## State Ready To Let Contract On Vaughan Road

### Work to Start As Soon As County Provides Right-of-Way

The State Highway Department is ready to let contracts for construction of the first section of the new farm-to-market road connecting Vaughan Field to Highway 163 and to Ozona as soon as the county can acquire right-of-way, County Judge Houston Smith said this week.

Some difficulties brought about by a last-minute change in the route of the proposed road by state engineers are now in process of being resolved, Judge Smith said, and a meeting with land owners along the proposed route is to be arranged soon to complete the right-of-way deal.

The new road will intersect Highway 163 at the north edge of Ozona and will follow approximately the route of the present road in a northwesterly direction to the Vaughan Field.

The first section of the road will be approximately 11 miles in length. Ultimately, it is the plan of the state to build additional road to the north to connect with Farm-to-Market Road No. 33 from Big Lake to Eldorado, intersecting Highway 163 north of Ozona at Midway Lane.

## Sinclair University Wildcat Abandoned

Sinclair No. 1-76 University, northwestern Crockett county wildcat located C SE NW 27-7 University, has been plugged and abandoned at total depth of 9,131 feet after having recovered 5,850 feet of salty sulphur water, no shows of oil or gas, on a three-hour drillstem test between 8,900-9,026 feet, the plugged back total depth.

Deep Rock Oil Corp. No. 1 Shamrock estate, northwestern Crockett wildcat near C SW SW J. H. Wiley Heirs 2, recovered 290 feet of sulphur water and drilling, plus 280 feet of salty water, on a one-hour drillstem test between 6,345-6,461 feet in the Ellenburger and was running electric log surveys. There was a strong blow throughout the test.

Crockett wildcat drilling depths: Texas Pacific 1 Bair, 3,655 feet in shale and lime; Sun 1 Mitchell, 10,206 feet in sand and shale.

## "BEAR" JACKSON DEAD

Alonzo (Bear) Jackson, colored long time resident of Ozona, died Monday in Rockdale, Texas, where he has been living for the past several months. Jackson had been in failing health for several years.

"Bear," one time a 350-pounder, cooked in various Ozona cafes for a number of years. Funeral services were held at Rockdale Tuesday. His widow survives.

### Chartered Bus Takes Group to Advertise May 31 Show

Residents of nine area towns heard about the third annual Ozona Registered Quarter Horse Show Wednesday when a group of sixteen horse show boosters, aboard a chartered bus, made a swing around the territory to advertise the May 31 show.

A string band composed of A. E. Gilliam, George Senne, Frank J. Womack and Homer Good entertained the crowds at each stop and Oscar Kost broadcast over the public address system details of the horse show events of Saturday and the preceding day's parade and roping which will inaugurate the horse show.

The boosters visited Sheffield, Iraan, Fort Stockton, McCamey, Rankin, Big Lake, Barnhart, Eldorado, Mertzon and Sonora, returning to Ozona about nine o'clock Wednesday night.

The annual horse show will be heralded on Friday afternoon, May 30, with a big downtown parade. A full evening's roping program is planned for Friday night at the fair grounds, with the featured matched roping, between John D. Holleyman and Buddy Groff, to begin. The ropers will rope six calves Friday night and six Saturday night to complete the match. The Saturday night program also will include judging of champions in the halter classes and finals in the cutting horse contest and reining contests.

The horse show program will open at 10 o'clock Saturday morning for the first go-round in the cutting horse contest, the final go-round set for Saturday night. Halter classes will be judged in the afternoon starting at 1 o'clock.

## Bud Coates In Race For Prec. 2 Co. Commissioner

### To Oppose Chas. Black for Oil Field Area Representative

Bud Coates, young ranchman and World War II veteran, last week cast his hat into the political ring by announcing his candidacy for County Commissioner for Precinct 2, the northern section of the county, embracing much of the oil field territory.

Mr. Coates will oppose the incumbent commissioner, Charles Black, who is seeking re-election. The race is the third among the present members of the Commissioners Court, Ira Carson, incumbent, and Ralph Jones seeking the Precinct 1 post; James Childress, incumbent and Jake Young running it out for the Precinct 4 representative.

Mr. Coates is a native of Ozona and has been engaged in ranching since returning from service in the Army during World War II. He says that he is seeking the office strictly on his own merits and not on the demerits of the opposition.

"I feel that I am qualified to serve in the position and if I am elected I pledge my best efforts in doing the job to the very best of my ability," he said. "I will be grateful for the support I receive in the coming election but will hold no grudge against anyone who may see fit to vote against me."

## NAC Kerry Tandy to Advanced Training At Corpus Christi

PENSACOLA, Fla., May 6. — Naval Aviation Cadet Kerry S. Tandy of the United States Navy took off and landed his SNJ "Texan" trainer six successive times recently aboard the USS Cabot, cruising in the Gulf of Mexico, to complete his aircraft carrier qualifications.

Cadet Tandy, son of Dr. and Mrs. Hugh B. Tandy of Ozona, Texas, attended the University of Texas, Texas Western College and McMurry College prior to entering the Naval Aviation Cadet program.

He reported to Pensacola, Florida, "The Annapolis of the Air," in February of 1951 and has completed a stringent schedule in military, academic, physical and flight training.

From Pensacola he has been sent to advanced training at Corpus Christi, Texas. This will be a four month syllabus in combat type aircraft. Graduation from advanced training will win him the coveted Navy wings of gold.

## 4-H Livestock Judging Team Wins Second In Dist.

### Local Boys Win High Individual Judging Honors in Lubbock

The Crockett County 4-H Club Livestock Judging Team won second in District competition at Lubbock last Saturday. Although handicapped by lack of practice workouts and lack of a variety of local livestock to practice on previous to the contest, the team worked hard and made a fine showing against strong competition, according to Pete W. Jacoby, county agent, who accompanied the team to Lubbock.

Graham Childress was high point man of the team with a score of 542 out of a possible 700, followed by Charles Garlitz with 535, and Scott Hickman and Bill Schneemann tied with scores of 505. Scott was second high individual in district on cattle judging and Graham, Bill and Charles won high individual honors in sheep judging. The team placed high in sheep and cattle and with a little luck on horses and swine could easily have won the contest, said the county agent.

The group left Ozona early Friday morning, going by San Angelo where practice workouts on cattle and sheep were held and returning to Ozona early Sunday morning.

## Construction of New Building for Miller Firestone Begins Soon

Construction will start soon on a new business building to be erected on the corner now occupied by Miller Firestone Service station and store.

The new building, being erected by Stephen Perner, will house the Miller Firestone business upon its completion, estimated from 30 to 40 days.

Meanwhile, effective next Saturday, Mr. Miller has announced that he will close his business for the period during which the building is under construction. He will, however, continue to have Firestone tires and tubes on sale in the Mrs. O. W. Smith blacksmith shop building in the rear of Dr. Walley's office. The new building is to be approximately 42 by 80 feet and will be built for a service station in front, a store and warehouse and service department in the rear.

## City Pavement To Get Seal Coat During Summer

### Commissioners Plan to Coat All Streets in Hot Months

All paved streets in Ozona will receive a seal coat treatment this summer under a plan launched by the Crockett County Commissioners Court.

The streets were paved nearly four years ago under a cooperative plan in which property owners shared in the cost of paving and curbing nearly all of the streets in the town.

The seal coating, which will consist of a shot of hot asphalt to be followed by application of a fine crushed rock coating, will serve to preserve the paving and to correct some of the irregularities in the original job, as well as taking care of some patching work that is needed now.

The new treatment will prevent a recurrence of the "freezing" damage suffered by much of the pavement soon after it was laid, the seal coat preventing the entrance of moisture and subsequent freezing and cracking of the pavement in case of a wet, cold winter.

The county's new mechanical street sweeper has been in use for a couple of weeks and all of the streets are being cleaned in anticipation of the coming seal coating job. The sweeper plays a spray of water on the pavement ahead of the revolving broom, thus minimizing the dust and aiding in the cleaning process. The machine operates like a vacuum sweeper, sucking up much of the dirt as the broom dislodges it.

## Jake Miller Appointed To School Board

### Will Fill Out Unexpired Term of Henry Witcher

Jake Miller, Crockett county ranchman, was appointed a member of the district board of school trustees at the regular meeting of the new board Tuesday night.

Mr. Miller will serve out the unexpired term of Henry Witcher, who resigned upon being transferred from Ozona.

The board organized for the coming year in the Tuesday night meeting, first meeting with the newly elected members chosen in the recent trustee election.

Rock Jones was re-elected president of the board. George Bunker was chosen vice president and Arthur Kyle, secretary-treasurer. All three are hold-over members of the board, Jones being re-elected for a new two-year term at the recent election, the other two to serve another year.

New members sitting in their first session of the body were Royal Caswell, N. D. Blackstone, II, and Richard Flowers, all chosen in the recent election along with Jones.

After organization, the board discussed routine business of the school.

**SHALL WE CHEER A DICTATOR?**

"The outcome of the steel case will set a national course," writes Ralph T. Moore in the Oregon Voter. "It will determine whether we are to continue as a republic or revert to European socialism. Wherever the final decision is made, be it the Congress or the U. S. Supreme Court, the thinking public will be waiting with grim concern. For it will determine whether we will elect a president or obediently cheer a dictator."

The so-called "inherent powers" which the president cited as his authority for government seizure of the steel industry have never been defined with anything resembling clarity. Some of the foremost authorities on constitutional laws are convinced the president does not and cannot have powers of so tremendous a nature. But, regardless of the legal aspects of the matter, it is perfectly obvious that such powers would make it possible for a president to establish a dictatorship almost overnight — and that the people would be helpless. A grim footnote to the steel case was added when the president inferred, at a press confer-

ence, that he could order government seizure of the nation's newspapers if he deemed it wise and necessary. That, of course, would be the end of the free press — and if the free press ever goes, all our other freedoms will follow it into oblivion.

Clearly, here is an issue of the highest importance which only Congress can deal with. Yet, with a few honorable exceptions, our Senators and Representatives have dodged it. The issue which the steel seizure has brought into the bright white light of day is not a partisan one. As Mr. Moore said in his revealing phrase, the outcome "will determine whether we will elect a president or obediently cheer a dictator."

subject to all the ills that beset mankind in this world. But, "He shall not be utterly cast down: for the Lord upholdeth him with His hand." He shall be cast down, tested, tried, discouraged many, many times. But never utterly. Never to the point of final despair. The hand of the Lord holds him up in his spirits. There is always some way out for him, though it may be a hard and narrow way. There is always a little something left. There is forever a ray of hope in him.

He won't get any more rain than the bad man gets. He won't get any better price for his wool. He will have all the troubles the bad man has. He may be driven to the very brink of despair, but somehow his faith in God will hold him up. "I have been young, and now am old; yet never have I seen the righteous forsaken. . . . This is the testimony of the best and wisest of all books.

If the suffering occasioned by this drouth serves to make some of us a little more humble, a little less sure of our own sufficiency, if it forces us to examine our hearts and see whether there be any wicked way in us, it will be a pretty good return for the dollars that are being lost.

No man in his right mind would invite suffering. No man who has suffered deeply would make light of it in himself or in another. Surely the sympathy of every right-feeling person must go out toward our friends and neighbors who are having a hard time. But nevertheless, suffering does come, soon or late, in some form to us all. Suffering is a part of life which we cannot escape. "In the world," said Jesus, "ye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer, for I have overcome the world." One of the disciples who saw all of the suffering that Jesus went through (St. John) said, "This is the victory that overcometh the world, — even our faith." That little thing — faith — often despised by the proud, does sometimes make the difference between life and death when the soul is sorely tried.

No one knows when it will rain. It will rain some day, but only God knows when. One thing we can know, if we will. We can know for ourselves, if we will trust God and love Him, how His hand can uphold us in the darkest night.
