House Passes DP Proposal By 237-2 Vote

WASHINGTON, June 14. UR-The House passed by a thumping 237to-2 vote today, and sent to the Senate, a bill to open the way for 3½ million additional persons to participate in old-age insurance. The legislation was presented to the House under a late session procedure that required a twothirds vote. However, it is not certain that the Senate will act upon it if Congress adjourns Saturday. The bill is short of what President Truman proposed. He asked Congress in a special message in May to bring 20 million more persons into the social security program, for a total coverage of 50

million persons. Moreover, Mr. Truman asked that benefits be increased by at least 50 percent and that the social security taxes be boosted also. This is not in the bill.

Rep. Reed (R-NY), author of the legislation, seld it would permit employes of state and local governing bodies to join in the insurance program, if the local governments give their approval. Employes of non-profit organizations choose. These are the





As a matter of individual responsibility and soncern, conservation does not enjoy the same legree of support. It is one of those things that he farmers or the ranchers or the fellow who works the quarter section across the way sught to practice.

That's where the program of conservation weakest; it sags at the point of understanding. Somehow the public must be made conscious that conservation is not an issue inviting platitudes on election year, but one of bread and butter and perhaps someday one of life and death.

Statisticians and economists tell us that by 1970 our national population will be such that we will be barely able to feed and clothe ourselves from our present cropland acreage. Actually, we will be a fifth of an acre under the three acres per individual, the base upon which the national estimates are predicted.

Whether these three acres are three fertile and productive acres or just that amount of ground that produces foods and fibers of ininferior quality is vital. It is quite as important as quastity, as important as that is. We can visualise disappearing acres for we can see guillies and barren fields and brushy pastures, but we cannot see less minerals and nourish-

The lessons of history are so harsh and so unmistakable that we can ill afford to ignore them. The physical well being-and indeed the mental and moral qualities-of a country are inexorable bound to its soil.

Our day of reckoning is not for a score of years, but the equations of our results are being put into the hopper today. Dr. Hugh H. Bennett, who knows more about soil conservation than anyone else in the nation, warns that "we have ruined more good land in less time than any other nation in recorded hislory." One-sixth of what we had is gone, onetwelvth is marginal, and another sixth is wast-

How much and how well you, your children and grandchildren live not more than a quarter of a century hence depends upon understanding and initiative today. Machines have helped us farm more and more acres; they also have speeded our means for soil destruction if we remain indifferent to conservation.

Interest In Serious Matter

Breaking of attendance records for the electric show, just closed, may be interpreted in several ways. For one thing, it probably means substantial population increase. For another, it means that the public is still interested in appliance browsing and that bigger stocks attract bigger crowds. Still another is that more and better entertainment is after all a real drawing eard.

One angle to the latter is the degree of interest with which the "atmoic" demonstrations were received. Crowds grew progressively heavier for these serious programs. If this is any criterion of public interest in such matters, there is a fertile field in adult education for one or several organizations.

Fiddles were not invented until the middle ages, hence the instrument on which Nero played while Rome burned, if he played on that occasion, was not a fiddle.



MILLIONS VOTE BUT ONLY 23 CAN MAKE IT COUNT

By TEX EASLEY WASHINGTON UP-A million or

so Texans will go to the polls this year, but only 23 actually will east a vote for the President of the United States.

They, however, will be mere figureheads who send in their ballots to Washington after the issue has been settled in the November gen-

The electoral college method of choosing the president and vice president is the explanation.

A far cry from the institution envisioned by the founding fathers of the republic, the electoral college now functions as an archiac method of formally tabulating the will of the people. The electors' votes still are sent into Congress and counted, but it's a perfunctory op-

Oddly, it is a device which can and has prevented the will of the majority from being reflected in the seating of a president:

One interesting case in which the loser had a larger popular vote then the man who became president occurred in 1876. The winner was President Rutherford B. Hayes The loser was Samuel J. Tilden

In that case three states submitted to Congress two sets of electors each. They were Louisiana, South Carolina and Florida. A special commission comprised of five senators, 5 representatives and 5 members of the U.S. Supreme Court was set up to decide which should be recognized. A predominantly Democratic House group voted 3 to 2 for electoral slates pledged to Democrat Tilden; the nation in the Senate was reversed. The Supreme Court mem-bers, most of whom had been appointed originally by Republican presidents, voted 3 to 2 for the Hayes-pledged electors.

There are now the same number of votes cast in the electoral college as there are U. S. Senators and Representatives, a total of 531. Each state has an electoral strength equivalent to its congressional delegation-two senators for each state and approximately one representative for each 300,000 population. Thus, Texas has 23 electoral

votes. New York has 47. Under the present system, the entire electoral vote of a state goes popular vote, All of New York's to the party receiving the largest votes would be cast for a Republican president if 51 percent of the people voted for the Republican

Partnership With Britain

By WALTER LIPPMANN Now that the new British Ambassador, Sir Oliver Franks, has had a chance to unpack his bags and shake hands, there is a revival of confidence that Britsh-American re-

lations, which have been going from bad to worse, can be repaired. Nothing in the whole field of international relations is so important. Unless it can be done, nothing else that the two governments have promised to do for freedom, recovery and peace can be done. The United Nations will collapse, and if it does, then almost certainly the American people in their dis-illusionment will for a long time to come be in no mood for international collaboration. The European Recovery Program will fail and will be abandoned. Europe will become hopelessly disunited. And anarchy will spread from the Middle East into Africa and Asia.

Working in partnership there is a chance that things can be put in order; with the English-speaking nations separated and opposed, there is no chance.

It is the fashion to say that British- American relations have been disrupted by the disputes over Palestine. To any one who has had long and intimate knowledge of British-American affairs, and has observed closely the course of events before, during, and since the war, that will seem a most superficial explanation. For the degrading quarrel about Palestine is not the cause but it is the ugly consequence of a breakdown of intercourse and communication between the two governments and the two

Neither the heads of the governments nor their foreign ministers have had genuine and intimate consultation, and there has been lacking almost altogether the informal but nevertheless influential intercourse among officials, editors, ournalists, and leaders of opinion which, beginning when Lord Loth-ian was Ambassador, did so much

Knutson's Tax Proposal Would Be Welcomed By The Wealthy Families

By DREW PEARSON WASHINGTON: - The declining

years of the du Ponts, the Rockefellers, the Morgans and the Astors will be made considerably brighter by several loopholes tucked away in the new "technical" tax bill which Congressman Harold Knutson, Republican of Minnesota, is obligingly reporting out of the Ways and Means Com-

He has carefully called this a "technical tax-revision" bill which gives the general impression that it merely rounds off a few rough edges of the tax law. The edges it rounds off, however, eut down the estate and gift taxes so as to benefit the wealthiest families in the

Most pople don't realize that the earlier tax bill, passed over Preident Truman's veto, carried a little-noticed provision reducing estate and gift taxes by a rough average of 30 per cent. By reason of estate-tax exemptions of \$60,000. this relief goes only to the nation's wealthiest families.

This, however, has merely whetted the appetites of the tax-lawyer lobbyists. They are now out to get more for their wealthy clients, and their good friend Congressman Knutson has generously fixed up another bill-H. R. 6712-by which anyone with a good tax lawyer could pass on to his family the nice little bonanza of between \$1,000,-000 and \$2,000,000 without any death or gift taxes whatsoever.

This would reduce gift and inheritance taxes. And while reducing gift and inheritance taxes for the wealthy, millions of low-income taxpayers continue to pay 8 to 10 times as much in income taxes as before the war.

No More Fun-

NO LONGER CAN ONE PEEK THRU LETTER SLOTS

WASHINGTON, June 14 W-The old-fashioned peekaboo letterdrop, a special joy of small-town Americans, is on its way out. In its stead is coming a strictly modern device that takes half the fun out of mailing a letter.

This wouldn't have happened if Gilbert Stanley Underwood hadn't visisted the Herkimer, N.Y., post office some weeks ago.

Underwood is chief architect for the Public Buldings Administration, which designs and builds federal buildings, including postoffices. He gave a reporter this description of what went on at Herkimer:

"The mail had just arrived, and the clerks had started to sort it. Many townspeople were waiting to get the mail from their boxes. "Everyone seemed to know

everyone else. They seemed to know the clerks, too. For one man after another would step up to the letterdrop, push back the flap, peek through, recognize the pants of the nearest clerk and say:

"Hey, Joe, give me my mail -I'm in a hurry." "I never imagined the letterdrop would be put to such use," Underwood said in amazement.

Underwood also noted that people with letters to mail were not content merely to drop them through the slot.

No, indeed, he said. They would shove them through with such force the letters would overshoot the mail receptacle and land on the floor.

"Handing mail to impatient customers and picking letters off the floor were time-wasting nulsances to the clerks," said Underwood. So back in Washington, Underwood designed a letterdrop so cunningly beveled on the inside as to

cut off the view entirely. And no letter can overshoot the mail box, no matter how hard it is popped into the slot. Each letter just slides upward over the beveled surface, kerplunk into the contain-

You'll find non-peek letterdrops in all new postoffices, and Underwood said they'll gradually replace the old slots in the other buildings.

The Herkimer letterdrop? It's still there, but the clerks have covered it with canvas-to prevent peeping and to keep letters from sailing through the air.

Big Hunter

"Yes," he found himself explaining, "Lobenstein is hiring Charles Myers and me to furnish him these buffalo hides. An English firm wants 500 for experimental purposes. If you are interested, go see him. He is located in Fort Leavenworth, and is a reputable fur deal-

So met two men who were destined to help write the pages of Plains history from Dodge City, Kansas, to the Concho country of West Texas.

The Moar brothers formed a hunters company, hiring their men and furnishing the equipment. In

1873 they, with other hunters, swung down into the Texas Panhandle, entering in the present Hansford county. They were followed within a few months by two different merchandising firmsthat of A. C. Myers and of Charlie Rath. These men, together with James Hanrahan, saloon keeper, and Tom O'Keefe, blacksmith, located at what became known as Adobe Walls.

But that is another story. Suffice it to say that the industry reached immense proportions within the next five years. It swept down the High Plains, with Fort Griffin becoming the central merchandising point in 1876, assisted by Hide Town (Snyder), and Rath City or Reynolds the two following

Why short order cooks in other parts of the world are less inspired in their creation of that undelicate bit of delicacy, the hamburger, than are Texas chefs remains a mystery. The recipe may be copyrighted but stray beyond the borders of this commonwealth and the 'burger becomes an anemic facsim-

Whether you order your burger in Rantoul, Ill., or Long Beach, Calif., the thing you buy can't even be called a second cousin of the Texas model.

In the first place, the Texas cooks believe in dishing out some meat within that bun they serve you. In other sections, the meat ball you get isn't much larger than the piece of pork that comes in any can of pork-and-beans.

The cafe-men might insist slaughtered cattle are harder to get in their sections than in

However, the restauranteur in Rantoul or Long Beach cannot explain away his reasons for omitting the vegetables and condiments that are so essential to the taste of the dish.

A hamburger isn't a hamburger in these parts without liberal helpings of onions and pickles diced together, a slice of fresh tomato and a dash of mustard. In other sections they deliver the mustard in a glass container to you, that and nothing else.

Several eateries we have run onto in distant sections of the country have painted across their windows "Hamburgers, Made Texas Style." Invariably, we were disappointed when we sampled their sandwiches, however. They simply did not measure up.

That the 'burger has tremendous appeal with the hungry public is reflected in the staggering sale in local short-order cafes. Not many Saturdays ago, a local eatery

was forced to turn away trade because it had used some 180 dozens of hamburger buns and could obtain no more—that in one day's time. -TOMMY HART

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


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

From all indications, Roswell is counting heavily on getting into professional baseball as soon as possible.
