The economy move, according to the General, was taken to insure all chapters needing aid, a fair share of the emergency funds until the end of the year.

Texas has been one of the main recipients of aid from the National Foundation, and this year has received more than one out of every six dollars allocated by the NFIP for patieent care.

"Under usual procedure," plained General Smith, "half of the March of Dimes funds are retained by chapters for local patient care, or, in emergencies, for supplementing national aid funds. The other half is remitted to the National Foundation for polio research, education and the replenishment of chapter treasuries depleted by epidemics.

"Because of the increasingly heavy load, Texas, for three years, has needed 100 per cent of the March of Dimes for patient care and thus has contributed nothing to research or education.'
