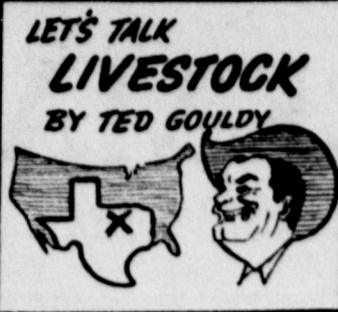

FORT WORTH — Receipts of all classes of livestock were considerably larger at Fort Worth and around the market circle Monday. Twelve major markets reported over 123,000 cattle and over 137,000 hogs. It was one of the largest hog runs of the season.

At Fort Worth cows were around 50 cents higher and bulls brought strong prices. Some early sales of fed yearlings were steady but most packers took a very bearish stand and before the day was over, many fed steers and yearlings cleared at 50 cents to \$1.50 lower prices. Shortfeds fared the worst. Choice fat calves ruled firm, but others were weak. Stocker trade

was again featured by some strong sales on cows and on lightweight yearlings and calves of choice grades. However, demand was still very narrow and plainer kinds draggy.

Fat lambs were steady to strong, with some choice fat lambs around \$1 to \$1.50 higher. Slaughter ewes opened 50 cents higher. Other sheep were fully steady. Hogs opened strong and topped Monday at \$17 to \$17.25. Sows sold for \$13.50 to \$16.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold for \$22 to \$30. Plain and medium butcher sorts sold for \$14 to \$20, with ratty yearlings around \$10 to \$13.

Fat cows sold for \$14 to \$16, heiferettes \$16 to \$20, and canners and cutters cashed at \$10 to \$14 in most cases. Bulls brought \$10 to \$18.50. Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$19 to \$25, with some 500 and up upwards to \$28.50. Common and medium slaughter kinds sold from \$14 to \$19, with culls around \$10 to \$13.

Good and choice stocker calves sold from \$18 to \$23.50 and stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$23 down. Feeder steers sold mostly from \$21 down. Stocker cows drew \$10 to \$17. Heifer calves and heifer yearlings usually brought \$2 or more less than comparable steers.

Good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$18 to \$23, a load at 92 pounds from Hill Brothers, Stanton, at \$25, a new top for the current crop. Shorn lambs with No. 1 pelts sold at \$21 downward. Feeder lambs cashed at \$10 to \$16. Slaughter yearlings sold from \$5.50 to \$8 and some breeding ewes sold for \$9 down. Old bucks sold around \$5 to \$6.

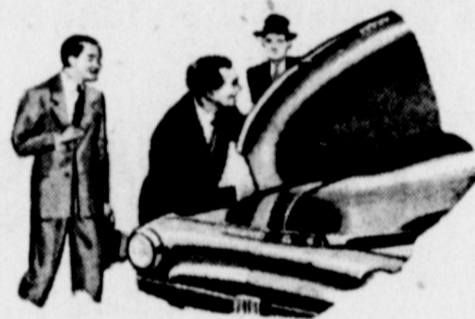
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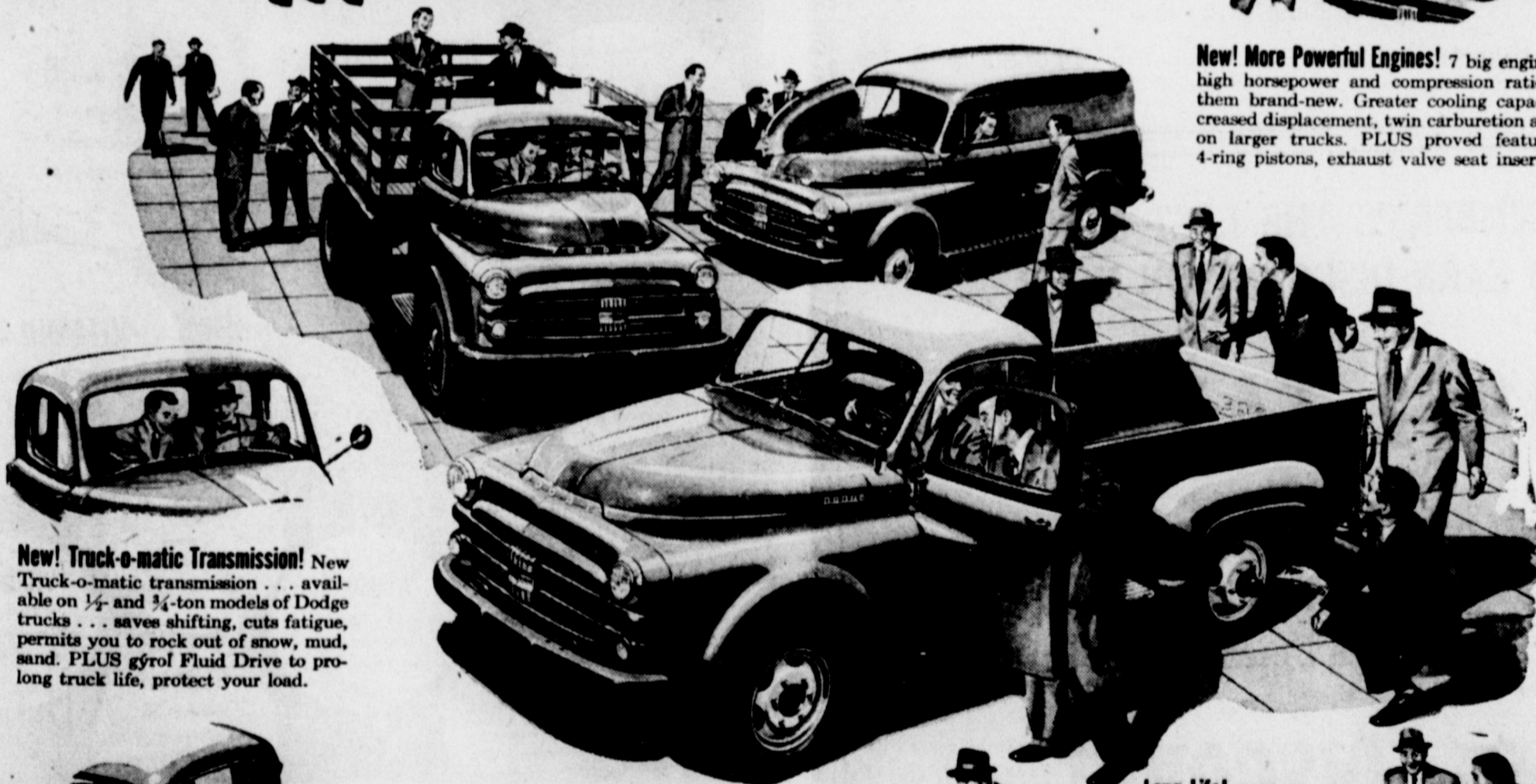

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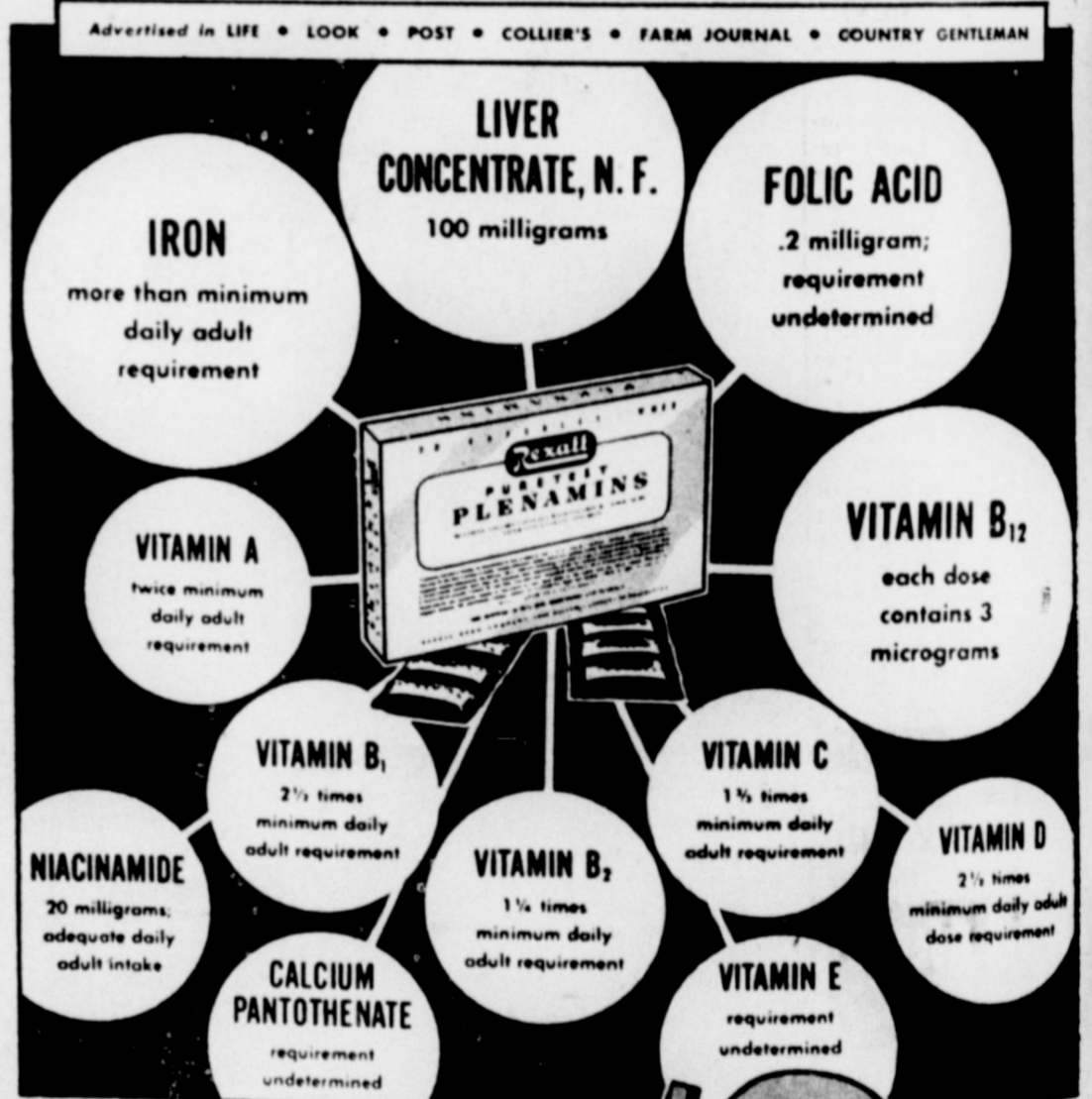

racy, he surely couldn't do it under the more rigorous Socialistic state.

Still another group embrace new forms of old errors in a spirit of revenge and hate. They have a grudge against life. They resent all who are respected, prosperous and successful. They feel that life has been unfair to them and they respond negatively and emotionally to that fact. They do not care whether Communism is right or wrong, if it would give them the pleasure of seeing their enemies, — who include everyone better off than they — ruined. Communism is a perfect vehicle for hate, and that is why it so often appeals to the hate-potential in human nature.

A thousand years from now the same old ideas which today take the form of Communism and Hitlerism will still be with us in other forms. An idea cannot be killed by the sword, or by a counter-program of hate, or even by the

hydrogen bomb. An idea can be overcome only by a better idea which is lived out in the field of human life. An error can be vanquished only by a truth. A militant error is, for the time being, stronger than an inactive truth, although when both become active the truth is stronger. Throughout the cold war the Communist lie has been active; the Democratic idea has been partly asleep. That is why the Russians seem to have had the advantage. Actually they have not had the advantage. They have had the initiative. Since there are no principles of honor to hinder them, it has been easy for them to assume and hold the initiative. But there are signs that the free peoples of the world are beginning to assume some of the initiative.

The survival power of the Christian faith is explained by the immortality of an idea. Christian people have been working and praying for the Kingdom of God to come upon the earth for two thousand years. There are times and places where the Kingdom seems far away. There are other

times and places where it seems almost at hand. But the idea will never die. More and more people will live for it, sacrifice for it, and if need be, die for it. The Kingdom is a greater idea than that of the powerful state or the ruthless leader or any other political idea. It is more true, therefore it is stronger and more true than any other idea that the heart of man has ever loved, it is destined to win out in the end. The way will be long and hard. But God has lots of time.

Perhaps there is even a better reason why Christ and his Kingdom will eventually win. The other big ideas which have been with us so long have been born in the minds of men. But the Kingdom of God was born in the heart of God and revealed to this world in the person of Jesus Christ. Because God is immortal, his Kingdom is a Kingdom that will never end. Nations will rise and fall, leaders will come and go, systems will wax and wane. But God and his Kingdom will go on forever.

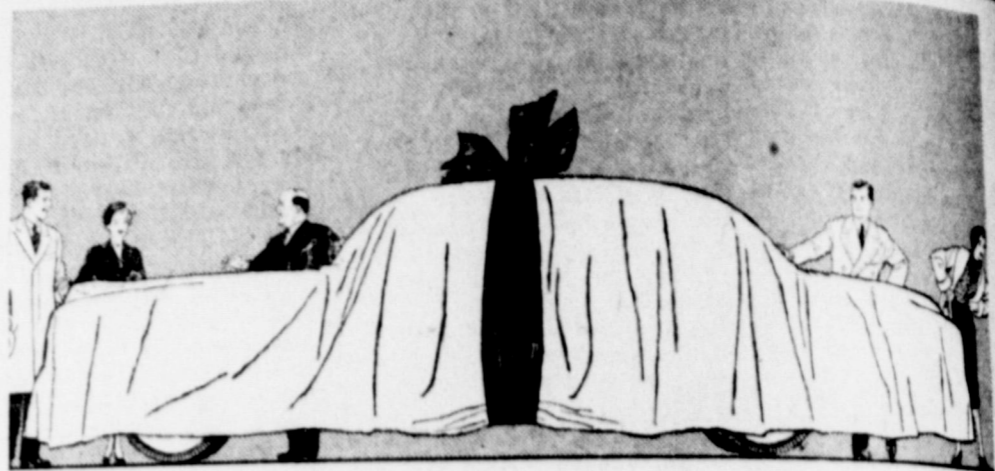
