#### Dozen Applicants for Supt. Post Interviewed; More Coming Saturday Burned To Death

Already a dozen applicants have been interviewed by the school board in quest of a successor to Lem Bray as superintendent of Ozona Public Schools and more are to be heard in sessions next Saturday afternoon and evening. Mr. Bray has resigned effective at the end of the present school year.

In addition to those interviewed by the board as a whole, a number of other inquiries have been received by board members. The board will meet Saturday afternoon and evening of this week to hear another group of applicants who are coming for interviews.

"The board has had applications from men in larger schools than the Ozona system, and from smaller ones," Brock Jones, board chairman said, "Board members are giving careful consideration to each applicant and all of us hope that we can select strong leadership for the schools from among these many applicants."

The board recently re-elected all principals now serving in the system. These include P. O. Hatley, high school principal; Johnny Clark, principal of the Junior High School; Glenn P. Hicks, principal of the North Elementary and W. H. Stockard, principal of the South Elementary school.

The Men's Bible Class is beginning a study of Old Testament events and characters.


