## Soil Board To Begin Work Plan; Two New Members

### Reorganized Board to Attack Organization Problems

Members of the board of supervisors of the Crockett Soil Conservation District held their monthly meeting in the Ozona Courthouse October 1.

All members of the board were present, which includes Charlie Davidson, Bascomb Cox, Alvin Harrell, Bill Clegg and Troy Williams. Others present included Pete Jacoby, county agent; Don Fulton, soil conservation service; and E. B. Keng, SCS, of Sonora.

Davidson and Clegg were recently elected district supervisors to fill vacancies created by the expiration of Ralph Jones' term and T. A. Kincaid's resignation. The board elected officers as follows: Charlie Davidson, chairman; Bascomb Cox, vice chairman; and Alvin Harrell, secretary.

One of the first objectives of the Crockett SCD Board will be the preparation of a district program and plan of work. This document will consist of a rather detailed description of problems in the district as they affect soil and water conservation and the overall plan of correcting the problems. The program portion will include a history of the district (which covers all of Crockett county), discussions of soils, slopes, climates, roads, vegetations, livestock and economic conditions. It should contain the most complete information available on these subjects, and will be a valuable reference for use in the schools, library and of much interest to ranchmen and businessmen.

The SCD supervisors will call on local people, agency representatives and others to assist in making the program and plan as complete as possible. At their next meeting they expect to select and appoint local committees to work on various sections.

One of the objectives of the district is to make technical help on soil and water problems available to local ranchmen who desire it. The supervisors want to emphasize that the entire program is entirely voluntary. The state law permitting the establishment of soil conservation districts specifies soil conservation districts specifically levying bonds. Approximately 150 districts are operating in the state, the first being organized in 1939.

Bill Hoover, Veteran of Nine Months in Korea As Master of Army Scout Dog, Thinks Home Looks Pretty Good in Spite of Drouth

Crockett county's parched ranch lands may look pretty sorry to those of us who have watched the prolonged drouth do its work, but it looks "mighty good" to Bill Hoover, Jr., who returned last week after about nine months in Korea.

Bill was rotated back home after nearly two years of service and has been placed on inactive duty. "I was lucky," he said in referring to the fact that he escaped without a scratch in the bitter fighting in the rugged mountains of Korea.

Hoover was in charge of one of the scout dogs being used by the U. N. forces in fighting the Communists. "Hamlet," a German police dog, and Hoover were "buddies" for seven months of combat service. One of eighteen such dogs being used in the fighting, Hamlet and his master accompanied allied patrols into communist territory, the dog's keen senses being employed in smelling out approaching enemy patrols. The dogs are also used in ferreting out snipers, Bill said.

## Mrs. Rosa Poteet, 73, Ozonan 21 Years, Dies; Buried at Somerville

Funeral services were held at Somerville Monday morning in the Somerville Methodist Church for Mrs. Rosa Poteet, 73, mother of Mrs. L. A. Greer of Ozona and a resident here for 21 years, who died at her home here Saturday morning.

Mrs. Poteet had been active and in good health until a few weeks ago when she fell and fractured a hip. The fracture was apparently healing satisfactorily but pneumonia and other complications developed and death followed after a week's illness. A Cody Funeral Home casket coach carried the body to Somerville for funeral services Monday morning.

The former Rosa Syer, Mrs. Poteet was a daughter of the late Jim B. Syer, a native of England. She was born May 29, 1879, at Gay Hill, in Washington county. She and the late Ernest Poteet were married in 1898 at Gay Hill, where Mr. Poteet was a barber. Soon after their marriage, the couple moved to Somerville. Mrs. Poteet is remembered by many early day residents of Washington as an excellent practical nurse. She had made her home in Ozona since the death of her husband in 1931.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Greer of Ozona and Mrs. Bertha Pittman of San Angelo; three sons, Arthur Poteet of San Jose, Calif.; Jim Poteet, Phoenix, Ariz., and Ernest Poteet, Big Lake and several brothers and sisters. A nephew, Bunk Poteet of Somerville, was reared in the home of his aunt and uncle.

## Lions Clip Menard For 14-7 Win In First Dist. Start

### Ozonans to Eldorado Friday Night to Try For Second

It wasn't an upset when the Ozona High School Lions topped the Menard Yellowjackets 14 to 7 last Friday night on the home field in the first District 6A contest for the locals. With spirit and determination at white heat, in both town and school circles, it was almost a foregone conclusion — and but for a little early-game jitters, it might well have been a 21-0 victory for the Lions.

The visitors scored early in the second quarter when they got possession of the ball on Ozona's 40 yard line. Marshall Parham, Menard fullback, led the attack which moved downfield, on successive plays, with Parham plugging over for the score and then circling end for the extra point.

After that, the Lions stiffened on defense and the Jackets were unable to penetrate to dangerous territory. The locals were on the march at the half and really came alive in the second half to chalk up their two touchdowns in short order.

After holding the Yellowjackets on downs, the Lions blasted through to block a Menard kick and cover the ball on the 17. Garlitz and Piner teamed up in two plays which carried to the one-yard line and Piner bulled over for the marker. Piner kicked the extra point.

Maness caught a pass from Garlitz to score the second Ozona touchdown and again Piner kicked the extra point.

Garlitz was the sparkplug of the Lion offense, carrying the ball 17 times for 65 yards and gaining 181 yards on 17 passes for a total of 246 yards. Piner carried 11 times for 40 yards of gain, Conklin 7 times to gain 12 yards and Hale carried 3 times for 6 yards.

Leading pass catcher and a power on defense was Bill Maness. Maness snagged 8 passes for a total of 58 yards. Cooper at the opposite end caught four aeriels for 32 yards. Piner took 4 for a total of 39 yards and Hale received one for a 37-yard gainer. The Ozona line was a rock wall for the Yellowjackets.

## Ozona Girl Returns Home After Treatment At Gonzales for Polio

GONZALES. — Seven-year-old Marilyn Kay Thomas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Thomas, Ozona, and formerly a patient at the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children, has been discharged from the Gonzales treatment center and returned home.

Young Marilyn was stricken by polio on June 12, 1952. Admitted to the Gonzales Warm Springs hospital on July 28, and received treatment there until October 24.

Although Marilyn has been discharged from the hospital her treatment program will not end there. A series of periodic check-backs at the Gonzales Foundation has been scheduled in order that the hospital may record her progress and check the fit and condition of braces and other appliances. A course of home treatments has also been prescribed to stimulate continued advancement.

## Record Vote Is Forecast Here In Election Tuesday

### Absentee Balloting Indicates High Interest in Contest

As record voting is being forecast all over the nation in the all-important general election next Tuesday, similar forecasts were being made for a record turnout of Crockett county voters.

Election machinery was all set up for opening of the polls in all voting precincts of the county next Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock. Voting places will close at 7 p.m.

An unusually heavy call for absentee ballots figured in the local forecasts. Eight voters had already cast ballots at the county clerk's office yesterday and a total of 49 ballots had been sent out on request of voters, George Russell, clerk, reported. Friday, October 31, is the last day to cast absentee ballots for the general election.

Voters were being bombarded over the radio waves as Democratic and Republican candidates and their backers swung into the final week of one of the most torrid campaigns in the nation's history. On the Democratic side, the new Deal-Fair Deal backers are seeking four more years of control behind the candidacy of Governor Adlai Stevenson of Illinois and Senator John Sparkman of Alabama. The Republicans hope to unseat the long tenure with General Dwight D. Eisenhower, supreme commander of Allied forces in World War II, as candidate for president and Senator Richard Nixon of California for the vice presidency.

For the first time in the 1952 general election, Texas voters will indicate their choice for president and vice president by a direct vote for the candidates. Heretofore only the names of presidential electors of the various parties appeared on the ballot, but this year the names of the candidates for the highest offices head each party column.

As is usual in general elections, new parties with new names, and sometimes the same names with different candidates, offer candidates for president and vice president. Besides the Democrats and Republicans, there are four such parties offering candidates in this year's election. They are the Prohibition party, the Progressive party, the Christian Nationalist party and the Constitutional party.

And if the voter still doesn't see a name to his liking, there are two additional columns in which he may write the names of his own choice, in a blank Independent Party and a just plain "Write-In" column.

Under a cross-filing by the Republican party this year, all candidates for state office on the Democratic party with the exception of John C. White for agricultural commissioner, also appear in the Republican column as nominees of that party.

There was a tie for third place between Bushytail, a squirrel belonging to Alejos Lara and Chico, a gray pigeon shown by Crucita Perez. Prizes were presented to the winners.

Letters To The Editor

Editor: Please carry this warning to my former constituents:

In am 80 years old today. I have no political ambitions. Our Republic is in great danger. Our manpower is being exhausted. Our financial resources are being depleted. Just as the line was drawn in the Alamo, American patriots in the 69 counties I have represented in Congress, on November 4 must cross a line to save the United States.

Our Administration and United Nations are infiltrated with Communists. Truman protects them, and says, "Joe Stalin is a fine fellow and I like Joe."

Our Constitution provides that only Congress can declare war. General Wedemeyer returned from the Orient in 1947 and in his report, suppressed by Truman, warn-

ed that withdrawing our soldiers from Korea would result in Russia's occupation, yet Truman and Acheson denied help and advice to the Chinese forces on Formosa, and permitted military forces trained by Russia to occupy North Korea and since June 1950, unauthorized by Congress, Truman has waged a bloody war in Korea causing 120,000 American casualties, has spent \$40,000,000,000.00 and is requiring 45,000 American boys to be drafted each month as replacements, portending lasting grief in over a million American homes.

Truman deliberately fired MacArthur for advocating courageous policies that would end this war in Korea. With a ridiculous truce suspended for over a year, Truman carries on this bloody war, affording the political slogan "We never had it so good." Roosevelt-Garner campaigners in 1932 said that Hoover was bankrupting us with a twenty billion national debt and pledged that they would reduce same 25%, yet they have increased it to \$259,000,000,000.00.

Jake Arvey, Democratic political boss of Chicago sponsored Stevenson for governor and supported Stevenson's nomination for President. Democratic Senator Kefauver in his Democratic Crime Committee report certified:

"Chicago, unfortunately, still remains the stronghold of certain cliques of corrupt policemen and officeholders and of local legislators who openly consort with gangsters."

"It also remains the jungle of criminals who walk in the footsteps of Al Capone."

"There was no doubt in the minds of any of us, after the sort of testimony we heard in Chicago, that organized crime and political corruption go hand in hand, and that in fact, there could be no bigtime organized crime without

a firm and profitable alliance between those who run the rackets and those in political control."

Isn't that an indictment against Truman by Democrat Kefauver? Truman's political career was sponsored by the rotten Pendergast machine of Kansas City. It and the rotten Democratic Hague machine of New Jersey, and the corrupt Tammany machine of New York are supporting Stevenson.

Eisenhower is a Texan, born in Denison. His election will honor Texas. Electing Eisenhower is our only chance to prevent the theft of our valuable blood-bought Tidelands, and save same for the school children of Texas.

Stevenson Is Member Of ADA or ADA Lies, Claude Gilmer Says

AUSTIN. — Governor Stevenson is a member of Americans for Democratic Action or "the ADA is lying," Claude Gilmer, chairman of the Democrats for Eisenhower charged in a statement today.

"We have secured documentary proof where Governor Stevenson has flatly said he is not a member of "ADA," Gilmer said. "On the other hand we have two editions of the Americans for Democratic Action official news paper which state that the democratic nominee is a charter member of the Chicago Chapter of ADA.

"The people of Texas, in the closing days of this campaign, can believe the governor or the ADA house organ, "The ADA World." "In any event somebody is lying," he added.

The Americans for Democratic Action is an extreme, radical left-wing organization which according to Gilmer "dealt our Texas delegates and other Southern Democratic delegations so many insults at the Chicago convention."

Gilmer produced copies of the ADA World, published in Washington, D. C. and a copy of the Nevada State Journal of August 29, which printed an exchange of a telegram and letter between Stevenson and Senator Pat McCarron upon which to base his charge.

"I cite the November 10, 1948 issue, Page three of the ADA World, which under a two column headline "ADA Plays Key Role in Chicago Victory" had the following quote: 'Adlai Stevenson, ONE OF THE ORIGINAL FOUNDERS OF ADA IN CHICAGO' defeated Col. McCormick's man for governor by a tremendous plurality of 565,000 carrying the entire state slate and winning control of the

lower house of the Illinois legisla-

ture. "I further cite another edition of the ADA World on February 1952 which under the one column headline "Chicago wants Adlai for President" reads as follows: "The independent voters of Illinois, the Chicago affiliate of Americans for Democratic Action has urged Governor Adlai Stevenson be nominated for president by the democratic party."

"In that same story, and I quote, is the following: "STEVENSON A CHARTER MEMBER OF ADA has been increasingly mentioned for the democratic nomination should the President not seek to succeed himself."

"In an exchange of correspondence with Senator Pat McCarron of Nevada, Governor Stevenson

has denied that he was ever an ADA member. In a telegram sent August 8, 1952, Senator McCarron asked Governor Stevenson to clarify the appointment of Wilson Wyatt as campaign manager for Stevenson.

"In a letter from Springfield, Illinois, upon his official stationery dated August 23, 1952, Governor Stevenson gave his reasons for appointing Wyatt and added, "AS FOR ADA I HAVE NEVER BEEN A MEMBER OF IT."

"Thus, the ADA twice cites Stevenson as a charter member and the Governor says he never has been. I would like for Speaker Sam Rayburn and some of Governor Stevenson's other apologists to help clarify this question. I shall be happy to turn over to Speaker Rayburn and his brass collar group

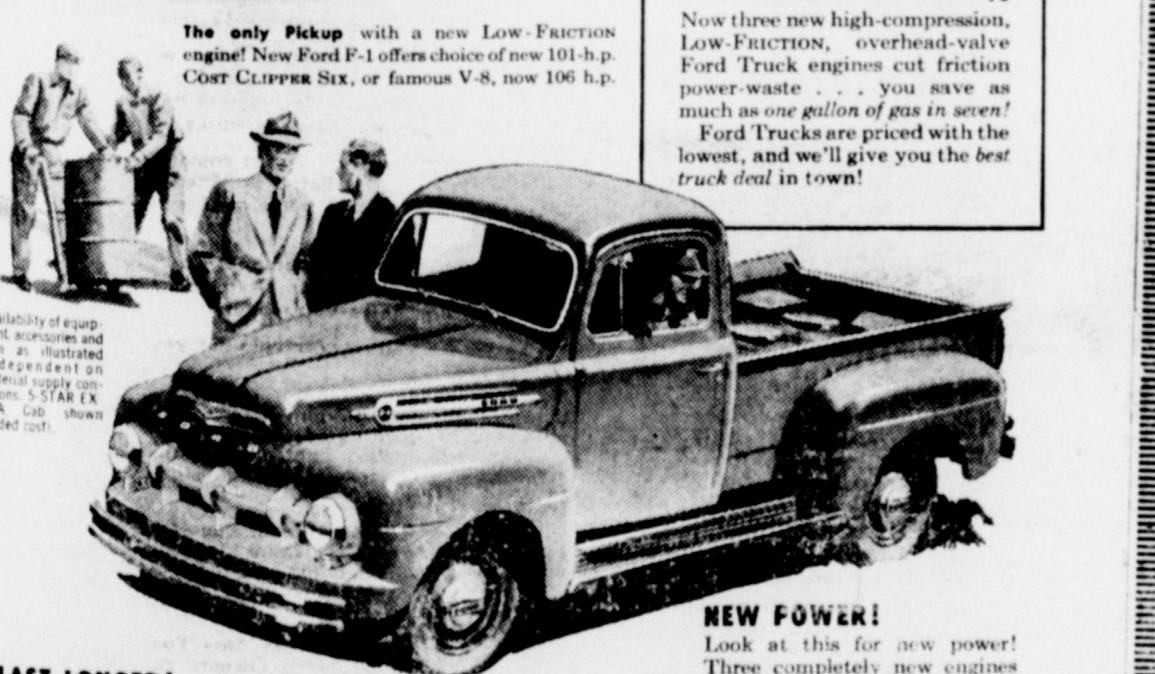

## THE STORY OF HALLOWEEN

Goblins screaming, spooks and ghosts floating around. Witches flying through the sky on brooms. Pumpkins glowing at you with an eerie grin and black cats darting here and there. And, of course, the old familiar phrase "trick or treat." Yes, that's America's idea of Halloween. But if you will travel back into the past with me, I'll tell you the true meaning of Halloween. Back to the 600's, back — back — back —

The name, Halloween, means hallowed or holy evening because it comes the day before All Saints Day. The church had celebrated All Saints Day in the 600's, but not on November 1.

The Druids, an early people in Britain, celebrated their autumnal festival this time of year. They called the festival Samhain, or Summer's End. It was an occasion for feasting on all kinds of food which had been grown during the summer.

The modern custom of decorating for Halloween parties with pumpkins, leaves and cornstaks comes from the Druids. The Druids also believed that on Halloween ghosts, spirits, fairies, witches and elves came out to harm people. They built large bonfires to scare such creatures away. From the Druids' beliefs and customs comes the modern use of witches and ghosts in Halloween festivities.

The early peoples of Europe also had a festival which was somewhat like the Druid holiday. In the 700's the church named November 1 as All Saints' festival, or the day for honoring all saints. The old pagan customs and the Christian festival were combined into the holiday which people celebrate today as the Halloween festival.

Halloween is a time of many parties for both grown-ups and children. There are special games which are played at Halloween, such as bobbing for apples and telling fortunes and ghost stories. Many schools have parties to which children come dressed in costumes. Prizes are given for the best costumes.

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### West Texas C of C Urges Defeat of Two Amendments

Defeat of two proposed amendments to the Constitution of Texas to be voted upon November 4 was urged by the taxation and legislation committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at its convention in Wichita Falls last week.

Basic provisions of the two proposals are:

1. To empower the legislature to enact laws to enable cities to provide workman's compensation insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk

for all employees, and provide suitable laws for administration of such insurance, and for payment of costs, charges premiums on insurance policies and the benefits to be paid under them. (House Joint Resolution No. 20)

2. To require that the legislature create a state medical board, establish a medical fund and make adequate appropriations for that fund to provide grants, loans or scholarships to persons desiring to study medicine and to practice in rural areas in Texas, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term "rural areas" would be defined by law. (House Joint Resolution No. 38)

The second proposal, for state grants, loans or scholarships for medical students would not increase the number of doctors, since all state medical schools now are at capacity and have long waiting lists of students anxious to pay

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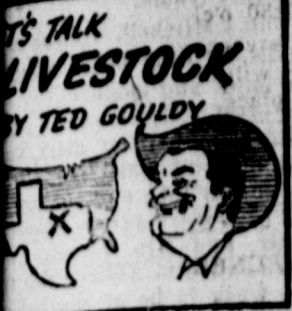

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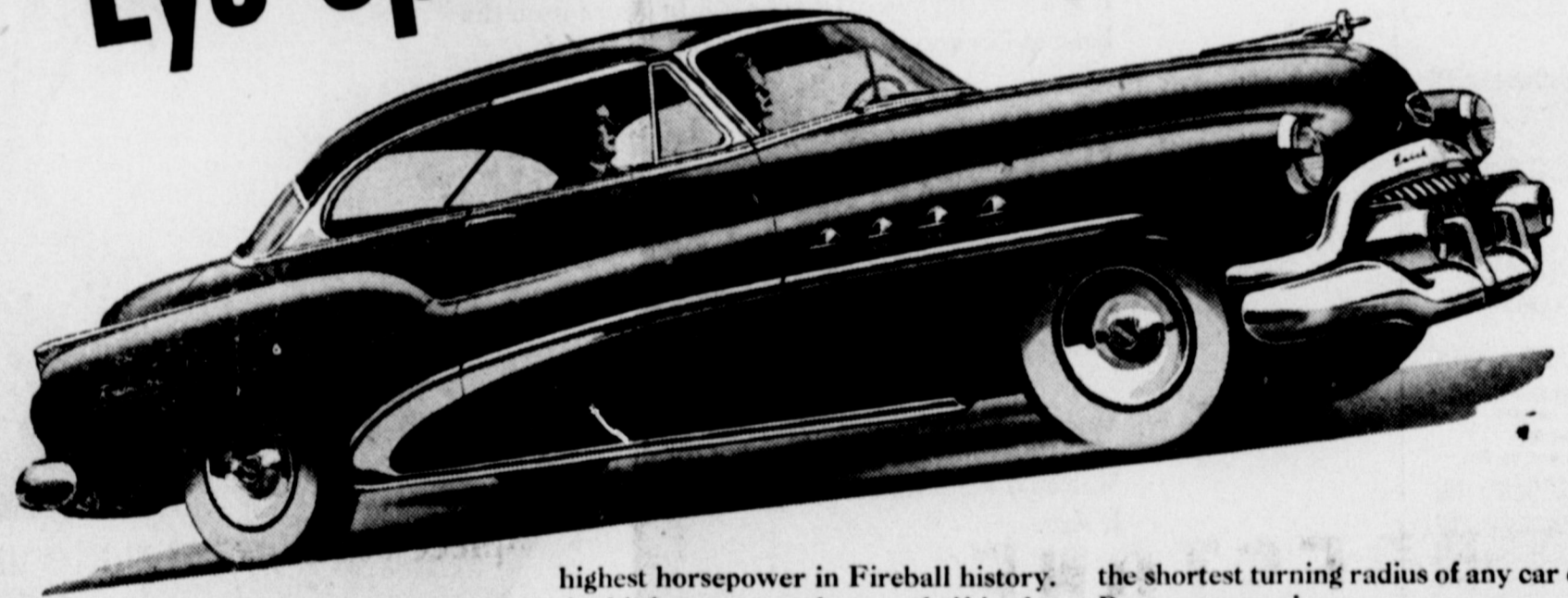

basic American principle. This philosophy failed to discern and evaluate the meaning of the Russian movement for the future of the world. It failed to recognize the infiltration of Communist agencies in our own government, and refused to take prompt and adequate action when the defect was uncovered by others. It elected to keep secret that vital information on relationships with other nations which the American public needed to make intelligent judgments. It has carried us far into the wilderness of tax-and-spend, and promises, if continued in power, to take us even farther. It showed such a cynical attitude toward integrity in government that an atmosphere was created which made it possible for the ever-present grafters to become a major menace. It has consistently refused to admit an error in anything. A mark of a real statesman is that when he errs he will take people frankly into his confidence, tell what happened, and take steps to make sure that it does not happen again. But for the past twenty years, not a mistake has been acknowledged. Our government has played God with easy assurance all over the world; and playing God is always dangerous business.

Some time ago I heard Stevenson speak in San Antonio. I was attracted by his splendid personality and the effective way in which he could make his points with both clarity and polish. And I heard and saw in him that same incredible optimism and almost fanatical zeal which has characterized the high priests of the New Deal from the beginning: Roosevelt, Wallace and Truman. It is a zeal which is faintly reminiscent, — to me, at least — of other strong but mistaken crusades which have flourished and failed in our times. I find that zeal frightening. Stevenson said in effect, "If we will not be afraid, if we will march on with the forces of progress, undrained-of horizons of prosperity and peace lie ahead." The voice was that of Stevenson, but the words were those of F.D.R. I came away convinced that a vote for Stevenson will definitely be a vote for four more years, at least of the New Deal. If this man is, as some say, a captive of his party, he certainly is a willing captive.

The point at which the New Deal now stands in its philosophy and practice of "Doing what comes naturally" is illustrated by something President Truman said not long ago. But first, a bit of background. The statesmen who founded this nation were men of long experience with governmental tyranny in all the European forms. Being determined that it should not happen here, they carefully defined and limited the boundaries of individual rights and governmental powers. To be sure that these boundaries should not be moved by an impulsive administration under the pressures of crisis, the limits were sunk deep into the rock of Constitutional immobility. From time to time, however, breaches have been made in the lines.

Under the pressures of the depression and second World War, more constitutional safeguards were circumvented than in all the previous history of the nation. Now back to the incident of Mr. Truman's revealing comment. When asked if the seizure of the struck steel mills meant that the President could seize anything and everything, the President in effect replied, "If it seemed best for the good of the country." Thus we have completed the full circle back to the point where monarchy is. If Mr. Truman spoke the truth, the

judgment of the President, rather than the Constitution, is the last word in American governmental authority. We are asked now to underwrite this way of life in order that we might move into unlimited horizons of prosperity and peace. But I belong to the troop of timid souls who believe that before we cross any more tracks we ought to stop, look and listen for a while.

A few years ago, a bishop of a Protestant Church told of a journey he made in Africa. The guides and burden-bearers were the black natives of the bush. One morning the natives refused to budge. Through their interpreter they said, "We have come far and fast. We have run away from our souls. We want to wait here a few days and let our souls catch up with us." It seems to me that we, too, have possibly got ahead of our souls in this trek to the left.

When a country finds it is too far to the right, it can always move over to the left. But when a country moves a certain distance to the left, it cannot turn back. There is a point of no return. I don't want to see us pass that point.

In the bays that fringe the ocean there grows a floating plant called the bladderwort. Each plant has a bladder about the size of a

it. The hole will open and close. When the hole is open all sorts of microscopic plants and animals, looking for shelter, swim or float inside the bladder. Then the hole closes, the imprisoned creatures dissolve and their remains feed the bladderwort.

The story of the bladderwort might be a parable of our search for security. When people turn their freedoms and incomes over to a protective government, they are more likely to be absorbed than sustained. That suggests the central issue of this campaign.

Ike is only a man; he will make some mistakes. But his point of view, his record, and the men whom he is likely to gather about him will, in my judgment, come nearest to giving this country the judicious and discriminating change of direction which it seems now to need. He will not throw away all the genuine gains of the past twenty years. Neither will he plunge recklessly ahead into an uncharted future. Chalk up one vote for Ike.

**Shallow Test in Northwest Crockett Slated by Midlander**

J. H. Bartley and others of Midland, have spotted their A-1 H. S. Carpenter and others as a 1,400-foot wildcat 8½ miles northwest of Iraan in Crockett county.
