Conoco To Drill East Offset To Ranch Field

Continental Oil Co. has filed application to drill a 3/4-mile east offset to its 2-C Harris, opener and lone producer in the newly-designated one-well Ranch (Strawn) field of Crockett County, 12 1/2 miles south of Texon. It will be drilled as the No. 1-D Harris.

Rotary drilling to 9,100 feet will begin immediately.

Location, on a 140-acre tract, is 1,980 feet from the middle south and 5,000 feet from the most east-

erly east lines of BB2-R. H. Harris.

Conoco 2-C Harris was finished July 24 for a daily flowing potential of 363.78 barrels of 47 gravity oil plus 31.71 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 2,592-1. Production was from between 8,171-91 feet in the Strawn, topped at 6,470 feet on elevation of 2,847 feet.

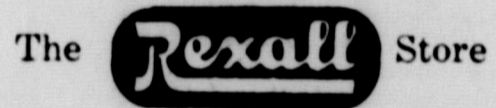

### At. Foundation Has Over Half Million Texas Polio Fund

Dallas, Texas— The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis recently announced that through Sept. 30, 1953, it had made 28 grants to eight Texas organizations totalling \$500,307.10 according to General Robert J. Smith, March of Dimes Chairman. The eight institutions still have operating funds some \$93,454.92 and \$500,207.10 granted since the General Smith pointed out. The largest of the grants was \$137,144 to Baylor University for research and medical care for the second largest grant, \$89,577, going to the University of Texas for virus research. The other six organizations participating in the polio program are: Southwestern Medical College in Dallas; Crippled Children's Hospital in Marlin; Texas Scottish Hospital; Jefferson Davis Hospital in Houston; Southwest Foundation for Research and Education in Dallas; and the Southern Polio Myelitis Respiratory Center in Houston.

Of the 28 grants, 17 for a total of \$189,419.83 were for virus research; four were for \$13,486.05 for treatment after-effects; one for a total of \$4,224.

00 and six for medical care for a total of \$199,722.30.

General Smith said that the \$93,454.92 in unexpended balances from past awards was divided between Baylor University with \$47,739.92 remaining for medical care and \$45,715.00 by Jefferson Davis Hospital in Houston for the same purpose.

From 1938 through December 31, 1952, the March of Dimes campaigns in Texas have resulted in net receipts of \$9,998,309.94 of which \$8,716,145.54 or 87 per cent was actually spent in the state. "It is of special interest to note that for the period January 1, 1949, through December 31, 1952, the March of Dimes campaign in Texas have netted a total of \$6,579,024.40 of which \$6,316,972.57 or 96 per cent has been spent in the state," General Smith said.

**LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY**



Fort Worth—Parity prices of livestock as announced Monday by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics reveal hogs selling at 117 per cent of parity, the only species in that fortunate position.

Average hog price on August 15 was \$23.60, effective parity \$20.20. Average cattle prices, \$16.30, effective parity \$21.00, or 78 percent of parity. Average calf prices \$16.70, effective parity price \$23.30, 72 percent of parity. Average lamb price \$20.10, effective parity \$22.80, or 88 percent of parity. Average wool price 53 cents, effective parity price 58.4cents, or 91 percent of parity.

Last week the daily papers and news services of the state carried a report from Houston's sixth annual marketing school. At this meeting, a spokesman for a leading cattlemen's association said price supports would be ineffective "because cattle are now selling at 90.1percent of parity."

This sort of off-the-cuff use figures has hurt the stockman's chances many times in the past when consideration of Congress or Washington agencies has been sought by the cattle producers. This gentleman may have been speaking in good faith, but he certainly gave the foes of the cattle producers some ammunition with his mis-statement of the facts.

The fact is that cattle and calves at 78 percent and 72 percent of parity respectively, are bringing an average 75 percent of parity. With high support prices on feed ingredients and grains, the production of beef is still a hazardous business.

Monday's cattle run was big, over 131,000 at 12 major markets, over 7,000 above a week ago. The calf run of over 17,000 was 3,000 above a week ago. Hog receipts were light at all points. Western

markets such as Denver and Omaha reported big sheep runs, indicating the Fall run of Western slope sheep and lambs was under way. This hurt prices around the circuit, too.

At Fort Worth, good and choice fed steers and yearlings, cows and bulls were fully steady. Grassy steers and yearlings 50 cents lower.

Good and choice grainfed beefs \$18.00-24.00, some Haskell County steers of over 1,000 lbs. at \$24.00. Common and medium grassers \$11.00-16.05; cutter grade yearlings \$8.00-10.00. Fat cows 9.50-12.00; and canners and cutters \$6.00-9.50. Bulls \$8.00-12.00.

Good and choice fat calves \$13.00-17.00, common and medium \$10.00-13.00; culls \$7.00-9.00. Good and choice stocker steers calves \$13.00-17.00; stockers yearlings \$10.00-16.50; stocker cows \$8.00-13.00.

The hog market, aided by light receipts, was strong to 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday with top hogs at \$25.50. Good and choice 185-250 lb. hogs \$25.00-25.50; sows, \$19.00-22.00. Lighter and heavier butchers \$22.50-24.75. Pigs \$19.00 down.

Slaughter lambs were weak to 50 cents or more lower. Other sheep and lambs steady. Good and choice fat lambs \$17.00-20.00; cull, common and medium grades \$10.00-16.00. Stocker and feeder lambs \$12.00-15.00. Fearlings \$10.00-16.00. Old wethers \$7.00-10.00. Slaughter ewes \$5.00-6.50; old bucks \$2.00-2.50. Solid mouthed ewes \$7.00-10.00.

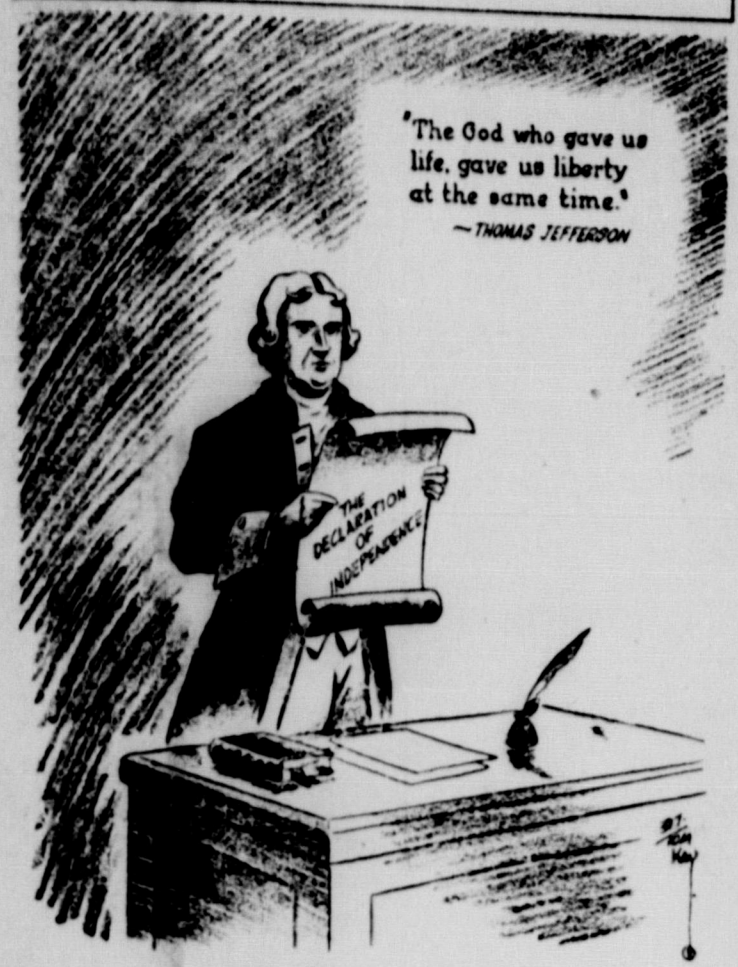

# So the People May Know

Previously in this series attention was called to the responsibility of county officials to publish regular financial reports. City officials have the same duty.

Here are two provisions of the Texas statutes describing what the city authorities must do:

"Art. 1001. Cities, Towns, and Villages — publication of receipts and expenditures by city treasurer.

"... At the end of every half year he shall cause to be published at the expense of the city, a statement showing the amount of receipts and expenditures for six months next preceding, and the general condition of the treasury."

"Art. 1023. Cities, Towns, and Villages — city council shall publish statement of receipts and expenditures.

"The city council shall, at least ten days before the expiration of each municipal year, cause to be published in a city newspaper a correct and full statement of the receipts and expenditures from the date of the last annual report, together with the sources, the condition of the treasury, together with such information as may be necessary to a full understanding of the financial condition of the city."

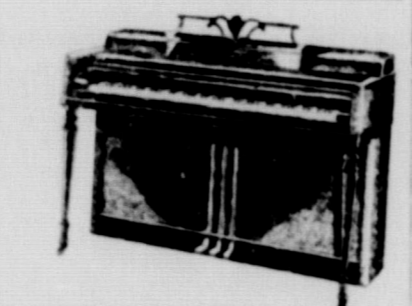

## Stepped-Up Production Of Agriculture Poses Problem For Controls

College Station—Total agricultural output in the nation is now 41 percent above the production for the prewar years, 1933-39. Even with our increasing population and high domestic consumption, large stocks of wheat, cotton, corn, beef and butter have piled up.

C. H. Bates, farm management specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says the return to acreage control program is evidence of a worsening of the economic picture. However, he

adds, if burdensome surpluses are to be avoided, production must be more nearly geared to demand. The well being of farm and urban families alike can be affected by broad economic objectives in the present situation.

These objectives include strengthening and expanding foreign markets for farm commodities; maintaining a high level of employment and earnings throughout the nation's economy; keeping farm purchasing power high and using more efficient production methods on the nation's farms and ranches in order to increase the output per person.

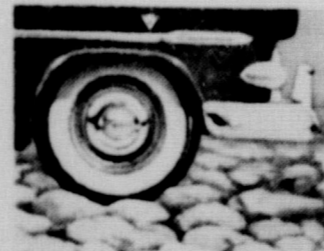

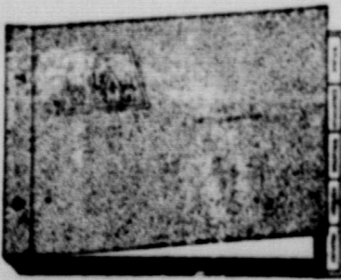
