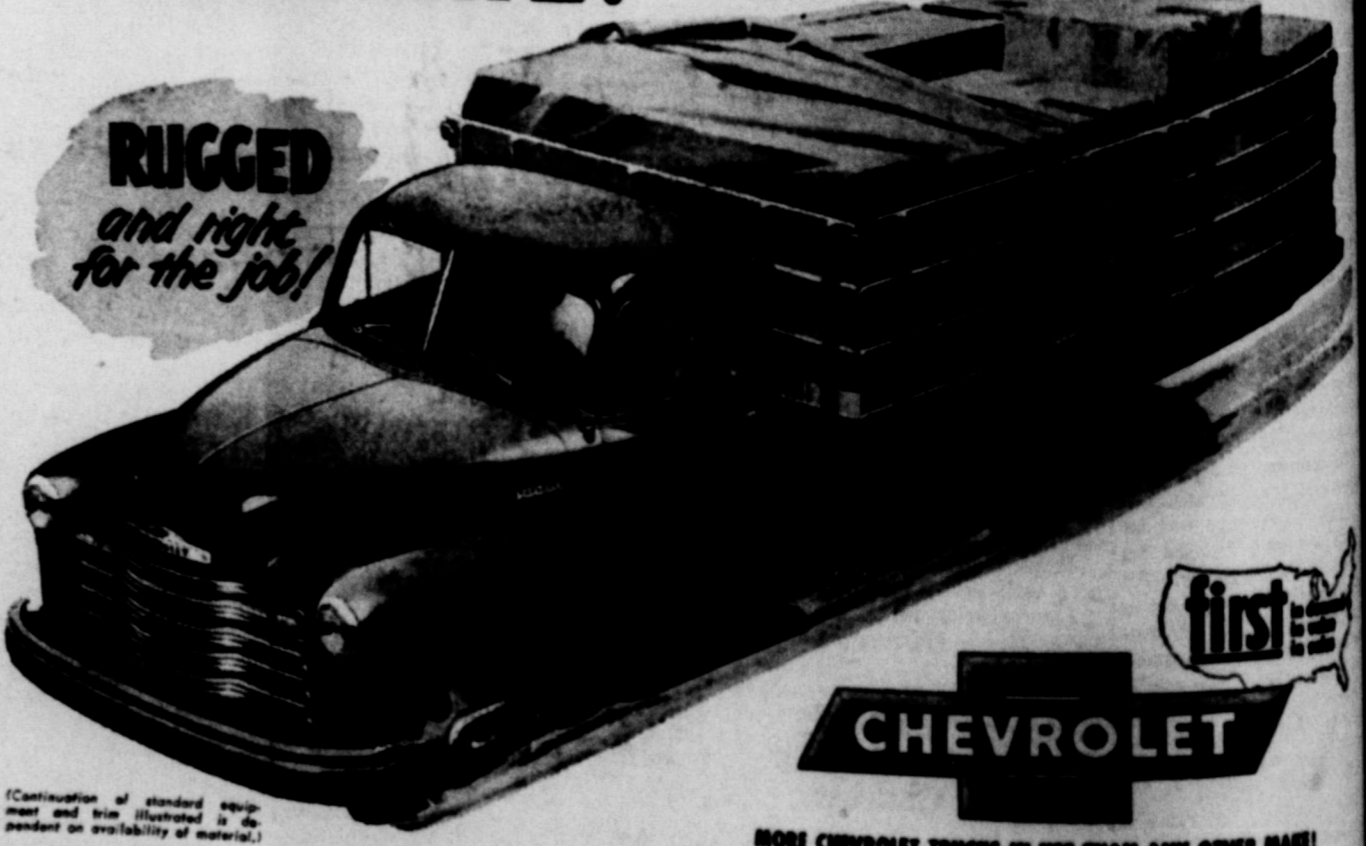

Now, that wasn't so bad, was it? Next, you must call on her. There (Continued on Page Four)



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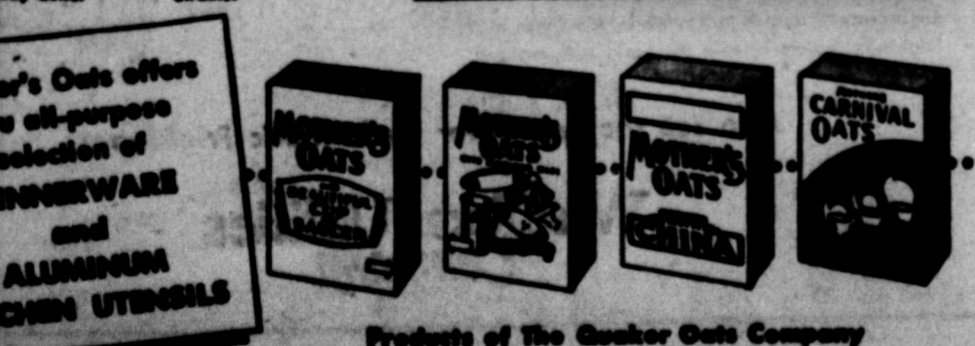
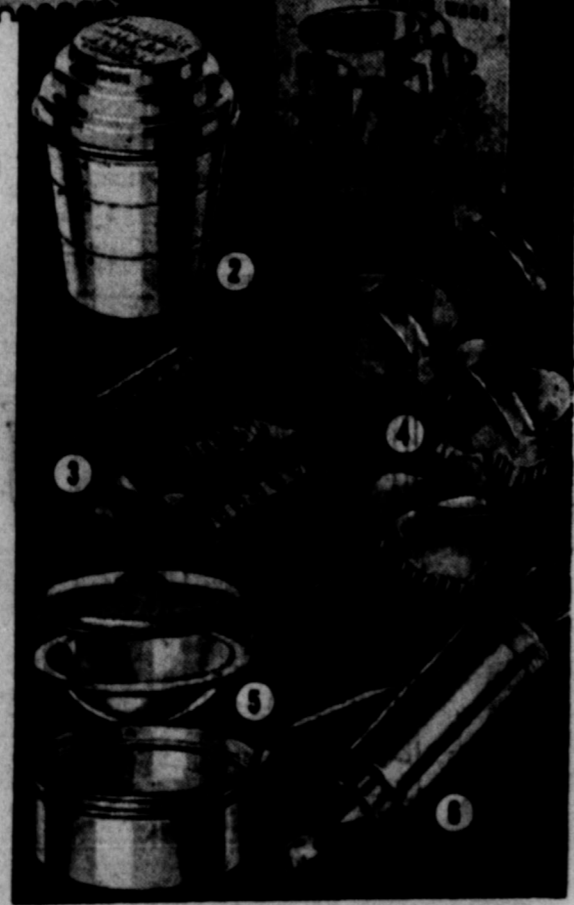

### 'Handbook of Texas' Contains Article on Crockett Co. History

The following article on Crockett county, taken from The Handbook of Texas, is presented for reader interest. If readers wish to report inaccuracies, they should write to the Managing Editor, The Handbook of Texas, Texas State Historical Association, University Station, Austin 12, Texas.

It is hoped that The Handbook of Texas, a two-volume work containing approximately fifteen thousand articles dealing with every phase of Texas life from the primitive Indian to the present time, will be available for purchase late in 1952.

#### CROCKETT COUNTY

Crockett county, on the Edwards Plateau of Southwest Texas, is bounded on the west by the Pecos River. The area of 2,794 square miles has rough stony land and shallow stony soil. Altitude varies from 1,500 to 2,500 feet; climate is warm and semiarid with a uniform average rainfall of about 16 inches; mean annual temperature is 69 degrees. Aridity has prevented the development of agriculture. Some cedar, mesquite and live oak are found, most of the timber being used for home consumption. Oil was discovered in April, 1928. More than 99 per cent of the land is used for grazing. The major livestock industry is the raising of sheep, mostly of the Rambouillet breed. Sheep

were introduced in the county in 1877 and began to predominate over cattle in about 1915. Cattle are second in importance. Raising of goats increased rapidly, from 943 head in 1910 to 36,349 in 1930, but the number has been decreasing since 1930. The county also produces horses, mules and hogs.

The Crockett area was Apache Indian country in the early period of Texas history. In 1683 Juan Dominguez de Mendoza and Fray Nicolas Lopez crossed the county on their return from a visit to the Jumano and to the borders of the Tejas country. The first settlements were supply depots and outposts from wagon trains going west on the old Chihuahua Trail. The primary outposts were Howard Springs and Fort Lancaster. The government established stage stands to furnish fresh teams for carrying the mail through the area after the beginning of the California gold rush. Following the Civil War, Anglo-Americans moved into the frontier region and took up the unoccupied lands, but Indian depredations discouraged settlement until the United States sent troops to the frontier posts. The Texas Legislature provided three battalions of rangers for

protection of that area in September, 1866.

The original county, including present Crockett, all of Sutton and Schleicher counties, and parts of Val Verde, Kinney and Edwards counties, was created from Bexar county on February 10, 1875. It was attached to Kinney county until 1885, when Val Verde county was created and Crockett became a subsidiary. Sutton and Schleicher counties were created out of Crockett on March 25, 1887. An election on July 7, 1891, provided for the organization of Crockett county, the site of the E. M. Powell well, present Ozona, in the county. In 1948 Ozona was the only town in the county and the nearest railroad point was Barnhart, thirty-two miles distant.

Population began to increase with the organization of the county and jumped from 194 to 1,591 in 1900. In 1940 the population was 2,809 and by 1950 reached 3,963. The entire county composes one common school district.

them, we granted the federal government unprecedented powers and rights which were not parts of our political traditions and which, except for the crises that seemed to exist, we would never have granted at all. Somehow we have never been able to recover those rights and powers. One grant has seemed to call for another. We have been in the peculiar position of disclaiming Socialism as a national objective, while at the same time accepting much of the Socialistic program piecemeal. It has seemed that our course for the past thirty-five years has been more a course of expediency than of principle. One of the most obvious factors in the public mind of today is a conviction that we must somehow get back to a more strict and consistent following of basic Constitutional principles.

One cannot escape a feeling that there is much solid wisdom in the mass American mind. Individuals may and often do, go astray. Groups within the country frequently get off on tangents. Wrong ideas have a way of appealing powerfully to the best balanced men on some occasions. But in the long run and on the whole, the American mind is about the most dependable guide we have. I, for one, believe that we are going to restore a balance in this country between legislative control on the one hand, and natural economic law on the other. We are not going to try to turn back the clock or throw away the genuine gains we have made. Through the November elections we are going to register the fact, I trust, that a majority of us believe that individual freedom of action with responsibility is harmonious with the public welfare.

The ship of state — to use an old figure — sometimes has to sail into a wind. The only practical way to sail into a wind is to follow a zig-zag course to the right, then the left, then back to the right. We have had a long swing to the left and we are probably off the true course. A turn to the right is overdue. And if one can judge by the signs of the times, this Fall we are going to make that turn to the right. The year 1952 will, indeed, be a year of decision, and, we hope, of wise decision.

Hormones May Rid Rangeland of Noxious Brush And Weeds

AUSTIN.—Ranchers now can use hormone sprays to clear pastures of misquitos and other large brush as well as weeds, a special lecturer at the University of Texas reports.

He is Dr. George Sherman Avery, Jr., Brooklyn, N. Y., Botanic Garden director and famed plant scientist, who is a visiting instructor for a graduate course in botany.

"Such hormones, or chemical substances which are growth factors, won't harm pasture grasses," Dr. Avery said. "Two effective hormones for improving pastures are 2, 4-D and 2,4,5-T, which will kill

cactus, elm black blue brush, sand as well as mesquite.

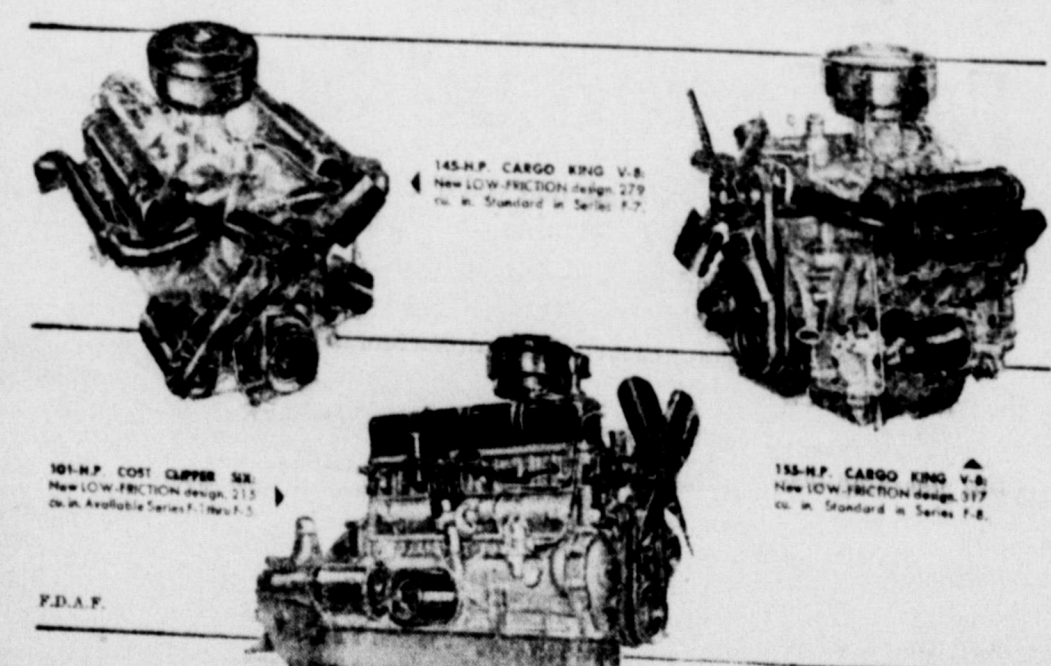
He also described how can be used to control wheat, rice and citrus keep citrus fruits off prematurely; rosebud growth in stocks.

"Ranchers, farmers can find the hormone spray for contacting agricultural hardwaremen, feed men, serymen," Dr. Avery said.

He predicted scientific hormone sprays will weed in most field crops freeze damage to peach and pear producing seedling pears.
