An additional \$6,100 has been made available to ranchers in Crockett county for soil and range conservation practices under the 1951 P.M.A. conservation program, Mrs. Mary Dunlap, administrative officer, announced this week.

The new fund, the second additional allotment received by this county since the original apportionment, will be available to operators who have not participated in the 1951 program but who are otherwise eligible to do so.

The new allotment makes a total of \$99,200 in federal funds spent in this county this year under the PMA program, the original allotment of \$87,000 and two supplemental allotments of \$6,100

1951 TAXES

Payable Beginning Oct. 1st

Your 1951 county, state and school taxes become due and payable on and after October 1.

The law specifies that tax bills may be paid on and after October 1. Therefore payment of taxes can not be accepted BEFORE October 1.

Except for school taxes, the same discount schedule for prompt payment as in previous years will be in effect this year. The discount will not be allowed on school taxes, but on county and state portions of the total tax bill, a discount of 3 per cent will be allowed in October, 2 per cent in November and 1 per cent in December.

If you mail in your tax remittance, deduct the amount of allowable discount, taking only the county and state portion of your taxes for computing the deduction. No discount may be taken from your school tax or poll tax.




