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First Football Practice Early Tuesday Morning

Team to Scrimmage Ft. Stockton Here September 5

First whomp of shoe leather on the side will be heard in the vicinity of Lions field at 6 o'clock Tuesday morning September 22 when the first football workout of the 1953 season will get under way.

Coach Larry Wilkins has issued the call to all football hopefuls to be on hand at the eerie hour of 6 o'clock for the very first practice session in preparation for the season opener here against Big Lake on Friday, September 11.

For the first two weeks, football practice sessions will be held for an hour and a half before school each morning and a two-hour session after school. The first scrimmage will be at 7 p.m. September 5 against the Fort Stockton team.

Coach Wilkins expects about 40 boys to report for football this fall. He plans to have both A and B teams and an 8-game schedule for the B team. Every boy who comes out for football will have opportunity to play in a game.

Handsome new uniforms of navy blue, a rich purple with gold trim, will be worn by the team in its first game against Big Lake.

A backfield of veterans and an experienced line is a summation of the Ozona Lions, 1953 edition. Herman Charles Garlitz, Ronnie McMullan, Sammy Martinez and Charles Hale will make up the core of the backfield attack and a pretty promising backfield it is. Garlitz and McMullan will be captains of the 1953 Lions.

Only two returning lettermen will be in the line, Kenny Phillips and Graham Childress. The others will be up from last year's B team. Coach Wilkins looks to Menard, Sonora and Junction to be among the stronger teams in the district this year.

A ten-game schedule, opening Sept. 11 and carrying through Oct. 20, will give the Lions five home games and five away from home. This year the Lions will play only two conference games at the home field, against Eldorado and Sonora, playing on the home grounds of Menard, Junction and Eden.

Three Ozona boys have enrolled as students at Schreiner Institute, Kerrville, according to Dr. Andrew Edgington, president. They are Ben Byrl Conklin, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Conklin; Alvin Harrell, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Harrell, and Thomas Lee Kincaid, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Kincaid, Jr. Harrell and Conklin have been members of the Schreiner student body and let corps since September 1950. When they entered the high school department, Kincaid will enroll in his second year.

Boarding students will register Monday, Sept. 14, reports Dean C. Weir. Dormitory facilities, which include four brick dormitories and two barracks, will open on that day. Classes start Wednesday, Sept. 16.

Schreiner is a fully-accredited military school, and includes four years of high school and two years of junior college work. It is a church-related (Presbyterian) school with an emphasis on Christian education.

Ozona P.T.A. Still Affiliated With State And Natl. Organization

In spite of rumors to the contrary, the Ozona Parent Teachers Assn. is still affiliated with the state and national Congress of Parents and Teachers. Mrs. Sidney P. Bolding of San Angelo, Sixth District president, informed officers of the local association this week.

Information reached the local organization recently to the effect that affiliation had been withdrawn because certain required reports had not reached the parent groups. But Mrs. Bolding said that all reports had been made and showed a fine record for the Ozona P.T.A. and that the reports of withdrawal of affiliation were entirely unfounded.

The local P.T.A. will have its first meeting September 21 at 4 p.m. in the high school auditorium. A good program for the entire year has been arranged and officers and other leaders hope for a good attendance on the P.T.A. sessions throughout the year. Mrs. A. O. AF Diving Team Gives Exhibition In New Pools Here

Formal Opening Held Sunday of Two Fine Paddock Pools

A seven-man diving team, all aviation cadets in training at Goodfellow Air Force base in San Angelo, presented spectacular diving exhibitions in both Ozona pools Sunday afternoon as part of a formal opening and dedication of the county-built pools.

The diving team, under the leadership of Major Simms of Goodfellow, presented an excellent performance which included intricate dives and comic diving acts. The men are all expert divers and a big crowd of Ozonians were on hand to witness the exhibition. A cool breeze blowing off heavy rain showers in the southern part of the county keep swimming crowds to a minimum however.

Ralph Jones, county commissioner of Precinct 1, who with Commissioner James Childress, acted as the pool building committee for the county, welcomed the crowd and the visiting divers in a brief opening address and one of the group of visiting servicemen took over as master of ceremonies for the diving exhibition.

The two new swimming pools, among the finest to be found anywhere, are attracting increasingly larger crowds at each daily session. Recent cool weather has slowed swimmers during the early morning hours, but when the temperature goes up in the afternoon and evening, the pools are in great demand.

Possibility of a revised schedule of open hours for the pools after the opening of schools is being discussed but no definite plan has yet been worked out.

Oil Production In County 716,070 Barrels In June

Todd Field Led in Total; Elkhorn Second Best

June production in Crockett county's 38 oil fields totaled 716,070 barrels.

Production during the first six months of the year was 4,297,149 barrels. The Todd (Ellenburger) field led in production during June with 200,361 barrels of oil. Second most prolific producing area was the Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field, with production totalling 131,059 barrels of oil. The World field produced 126,638 barrels and the Vaughn field 88,603 barrels.

The Ranch (Strawn) field was opened by the Continental Oil Co. 2-C Harris, completed July 24 for a daily flowing potential of 363.78 barrels of 47 gravity oil from pay between 8,171-91 feet. It is in 4-BE-2, Francis Boren survey, 12 1/2 miles south of Texon in Reagan county.

The Dry Creek 1150 field was opened by Harry J. Russell 1 Winnie Puckett Martin et al. completed July 2 for a daily pumping potential of 7.5 barrels of 31 gravity oil from between 1,149-181 feet in the Grayburg. It is in 39-OP-GC&SF, nine miles northwest of Ozona.

The Noelke 3465 field was opened by LeLodge Petroleum Co. Inc. 1-A Bouscaren Heirs, completed July 2 for a daily flowing potential of 60.01 barrels of 41.6 gravity oil from between 3,565-580 feet in the Clear Fork. It is in 57-GG-TCCR, eight miles southeast of Iraan.

Wildcats Spotted On Ingham, Owens Lands In Crockett

Elkhorn Link Well Finaled for 230 Barrels Daily

Applications have been filed to drill two wildcats and one stepout to production in the Wyatt field of Crockett county.

Cities Service Oil Co. will drill its 1-F Owens, a 6,400-foot wildcat, nine miles northeast of Sheffield. The project will test the Cisco.

Rotary drilling will begin August 29. Elevation is 2,730 feet.

Location, on a 160.26-acre tract, is 661.1 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 17-GG-GC&SF.

The prospector is 1 1/4 miles west of the Clara Couch field, which produces from the Grayburg at an average depth of 2,079 feet and from the Wolfcamp at 5,717 feet.

It is also one mile southwest of production in the Clara Couch (Cisco) gas field.

Cataroga Oil Co. of San Angelo will drill an 1,800-foot wildcat, its 1 Ingham - Superior, eight miles east of Sheffield.

Cable tool drilling will begin at once. It is on an 801-acre tract.

Location is 330 feet from the north and 990 feet from the most northerly west lines of 37-1-I&GN. The prospector is three miles south of the depleted one-well Cox field and 4 1/4 miles southwest of the three-well Lancaster Hill field, which produces from the Grayburg at an average depth of 1,624 feet.

It is also 4 1/4 miles southeast of Taber 1 Cox, plugged and abandoned Dec. 1, 1952 at 1,936 feet on elevation of 2,376 feet.

Continental Oil Co. 5-D Shannon a link well 3/4 mile north and 1/2 mile south of production on the east side of the Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field of Crockett county, has been finaled for a daily flowing potential of 230 barrels of 40.8 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio at 227-1.

Production was through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 7,264-300 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing cemented at 7,379 feet, the total depth. Top of pay was picked at 7,225 feet on derrick floor elevation of 2,599 feet. Pay section was acidized with 500 gallons.

Tubing pressure was 500 pounds; casing pressure, 150 pounds.

Location is in 20-UV-GC&SF.

Oliver A. Kotyza of Midland will drill their 4-A Todd 1/2-mile west of production on the south side of the Wyatt field, 15 miles northwest of Ozona.

Cable tool drilling to 1,600 feet will begin immediately.

Location, on a 240-acre tract, is 330 feet from the north and 4-35-WX-GC&SF.

NEW HUMBLE STATION

Construction work is progressing rapidly on a new filling station being built by Judge Houston Smith on a lot facing Highway 290 in western Ozona. Two residences which formerly occupied the lot were moved to the back of the lot to face east on the side street. The new station is being built for lease to the Humble Oil and Refining Co.

Superior Elkhorn Outpost Recovers Oil

Superior Oil Co. 1-27 University, 27-46-University, 3/4-mile north outpost to production in the Elkhorn (Ellenburger) field, cut a core between 7,334-54 feet. Recovery was 19 feet of highly-fractured dolomite.

Operator then took a two-hour drillstem test between 7,304-54 feet. Gas surfaced at the rate of 12,300 cubic feet daily. Recovery was 740 feet of 39.4 gravity oil and 160 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud.

Flowing pressure was 60-310 pounds; 30-minute shut-in pressure, 2,085 pounds.

The project then cored between 7,354-71 feet. Recovery was 16 feet of fractured dolomite bleeding oil and gas.

Recovery on a 40-minute drillstem test between 7,250-71 feet was 10 feet of drilling mud. Flowing pressure was 0-30 pounds; 30-minute shut-in pressure, zero.

Showers Continue At Slow Job Of Chasing Drouth

Heavy Rains Reported Sunday in Southern Part of County

Those scattered showers continue to scatter hope in the ranch country that at last the long drouth is on the way out. Follow-up rains have brought up green grass and weeds in the areas fortunate enough to get them and the gradually spreading showers are wetting more and more of the drouth parched land to bring hope to ranch operators that these and hoped-for fall rains will put the country on the mend.

A fast-traveling shower cloud which dumped a heavy shower on a strip of country from northeast to northwest of Ozona Tuesday night recorded .6 of an inch of moisture in the town of Ozona and a reported inch of rain in a long Howard draw to the west, with heavy falls continuing along the comparatively narrow strip beyond Sheffield.

Last Sunday afternoon a wide section of Crockett county southwest and southeast of Ozona caught one of the heaviest rains of the year, up to six inches in some spots. T. A. Kincaid, Jr., Marbury Morrison, S. M. Harvick, V. I. Pierce and ranches in that area reported the torrential soaker of around 6 inches, falling in an estimated four hours. Very heavy rains came within a few miles of Ozona to the south but only a trace was recorded in town. Falls were lighter on the southeast and southwest edges of the favored area.

Faculty Complete For Opening Of Schools Monday

High School Students Register Today and Friday

With a strong faculty, complete in every department, and schedule lined up, all was in readiness this week for the opening of the 1953-54 school term next Monday morning, August 31, Supt. L. B. T. Sikes announced this week.

The faculty, completed during the past two weeks with return of the last signed contracts, shows a total of 48 teachers ready to begin the task of guiding Ozona youth during the next nine months. Of this number, 21 teachers are new additions to the local faculty, replacements for members of last year's faculty who have resigned.

Of the 21 new teachers added by Mr. Sikes in a summer-long search for teaching talent, 12 hold master's degrees. A total of 18 faculty members, 37 per cent hold master's degrees. By schools, teacher numbers are 14 in the North Elementary, 13 in the South Elementary, 6 in Junior High, 14 in high school and one in the colored school.

High school students will begin school activities today and Friday with registration for Senior and Junior students set for today (Thursday) and for Sophomore and Freshman students Friday. Principal P. O. Hatley and a staff of helpers will be on hand to register the high school students and a matter of a few minutes time is all that will be needed to complete this chore, Mr. Hatley said.

Opening exercises will be held at 9 o'clock Monday morning. High school and junior high school opening exercises will be combined in the high school auditorium, while separate opening programs will be held in the North and South Elementary schools at the same hour. All students will be dismissed at noon Monday, with regular classes to begin at 8:30 Tuesday morning.

For the teachers, there will be the first general faculty meeting of the new year in the high school library room beginning at 9 o'clock Saturday morning.

New Motor Vehicle Inspection Law Goes Into Effect Today

AUSTIN, Aug. 26 (Spl.) The old Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection law died last night at midnight after a somewhat turbulent existence.

The measure, which saw heated debate in the last session of the legislature, has been replaced by a modified version which calls only for the inspection of brakes, lighting equipment, horns, rear view mirrors and windshield wipers. It becomes effective today, but Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the State Public Safety Commission has officially set the new inspection period for September 15, 1953, through April 15, 1954.

George Busby, chief of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division of the Department of Public Safety, has said that there will be about 3,000 inspection stations ready to operate on the opening date.

"Trained mechanics who are well versed in the new law and its requirements will be set to go, and they will have an adequate supply of stickers and other materials on hand," Busby stated.

Garrison added that he could see no possibility of a "log jam" of motorists at the official inspection stations at any time unless too many people put off getting their autos checked until the last few days of the seven-month period.
